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
THE FAIR OF ATHY

This song was sung in the pubs of the eastern part of County Galway, Ireland, to the tune better known as "Haste to the wedding."


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
COAT OF ARMS OF THE ATHY TRIBE OF GALWAY




ATHY CASTLE - GALWAY, IRELAND

PREFACE

Let me introduce myself. I am the son of Lawrence F. Athy (8), son of Mervin Elijah Athy (7), son of /702/ Daniel Basil Athy (6), all of Williams County, Ohio. I was nearly fourteen years old in 1940 when Daniel died at the age of 93, remember him well, and was fascinated by his stories about frontier life before the Civil War. His two most prized possessions seemed to have been a large claw from a bear that he had killed when he was a young man and a copy of Genealogy of the Athey Family in America 1642-1932, by Dr. C. E. Athey, that had been given to him by my father. Daniel was disappointed that our immediate family was unknown to Dr. C. E. Athy at the time of publication.

Dr. C. E. Athey did us a great service when he wrote his book in that he published not only his own work but also that of many other members of various branches of the Athy-Athey-Atha family, mostly right, partly wrong, and very little with proofs. His book is our greatest family treasure.

In 1971 I was contacted by Thomas Whitfield Athey, III, who was searching for information to be used in his book, The Descendants of Henry Athey of Maryland, South Carolina, and Alabama, which was published in 1972. His excellent book lists over 750 descendants of the gentleman that I list as /45/ Henry Athey (4). I have taken information on Henry's children and grandchildren directly from Whit's book.

Whit put me in touch with Paul T. Davis, III, who had done extensive research on the early Athy-Athey-Atha generations and in 1972 published in newsletter form extensive information on the first four generation of the family with documentation for the first three generations. His work was under the title The Athey Family Genealogy. Paul did such excellent work that it only made sense for me to start with his work, make changes and additions using the same lineage numbers, and then add a sixth generation. Subsequently, I have lost track of Paul. Please contact me, Paul Davis, wherever you are! We owe you our thanks.

Paul referred me to Mrs. Gladys Lott, who in turn was so kind as to provide me with information that proved that my /702/ Daniel Basil Athy (6) was a son of /185a/ Elijah Basil Athy (5), thought to be a son of /71/ Basil Athy (4), son of /19/ Corporal John Athy (3). Someone had submitted to Dr. C. E. Athey a family list for /71/ Basil Athy (4) which he published and which has subsequently proven to be completely in error. At a dead end, I became discouraged in 1975 and lost interest.

Then in 1979 my cousin Patricia Braun, of Williams County, Ohio, put me in contact with Mrs. Gladys Donson, also of Williams County, great granddaughter of /713/ David Gusler, Jr. (6). Gladys had proven that our /71/ Basil Athy (4) was indeed the son of /19/ Corporal John Athy (3) and had done extensive work on Basil's descendants. Gladys is an excellent genealogist and has been my constant inspiration and best critic. She has also done much work on the ancestors of Sarah Foster Athy, wife of /19/ Corporal John Athy (3), and on the family of Sarah Marsh, formerly thought to have been the second wife of /1/ Captain George Athy (1). She has demonstrated that there is no proof that Sarah Athy was of the Marsh family. We really don't know who Sarah was.

In 1980 I discovered that Fern I. Bauer of Springfield, Ohio, had published the <u>History of the John and Frances Rue Athey (Athy) Family 1637-1980</u>. This John is /175/ John Athey, III, (5). I have taken from this excellent book information on John's descendants. Fern has also done all of us an additional valuable service. Within the same cover of the book described above, she has reprinted Dr. C. E. Athey's book in its entirety - a beautiful job.

I have compiled in this book basic genealogical information on the first six generations of the family in America from the sources described above, from information sent to me by many other family members, and from my own research. These listings are offered without supporting evidence and can only be considered probable relationships. Thus each individual might use such information as a guide to help him prove his own lineage. On the other hand, much of the information has been proven previously or could be proven by information in my files or those of other researchers. I want to thank those who have supplied me information on their families but will not list names for fear that I might omit someone.

You may ask why I use the spelling "Athy" rather than "Athey" as always been used previously. I have what I feel are five good reasons as follows: [1] For rather obvious reasons, I am absolutely prejudiced in favor of the spelling "Athy". [2] No self respecting Irishman would have used any spelling other than "Athy" (assuming that he could spell at all and were asked). [3] Although the spelling "Athy" was common in England in the early 1600's, it had become rare by 1700 certainly for political reasons. Any English Protestant priest or civil servant would always use the spellings "Athey", "Athay", "Athie", "Atthea", etc. and would hesitate to use the Irish Catholic spelling "Athy". [4] Control of the Province of Maryland passed from Catholics to Protestants in 1691. Before that time the Catholic spelling predominated in official records; and afterwards, the Protestant spellings are most common. [5] In a letter to my father dated November 24, 1933, Dr. C. E. Athev stated the following: "Now relative to your history, you sign yourself Athy. The very first to come did the same, George Athy, as all of them did until about 100 years ago. In fact I found a deed, Thomas Athy, while his wife signed as Martha Athey. All of those of the Revolution are known as Athy, and the family back in Ireland never have changed, but the majority now sign Athey."

Since the Church of England became the official religion of the Province of Maryland in 1691 and all office holders were subsequently required to take an oath supporting the Church, we would expect to find and do find the English spellings in all church and civil records from that time until the Revolutionary War even though, as Dr. C. E. Athey points out, the early generations would have preferred the Irish spelling. By 1800 the spelling variations had narrowed to "Athy", "Athey", "Atha" (probably a contraction of "Athay"), and "Athon" (seems to be as American as apple pie).

Most family members still using the original "Athy" spelling are descendants of /19/ Corporal John Athy who died in 1830 at the age of 100 years and was thus able to carry the old name tradition to later generations.

FOREWORD

The ATHY surname originated in France in the late 12th century with a Norman military commander named Gerard who adopted his surname, de Athée, from the name of the village of his birth – Athée Sur Cher – in the then Province of Touraine. This beautiful little village exists today and is located about eight miles southeast of Tours, Indre et Loire.

The surname was taken to England by this same Norman in the early thirteenth century where Anglo-Norman historians introduced several spelling variations such as Athies, Atye, Attie, Athyes, and Athy to convey a pronunciation something like a modern day "At-Eye" or "At-high". His descendants were using the spelling de Athy when they arrived in eastern Ireland in the late thirteenth century where they served as mounted professional soldiers (knights) in the service of the local overlords.

There was at that time in County Kildare a new town with the Irish name of Ath-I. For this same pronumciation, the Anglo-Normans preferred to identify the town by a spelling known to them – Athy. Thus the town name is not derived from the surname except in the sense that the Anglo-Norman spelling was adopted.

In the early fourteenth century, Sir William de Athy served as a knight at Ardree near the town of Athy; became involved in certain commercial ventures in Dublin; transferred his allegiance to Richard de Burgh, overlord of Western Ireland; and established himself in Athenry and Galway as soon as the countryside was pacified. He built in the new town of Galway its first stone residence, known thereafter as Athy Castle, which stood until the middle of the nineteenth century (see figure 2).

William's descendants eventually joined with thirteen other French speaking Anglo-Norman families in obtaining both Royal and Papal charters to build a wall around the town, conduct maritime trade, collect customs fees, elect church wardens, legislate for the town, and administer the town. These fourteen merchant families, now referred to as the Fourteen Tribes of Galway, intermarried and continued to control the town of Galway until the middle of the seventeenth century. The town of Galway currently celebrates the Festival of the Galway Tribes each summer during which on three occasions I have proudly raised the Athy flag on one of the fourteen flagpoles on the town square.

It appears that at least one member of the de Athy family remained in England in the late thirteenth century since the name continues there in the Anglo-Norman community. On the other hand, the Anglo-Saxons in the countryside had not yet adopted the use of surnames. Then in the fifteenth century, surnames did become popular in England with a variety of derivations.

In some rural areas it became popular to distinguish between men with the same given name by reference to geographical features unique to their residences. Lets assume that there were three men named John living in or near the same village, one living at the brook, one living at the woods, and one living at the hay meadow. These men became known

as John a-ta-brook, John a-ta-wood, and John a-ta-hay; John a-t'-brook, John a-t'-wood, John a-t'-hay; and finally John Atbrook, John Atwood, and John Athay (Atha, Athey). By the seventeenth century there were quite a few men in England with the names Athay, Atha, Athey, Athe, Atte, Attey, etc. Although these names were well known in England, it seems that few if any people with these names came to America until the nineteenth century.

THE ATHY FAMILY OF GALWAY

The Athy family in Galway continued to be very influential during the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries. The family always remained small and seemed to decline somewhat in political influence in the sixteenth century and perhaps also in economic matters in the seventeenth century. Enjoying the advantages of both Royal and Papal charters, the fourteen families remained extremely loyal to the Kings of England and to the Catholic Church thru the centuries.

In 1577 John Athy built a magnificent stone house in Galway on the south side of St. Augustine Street, the first door east of Cross Street (see figure 6c). The door frame and window frame were of carved stone and included over the door the Athy coat-of-arms and John's merchant's mark (see figure 3b). The main house was two and one half stories with slated roof and with a single story house in the yard behind it. When this house was demolished in 1947, Clare Sheridan (first cousin to Sir Winston Churchill) recovered the carved doorway and window and had them installed in a small building on top of "Spanish Arch" adjacent to and part of her art studio (see figures 4 and 5). These treasures will hopefully be preserved indefinitely since the "Spanish Arch" is one of the last surviving portions of the old town wall and is now part of the City Museum.

Walter Athy, son of John, had business connections with a Francis Martin, probably married Francis' daughter, and lived for years in a stone house owned by a Stephen Martin. In 1640 Walter owned his father's property as described above to which had been added a second dwelling house of three stories. Walter had a son Francis, no doubt named after his maternal grandfather. At this time Athy Castle seems to have been owned by descendants of Walter's brother.

Sometime in the 1630s, Francis Athy married another Martin woman, the daughter of George Martin who had been Mayor of Galway in 1632. Their marriage stone is shown in figure 3a and can be seen today on display in the Lydon House Restaurant on Shop Street in Galway. This specific stone was never used in Francis' house as it was broken during carving and was found by Mr. Lydon in the rubble of the stone carver's shop on the north side of Middle Street near Lower Abbeygate Street. Also on display is a broken stone lintel from a nearbye Middle Street site on which is carved the Athy coat-of-arms. This lintel is thought to have been from Athy Castle since it had been used as a structural member of a ninteenth century building. Since Francis was not listed as a property owner in 1640, it can be assumed that he built the three story residence at the back of his father's property. Francis Athy served as a "Sheriffe" of Galway in 1639 and as a Councilman in 1644. It had been decreed in 1638 that he hold the Parson's tiethes of the Parish of St. Nicholas which covered the area within the town walls and was by law Protestant at that time.

We should note that prior to 1643 Galway had a Protestant English army company garrisoned locally and that the Catholic Church had been outlawed. In 1643 during the Irish Rebellion, the town threw out the English garrison and restored the Catholic Church at St. Nicholas. Thus the town was overtly Catholic from 1643 until Cromwell captured the town in 1652 and restored Protestant control. Having held office prior

to 1643, George Martin and Francis Athy must have been "Protestant in Name" since the King's law required all officials to take a Protestant oath. Yet they must also have been "Catholic at Heart" since they resisted Cromwell and suffered accordingly.

Although his brother Edmond seems to have had property in both Galway and County Mayo, Walter and his descendants apparently had property only within the walls of Galway. Both branches of the family were merchants, but they were also part-time soldiers since the Athy family was required to provide continuously such sentinels as were required to man a portion of the north wall near Athy Castle including a nearby tower in the wall known as Athy Tower. The Martin family had controlled the local milling and fishing industries for centuries and were required to man the west wall and tower between the river bridge and Spanish Arch. Figure 6 shows Galway as it appeared in the year 1610. The letter "A" identifies Athy Castle; "B", St. Nicholas Collegiate Church; "C", the house built by John Athy; and "D", Spanish Arch at the docks.

Although the Athy family had spoken French for several centuries, they were speaking English by the sixteenth century. As merchants they lived in fine houses, furnished them well, and dressed per the current European fashions. In the early seventeenth century, they would have worn costumes similar to those illustrated in figure 9.

Though not of noble blood, each of the fourteen tribes had acquired its own coat-of-arms by 1650, carved them in stone on their houses, and probably displayed them at every opportunity. These fourteen coats-of-arms are illustrated in color in the margin on a still existing 1650 map of the town of Galway. Although some arms were relatively new at that time, there is good reason to believe that those of both the Athy and Martin families date back to the end of the 12th century.

The Athy arms are illustrated in figure 1 and are described on the map as follows: "Checky argent and gules, on a chevron of the last, three etoiles, or." In other words: three gold stars on a red chevron on a silver and red checkered background. The crest is described as follows: "A demi lion rampant." The motto "Ductus non Coactus" means "led not driven." We know nothing regarding the origins of this information but can make certain deductions. Since simple geometric designs are normally the older designs, the checky or checks with chevron designs would have been very early. Since the lion rampant was the principle design in the coat-of-arms of King Richard the Lionhearted and since Gerard de Athée was a Castellan in Richard's service. we might assume that Richard awarded the silver and red checkered field to Gerard as his coat-of-arms and that Gerard adopted the demi lion rampant to show that he was in Richard's service as was the custom. Since the de Clare family used three red chevrons on its coat-of-arms and since Sir William de Athy and perhaps also his father were in the service of the de Clare family, we might also assume that the red chevron was added to the Athy coat-of-arms to identify the bearer as being in the service of the de Clare family.

The Martin coat-of-arms is said to have been awarded to an Oliver Martyn by Richard the Lionhearted while on crusade. Oliver was made prisoner with Richard in Germany and died there.

The Martin arms are described as follows: "Azure, a Calvary cross, on three degrees argent, between the sun in splendor, on the dexter limb, and the moon in crescent, on the sinister, or." In other words: a silver Calvary cross on a three stepped silver platform with a gold sun on the left and a gold crescent moon on the right, all on a blue background. The Crest: "An etoile wavy, of six points, or," which is to say "a six pointed golden star." The Motto: "Auxilium meum a Domino" which means "my service to the Lord."

Thus Francis Athy was a merchant with property and political influence within the small walled area of perhaps twenty acres that had been operated for centuries under a Royal charter. Francis had at least three sons. Walter was the oldest, was named after his paternal grandfather, and would inherit his father's merchant business. The second son was George, born in 1642 and named after his maternal grandfather; and the third was John, born in 1644.

Although the elders of the town were in opposition, some of its citizens joined with the Irish and brought Galway into the Civil War in 1642 on the side of the Irish against the King. The town was under siege until it fell in June of 1643. Thus George was a "war baby." Times were relatively good from 1643 until disaster struck in 1649 before George had become old enough to receive any formal education.

The plague arrived in July of 1649, and the town was virtually abandoned until the disease had run its course in the summer of 1650. By that time Galway had become involved again in a war on the side of the King against Oliver Cromwell's forces. The town was besieged by Cromwell's forces in the summer of 1651 and surrendered in April of 1652 when George was only ten years old. The surrender was followed by two years of famine and plague that reduced the local population by one third. During this same period the possessions of the local Catholics who had resisted were taken by the English soldiers who lived in and destroyed their homes. Many of the local people were loaded on ships and sold into bondage in the West Indies. All trade had ceased in Galway by 1654.

Catholics were not allowed to live within the walls after the surrender, and their property within the walls was confiscated and sold to Protestants by 1657. We do not know where Francis' family might have lived immediately after 1652, or when Francis died; but we do know that those times were extremely difficult for the members of the fourteen tribes.

The Athy family merchant business must have been continued by Francis Athy - perhaps from one of the villages on Galway Bay; and Francis probably died by 1666. At that time Walter Athy fitz Francis leased for 42 years Oranmore Castle from his overlord, William, Earl Clanricarde, a descendant of Richard de Burgh who had built it in the early fourteenth century. Walter's ancestor William de Athy had come to Galway in the service of Richard de Burgh. Oranmore Castle is a typical rectangular Norman keep standing at water's edge at the east end of Galway Bay and with an integral stone dock. The east end of the bay is silted now but must have been then an ideal location for a merchant who was not allowed to live within the walls of Galway.

Walter married an Anne (probably FRENCH), and they had a daughter Mary French Athy who married a Walter BLAKE. Walter had no son, but the

descendants of Walter and Mary Athy Blake occupied Oranmore Castle until it was sold ca. 1850. This castle is occupied today by Commander Bill King and his wife Anita. Oranmore Castle was restored by Anita King's mother, wife of Sir Shane Leslie, a first cousin of Sir Winston Churchill.

George and John, the second and third sons of Francis, spent their early years surrounded by relative wealth; but circumstances prevented their getting educations or participating in the struggling family business. Since they could see no future in Galway, or in Ireland for that matter, both George and John elected to go as bondservants to the Province of Maryland which was still governed by a Catholic overlord and where religious freedom was emphasized.

WEST TO MARYLAND

It is said that Christopher Columbus prayed at St. Nicholas Collegiate Church in Galway before sailing west to America, and we might assume that George and John Athy did the same.

Judge Thomas Dent of Yorkshire, England, a protestant, had arrived in America in the 1650's and had married Rebecca Wilkerson, daughter of Reverand William Wilkerson, who had acquired considerable property in Maryland. At the Reverand's death in 1663, Thomas acquired much of that property and established residence in St. Mary's City where he patented one acre of land called "The Lawyer's Lodging" and was next door neighbor to Governor Thomas Notley. He also held extensive lands on Nanjemoy Creek, at Port Tobacco, and on the Anacostia (Potomac) River. Thomas was appointed High Sheriff and a Justice of the County Court in St. Marys County in 1664, Commissioner of the Peace in 1688, and a member of the Maryland General Assembly in 1669, 1674, and 1675.

Thomas Dent entered his rights in 1663 for lands due to him for transporting "George Athley" and others. Then "George Athee" of St. Mary's County proved on 3 November 1668 his right to land due to him for services to Thomas Dent and then sold his right that same day. Thus it appears that George arrived in Maryland in 1661 and served the normal seven year term as bondservant from 1661 until 1668. We have no hint as to in what fashion George Athy might have served Thomas Dent during that period, but it is clear that contacts made by George with Thomas Dent; Thomas' sons; Thomas' brother-in-law, William Hatton; and Mrs Dent's second husband, Colonel John Addison, served George well in the years to come.

In October 1671, George Athy was subpoensed as a witness at the Charles County Court. In November 1672, he is said by Nicholas Richardson to have purchased from him tobacco and other comodities for which George is charged with nonpayment – a charge that was dropped in November 1673. George registered his mark for hogs and cattle in November 1672 to be "the Right eare cropt over keeled and under keeled the left eare Swallow forked." He may have been living at that time on 100 acres called "Maidstone" on the south side of Piscataway Creek about four miles from its mouth. George had this property surveyed on 6 February 1673 and received his grant for this land on 18 August 1674. We do not know when this property was sold.

George "Athee" received three grants during 1675, "Hutton Lockvice" of 110 acres, "Athee's Hopewell" of 100 acres, and "Wakefield" of 200 acres. All were clearly land speculations in the unsettled country to the north since all were sold within six months of purchase. It is also interesting to note that these grants were made less than one year before Judge Thomas Dent died.

William Dent, the oldest son of Thomas Dent, had established his residence on Dent land on Nanjemoy Creek; and in April 1677, George Athy made a deposition concerning Dent land at Nanjemoy. Then on 17 April 1680 George Athey obtained a survey on an 80 acre tract called "Hopewell" in Nanjemoy Hundred, Charles County, on the east side of a great beaver dam three miles from Zachariah Wade and on 27 September 1680 obtained a grant. Here George lived with his first wife, Ann, and his first son, #2 John (2). The exact location of "Hopewell" is not known but is thought to be between Piscataway Creek and Mattawoman Creek about two miles east of "Athey's Choice".



CHARLES COUNTY, MARYLAND

Although the original settlesment on the Maryland side of the Potomac River had been at the southern most part in St. Marys County, the area draining into the Potomac River above the Wicomico River had grown and was formed into Charles County in 1658. All of the Colony of Maryland was under the control of the Proprietor, Cecil Calvert, Lord Baron of Baltimore, a gentleman of the Catholic faith. In contrast to the religious conflicts that continued in England and Ireland, Maryland was considered to be free of religious persecution and was populated by about half Catholics and half Protestants.

Less than two thousand people lived in Charles County in 1680, and almost all of these lived directly on the tidewater bays, rivers and creeks south of the Piscataway River. Their cabins were located close to the water, and each had its own landing and boats. Although there were a few footpaths and trails fit for horseback, there were no roads at all satisfactory for wheeled vehicles and certainly no bridges.

There were two small settlements in the county, one at Port Tobacco Creek and one at Nanjemoy Creek, both having docks for ocean vessels. Port Tobacco boasted a Catholic church and an Episcopal church – the only churches in the county. Since there had previously been no government buildings in the county, the County Court had been meeting in private residences referred to by the local people as "court houses." Thus the word courthouse was coined and applied to the new 22' x 25' two story wooden structure recently built for the county near Port Tobacco.

By that time a few of the larger manor houses had been built of local brick, but almost all residences were wooden cabins. A typical cabin such as might have been built by George Athy would have been about 20' x 25', single story, built of logs, floored and lofted with deal (sawed) boards, lined with riven (split) boards, and perhaps glazed. It would have had a stone or brick chimney since all heating and cooking would have been accomplished by the open fireplace using brass, copper, or iron utensils. Furnishings were plain and few; and the dishes were of wood, clay, or pewter. See figure 10 for the inventory of George Athy's estate, which would have been typical for most planters of the day.

Although there had been some problems with the indians when George first arrived in Maryland, most of the indians had moved west into the mountains of Virginia by 1880; however, the Piscataway Tribe still lived on a reservation on the Potomac River south of Piscataway Creek. All able bodied men were listed on the rolls of the militia and were subject to call for training and duty. Security was no doubt better in Maryland than it had been in Ireland where dispossessed Catholic landowners now roamed the countryside in addition to the traditional professional bandits.

LIFE BEGINS AT FORTY

That George Athy's first wife was named Ann is indeed a fact; that her name was Ann Moorewood is unlikely. An early Athy researcher claimed that George Athy had transported Ann Moorewood to Maryland and then married her.

The following is quoted from the grant of "Wakefield" to George Athee in 1675: "by assignment from Clement Hill, the assingee of Richard Edelen, the assignee of Thomas Chipsham, due to the said Chipsham for transporting Samuel Whitten, Christopher Shadwell, Mary Phillips, and Ann Moorewood into our said province – -." Since George was the fourth owner of the land warrant due for transporting Ann Moorewood, there is no reason to assume that he ever met her – much less married her.

Who was Ann Athy? We don't really have any idea. Since George was in his mid thirties by the time he married, had good political connections, and owned land, it is reasonable to assume that Ann was the daughter of one of his neighbors in Nanjemoy Hundred.

George sued Edward Crouch in 1680 for tobacco taken from him without payment and then settled out of court. He was sued in turn by the same man in 1684 with an unknown result.

George received small payments from the Maryland General Assembly in November 1681 and November 1682 for reasons not stated.

In December 1682 George was named as a planter of Nanjemoy and was charged by the Grand Jury with the theft of a heifer. He posted bond as did William Thomas of the Nanjemoy River and Jno. Butcher of Port Tobacco. It seems that he did not come to trial in this matter.

On 5 May 1683, George and Ann Athy sold their home "Hopewell" in Nanjemoy Hundred to James Martin, who died shortly thereafter. The Court ordered that George have an attachment against the James Martin estate in 1684, and it appears that George maintained title to "Hopewell".

In June 1685, George Aythey was assigned and granted a patent for 100 acres called "Leads" at the head of Oxen Creek. This purchase appears to be another speculation as he sold this property in June 1686.

It is said that George Athy married his second wife, Sarah, in 1686. An early Athy researcher claimed that Sarah was the daughter of Margaret and Thomas Marsh II (b. ca. 1625-30). Such a relationship would have allowed the development of a direct lineage back to a Magna Carta baron. It is indeed unfortunate that there is no evidence that Sarah Athy was a Marsh. The evidence offered by the early researcher quotes a deed of gift of a heifer by Elizabeth Marsh (presumed to be a daughter of Thomas Marsh II but not so demonstrated) to her hephew, "to George Athey, Junior, ye soun of George Athey, Senior." An examination of the original document (figure 21) reveals that no mention is made of any relationship between this unidentified Elizabeth Marsh and George Athey, Junior. Furthermore, a Sarah Marsh, who must have been the daughter of Thomas Marsh II, died in 1688 at the age of ten years.

On 12 June 1688, two grants were made to George Aithey. One for 88 acres was called "Stony Hill," and the other for 78 acres was called "Little Hall." "Stony Hill" was located on the Potomac River between the north side of the mouth of Broad Creek and Indian Queen Point and became George's home. "Little Hall" was located on Broad Creek only a short distance away. A 70 acre tract of land called "Aithey's Folly" was located about ½ mile south of "Little Hall", and was granted to a Richard Golby in 1686. This tract must have belonged to George Athy at

some time or other, but there is no such direct evidence. At about this same time George must have acquired a 90 acre tract called "Yorkshire" near Oxen Creek since George and Sarah sold this tract 11 March 1689, probably as another speculation.

Immediately thereafter on 11 March 1689, George Athy was granted 220 acres called "St. Johns", located about three miles up Broad Creek from "Stony Hill." Thus in 1690 George Athy held four tracts of land, "Stony Hill", "Little Hall", "Aithey's Folly", and "St. Johns" with a total of 456 acres. See figures 8, 12, 19 and 20 for a summary of all of George Athy's land holdings and their locations.

A George Thompson sued George Athy in 1688 for damages as a result of an incident in Port Tobacco that had happened in 1686 and lost the suit to George. Then in 1692 George was sued by Philip Parks for another occurance in Port Tobacco, and George won again. At about this same time, John Athey, George's brother, sued in Charles County a William Smoot of Calvert County regarding failure to pay that due to John for a transaction at Port Tobacco; and John won the suit. Since John was a merchant and George seemed to be involved in a variety of law suits, it is possible that they might have been involved in a tobacco export enterprise at Port Tobacco, the principal deep water port on the Potomac River. Could John and George have exported tobacco to their brother, Walter, a merchant at Oranmore, near Galway, Ireland?

In 1691 the Catholic Proprietorship of Lord Baltimore was replaced by a Protestant Governor appointed by the King. The new Protestant General Assembly passed a low in 1692 making the Church of England the official state church in Maryland.

The General Assembly of Maryland made payment to George Athy in 1694 for services not described. Then on 3 December 1694, George Athey sold to the Vestrymen of Piscataway Parish (including Colonel John Addison) his 78 acre tract on Broad Creek called "Little Hall" on which St. John's Protestant Episcopal Church was to be built. See figure 7 for this church as it appears today.

In May and June 1695, St. John's Parish paid to George Athey an amount of 18 pounds for supplying a Carpenters Dial and raising the church floor. At some time or other, George must have learned the carpenter's trade which may have been his prime occupation. At that time and place, most men having a trade or profession were also planters. Regardless of occupation he and his wife would have appeared similar to the couple shown in Figure 13.

PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY, MARYLAND

In 1696 Prince George's County was established, and officials were appointed by the Maryland General Assembly. Assemblyman Colonel John Addison (who had married the widow of Judge Thomas Dent) was named as Colonel of the Prince George's County Militia, and he in turn named the first officers of the county militia. It is not surprising that he chose George Athey to be Captain of Foot for the western half of the county. The colors for the county militia were chosen to be the St. George Cross, that is to say a red cross on a white field as illustrated in figure 11.

The Prince George's County Militia was issued the follow arms: one hand mortar, two Grenado pouches, 20 Grenado shells, 60 fusees, one brass lantern, one compass, one horse picker, one perspective glass, one drum, one trumpet, one powder prover, two pair of drum heads, 7 pair of pistols, 7 carbines and belts, 5 cartouch boxes and belts, 5 bayonets and belts, two pickaxes, two mattocks, 4 wheelbarrow irons, 4 steel spades, 4 shovels, two barrels of musket shot, carbine shot, pistol bullets, and 3460 flints. Since there were at least 600 able bodied men enrolled in the militia in the county, it is clear that they provided their own personal weapons and equipment.

By this time there were very few indians in the settled part of Maryland, and there was very little indian trouble. Ten Rangers were stationed at a garrison at the first falls of the Potomac River to defend the frontier. There were indeed several deaths caused by indians during the 1690's, and part of the militia was called out on several occasions

Roads were few and poorly maintained — most travel was still by boat. The only real town in the county was the county seat, Charles Town, on the Patuxent River. There one could find numerous storekeepers, warehouses, merchants, innkeepers, carpenters, lawyers, physicians, and (alas) public servents.

The only village in the county on the Potomac River was called Aire (later called Broad Creek) located at the boat landing of Thomas Lewis at the mouth of Broad Creek. Captain George Athy's residence at "Stony Hill" was next to Aire on the Potomac side of town, and St. John's Church on "Little Hall" was the first tract upstream from Aire. This town would later become sizeable with stores, toverns, warehouses, and a shipyard. Although post and stage service had started from Port Tobacco to Charles Town and onward, Aire had no such services. Plantations only a few miles to the north were truly on the frontier.

The years 1696 and 1697 seemed to bring hard times to Sarah and George Athy. George was sued for debt by Thomas Hussey and also by William Filmore and lost both cases. He was also fined in 1697 for not appearing to serve on a jury when called. Perhaps as a result of those financial reverses, Sarah and George Athy sold their 220 acre tract called "St. Johns" on 26 June 1697.

That George continued to be held in high esteem by the community is demonstrated by the fact that in 1697 his testimony was taken regarding the bounds of a tract of land on Piscataway Creek and that on 7 October 1698 George Athey and William Simpson were paid 1000 pounds by St. John's Parish for "covering the church". George must have been considered something of a carpenter since he built both the floor and roof for the church. It was during this same period that two sons were born to Sarah and George, #3 Thomas and #4 George, Jr.

Captain George Athy is said to have made a deposition in 1702 giving his age as 60 years and setting his year of birth as 1642. Then there are no further records concerning Captain George Athy until Luke Gardner qualified as administrator of his estate on 7 March 1709 and the inventory of his estate was attested to by his wife Sarah and his son John on 21 December 1710. See Figure 10 for this inventory and note that real property is not included. Certain items are obviously missing from George's inventory such as his clothing, weapons, and tools of trade. Perhsps George had been inactive for the last few years and had passed such items to his children. It is interesting to note that a man who owned property should have such a limited number of modest possessions. It would appear that only a few families with large estates would have had access to the limited luxuries of the time.

The last we hear of Sarah Athy is her deposition in February 1723/24 in which she gives her age as 57 and says that she has several children. This leads to to believe that she might have had one or more daughters unknown to us.

Previous researchers have suggested that Captain George Athey also had children Mary, Edward, and Walter. There is no known evidence that any of these three might have been his children. All three lived in Virginia and were not necessarily even related to Captain George Athy. It is possible that part or all of them were English rather than Irish since there were quite a few people with the name Athey living in England at that time.

BROTHER JOHN

John Athy, son of Francis Athy of Galway, Ireland, and brother of #1 Captian George Athy (1), is thought to have been transported to Virginia ca. 1663 and to have moved to Maryland by 1770. Such would be consistent with the normal seven year term of a bondservant; however, we have no evidence that he so served.

No later than 1770, John Athee acquired "Lands Land", 238 acres in Calvert County, Md., on the east side of the Patuxent River north of Lands Creek and near Hall Creek.

A lawsuit was brought against John Athey on 24 March 1675 in the Court of Chancery of Maryland, but the outcome is unknown. Then on 20 September 1678, John Athey of the Clifts in the County of Calvert, a planter, proved in the Court of Chancery his title to 150 acres called "Tucker's Unfortunate."

On 4 May 1681, John Atkee had a 150 acre tract surveyed in the Lower Hundred of the Clifts, Calvert County, part of "Lower Bennett". In November of the same year John Atkey was paid 100 pounds of tobacco by the General Assembly for reasons unknown.

On 29 September 1685 and 13 April 1686, John Atkey (also spelled Atky) served on a Provincial Grand Jury and declared Hannah Edwards not guilty of a charge of witchcraft.

John Atkey of Calvert County made a deposition on 24 March 1688 in which he gave his age as fourty four years and stated that he had heard some indians say while they were drunk that Colonel Henry Darnall had hired indians to fight against the English. These were times of religious conflict; and since Colonel Darnall was Catholic, John Athy was probably Protestant.

John Athey sued William Smoot of Calvert County in the Charles County Court on 9 June 1692 with regard to previous happenings in Port Tobacco. Later on 20 August 1695, John Athey served on a jury for the Maryland Court of Appeals in Ann Arrundell County, and in 1696 deposited a bill for ten pounds as dues paid to the "ffree schole" at Anapolis.


In 1698 a judge of the Court of Vice Admiralty came to the Port of Anapolis to hear a complaint of John Athea, Merchant, against Captain Giles Wigginer, Commander of the Cornellis of London. The said Athea made no complaint to him having agreed with Captain Wigginer who delivered him what goods he had demanded. This document is important in that it confirms that John is a merchant importing goods from Europe as did his father.

in 1702 a John Athy is listed as a taxable in Spesutij Hundred Light of Baltimore County, Maryland, This John is probably John, Jr., son of the subject John.

In May of 1706, John Atkey was sued by William Finch in Provincial Court regarding acts from 1682 – 1703. The results are not known.

It seems that John Athy died in 1706 since the Inventory and the Account for his estate were filed in Anne Arundel County in 1706 & 07.

John's son appears in the Rent Rolls of Cecil County and Kent County, Md., from 1711 thru 1723. John Athy, Jr.'s will was dated 1 July 1723 and was proven 25 January 1726. He named his wife Anne and daughters Angelico Coppen and Mary Pennington Rickets. Angelico had married John Coppen, and Mary married 1st Richard Pennington and 2nd David Ricketts. To the best of our knowledge, John, Jr. had no brothers or male heirs. Nothing else is known of this branch of the Athy family.

HIS THREE SONS

When Captain George Athy died ca. 1710, #2 John Athy (2) was the only one of his three sons old enough to assume responsibility for the family. John was 30–35 years old at the time; while #3 Thomas Athy (2) was no more than fifteen years old and #4 George Athy, Jr, (2), about 10 years old.

Although the James Martin estate still had possession of "Hopewell" in 1707, it appears that the George Athy heirs must have had title to and at some date took possession of "Hopewell" in addition to the home place at "Stony Hill" and held them for many years.

In 1711, #2 John Athy (2) married Margaret Lewis, the girl next door, who had become a widow. Her father owned the tract of land on which the port and village of Aire had started developing. By 1719 John was renting from Luke Gardiner a plantation on the south side of Piscataway Creek near Accokeek (see "JA" on Figure 8); however, #2 John (2) and #3 Thomas (2) are listed in 1719 as taxables in Piscataway Hundred, no doubt at "Stony Hill".

Sarah Athy, wife of Captain George, was still alive in 1723 when she and George, Jr. made their depositions regarding their ages and the boundries of Henry Goodridge's land. In fact, she probably lived until sometime after 1733, at which time titles to "Stony Hill" and "Hopewell" seem to have been determined by final distribution of Captain George's estate.

#3 Thomas Athy (2) had married Elizabeth Fenley in 1718. Elizabeth's father, Charles Fenley, purchased 136 acres called "Nonsuch" on a ridge between Piscataway Creek and Mattaway Swamp in Prince George's County and had it surveyed on 30 April 1720. On 2 October 1723, Thomas and Elizabeth surveyed a 200 acre tract called "Athey's Choice" on the side of a small valley near "Nonsuch" and was granted a patent 4 July 1725.

#4 George Athy, Jr. (2) married in 1728, and #2 John Athy (2) died in 1729. Thus #3 Thomas Athy (2) would have assumed responsibility for the Athy family at that time including John's five children and three or four of his own. Thomas presumably moved back to "Stony Hill" at that time.

In 1733 the list of taxables for Piscataway Hundred includes #3 Thomas (2), #4 George, Jr. (2), and #4a John, Jr. (3). By this time #4a John, Jr. (3) was 21 years old and had no doubt assumed responsibility for his brothers and sisters, the youngest of whom was only 9 years old. #4 George Athy, Jr. (2) had two young sons of his own. The whole family seems to have been at "Stony Hill" at that time.

#4 George Athy, Jr. (2) died in 1734, and his wife Mary and sons Robert and John are said to have been subjequently supported by an uncle, certianly a logical assumption. Family tradition says that George, Jr. had moved his family to Virginia and that his sons were raised in Caroline Co., Va., by an uncle - who would have had to have been one of Mary's brothers. George Athy, Jr. obviously did not move to Virginia since he was in Prince George's Co., Md., the year before he died; and it seems most likely that his sons were raised there by his brother Thomas. As a matter of fact, his son #19 John Athy (3) married a Foster girl from a family that had lived in Prince George's Co., Md., for many years - not a Virginia girl as would probably have been the case if he had been raised in Virginia.

On 12 December 1741, #3 Thomas Athy (2) purchased a 100 acre tract called "Chance Situate" in Prince George's Co., Md., on the west side of the Patuxant River and on the north side of Mattawoman Branches. This tract would be not far from Thomas' tract, "Athey's Choice". Thomas sold this tract on 13 February 1745.

On 30 March 1741, #3 Thomas Athy (2) was chosed as Church Warden for St. John's Parish Church on Broad Creek. On 19 April 1742 St. John's Parish paid Thomas for a bottle of Madara wine. Perhaps Thomas was a merchant as well as a planter; his uncle Walter had certainly imported wine at Oranmore near Galway, Ireland. Thomas was one of those who desired to divide Prince George's County into two counties and on 16 October 1742 signed a petition accordingly as did his son #10 Walter William Athy (3).

On 12 February 1748/49, #3 Thomas Athy (2) bought pew #10 and his son #10 Walter William Athy (3) bought pew #14 at the St. John's Parish Church, Broad Creek, Prince George's County. Thomas was chosen as Church Warden for the second time on 16 May 1749. Thomas' nephew, #7 George Athy (3), was paid by the church for four "lockast posts" for use in the "lower chapil".

#8 Thomas Athy, Jr. (3) had acquired "Hopewell" by 4 June 1748 at which time he requested that a commission be formed to determine the boundries of the tract. By 1761, Thomas, Jr. also owned and was living at "Athey's Choice". In his will probated 25 March 1761, Thomas, Jr. left "Hopewell" to his daughter Mary and "Athey's Choice" to his daughters Sarah and Lucy.

#3 Thomas Athy (2) seems to have continued to live at "Stony Hill" and registered the births of several of his children at the St. John's Parish Church on 31 August 1753. He also recorded several certificates of a stray with the County in 1753, 1755, 1759, and 1764 after which he is assumed to have died.

Thomas's nephew, #6 Thomas Athy (3), son of #2 John Athy (2), seems to have moved to Fairfax County, Virginia, ca. 1755; but his other nephew, #7 George Athy (3), also son of #2 John (2), served in Captain Elies Delashmut's Company during the French and Indian War in 1757 and remained in Prince George's County until 1762-1770 when he also moved to Fairfax County, Virginia.

Thomas' sons #10 Walter William (3), #12 Owen (3), and #14 Hezekiah (3) were all in Prince George's County, probably at or near "Stony Hill" in 1790. By 1800 all seem to have been dead or to have moved. On the other hand, Thomas' sons #9 Elijah (3) and #13 Benjamin seem to have moved to Charles County, Md., and were also dead or gone by 1800.

#18 Robert Athy (3), son of #4 George Athy, Jr. (2), must have married young and then lived and died in Fairfax County, Virginia. In contrast, #19 John Athy (3), son of George Athy, Jr. (2), seems to have remained in Prince George's County until about the time his uncle, #3 Thomas Athy (2), died. At that time John married and moved to Prince William County, Virginia, where he lived until after the Revolution when he moved to Berkeley County, Virginia, and then later to Hampshire County, Virginia.

DESCENDANTS OF #2 JOHN ATHY (2)

Very little is known of #4a John Athy, Jr. (3) beyond the fact that he was listed as a taxable in Prince George's County in 1733 and had a daughter, #19a Lucille (4), born ca. 1753. Lucille seems to have grown and married in Prince George's County before moving with her husband, John Dawkins, to Wood County in Virginia. Most of their children and grandchildren are said to have lived in Wood County.

Although raised in Prince George's County where he lived with his first wife, #6 Thomas Athy (3) seems to have moved with his two baby daughters to Fairfax County in Virginia about the same time that he married his second wife in 1753. His daughter #28 Mary (4) married George Creel ca. 1770 and lived in Prince William County in Virginia, until they moved to Wood County in Virginia, ca. 1798. The Creels were large landowners on the Little Kanawha River. Their children and grandchildren were leaders of the community as commissioner, professor, surgeon, lawyer, etc. Most of their children are said to have stayed in Wood County, but some of their grandchildren moved on to Ohio, Kentucky, and Missouri. Thomas' daughter #31 Elinor (4) married Thomas Dawkins and lived in Kentucky, but little is known of her family. Daughter #32 Ethylda (4) married Thomas Leach and lived in Prince William and Fauquier Counties in Virginia. After her death, Thomas Leach took their children to Wood County in Va. where most of the grandchildren also seem to have lived. See Figure 14 for a photo of an oil painting of Ethylda. Thus it appears that most of the children and grandchildren of #4a John (3) and #6 Thomas (3) lived in Wood County in Virginia.

Following his brother, #7 George Athy (3) moved to Fairfax County in Virginia ca. 1765. The descendants of his sons #23 Samuel (4) and #24 William A. Athy (4) remained in Fairfax and Loudoun Counties in Virginia. Son #25 Thomas Athy (4) started his family in Fairfax County in Virginia but moved his family to Hampshire County in Virginia where most of his children and grandchildren lived except for his son #90 Walter Athy (5) who moved on to Washington County in Ohio.

#2 John's daughter, #7a Anne (3), married Peter Robinson and raised her family in Prince George's County. Peter was one of the few, if not the only, schoolmaster in the County at that time and had his school first at Upper Marlboro and then later at Piscataway Town.

It is interesting to note that #2 John Athy (2) died in 1729, that his sons all remained in Prince George's County for at least 25 years, and that all seem to have moved to Virginia by 1765.

Of the descendants of #2 John Athy (2), the ones known to have served in the Revolutinary War were #25 Thomas Athy (4) and his brother #26 Benjamin Athy (4), both sons of #7 George Athy (3). Benjamin is the only member of the Athy family known to have died while in service during the Revolution.

DESCENDANTS OF #3 THOMAS ATHY (2)

As the oldest son of #3 Thomas Athy (2), #8 Thomas Athy, Jr. (3) seems to have acquired the Athy family property in Maryland except for the home place, "Stony Hill", where his father probably lived. In 1741 he bought "Chance Situate", a 100 acre tract, located between Piscataway Creek and Mattawoman Creek near "Hopewell"; however, he sold this tract in 1745. Even though his father outlived him, he had acquired the 80 acre family tract "Hopewell" prior to 1748 at which time he requested that its boundries by established by a commission appointed by the County.Furthermore, he also acquired the 200 acre tract, "Athey's Choice", from his father at some time prior to his father's death in 1761.

In his will, he left 80 acres ("Hopewell") to his daughter #20 Mary Athy (4) and 200 acres ("Athey's Choice") to be divided equally between his daughters #21 Lucy Athy Feagins (4) and #22 Sarah Athy Staige (4). In the will both properties are referred to as "Athey's Choice", certainly in error, although it is possible that the two properties are adjacent and had been combined.

Mary sold her 80 acres in 1774. Thomas' wife Sarah demanded and received her widow's third of the 200 acre tract and sold it in 1779. Daughters Lucy and Sarah also sold their thirds of the 200 acres in 1779. Lucy and Sarah lived in Fauquier County in Virginia at that time; and Mary also lived in Virginia, possibly in Fauquier County.

The second son, #9 Elijah Athey (3), lived at "Wakefield Plantation", Charles County in Maryland where his children were born. By 1785 he had moved to Prince William County in Virginia. His sons, #33 Elijah Athy, Jr. (4), #34 Ebenezer Athy (4), and #36 Hezekiah Athey (4), all served in the Maryland Militia during the Revolution.

Two of the sons of #33 Elijah Athy, Jr. (4), #104 Augustine (5) and #105 Levi (5), served in the War of 1812. Grandchildren were scattered in Prince William County in Va., Loudoun County in Va., Fauquier County in Va., Licking County in Ohio, Coshocton County in Ohio, Whitley County in Indiana, and Crawford County in Illinois.

To the best of our knowledge, the children and grandchildren of #34 Ebenezer (4) lived in Prince William County in Virginia except for #116 Horatia Atha (Athon) (5) and his children who moved to Surry County in North Carolina.

The descendants of #36 Hezekiah Athey (4) lived in Clinton County in Ohio, Williamson County in Tennessee, Floyd County in Indiana, and Clark County in Indiana. #117 James S. Athon was a surgeon in the Mexican War, Indiana State Senator, Indiana Secretary of State, and Superintendent of the Indiana Hospital for the Insane.

The third and fourth sons of #3 Thomas Athy (2) were #10 Walter William (4) and #10a Joseph (4) who lived in Prince George's County in Maryland. Little is known of their descendants.

The fifth son, #12 Owen Athy (3), raised his family in Prince George's County in Maryland and then moved in the 1790's to Berkeley County in Virginia with some of his children. Owen's family was widely dispersed. #40 Sarah Athey Casteel (4) lived in Bedford County in Pennsylvania, Allegany County in Maryland, Preston County in Virginia, and Monroe County in Ohio. Owen's son #41 Wilson Athens and family lived

in Frederick County in Maryland, Berkeley County in Virginia, and Rockbridge County in Virginia. Son #44 Zepheniah (4) established the Atha family of Georgia. Grandson #120 Francis Warren Atha (5) served in the War of 1812 as a Marine on a ship and later in the Militia. Grandaughter #122 Pamelia Atha Pardue (5) lived in Mississippi and in Collin County in Texas. Owen's son #45 Henry Athey (4) served in the Militia of Washington County in Pennsylvania dur the Revolutionary War, moved to Darlington County in South Carolina aand then to Montgomery County in Alabama. Most of Henry's descendants lived in Alabama. Arkansas, and Texas and are listed in detail in a book "The Descendants of Henry Athey by Thomas Whitfield Athey, III. Owen's son #46a Townley Athey (4) and most of his descendants remained in Berkeley County in Virginia in the portion that later became Jefferson County. One exception is #131d Judson William Athey (5) whose family lived in Parke County in Indiana and Iowa County in Iowa. Townley's family was formerly identified in error as being the family of #71 Basil Athy (4), son of #19 John Athy (3). It is not clear as to how this error was made as there is no known evidence of such a relationship; however, the family of #71 Basil Athy is extensively documented. Owen's son #47 Joseph Athon (4) and his family lived in Frederick County in Maryland, Rockbridge County in Virginia, Surry County in North Carolina, and Lawrence County in Indiana. Joseph was a schoolmaster, hotel keeper, County Coroner, County Commissioner, and Associate Judge and has a grandson #477whb Henry Franklin Barnes (6) who was a physician and surgeon. Owen's son #48 Elisha Atha (4) and most of his family lived in Monongalia and Marion Counties in Virginia. The Atha Family Reunion is still held every year in Marion County in West Virginia. See Figure 15 for a photo of Elisha's grandson #491 Elisha Atha (6) and his wife Luverna. Elisha's son #132i Elisha (5) and his family lived in Frederick County in Virginia, and daughter #133 Scenna Atha Squires (5) and family lived in Preston County in Virginia. Owen's son #49 Elijah Athey (4) moved to Georgia, but his descendants are unknown if any.

The sixth son, #13 Benjamin Athey (30) raised his family in Prince George's County in Maryland and moved to Charles County in Maryland ca. 1777. His son #52 George (4) married, had children, and moved to Fairfax County in Virginia, where he died leaving young children about whom little is known. Son #54 Charles (4) lived in Charles County, served in the 4th Maryland Regiment during the Revolution, and had at least eight children about whom little is known. Nothing is known of the other children of #13 Benjamin (3) other than for #56 Elizabeth Ford (4) and #58 Hanson Stone Athon (4), both of whom moved to North Carolina. Hanson raised his children in Surrey County in North Carolina and died there. Two of Hanson's sons 144k Joseph (5) and #144n Nathaniel (5) moved on to raise their families in Georgia.

Thomas' seventh son #14 Hezekiah (3) lived in Prince George's County in Maryland. Little is known of his family except that #61 Elizabeth Robey (4) moved to North Carolina and then on to Simpson County in Kentucky with their children. #63 Hezekiah, Jr.(4) seems to have moved to Philadelphia in Pennsylvania, and #64 Rhodde Thompson (4) lived in Charles County in Maryland.

Two of the daughters of #3 Thomas (2), #15 Sarah Talbot (3) and #16 Mary Fenley Roberts (3) moved to Washington County in Virginia where they raised their families. Thus it appears that the sons of Thomas lived in Prince George's or Charles Co., Md., with the exceptions of Elijah and Owen. His grandchildren were widely dispersed.

DESCENDANTS OF #4 GEORGE ATHY, JR. (2)

Tradition within one line of descendants says that the two sons of #4 George Athy, Jr. (2) were raised by an uncle in Caroline County in Virginia. That such might be the case is certainly possible but seems to be improbable since there is no supporting evidence and both sons settled and started raising their families in Virginia near where several of their cousins lived and just across the river from cousins in Maryland.

#18 Robert Athy (3), the oldest son of #4 George Athy, Jr.(2), must have married young, probably raised his children in Prince George's County in Maryland, and moved with his family to Fairfax County in Virginia prior to the Revolution. Robert is distinguished by the fact that all five of his sons served during the Revolution.

#65 William (4) had moved to Loudoun County in Virginia prior to the Revolution and migrated to Allegany County in Maryland ca. 1795. Most of William's children lived in Ohio or Kentucky. Two of William's sons, #145a Hezekiah W. (5) and #145b Thomas (5) served during the War of 1812.

#66 Robert, Jr. (4) moved from Fairfax County in Virginia to Bourbon County in Kentucky in 1786 and then on to Indiana after 1820. His children, #151 William (5), #154 James H. (5), and #157 Jane Hume (5), all moved on to Indiana; #151 Thomas (5) (a minister) lived in Ohio; and #153 Presley (5) and #155 Susan Stephens remained in Kentucky. A grandson, #564 Robert A. (6), became a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives and Mayor of Covington in Kentucky.

#68 Thomas remained in Fairfax County in Virginia as it seems his children did. We know little of this family.

#69 James also remained in Fairfax County in Virginia where his children were born prior to all moving to Wood County in Virginia. All of James' children lived and raised their children in Wood County except for except for #168b Sarah Arnold (5) who lived in Ohio. #162 Samuel (5) and #164 Burgess (5) served in the Virginia Militia during the War of 1812.

#19 John Athy (3), the other son of #4 George Athy, Jr. (2), was probably raised in Prince George's County in Maryland by his uncle, #3 Thomas Athy (2), and probably lived in that county until his uncle died. He married Sarah Foster who had been raised in that same county (see "TF" on Figure 8 for the location of the Thomas Foster plantation) ca. 1765, probably moved to Prince William County in Virginia before 1775, and settled there near the Occoquan River. John was said by one of his grandsons to have been bony, not fleshy, over six feet tall, and wieghing over 200 pounds; and Sarah was said to have been quite stout, weighing about 180 pounds.

We have no specific evidence of his militia service prior to the Revolution; however, John had already enlisted in the 3rd Virginia Regiment a month before his 8th Company was formed and probably assisted in the recruiting of the company by Captain Philip Richard Francis Lee on 8 March 1776 in Prince William Company in Virginia. The facts that he was 46 years old when he enlisted and that he enlisted as a Corporal suggest that he had probably served previously in the Militia and in the Independent Company of Prince William County which was commanded by

the same Captain Philip Richard Francis Lee who later formed the 8th Company of the 3rd Virginia Regiment. The Independent Company of Prince William County took part in the abortive march on Williamsburg in April 1775 but turned back on Washington's orders.

While forming and training, the 3rd Virginia Regiment was in camp near Dumfries, Prince William County, not far from Corporal John Athy's wife and children. Each of the eight companies of the Regiment had a captain, first lieutenant, second lieutenant, ensign, two sergeants, two corporals, a drummer, a fifer, and 68 men – 78 in all. Thus the Regiment at full strength consisted of 624 men plus regimental officers and their staff. The officers for the 3rd Virginia Regiment were Colonel Mercer, Lieutenant Colonel George Weeden, and Major Thomas Marshall.

Each enlisted man was provided two linen shirts, two pair of underwear, one brown fringed leather or woolen hunting waistcoat with sleeves, a pair of brown breeches, a narrow rimed hat turned up on one side and secured with fur or feather, two pair of hose, and two pair of shoes. He was also issued a rifled gun, tomahawk, bayonet, canteen, and either pouch and horn or cartridge box. He appeared as shown in Figure 23 and continued with that uniform until blue coats with white bound button holes were issued in the summer of 1777. After that he would have appeared as shown in Figure 24 until red faced blue uniforms were issued in 1779. The narrow rimed hat continued with the Virginia regiments who considered it to be more practical in the field than the hat more familiar to us with a wide brim turned up front and back.

The Third Virginia Regiment, now of the Continental Line, left Dumfries on the 16th of August 1776, the first of the nine Virginia regiments to march north to join General Washington. They were not at full strength as they numbered only 550 men, and they would never be stronger. Colonel Mercer had recently been promoted to General and was in New York City. Colonel Weeden and Lieutenant Colonel Marshall had just been promoted and were in command along with a new major, William Taliaferro.

From Dumfries they marched to Red House in Prince William County where they joined the old Carolina Road which took them on the east side of the Bull Run Mountains, past West's Ordinary, through Leesburg, and across the Potomac at Noland's Ferry. They then marched thru Frederick in Maryland, near Hanover in Pennsylvania, to York in Pennsylvania on the 28th of August. Colonel Weeden then led them to Lancaster, across the Delaware near New Hope, near Plainsfield, Montclair, and Hackensack in New Jersey. The Regiment crossed the Hudson River at Dobbs Ferry, marched thru Yonkers, crossed the Harlem River at Kings Bridge, and encamped the 13th of September at Hellgate – then fourteen miles above New York. They had covered over 400 miles in 26 days, more than 16 miles per day, and arrived healthy and in good spirits.

The 3rd Virginia Regiment, Continental Line, was in its first skirmish on the 16th of September in a meadow called The Hollow Way at what is today West 120th Street between Broadway and Riverside Drive. Several days later the Regiment moved about ½ mile north to the eastern edge of Morris Heights where they entrenched and were joined by the 1st Virginia Regiment on September 27th.

The Virginians moved north to White Plains with the army but did not take part in the battle there. From there they crossed the Hudson River at Peekskill, marched to Hackensack, and entered New Brunswick in New Jersey on the 17th of November. By this time the army was extremely

short of shoes, stockings, shirts, and blankets. With only one branket for each three men, it is no wonder that the 1st and 3rd Virginia Regiments had together no more than 575 men of whom only 510 were fit for duty - less than ½ strength. The army marched on thru Princeton and crossed the Delaware River at Trenton, followed closely by the British. The army was deployed at nine river crossings with the 3rd Virginia Regiment at McKonkey's Ferry, the best crossing. By December 22nd Colonel Weeden's Regiment was down to only 196 men fit to bear arms - only 1/3 strength. By this time the 4th Virginia Regiment had arrived and in its number was Corporal John Athy's nephew, #69 James Athey (4).

As we all know, General Washington led a part of his army back across the Delaware River on Christmas night about nine miles above Trenton at McKonkey's Ferry and then marched on Trenton thru snow and sleet. The Continental Line formed north of Trenton with the 3rd Virginia Regiment near the center. Corporal John Athy's 8th Company was also known as the Lieutenant Colonel's Company and was in the Continental Line behind Lieutenant Colonel Thomas Marshall, the sixth company in the Regiment from its own right. Since they had arrived undetected, a bayonet charge was ordered; and at about 8:00 A.M. during a snowstorm the Virginians swept thru town down King Street. Most of the surprised Hessians were killed or captured, and the 3rd Virginia Regiment was given the honor of escorting the 900 prisoners back across the river. The Americans were back in Pennsylvania before midnight, and the British Army retreated from the Deleware in panic.

On the 30th of December, Washington crossed the Deleware again, occupied Trenton, and was confronted by the British who had arrived from their base at Princeton. Washington then ordered a forced march at night to Princeton on the third of January 1777, defeated the British garrison there, and marched thru Pluckemin to arrive on the 6th at his new winter quarters at Morristown in New Jersey. Thus #19 Corporal John Athy and his nephew #69 James Athy had stood probably not more than 150 yards apart at both Trenton and at Princeton. For the first four or five days after their arrival, the 3rd Virginia Regiment lived on the side of a mountain without any tents or other shelter. The Regiment then moved to permenant quarters at Quibbletown, about eleven miles southeast of Morristown. Although poorly clad, poorly fed, and suffering from smallpox, the army conducted sufficient raids that few British remained in New Jersey by March 1, 1777.

During the winter Colonel George Weeden was promoted to Brigadier General, Lieutenant Colonel Thomas Marshall was promoted to Colonel, a William Heth was appointed Lieutenant Colonel, and Captain Charles West was promoted to Major. Corporal John Athy's 8th Company had only Captain Lee, Lieutenant Helm, 3 sergeants, 2 corporals, and 26 privates by the end of May 1777.

In late May 1777, Washington took his army to positions at Middle Brook near Brunswick in New Jersey to confront the British at this base. As the British army moved north to New York City, Washington moved north into New York State near the Hudson River; and when the British embarked for the Chesapeke Bay, Washington marched south beyond Philadelphia and deployed his army to defend the Capitol. The 3rd Virginia Regiment, now under Colonel Marshall, camped on August 2nd at Germantown and moved to Crooked Billet near Philadelphia on August 10th. By this time Corporal John Athy's nephew #68 Thomas Athy (4) and his second cousins #25 Thomas

Athy (4) and #26 Benjamin Athy (4) had arrived with Grayson's Regiment. It being a hot summer and the quartermasters being not unlike those of any other army, blue coats with white trim on the button holes were issued to the Virginia regiments. At 7:00 A.M. on the 24th, the Continental Army and the various Militias paraded in Philadelphia. To distinguish themselves, the Virginians placed sprigs of geen leaves on their somewhat unusual hats. First came General George Washington followed by his Guard Company. Next came the cavalry followed by a company of pioneers with axes. Then the first infantry regiments led by the Virginia Regiments at intervals of one hundred yards. They may not have been well dressed and polished like the British, but subsequent events proved that they were rugged and determined. Most important was the fact that each man in the Militia owned and maintained his own arms and that every able bodied man was in the Militia. The despots of the world were about to learn that they should never again allow their citizens the right to bear arms. On the 25th of August the Patriots marched past the Brandywine to a camp near Wilmington in Delaware and then returned to the Brandywine on the 28th.

The Continental Army was deployed to defend from south to north Pyle's Ford, Chad's Ford, Brinton's Ford, and Jones Ford. The British divided into two columns, one attacking at Pyle's Ford to the south and the other moving north about four miles to cross at Jeffries Ford and flank the Patriots. The 3rd and 4th Virginia Regiments were deployed above Chad's Ford and watched as the British attacked the Continental Regiments at Pyle's Ford to the south at about 8:30 in the morning of the 11th of September. By 11:00 that morning, Washington learned of the British column now on the east side of the Brandywine and north of him. He pulled several regiments from the line and ordered them to march to the northeast, to form a new line at the Birmingham Meeting House, and tomeet what proved to be the main British force. The 3rd Virginia Regiment was in that new line.

Colonel Marshall with his 3rd Virginia Regiment (now only 179 strong) were detached to a wood on the right with orders to hold that position to cover that flank and the artillery in place there. As the other regiments moved into the main Continental Line, the eastern part of the line moved too far east puting them in positions to the south of Colonel Marshall and puting the 3rd Virginia Regiment into a position in advance of the main line so that they received fire from both foe and friend. The 3rd Virginia held the woods against the onslaught of the British for forty five minutes before receiving orders to withdraw. Forty of its one hundred seventy men had been killed or wounded by nightfall in addition to three officers killed and four wounded. Corporal John Athy's 8th Company had only three officers, three sergeants, 2 corporals, and 18 privates fit for duty at the start of the battle. Of these, Captain Lee was mortally wounded. Second Lieutenant Peyton was killed, and two privates were wounded. As the only surving officer, Lieutenant Thomas Nelm assumed command of the 8th Company.

The Continental Army held its positions until dark and then withdrew, arriving at Chester about mindight. They then bypassed Philadelphia, crossed the Schuylkill, camped and rested at The Falls and at Germantown, recrossed the Schuylkill on the 14th, and then marched to the west in high spirits. The 3rd Virginia Regiment had done itself honor at a very high cost and had been commended by General Washington.

The British moved north to intercept the patriots, the two armies confronted one another near Warren Tavern, but a conflict did not result due to a severe storm. The British moved east to Germantown and Philadelphia; and Washington moved northwest to Warwick and then east to shadow the British, establishing camp at Skippack on the 29th of September. On the 2nd of October, the Continental Army moved thru rain and mud toward the British who were encamped at Germantown. They attacked at dawn, but fog caused early success to turn to total confusion. The battle lasted less than three hours. The 3rd Virginia Regiment became involved in the siege of the British at Chew House and remained there during most of the battle. Fortunately there were no additional casualties in Corporal John Athy's 8th Company. Thus #19 John Athy, #25 Thomas Athy, #26 Benjamin Athy, #68 Thomas Aty, and #69 James Athey all must have been at Brandywine and Germantown. On the 4th of October, #65 William Athy (4) arrived as a replacement in the 10th Virginia Regiment.

The Continental Army then retired to its camp at Skippack where it remained until it moved to winter quarters in the hills near Whitemarsh on the 30th of October. The camp was fortified; huts were built for the troops; however, the camp was abandoned on the 11th of December. The Army arrived at Valley Forge on December 19th; and in a few days those who were sufficiently clad had built huts for the troops. Each hut was 14×16 feet with $6\frac{1}{2}$ feet high sides, ends and roofs made of logs with the roof made tight with split slabs and the sides with clay. The door was of split slabs, and the chimney was of wood lined with 18° thick layer of clay. Such a hut was for twelve enlisted men. Many men were without shoes, coats, or blankets. There were few horses requiring that men pull wagons or carry heavy burdens on their backs. Food was very scarce, and men often went over a week without meat.

The huts of the 3rd Virginia Regiment were with General Weedon's Brigade near the east end of the camp about 1000 yards south of the Schuylkill River. #69 James Athey's 4th Virginia Regiment and #65 William Athy's 10th Virginia Regiment were also in General Weeden's Brigade. Thus the huts of Corporal John Athy and those of two of his close relatives would have been within several hundred yards of one another. Lieutenant Thomas Nelm had resigned his commission on November 27th at Whitemarsh leaving Corporal John Athy's 8th Company without any commissioned officers. All that remained of the company were three sergeants, one corporal (John Athy), and sixteen privates - a total of 20 men - 25% of full company strength. Surprisingly enough, all twenty men remained with the company until February 14, 1778 when the entire company was sent to York in Pennsylvania and discharged there on the 16th of February 1778. At the age of 48, having survived for a period of two years and ten days cannon balls, small leaden balls, bayonets, smallpox, ice, snow, cold, rain, mud, and the errors of the first of many fickle Houses of Congress, Corporal John Athy was finally on his way home to his wife and three children in Prince William County in Virginia. The other Athy patriots - #25 Thomas, #26 Benjamin, #65 William, #68 Thomas, and #69 James - were probably all at the Battle of Monwouth where Benjamin was probably killed; however, all the others were discharged in 1779 and 1780 prior to the capture of most of the Virginia Line at Charlestown in May 1780.

We might immagine the celebration when the 20 survivors of the 8th Company reached their homes in Prince William County after an absence of nearly two years. As a matter of fact, John's fourth child, Elizabeth, was born by the end of the year. John must have been a teamster by trade and seems to have started hauling supplies to the army. By 1781 he and Jeremiah Strode, who had acquired land in Berkeley County in Virginia prior to the war, were hauling to the army from Berkeley County in Virginia.

John moved his family from Prince William County to Berkeley County where he bought 150 acres of land in 1782. Since John was a teamster and there happened to have been a road from Dumfries to Alexandria to Winchester to Martinsburg, the 120 mile trip was no doubt made by roads, bad as they no doubt were. Travel by water was much more common at that time. John's wife, Sarah, bore twins that same year, and his oldest son had his 17th birthday.

By their standards living conditions had improved considerably since John's grandfather had married one hundred years earlier; however, by our standards there had been little improvement. With a tenfold increase in population had come roads, bridges, towns, and public buildings where there had been none; however, there were relatively few roads and those few were poor. When John built his new cabin in Berkeley County, you can be sure that it and its furnishings were little changed from those of his grandfather.

A second set of twins were born to Sarah and John in 1783, and in 1784 John sold his land and became foreman of the 1310 acre plantation owned by his old teamster friend – Jeremiah Strode. This plantation was bounded on the west and north by the Opekon Creek only a short distance from the Potomac River. Their last child was born there in 1785 at which time John was 55 years old and Sarah was at least 45 years.

1796 was a big year in the John Athy family since John, Jr. (age 31), Nancy (age 21), and Elizabeth (age 18) all were married - Elizabeth to Jeremiah Strode, Jr., son of the now deceased owner of the plantation where they now lived. Then in 1797, at the age of 67, John Athy bought 132 acres of land in Hampshire County in Virginia on the Great Cacapehon about two miles downstream from the present day town of Largent and moved there with his wife and children - Basil (24 Years), Elijah (15 years), Elisha (15 years), Thomas (14 years), Mary (14 years), and George (12 years).

John's land was on a large bend of the river nest to that of Reverand John Conn and not far downstream from the lands of Peter and Abraham Larue who had served during the war at the same time and in the same company with John Athy. At about this same time, John's second cousins #25 Thomas and #65 William who had camped near him at Valley Forge bought land not far from his – Thomas in Hampshire County and William in Allegany County in Maryland. It is not at all clear why Corporal John Athy never used or sold the land warrants to which he was entitled for military service during the war. It appears that he was willing to fight for his freedom but not for money.

In 1801 at the age of 71, John Athy, his wife Sarah, his son Basil (now age 28), and Basil's bride Margaret left Hampshire County and moved west to settle in Ross County in Ohio near the present day town of Dayton. John left his farm in Hampshire County in the custody of his second cousin and old comrade-in-arms, #65 William Athy. While in Ohio,

Margaret bore a son #185a Elijah Basil Athy (5) (See Figure 16); however, in the words of #702 Daniel Basil Athy (6) (See Figure 17) "so menacing were the Indians and so constant the warfare with them that he removed to West Virginia." They did in fact all return to John's farm on the Great Cacapehon in 1803.

John's son, #70 John Athey, Jr., moved in 1804 from Berkeley County in Virginia to Allegany County in Maryland where most of his children lived except for John Athy III who moved to Ohio (for his family see Fern Bauer's book). After returning from Ohio, the second son #71 Basil Athy raised his family in Hampshire County (to become part of Morgan County) in Virginia and then after his father's death moved back to Ohio with his son Elijah in 1833. His children lived in Ohio except for his son George who stayed in Morgan County. See Figures 16, 17, & 18. John's daughter #72 Nancy Hanes lived in Hampshire County, moved to Allegany County in Maryland, and then moved on to Ohio. #73 Elizabeth Strode, who had remained in Berkeley County, left for Kentucky in 1800 and moved on to Missouri later. Son #75 Elisha attended commercial school in Baltimore and later became a merchant in Kentucky. Son #76 Thomas served in the War of 1812, married the girl next door (Elizabeth Conn), and stayed in Hampshire and Morgan Counties. Most of his children lived in Allegany County in Maryland except for David Honn (Conn?) who lived in Iowa. Son #78 George Athy also served in the War of 1812 and lived in Morgan County until he moved on to Illinois at age 47.

Corporal John and Sarah Athy continued to live on their farm in what had become Morgan County in Virginia until both died in 1830, he in his 101st year and she in at least her 91st. From the Appraisal Bill for John Athy's estate as shown in Figure 22, it is interesting to note that at the age of 100 he still maintained at least some of the tools of his three known trades, soldier, teamster, and farmer: (1) "riffel gun, shot pouch, and pichin ax." (2) "waggon boxes & bands, big wheel, iron wegs and halter chains, geears, jack schrew, waggon whip, stretchers, and tong chains." (3) "plow shear and colter, shovel and dung fork, carts, Mateck and drawing knife, meale bags, plan, hachet and auger, cards and sheep sheers, windmill, hows and pich fork." It is said by their grandson Basil that John's and Sarah's coffins were made by their next door neighbor, Jacob Conn, brother to the wife of their son Thomas.

CONCLUSIONS:


Research reveals that most members of the Athy Tribe in Ireland were for three hundred years honest, God fearing, freedom loving merchants. Most members of the Athy Tribe were for the next three hundred years in America honest, God fearing, freedom loving farmers. We are certainly if anything consistent.

The native Celtic Irish considered the Anglo-Norman Athy Tribe in Galway to be Tories, traitors, and thieves. But in America it appears that there were no Tories, traitors, or thieves. As a matter of fact, our Athy Tribe is so honest, honorable and patriotic that we can proudly boast that in over 200 years no Athy has ever been required to serve in the Congress in Washington, D.C....

Early documents reveal to us that against members of the early Athy generations there were three three serious charges but no known convictions. One charge was of fornication, one of non payment of debt, and one of desertion from the Union Army. Surely they were innocent; however we should remember that members of our tribe have always been among the first in their fields of endeavor being of the early settlers of the states of Maryland, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Oregon, etc. At the worst by today's standards, these three persecuted Tribesmen are guilty of no more than being born at least one hundred years too soon.

How many descendants of Captain George Athy might there be today? In the sixth generation there are listed herein about 850 descendants of which about 250 are male with the name Athy or variations thereof. In the sixth generation, only one out of every thirty two descendants could be expected to have the Athy surname. Thus there must have been in excess of 8000 descendants in the sixth generation, of which only about ten percent are listed herein. In the tenth generation, only one out of every 512 descendants should have the Athy name. There is reason to believe that there are at least 2000 males today with the Athy surname and variations thereof. If such is the case, Captain George Athy has over 1,000,000 descendants alive today.

Our name may be rare, but there are sure lots of us sharing the very rare freedoms of the Republic won for us by a few of our Athy ancestors and General George Washington (with some help from others). If we are to keep this republic as two hundred years ago Dr. Benjamin Franklin suggested that we just might, we should take a close look at Corporal John Athy's example and perhaps do as he did – stay fit, keep "riffle gun, shot pouch, and pichin ax" handy, be willing to go in harms way at any age and in other "states" if necessary, provide for one's own retirement, and refuse unnecessary government entitlements.
