

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# PREFACE

This book has been compiled from material gathered over a period of years from original sources; State archives, census and pension reports, town records, histories, Bibles, family records, etc., and by word of mouth from members of various families. Naturally, with information from such varied sources, particularly traditional sources, there will be errors, but it has been arranged with as much care as possible. It is not the work of a genealogist, but has been accumulated at a great cost of time and money by one who had a deep love for all things of the past. There has been no attempt to make it a complete genealogy; merely to publish the material on hand at the time of the compiler's death. The conclusions reached may not always be correct, but it was the hope of the compiler that any descendant of Captain Jonathan could find sufficient information here to enable him to start a more thorough search on his own line.

Frank Myer Ferrin became interested in this work through records that his father Francis Legro had collected, and after his father's death in 1913, Frank Myer continued the research in his memory. It was not the original intention to go beyond a family line, but like all work of this kind, further research developed greater interest and finally material on all lines was searched for and collected.

E. S. Stearns, in his History of Plymouth, N. H., gave the Ferrin family of New Hampshire as descending from Jonathan Ferrin of Newton, N. H. Starting with this lead, visits were made to Newton, N. H. (formerly part of Amesbury, Mass.), and the town records there proved that this was the correct information. These records were replete with entries of Capt. Jonathan Ferrin (or Farren) and his family. The late Mr. Edward Kelly of Newton, then an elderly gentleman, volunteered the information that as a boy he had seen a Ferrin grave in the town cemetery. A thorough search was made by Mr. Kelly and others of the town, and the grave of Capt. Jonathan Ferrin was found with its gravestone broken and buried beneath mounds of earth. The grave was immediately cared for and two boulders erected with bronze tablets, one an account of incidents in the life of Captain Jonathan, and the other a replica of the old gravestone.

#### PREFACE

The late Mr. Everett Bartlett of Newton, N. H., a student of local history, contributed much information about the early families. He had in his possession many interesting original papers, amongst them some original "Ferrin" signatures of 1765 and 1785, now in the possession of the New England Historic Genealogical Society.

Thanks and appreciation are due Mrs. Lavisa (Ferrin) Hollinger (Joseph, Francis, Philip, Jonathan) for the generous amount of material that she contributed to this work. Having collected it over a period of years, she very gladly consented to have it included in this publication. Thanks are also due to all who have helped in any way in establishing the various lines.

Frank Myer Ferrin died July 15, 1939, before the completion of this work. It was his wish, as expressed in his will, that I, his secretary for long years, arrange this material for publication.

# HOW TO TRACE YOUR ANCESTRY

Two indexes are printed in this genealogy, first of those bearing the name of Ferrin (in its various spellings), and second, persons of other names. To trace one's ancestry in the Ferrin line you should refer to the index, where you will find names of all direct descendants have the number of their generation in small figures, and the page reference. By turning to the page indicated you will find your name and record, and preceding it the names of your parents of the fifth generation and their immediate ancestry of the fourth generation. Refer to the index again, locate the names and page reference of your grandparents, on which page you will find their record and that of their ancestry in the third generation. Locating the names of this third generation in the index will bring you to the second generation, and repetition of the same procedure will bring your lineage to the first generation of Ferrins.

As this genealogy does not include the names of all descendants in the Ferrin line, in case you do not find yourself listed in the index, you may be able to trace your lineage through the descent of some relatives whom you find listed.

# INTRODUCTION

The name Capt. Jonathan Farren appears for the first time on the Amesbury, Mass. Town Records in 1719, at the time of his marriage to Sarah Wells, granddaughter of Rev. Thomas Wells, first minister to Amesbury, who performed the marriage ceremony. It is known that he was born in 1697 from the dates on his gravestone, but considerable research has failed to unearth his birthplace or parentage.

Very early in the search a snag was encountered. On the Essex County Registry of Deeds was found a deed of gift dated 25 May 1726, Thomas Bettel and Elizabeth Bettel of Almsbury to "our son, Jonathan Farren of Almsbury" one half of our lot of land lying in the children's land division. This was given "in consideration of the love, goodwill and affection which we have and do bear towards our son Jonathan Farren of Almsbury."

Elizabeth Bettel or Bedle was the daughter of Nathan Gould of Almsbury, and this land was originally owned by him and willed to his daughter Elizabeth in his will dated 12 Dec. 1692. No record of a first marriage of Elizabeth Gould was found which might have accounted for Thomas and Elizabeth Bettel calling him their "son." The first Bedle child was not born until 19 Feb. 1698/99.

In the will of Thomas Bedle of "Almsbury" dated 10 Feb. 1734/35 the three Bedle children are mentioned, but no mention

of a "son" Jonathan Farren.

Further evidence against a first marriage is another deed in the Essex County Registry of Deeds, dated 6 July 1736. The heirs of Nathan Gould of Almsbury are clearing the title of a deed that Nathan Gould and wife gave to Stephen Webster of Haverhill, 18 May 1672. Jonathan Farren is living at this time and is not given as one of the heirs of Nathan Gould. Jonathan Farren could have been an adopted son of Thomas and Elizabeth Bedle, but of this no record has been found.

There were no Farrens or Ferrins in Almsbury contemporary with Jonathan, but in the neighboring town of Ipswich, Mass., there was a Patrick Farren,\* chirurgien and periwig maker, who settled there before 1721. He was said to have come from Dublin, Ireland to Ipswich, Mass. He married in Boston 7 Feb. 1721 Joanna Tuttle of Boston. Most of his descendants settled in Maine. Nothing has been found that would show any relationship between Jonathan Farren of Almsbury and Patrick Farren of Ipswich, but they were contemporaries.

In collecting material for this work much information was

gathered about Farrens or Ferrins who are not descendants of Captain Jonathan of Newton, N. H. There were many descendants of Patrick Farren of Ipswich, many lines of Irish origin and many of French origin, particularly a Ferron family of Canada. Then, too, numerous miscellaneous items referring to "Ferrins" were found. All this material will be placed in the New England Historic Genealogical Society library at a later date, but will not be published.

The original manuscript of this work, including many photographs, original papers, allied families and many female descendants, has been bound in two volumes and will be placed in the vaults of the New England Historic Genealogical Society at Boston, Mass. They may be seen at any time by any member of the Society, or anyone recommended by a member. Should any descendant care to make further study of his line, valuable material

might be found there.

The spelling of the name has been most confusing. It was always found spelled in various ways, sometimes in the same document, but the name of the head of the family in each case is the form that was most frequently used.

Without doubt, Captain Jonathan called himself "Farren." It is found this way on most of the records, with an occasional "Faren." In the New Hampshire Historical Society at Concord,

N. H., are many papers with his own signature, i.e.:

1763. Inventory estate Jonathan Currier of Newtown, signed "Jonathan Farren."

1765. In setting off land for the Widow Judith Currier it mentions "then westerly about 45 rods to a stake and stones by Capt. Jonathan Farren's land." Signed "Jonathan Farren."

1765. Estate Gershom Bartlett, Newtown, signed "Jonathan Farren." Widow's accounting, 31 Aug. 1769—"Pd. to Thomas Beedle, jr. 0-12-0. Pd. to Capt. Jonathan Farren 2-15-1."

1768. Will signed "Jonathan Farren."

There is an old original receipt, now in the possession of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, which reads: "Southhamton, May ye 28, 1765. Then received of Philip Currier for four days sarvies as a comitey man in priseing the estates of Captin Jonathan Currier late of Southhamton decest eight pounds old tener of pay received by me. 8-0-0. Jonathan Faren."

His gravestone reads "Capt. Jonathan Ferrin," but this could be accounted for from the fact that his son Aquilla was executor of his estate and no doubt erected the stone. At that time Aquilla

was signing "Ferrin."

Timothy, oldest son of Jonathan, signed "Farren" on the fol-

lowing papers:

1753. Timothy Farren signed a note to John Goffe dated 10 Feb. 1753.

1766. Timothy Farren, lawsuit against Jona. Currier, dated 10 Feb. 1766. Again on these papers, appointing his lawyer, signed "Timothy Farren."

776. Association Test from Londonderry, 12 April 1776, signed

"Timothy Faren."

Moses, the second son, signed "Ferren" on the Association Test of Portsmouth, N. H.

Zebulon, third son of Jonathan, signed "Ferren." The follow-

ing papers were signed in this way:

Note dated Southampton 23 March 1759, signed "Zebulun ferren."

Joint note with James Sticknee, dated 7 April 1762, signed "Zebulun ferren."

Note to Nath. Batchelor, dated 7 Aug. 1763, signed "Zebulun

ferren.'

Zebulun Ferren evidently left the New Hampshire area after the death of his first wife. A Zebulon Farren married in East Haven, Conn., shortly after this, and from the tradition gathered from his descendants there seems to be no question as to his being the New Hampshire Zebulun. However, in Connecticut he became "Zebulon Farren." His name is given as "Farren" on all records and on his gravestone. No record was ever found of Zebulun in New Hampshire at a later date which in any way would disprove the conclusions arrived at by the compiler and other descendants that Zebulon Farren of East Haven was the same man as Zebulun Ferren of New Hampshire. The Connecticut descendants have always been "Farren."

Aquilla, sixth son of Jonathan, signed "Aquiller ferrin" to an old paper dated 11 Aug. 1785, now in the possession of the New England Historic Genealogical Society. On the records he is

referred to as "Ferrin."

Enos, grandson of Jonathan and son of Zebulon, was the ancestor of Frank Myer Ferrin, the compiler of this genealogy. He, too, signed "Ferrin." On the Association Test for Weare, N. H. dated 12 April 1776, he signed "Enos ferrin."

William, grandson of Jonathan and son of Alpheus, signed "William ferren" on the Association Test for Sandown, N. H.

The name was evidently "Farren" and has been changed to Ferren and Ferrin as it has come down.

# FIRST GENERATION

1. CAPTAIN JONATHAN FARREN was born about 1697, according to information on gravestone, and died at Newtown, N. H. 5 May 1770. He married at Amesbury, Mass. 10 Dec. 1719, Sarah Wells, granddaughter of the Rev. Thomas Wells, first minister of Amesbury, who performed the marriage ceremony. (Intentions 29 Oct. and marriage on Amesbury Town Records.) She was the daughter of Titus and Joanna (Rowell) Wells, born at Amesbury 20 July 1608.

at Amesbury, 30 July 1698.

Jonathan Farren marched with Capt. John Lovewell in 1724 on his expedition against ye Indian enemy and was present when "ye ten Indians were killed." Mr. Frederic Kidder says: "In the autumn of 1724 the inhabitants of the frontier towns on the Merrimac River seem to have been dissatisfied with the manner of carrying on the war with the Indians, and wished to adopt offensive operations. Accordingly, a company was organized at Dunstable, of which John Lovewell was Captain, Josiah Farwell Lieu tenant, and Jonathan Robbins Ensign. These officers offered a petition to the Legislature in which they say 'that if said Company may be allowed five shillings per day in case they kill any enemy Indians and possesse their scalp they will employ in Indian Hunting one whole year and if they do not within that time kill any, they are content to be allowed nothing for their wages, time and trouble.' This petition was granted changing the terms into a bounty of 100 pounds for every scalp taken during one year. Capt. Lovewell was a brave and adventurous officer, and stimulated by this offer, he immediately took the field and led his company on towards the dwelling place of the Pequaketts who resided within the territory now forming the towns of Fryeburg, Me., and Conway, NH'

Some time after their return, Captain Lovewell and his men petitioned the General Court. In the Archives of the State of Massachusetts is an advertisement stating that the General Assembly of the Province at their session held 29 May 1728 have set aside two tracts of unappropriated land for all persons in the Narragansett War, and asking that lists of their names be sent in to be laid before the General Court. On the back of this advertisement is the list of men "when ye 10 Indians were killed" and Jona Ferren is one of the 62 names given. These two grants were Suncook, now Pembroke, N. H., and Voluntierstown, now Petersham, Mass. 20 June 1733, Jonathan Farren and others were admitted to the Voluntierstown Grant. In 1735 he deeds same to Samuel Willard of Lancaster for the sum of thirty-six pounds "currant money of New England."

Left. Jonathan Farrin was one of the petitioners with Ladd

and Young "Officers and Soldiers in ye late expedition against Cape Briton" for a township or tract of land, 1748. (Masonian

Papers, Vol. 5, p. 51.)

From Massachusetts Archives, Muster Roll, 1710 to 1774: Jona Farron — Dated Boston, 8 March 1755, of Company in His Majesty's service under command of Capt. Jabez Bradbury. Centinel. Entered service 9 March 1754. Served until 29 Sept. 1754. Length of service 29 weeks, 2 days. Reported discharged.

In 1752 on the Amesbury Town Records, he is referred to for the first time as Captain Jonathan Farren, by which title he is known until his death in 1770. He is Capt. Jona Ferrin on his

gravestone.

He settled in the West Parish of Amesbury at a place called Cottel's Plaine. In 1726 he is given on a list of persons over 21 years taxed for the support of preaching in the west parish. This was the Amesbury Second Church, where he was baptized 31 Dec. 1727, and where all his children were baptized later.\* Nov. 1727 J. Barnard deeds to him 33 acres of land at Cottel's Plaine for the sum of 100 pounds current money. March 1730 John Peaslee deeds to him one and one half acres at the same place. (Essex County Registry of Deeds.) Sept. 1751 John Peaslee deeds to him one acre adjoining his land, and in May 1762 James George deeds five acres adjoining his land. (New Hampshire Province Deeds.) These deeds represent his home farm mentioned in inventory as "about forty acres of land with buildings being his homestead liveing."

In 1916, through the courtesy of the late Mr. Edward Kelly of Newton, N. H., the site of the Capt. Jonathan Farren farm in the Currierville section of Newton was located, and the remains of an old dam found there. Tradition states that Captain Jonathan had some sort of mill where guns or munitions were made. It is still known to some of the older settlers of Newton as the

"Ferrin Farm" or "Ferrin Pasture."

In 1741 a new Province Line was established between Massachusetts and New Hampshire, and a strip of land fifteen miles in length was taken from Salisbury and Amesbury in Massachusetts and annexed to New Hampshire. In May 1742 this strip was incorporated as the Town of South Hampton, N. H. Jonathan Farren, a resident of that part of Amesbury, Mass. which was annexed to New Hampshire, automatically became an inhabitant of South Hampton, N. H., but later on he and others, dissatisfied with the location of the meeting house in said town, begged to be set off to other parishes, or be allowed to form a separate parish

for themselves. After several years of petitions and reports, they were finally set off from South Hampton and annexed to Newtown, N. H., 22 March 1749.

There are numerous deeds of record in Concord and Exeter, N. H., and Salem, Mass., to which Jonathan Farren was a party. In these deeds he is referred to as "yoeman," "husbandman" and for many years before his death as "gentleman."

He held various town offices in Amesbury, Mass., South Hampton and Newtown, N. H. Apparently an important citizen in the little town of Newtown, his name appears constantly on the records. The following taken from Vol. II, Town Meetings, Newton, N. H., Town Records:

5 April 1755 — Cap Jonathan Farrin one of a committee chosen "to make up with the selectmen for the year past." He was chosen Assessor for same year.

21 April 1755 — Adjourned Meeting: Capt. Jonathan Farrin one of a committee "to provide stuff for the meeting house and look out a bureing

place and make return at the adjournment of the meeting.

4 Aug. 1755 — Capt. Jonathan Farrin one of a committee "to hire a joyner to clabbord the meeting house and lay the floor and build the doors, etc., and to hire a glaaser to glaase the meeting house."

31 March 1756 - Captain Jonathan Farrin chosen one of the select-

30 April 1756 - Put to vote "to see if the town would allow Captain Jonathan Farrin thirteen pounds six shillings and six pence (old tenor) for shingels for and work done on the meeting house," and the vote passed in the negative. At same meeting it was voted to reconsider above, and

it was voted in the affirmative.

8 July 1756 — "Voted that the persons hereafter named, Gideon Bartlett, Esquire, Capt. William Rowell, Capt. Jonathan Farrin, Ens. David Bagley, Andrew Whittier, David Elliott, Nathaniel Ash, Daniel Goodwin, Aaron Currier, Joseph Bartlet, and Garshom Bartlett should have all the privilages and conveniances for the pews in the meeting house in Newtown, below (excepting one for the minister in a conveniant place) and they to glaase the Meeting House for said privilage and to have it

glaased by the first of September next." Voted in the affirmative.

30 Sept. 1756 — Captain Jonathan Farrin, Moderator of Meeting.

16 May 1757 — Captain Jonathan Farrin, Moderator of Meeting.

1 May 1758 — "Voted that Captain Jonathan Farrin should go with

the Selectmen to Mr. Eames and discourse with him in order for a new settlement." (This was in reference to asking Mr. Eames to settle with them in the work of the Ministry.)

16 Oct. 1758 — Captain Jonathan Farren chosen Moderator of Meet-

30 Oct. 1758 - Capt. Jonathan Farrin Moderator of Meeting. "Voted that Captain William Rowell and Aaron Currier and Cutting Favor and Captain Jonathan Farrin should go to Mr. Eames at Mr. Gershom Bartlett's house and inform him what the town had done and bring word back again to the meeting." (The town had appropriated 1000 pounds old tenor to Mr. Eames if he would settle with them.) At adjourned meeting committee reported that Mr. Eames would not accept unless they gave him 600 pounds old tenor additional. Voted in the affirmative.

28 March 1759 — Captain Jonathan Farrin one of a committee "for to look out and agree for a convenient piece of land for a bureing place

for both ends of ye town" and make report to next meeting.

25 March 1761 — Captain Jonathan Farrin one of a committee "for to treat with South Hampton Committee and to act with them in behalf of ye town in order to settel a line between sd. South Hampton and Newtown and the matter wholly left with ye said Committee for to establish and confirm a line between the two towns." Captain Jonathan Farrin chosen Assessor for this year.

30 April 1761 — Captain Jonathan Farrin, Moderator of Meeting.

31 March 1762 — Captain Jonathan Farrin chosen fence viewer. "Voted to see if the town would allow Cap. Jonathan Farrins accompt as their laid before them as to the charge he had been at in repairing the Meeting House doors this year which sum was one pound fifteen shillings silver (old tenor) or Hampshire bills of credit equivalent thereto." Voted in the affirmative.

7 April 1762 — Voted to allow Cap. Jonathan Farrin and others five shillings per man for their serving as Committee men in setteling a line with South Hampton the last year.

30 March 1763 - Cap. Jonathan Farrin and Stephen Bartlett tythe-

ing men.

6 Dec. 1763 — Capt. Jonathan Farrin chosen Moderator of Meeting. 28 March 1764 — Cap. Jonathan Farrin, Gideon Bartleit and Capt. William Rowell chosen selectmen. "Voted to see if the town would free Capt. Jonathan Farrin's head from reats this year." Voted in the negative.

22 Oct. 1764 — Captain Jonathan Farrin chosen Moderator of Meeting. Captain Jonathan Farrin and other selectmen report on a highway.

27 March 1765 — Captain Jonathan ferren and other chosen constables. "Voted to see if the town would accept Captain Jonathan farren for to serve constable for the whole town this year viz; — in the room of Timothy Whittier and Thomas Tuxbury." Voted in the affirmative.

17 April 1765 — "Voted to see if the town would give Captain Jonathan Farren seven dollars or Hampshire bills equivalent thereto if he would collect the rates committed to Lieut. Gershom Bartlett decesd to collect." Voted affirmative. Capt. Jonathan Farren, Constable, for to collect the remaining part of the rates which were committed to sd. Gershom Bartlett who deced before he had collected them.

26 March 1766 — "Voted to see if the town would allow Capt. Jonathan ferren six pence upon the pound for what rates he collected for said

town." Affirmative.

22 April 1767 — "Voted to see if the town would free Capt. ferren from paying rates for his head this present year." Voted in the negative.

30 March 1768 — Cap. Jonathan Farrion and others chosen fence

viewers.

25 July 1769 — "Voted to see if the town would pay the money for Captain Jonathan Farrin for the Baptis rates which are not yet paid to him." Voted negative. "Voted to see if they would exclusive of frinds Churchmen and Baptis raise the money for Cap farren as aforementioned." Voted negative.

16 Oct. 1769 — "Voted to see if the town would exclusive of the frinds agree to pay Cap Jonathan Farrin interest for four months for ye money due to him for the Baptis rates which he had not collected."

Voted affirmative.

16 April 1770 - Voted that the Committee, viz; Captain William

Rowell, and Gideon Bartlett, Jr. should pay the whole of the Congregationals part of the money recovered from the Selectmen for ye year 1768 unto Captain Jonathan farren. (Town were dissatisfied with the manner of spending money that year and selectmen had to pay it back to town.)

The following from Volume III, Selectmen's book:

16 Nov. 1767 — Paid to Capt. Jonathan Farren one pound four shillings lawful money for his boarding schoolmaster Hobs two months. Paid to Capt. Jonathan Farren four shillings and eleven pence lawful money for an abatement of his rates. Paid to Capt. Jonathan ferren two pounds eleven shilling and five pence lawful money it being for orders which was drawd on Timothy Favour late constable by late selectmen which were not answered.

1768 — Invoice: Cap. Jonathan Farron list. Town Rate for paying of cost which had arose in ye town by reason of Baptis being rated to ye Congregational Minister. Cap. Jonathan Farrion on list. Town Rate for scouting and other charges. Cap. Jonathan Farrion on list.

20 Aug. 1769 - Province Rate - Capt. Jonathan Farren on list.

Town Rate - Cap. Jonathan Farren on list.

6 Feb. 1770 — Ordered to Capt. Jonathan Farren the sum of eighteen shillings for his time and expense in going to the general court to have the annual town meeting in ye year 1769 set aside.

The will of Capt. Jonathan Farren was dated 22 Feb. 1768. In this will he bequeaths to Aquilla Ferren "all my homestead living, salt marsh fresh meadow, etc." In trying to locate the "salt marsh" mentioned, the Salisbury, Mass. records were searched. Old tax lists were found, and on one of 1766 Capt. Jonathan Ferinton's name was entered. This was Capt. Jonathan, without doubt, as his estate was named on lists found for 1770, 1773, 1778 and 1779 as "non-resident." For many years thereafter, Aquilla Ferren, his son, was taxed as "non-resident." These tax lists were loose sheets, and many years were missing.

Capt. Jonathan Farren departed this life 5 May 1770, and was buried in the Town Cemetery at Newtown, N. H. (now Newton). Two bronze tablets set in boulders mark his grave, the tablet at the foot of the grave being a copy of the original gravestone.

Widow Sarah Ferren is on the Newtown, N. H., tax lists for

the years 1771, 1772, 1773 and 1774.

He married (1) at Amesbury 24 Nov. 1743, Mary Hoyt, daughter of Lieut. Micah\* and Susannah Hoyt, who was born July 1726 and baptized 15 July 1744 in the Amesbury Second Church. She died before Dec. 1768.† He married (2) Mary ——.‡

Petitions on file dated 18 Feb. 1741-42 and 29 Sept. 1742, have his signature as one of the inhabitants of Amesbury asking to be set off to Kingstown, N. H. in the first petition, and as one of the inhabitants of South Hampton, N. H. asking to be allowed to form

a new parish in the second petition.

1 June 1746, he renewed his covenant in the Amesbury First

Church.

He was of Kingstown, Goffstown and Londonderry, N. H. There are several deeds on record at Concord and Exeter, N. H., to which Timothy Farren (or Ferren) was a party. According to these he probably settled in Goffstown, N. H., in 1752. The births of his children are entered on the Goffstown Town Records. He settled somewhere in the vicinity of the Shirley Station. On a plan of Goffstown showing original lots, first roads and the streams, lot No. 16, second range, is "T. Farin." On the Goffstown Town Records is the following: "10 Aug. 1761 — Laying out rodes. Mast rode runs to the south of Timothy Ferrin's house."

After the incorporation of Town of Goffstown, at first town meeting, 6 July 1761, Timothy Ferren and three others were chosen hog reeves. In 1762 he was chosen constable and in 1764, chosen

surveyor of highways. In 1765 the annual town meeting was "holden" at his house. In 1766 he was chosen "howards." At this same meeting he was freed of his rates for that year, no reason given. There is a tradition that about this time his buildings were destroyed by fire, which may be the reason for the exemption. In 1771 he and other inhabitants of Goffstown protest against the establishment of a Presbyterian Parish. (His brother Philip and his son Timy signed also.)

At Exeter, N. H., are deeds which show that he bought land in Londonderry in 1774, which is probably the date of his settling there. From 1780 to 1790 he held office in Londonderry, tytheing man, constable and hog reeves. At the age of 76 years he deeded his homestead farm to his sons John and James Farin of Londonderry, and it is fair to presume that he ended his days with them

in Londonderry. No record of his death has been found.

Intentions were "Farren"; marriage "Ferren."

On the "Muster Rolls of 1710 to 1774" in the Massachusetts Archives his name appears several times:

Moses Ferrin appears on a Muster Roll dated Boston 8 Nov. 1748, of a Company in His Majesty's Service under the command of Capt. John Smith in the quality of Centinel. Ent. Service May 23, served until Oct. 26 (year not given, probably 1748). Length of service 22 weeks, 3 days.

Moses Ferren—a Muster Roll dated Boston, 22 June 1749 of Company in His Majesty's Service under the command of Capt. John Smith, quality Centinel. Ent. service Oct. 27 (probably 1748). Served until June 18 (probably 1749). Length of service 33 weeks, 4 days.

Moses Ferrin — served from 23 May to 26 Oct. 1748, 22 weeks, 3 days,

and from 27 Oct. 1748 to 18 June 1749, 38 weeks. 4 days.

Moses Ferren — appears on a list dated Biddeford, 7 April, 1757. Militia in Town of Biddeford (west side of river), commanded by Capt. Thomas Bradbury comprising Train band and Alarm list. Rank, private (Probably). Reported, belonged to Train band.

Moses "Tarren" — list dated 9 March 1758, of men in the 2d foot company of Biddeford under command of Capt. Thomas Bradbury. Reported

on training list.

Mr. Moses Morrill of the First Congregational Church of Biddeford admitted him to membership 15 March 1752. For the next twenty years he and his family are residents of Biddeford, Maine.

On the town records at Biddeford, Maine, in city clerk's office, under date of 5 April 1754, Moses Ferren requests town to lay out and measure five and half acres of land. Under date of 22 July 1754, he requests town to lay out and measure five more acres. 20 May 1756, at a Biddeford town meeting, it was voted that there be paid to Moses Farrin by sd town twenty six shillings and eight pence for and on acct. of James Treworgy. For several years he was chosen hog reeves; the last year 1772.

After 1772 there is no further mention of Moses Farrin\* on Biddeford, Maine, records, so we presume he left there about that time. He likely removed to his old home town, Newtown, N. H., as the following war rolls place him in and about that section, and

two of his daughters are married there.

4. ZEBULON FARREN (Jonathan¹), born 18 Sept. 1727, Amesbury, Mass., baptized 28 Sept. 1740 Amesbury Second Church, now in Merrimac, Mass., and died 3 Dec. 1805 East Haven, Conn. He married (1) 9 July 1747, Alice Tucker, who was born in Amesbury, Mass., 24 March 1721, daughter of Benjamin and Alice Davis Tucker, and died probably in Sandown, N. H. in 1767. She was a sister of Rev. John Tucker of Newbury, Mass. Zebulon married (2) 3 March 1768 at East Haven, Conn., Desire Hemingway, born 19 Feb. 1741–42, daughter of Samuel and Mehitabel (Dennison) Hemingway of East Haven, and granddaughter of Samuel Hemingway, one of early settlers of East Haven and probably richest and most influential man in the town. They were married by Rev. Nicholas Street.

In 1748 and 1749 Zebulon's name appears on petition with his father Jonathan Farren, asking to be set off from South Hampton,

N. H. and annexed to Newtown, N. H.

In 1749 Zebulon Farren and his wife, Alice, renewed their baptismal covenant in the Amesbury Second Church.

1755, he signed petition dated Newtown, N. H. for opening high-

way.

Between 1749 and 1759 he is referred to on all records as of South Hampton and Newtown, N. H. This does not necessarily mean a change of residence, merely a shifting of town lines.

Sometime before 1761 Zebulon Farren removed to Sandown, N. H. 23 Feb. 1764 — town votes to Zebulon Ferren all the common land on the upper end of his land. At same meeting he is one of three names acknowledging receipt of full satisfaction for highway going through their land. In all probability the family were members of the Congregational Church at Sandown. The Congregational Society was organized in 1759, although Meeting House was not built until 1774.

His signature on New Hampshire records was "Zebulun Ferren" and his descendants in New Hampshire have since used Ferren

and Ferrin.

There is no trace of Zebulon after 1764 on any New Hampshire records that have been searched. His wife died in 1767 and it is probable that he left the section at that time. In Feb. 1768, in his father's will, the bequest to his son Zebulon was not at all in proportion to the other children, while to the three sons of Zebulon he leaves land in Sandown.

Perusal of *Dodd's East Haven Register* brought to light the marriage of a Zebulon Farren in East Haven, Conn. in 1768. A visit to descendants there revealed that their ancestor was a "Zebulon from somewhere near Newburyport, Mass., married

before with a first family as large as the East Haven family." Further interviews and research convinced them that Zebulon Farren of East Haven, Conn. was the son of Jonathan of Amesbury, Mass. The descendants of the second marriage were always known as Farren.

Family tradition says that Zebulon Farren was the first man in Connecticut to free a slave. From the East Haven Town Records:

"To all to whom these presents shall come greeting; — Know ye that we John Woodward Gurdin Bradley Mary Bradley Azariah Bradley Lydia Bradley Haldah Hemingway Joseph Hemingway Stephen Woodward all of East Haven in New Haven County for the consideration of 10 pounds lawful money received to our full satisfaction of Mr. Zebulon Farrin of said East Haven do sell make over & confirm unto him the said Farrin a certain negro girl named Sophia unto us belonging and being a slave for life hereby convenanting with the said Farrend that we have good right to dispose of said Sophia in service to the said Farrand with him to serve during the term of her natural life.

There are numerous transfers of land between 1781 and 1805 to and from Zebulon and Desire Farren on the East Haven Land Records at New Haven.

Zebulon Farren died 3 Dec. 1805, and is buried in the Hemingway family lot in East Haven Cemetery. His wife Desire died 14 June 1807 and is buried there also. Their gravestone reads:

> ZEBULON FARREN Died Dec. 3, 1805 Aged 100 years

DESIRE FARREN Died June 14, 1807 Aged 76 years

There have been great discrepancies in recording the age of Zebulon Farren in East Haven, due no doubt to the fact that his East Haven descendants knew nothing of the date or place of his birth. The gravestone says 100 years; one of the descendants claimed 110 years; an old paper of Joseph Dunham Farren (Jacob, Zebulon, Jonathan)\* gives 86 years. He was really 78 years of age at the time of his death.

6. PHILIP FARREN (Jonathan<sup>1</sup>), born 21 Oct. 1739, Newton, N. H., baptized 28 Sept. 1740, Amesbury Second Church, and died 12 Jan. 1804, Goffstown, N. H. He married about 1764 Anne Currier, daughter of Aaron (Richard, Thomas, Richard) and Electa (Wells) Currier of Newton, N. H. The mothers of the two young people were cousins. She was born 9 June 1743 and died 2 March

1815, Goffstown, N. H.

Philip Ferren\* settled in Goffstown, N. H., probably coming there immediately after his marriage. His first house was built at what is now Shirley Station, Goffstown, but it was burned to the ground one evening while the family were away from home. He next built at the top of Shirley Hill near "Tipping Rock," but when the timber was cleared away, this proved to be too bleak for comfort, so they either moved this house or built a new one further down the slope, on land now owned by Ferson. The original Ferson bought this farm from Ebenezer Ferren, son of Philip. Today there remains nothing but the cellar hole of the old Philip Ferren homestead. All the children of Philip and Anne Ferren were born on this place and Ebenezer, their son, lived there during his lifetime and died there in 1873.

In 1765 his name appears for the first time on the Goffstown Town Records. He was chosen tytheing man that year; and in 1767 and 1773 was chosen surveyor of highways. In the laying

out of highways his land is often mentioned.

Philip Ferren, together with his brother Timothy and his nephew Timy and others, in 1771 signed a petition dated Goffs-

town, N. H., protesting against the setting up of inhabitants calling themselves Presbyterians into a distinct parish. In 1777 he and his nephew Ebenezer are petitioners with others "for a lottery

to build bridges over Piscataguog River."

In 1778, 1800 and 1802 he is again chosen surveyor of highways, and on these later dates he is called Lieut. Philip Ferren. He received this commission in 1779 while serving in the American Revolution. The following is his Revolutionary Record:

A grandson of Philip Ferren states that he was also one of the

devoted ones who spent the winter at Valley Forge.

In the year 1779 Philip Ferren was appointed First Lieutenant of the Ninth Regiment. He entered the army as a private Aug. 7, 1778. He enlisted in Capt. James Aiken's Company of Goffstown, N. H. and as an ensign, Dec. 1, 1779. He was appointed First Lieutenant of the First Company in the Ninth Regiment of Militia in the State of New Hampshire. The following is his commission copied from a copy in the possession of his grandson, Ebenezer Ferrin, of Manchester, N. H.

State of New Hampshire to Philip Ferren Gentleman - The Government and People of the Said State

Greetings; We reposing especial Trust and Confidence in your Fidelity, Courage and good Conduct, Do, by these Presents, constitute, and appoint you the said Philip Ferren first Lieutenant of the First Company in the Ninth Regiment of Militia in the said State of New Hampshire, you are therefore carefully and diligently to discharge the Duty of a first Lieutenant in leading, ordering, and exercising said Company in Arms, both inferior officers and Soldiers, and to keep them in good Order and Discipline; hereby commanding them to obey you as their first Lieutenant and yourself to observe and follow such Order and Instructions, as you shall from Time to Time receive from the Council and House of Representatives of said State for the time being, and in their Recess from the Committee of Safety, or any your Superior Officers for the Service of said State, according to Military Rules and Discipline, pursuant to the Trust reposed in you. In Testimony Whereof we have caused the Seal of said State to be hereunto affixed: Witness M. Weare, Esq.

President of our said Council at Exeter the first day of December

Anno Domini 1779. E. Thompson Secy.

28 June 1779 (on Goffstown Town Records) Philip Ferren appointed one of a committee to examine the state of the town, and what each man has done in the war, and make proper estimation of each man's service per month according to pole and estate.

In 1783 he and others protest to the Town Clerk against the method of carrying on Town Meeting. They also petition the

General Court in reference to trouble between Congregational and Presbyterian Parishes.

In June 1797 he was one of petitioners to the General Court

relative to fish-wardens.

Philip Ferren died 12 Jan. 1804 at Shirley Hill, Goffstown, and his wife Anna died 2 March 1815, and both are buried in the Ferren lot in Grasmere Cemetery, Goffstown, N. H.

He married (1) Hannah ——, who died 18 July 1791, Newtown, N. H. (Newton Town Records—"wife of Lt. Aquila Ferrin.") He married (2) 26 Jan. 1792, Abigail Colby at Kingstown, N. H. She was born 17 Oct. 1756 at Newtown, N. H. and died at Concord, N. H. 11 June 1826, aged 70 years, called "widow of Aquilla."

His name appears as follows on the Muster Roll of Colonial

Wars, 1710 to 1774 in the Massachusetts Archives:

Aquilla Ferrin appears on return of men enlisted for His Majesty's Service for the total reduction of Canada — 1760. Enlisted by Thomas Colbey Apr. 12th, age 19. Birthplace, Amesbury. Reported — Son to Jona Ferrin.

Aquillia Ferrin Private — Muster Roll, Boston, Mar. 11, 1761, Company in His Majesty's Service under command of Capt. Anthony Stickney. Residence, Kingstown. Ent. Apr. 14th, and served until Dec. 11th (year not given — probably 1760). Length of service 34 weeks 4 days. Reported 240 miles travl home allowed.

Aqualla Farren appears on a Billeting Account sworn to Middlesex Feb. 16. 1761 rendered by Walter Pollard for meals furnished men in Capt. Stickney's Company, Col. Ingersol's Regt. 1 meal charged. Dated

Bedford, Oct. 1760.

Aquiler Ferrin signed petition 30 March 1769 dated Newtown expressing dissatisfaction at a recent town meeting. His father

signed same petition.

Aquilla Farren or Ferrin is repeatedly mentioned in the Newton, N. H. Town Records, and his name is on all Province, Parish, Town, State and Continental Rates from 1768 until 1794 inclusive. From 1775 on he is called Lieut. Aquilla. During these years he held various town offices, such as surveyor of highways, selectman, constable, fence viewer and tytheing man, and his name is spelled in various ways in these entries.

The following original receipt in our possession has his signa-

ture;

"Know all men by these presents that I Aquilar farrin of Newtown Do Releas unto Philip Currier and Aaron Currier of sd town the Privilag of their mill standing on my land till August 1789 without any clame from me or my heirs or asines to the privelag in witness whereof I hereunto set my hand this Eleventh day of August 1785."

(Signed) "Aquiller ferrin"

John his + mark Carter — John Currier

In the United States Census of 1790, Aquilla Ferrin is of Newtown, N. H. with one male over 16, four males under 16, and three females. In Exeter, N. H. there is a deed dated 30 Dec. 1793, "Benjamin Morse of Concord deeds to Aquilla Ferrin of Newton, gentleman, 200 acres of land in northerly part of said Concord... whole of farm on which I now live" for sum of 420 pounds lawful money. It is probable that Aquilla removed from Newton, N. H. to Concord about this time. And again at Exeter is a deed 28 Feb. 1795, "Aquilla Ferrin deeds his home farm and land in Newton to Thomas Colby of Newton" (this was his father Jonathan's farm), as also "A pew in Meeting House in Newtown on lower floor, being first Pew on the left hand going in the fore door." His name is entered on the Newtown tax lists for the last time in 1794.

There are many deeds on file between 1795 and 1820 in which Aquilla Ferrin of Concord is a party. The last deed is as follows:

17 March 1820, Aquilla Ferrin of Concord, gentleman, deeds Isaac Farnum Ferrin, yoeman, land in Concord, 120 acres "being all that part of my homestead farm where I now live" also one eight day clock and one half of the wall pew in Concord Meeting House No. 8th, which pew I own in common with Henry Martin, also all the neat stock, horses, sheep and swine, which I now own, also all farming tools and household moveables which I now own, together with buildings on said farm.

(Signed) Aquilla Ferrin.

Aquilla Ferrin died in Concord, N. H., 1825.

> On the Bow, N. H. Town Records is a license dated 21 March 1817 granting to Moses Ferrin the right to keep a public house. He settled in Bow at this time. There is a deed on file in May 1818 calling him Moses Ferrin of Bow, innkeeper, and in Dec. 1818 and Feb. 1819 he is called Moses Ferrin of Bow, gentleman.

> On the Town of Hooksett, N. H. Town Records Moses Ferren is on the 1823 Inventory, given 'Moses Ferren one poll." He died in 1825 and the settlement of his estate is on file at Concord, N. H. His widow Joanna survived him. In 1845 and 1849 there are deeds on file to which Joanna Ferrin is a party. In the United States Census of 1850, Bow, N. H. she was living in family of Daniel Elliot.

There is no record of any children.

8. PHINEHAS FARREN (Jonathan¹), born 27 Aug. 1743 and baptized 2 Oct. 1743. He married Mary Hoyt, daughter of Reuben and Anna Hoyt, who was born 26 Dec. 1743 and died at

Enfield, N. H. 6 Feb. 1827, age 84 years.

Phinehas evidently joined his brothers in Goffstown, N. H., as in 1766 the Town Records speak of "laying out a road beginning at the crotch of a road east of Phinehas Ferrin's." Town Meeting, 1771, Phinehas Ferrin chosen surveyor of bigbways. (Goffstown Records.) His father Jonathan in 1768 bequeathed him 150 acres of land in Goffstown but sometime between 1768 and the Revolution he removed to Weare, N. H.

From New Hampshire State Records, Vol. 14, Rev. Roll, p. 174:

(Capt. Parker's Co. Muster-Roll 1775)

A list of Capt. John Parker's Company mustered sworn and paid their first months wages August second day 1775 — No. 27 is Phinehas Farren, age 32 years Weare, Hillsborough County, husbandman enlisted July 11th.

P. 329 —

Muster roll and pay roll of men raised for Canada out of Collo Daniel Moores Regiment mustered and paid by Moses Kelly Esqr. July 22nd 1776.

Phinehas Fanin — advance wages and bounty 9.18 billeting 5. Total 10.3

The above men under Lieut. Worthley marched to join Capt. Dear-

born's Company.

Aug. 22, 1776. I the subscriber agreeable to appointment of the Council and Assembly have mustered the within named persons soldiers gone in Colo Isaac Wymands Regiment to Canada and paid them the several and respective sums set against their names in this roll they being all good able bodied and effective men.

Moses Kelly, Muster Master.

(Ed. note. Lieut. Worthly was of Weare. The foregoing was a portion of Capt. Dearborn's Co.) NOTE. The above Phinehas Fanin was without doubt FARREN.

Revolutionary Records from the History of Weare, N. H.:

"In June it became necessary to reinforce army in Canada and leg. yoted to sent Regt. of 750 men, each to have bounty of 6 pounds. Isaac

Wyman of Keene was made Colonel, and place of rendezvous was at 'Haverhill on Connecticut River.' Weare furnished 20 men.

Mustered and paid July 22nd. Phinehas Fanin (Farren)

They marched to Canada and joined Capt. Joseph Dearborn's Company. Late in season they spent several months at Fort Ticonderoga."
P. 198-199.

Recruiting for the army was sharp and Weare men enlisted to go to New York, Coos and Canada and Phinehas Ferrin was one. He was 32

years old, enlisted July 11th, 1775.

Lieut. Henry Tuxbury led seventeen to Coos where Aug. 2nd they joined Capt. John Parker's Company in Col. Timothy Bedell's Regiment and then marched across the Green Mountains to Canada. They were at the Siege of St. John at the Sorel, the outlet of Lake Champlain and were present at its surrender. Colonel Bedell with his regiment alone captured Chambley and then they did guard duty at these places, also at La Prairie and the Isle aux Noix.

P. 206.

Capt. Ithamar Eaton and Benjamin Selley hired Phinehas Ferrin to go to the War in 1776 as a substitute for 9 pounds. These men were allowed to deduct this amount from war taxes. Service five months. Men joined together to pay a man.

In the Stone Memorial Building at Weare, N. H. there is a Revolutionary War tablet and amongst the names on same are Phinehas Ferren and Enos Ferren.

For several years after the Revolutionary War Phinehas continued to reside in Weare, N. H. He is often mentioned on the Weare Town Records.

A return of road laid out by us the subscribers viz; beginning at the range way at the east side of Benjamin Tilley's land running westerly to land owned by Jacob Rowell which road runs across the center of lots owned by P. Silley, Thomas Evans and Phinehas Ferrin taking one rod on each side of the center of P. lotts saving one turn into said Ferrin land to escape a ledge of rocks on the west side of a brook and we allow to Thomas Evans the rangeway at the south end of his lot beginning at the west side from fence running easterly thirty 30 and to Benjamin Cilley and Phinehas Ferrin twelve shillings each in full satisfaction for the above-mentioned road dated at Weare May 80, 1777.

In 1779 he was surveyor of highways in Weare, N. H. In 1786 Phinehas Ferrin and family joined the Shakers and removed with them to Enfield, N. H. The following from the Weare History:

P. 313.

The Shakers. Mother Ann Lee and her disciples from Manchester, England landed in this country at New York 6th Aug. 1774. They settled in the woods seven miles from Albany, where is now the village of Watervliet. From here Shakerism spread into several states. A few converts were made in Weare in the summer of 1784. They lived on the western slope of Rattlesnake Hill where no one lives now, and a few more in Henniker in the southeast part of that town on Noyes Hill. . . . Phinehas Ferrin and family joined Shakers, but Henniker would not stand for them so they all moved to the Society in Enfield. Phinehas Ferrin and family went with them.

Friends were drab suits. Men had broad brimmed hats and women plain becoming bonnets. Suspenders were not allowed. One man were tow strings crossed over his shoulders to keep his trousers up. A committee of the brethren labored with him and amongst other reasons urged that he was encouraging the Papacy by having a cross on his back. Friends opposed to umbrellas said it was sinful vanity and defiance of

Providence to intercept the rain.

On page 169 of the History there is a foot-note saying

"Phinehas Ferrin bought part of lot 18 range 6 south slope of Sugar Hill of Adonijah Fellows, lived there until 1786 when he sold to Humphrey Eaton of Scabrook for 270 pounds and having joined the Shakers soon after moved to their settlement in Enfield."

On the Weare Map; -

Phinehas Ferrin, lot 18. Range 6. Deering Road. Site 2. House standing in 1888. Humphrey Eaton second owner. In 1836 saw-mill of B. Frank Cilley.

On the Grafton County Records is a deed dated 24 Feb. 1786, Dudley Kimball deeding to Phinehas Ferrin 100 acres of land in Enfield for 150 pounds. 25 Sept. 1788 Phinehas and Mary Ferrin deed this same land to David Coffin for 200 pounds. One of witnesses to this deed was Reuben Farrin.

United States Census of 1790 - Enfield, N. H. Phinehas Ferrin,

United States Census of 1800 — Enfield, N. H. Phinehas Ferrin, one male and one female under 10; one male and one female

16 to 26; one female 26 to 45; one male over 45.

In 1793 Phinehas Ferrin buys of Cornelius and Nelly Goodall 53½ acres of land in Enfield. Also buys 72 acres in Enfield of William and Lydia Williams. These may represent the homestead as in June, 1801 Phinehas and Mary deed to Reuben Yewrin for \$1800.00 150 acres in Enfield with all buildings and orcharding thereon.

Phinehas Ferrin appears on the Enfield tax list for the last time

in 1802, so he probably died about this time.

Some time after his death his wife Mary joined her daughters Esther and Hannah in the Shaker Community. The daughters had joined many years before. The following sketch was found on the Shaker Records at Enfield, N. H. in 1917, but there are discrepancies if other records are correct:

"MARY FERRIN was born 26 Dec. 1743. Entered the Church from the Second family 7th Sept. 1822. Mary was the Mother of Hannah and Esther. When the Shakers came to Enfield in 1782 the family lived where the North family now stands. The father had passed away. The daughters wanted very much to live with the Shakers but some of their neighbors were officious in preventing it, as the mother did not think it best for the girls to leave home. At one time it was thought that the two girls would not persist in leaving home, as the neighbors were so determined that they should not. Hannah, however, thought different and visited the Believers on Shaker Hill as often as circumstances would permit, and the record says she was one of the first persons in Enfield that accepted the faith. Not long after this Hannah moved to the house of the Believers and Esther went to live with Molly Esterbrooks on George Hill. Subsequently the mother accepted the faith so wisely held by the daughters and moved to the Second Family. Mary Ferrin died 6 Feb. 1827, aged 83 years. 1 mo., 10 days."

Mary Ferrin is buried in the Shaker Cemetery at Enfield, N. H., and a simple stone formerly marked her grave, as follows:

## MARY FERRIN 84 1827

but now the La Salette Fathers of Hartford, Conn. (Roman Catholic) own the Shaker Settlement and have a seminary there, and the Shakers have removed the small stones and plan to erect one large monument containing all the names (1935).

#### From Shaker Records, Enfield, N. H.:

Hannah Ferrin was born July 23, 1770. She entered the Society in March 1793. She was one of the first sisters that accepted the faith of Believers in Enfield. Hannah was the daughter of Mary Ferrin. Hannah was the first person who died after the organization of the Society, and her burial was in the North Cemetery. She died July 21, 1793, aged 22 yrs., 11 mos., and 28 days. Her gravestone was the oldest in the little Shaker Cemetery. It was simply marked:

## HANNA FERRIN

ESTHER, b. 15 Jan. 1773, Weare, N. H., d. 19 Jan. 1845, Enfield, N. H., aged 72. Buried in Shaker Cemetery, Enfield:

#### ESTHER FERRIN 72 1854

From Shaker Records, Enfield, N. H .:

"Eldress Esther Ferrin was born Jan. 15, 1773. Entered the Society March 1793. August 1807 appointed to the Ministry. July 1844 was removed from the Ministry. Eldress Esther was the ninth companion of Mother Hannah Goodrich and lived with her in the Order of Ministry thirteen years. On the death of Mother Hannah she was appointed the Senior Eldress in the Ministry and for twenty-four years faithfully discharged her duty to the two societies. She always manifested a zeal for the increase of all temporal and spiritual interests. Before the Church Family was organized Esther lived with mother and sister in a house where the North family now stands. The father had died some time before the arrival of the Believers.

Esther was 18 years old and her sister two years older. Both girls wanted to live with the Shakers but their mother did not favor it. Finally she said they might have their choice. The busybody neighbors then began to oppose, and teased and coaxed the girls early and late to renounce their faith. The two sisters then contrived to get their hair cut close all over their heads thinking that it might make the neighbors ashamed of them, and that positively they would now be

left to themselves.

In this, however, they were not successful, as the neighbors importuned them no less. By this persistent annoyance they finally succeeded in getting a promise from the older that she would not live with the Shakers. Esther in order to escape from her unpleasant condition went to live with Molly Brooks on George Hill. When the Community was organized on the west side of Mascomo Lake, Esther entered the Church Family.

On the 11th of July, 1807, she was appointed to the order of Ministry with Mother Hannah Goodrich in place of Rhoda Mills. On the decease of Mother Hannah she was appointed the Senior Eldress. Having been enfeebled by paralysis she was removed June 9, 1844 and returned to Enfield the following August. She died Jan. 19, 1845 at the age of 71 years

and 4 mos.

Members composing the Church when gathered:

Mar. 25, 1793 — Esther Ferrin, b. Jan 15, 1773. Feb. 26, 1802 — Ester Ferrin and Sarah Jewett go to Canterbury for a visit and return.

July 11, 1807 — Nathaniel Draper, Betty Andrews, Dolly Sanborn, and Ester Ferrin go to Canterbury. They return the 16th except Ester who returns Aug. 18th.

released succeeded by Ester Ferrin of Enfield.

Sept. 7, 1808 — Br. Edmund, Joshua Goodrich, Lavina Goodrich and Esther Ferrin came here and return the 15th. Aug. 28, 1817 — Benjamin Whitcher, Stephen Adams, Esther Ferrin and Lucy Andrews sent to Canterbury R. Sept. 1st.

Feb. 9, 1820 — Mother Hannah Goodrich deceased and is succeeded by Esther Ferrin who bears the title of Eldress. 1844 — Eldress Esther Ferrin released from the Ministry

July 29th.

1845, Jan. 19th — Eldress Esther Ferrin deceased, aged 72 years."

9. TIMOTHY FERREN (Timothy<sup>2</sup>, Jonathan<sup>1</sup>), born 17 June 1748 (Gaffstown, N. H. Record). He was alive in 1810, Jefferson, Maine. He married 26 Nov. 1772 Abigail Dow in Ponalborough, Maine. (Now Wiscasset and Dresden, Town Record, Bangor Hist. Magazine, Vol. 7.)

In 1771 at Goffstown "Timy Ferren" signs a petition with his father, Uncle Philip, and others, against allowing the Presbyterians

to set up their own Parish.

In the United States Census of 1790 he is in Balltown, Lincoln County, Maine, one male over 16 and one female.

In the United States Census of 1800, Balltown, one male over

45 and one female under 45.

In the United States Census of 1810 he is in Jefferson, Maine, one male over 45, one under 16 and one female over 45 and one under 16.

This would seem to indicate children, but we know nothing

further about them.

10. JONATHAN FERRIN (Timothy<sup>2</sup>, Jonathan<sup>1</sup>), born 15 July 1753, Goffstown, N. H., baptized 5 Aug. 1766, Church of Christ, Hampstead, N. H. and died 30 June 1827, Thornton, N. H. He married 13 Dec. 1781 at Hampstead, N. H. Hannah Ela, born 9 June 1761 and died 31 March 1843 at Thornton, N. H. She was the daughter of Samuel and Mary (Homans) Ela.

Jonathan Ferrin probably spent his youth in Goffstown, as

his father did not remove to Londonderry until 1774.

The Revolutionary War Record of Jonathan Ferrin follows:

From the New Hampshire State Records, Vol. 15, p. 455:

A return of the men that enlisted in the Continental Service for three years or during the war belonging to the eight regiment of Militia in the State of New Hampshire. (List then given.) Underneath the list the following: "Hugh Jameson, Francis Mitchell, Jonathan Ferrin enlisted for nine months with Capt. Frye." (History of Londonderry mentions this also as "from Londonderry.")

Londonderry General Return. An account of money paid by the Town of Londonderry to Soldiers in the Continental Service hired by said Town:

May 7, 1778, Jonathan Ferrin for nine months

Town Bounty 60 (probably pounds).

Jonathan Ferrin applied for pension June 4, 1818 and claimed that he enlisted February or March 1776 at Cambridge, Capt. Shearmans Company, Col. Baldwin's Regiment, Gen. Heath's Brigade. Served until February or March 1777. Discharged Peekskill, N. Y. In battles Long Island, White Plains, and two at Saratoga.\* Caleb Mitchell of Exeter, N. H. made affidavit, July 8, 1818 confirming the above statement and saying that he served with Jonathan Ferrin. (United States Pension Papers.) Further affidavit May 22, 1819. Moses Ferrin of Eaton, N. H. (Moses, Jonathan) makes affidavit June 1, 1819 confirming statement of Jonathan Ferrin.

Hannah Ferrin, wife of Jonathan, made application for pension after his death, and the following is taken from her declaration of

April 14, 1840 in reference to his Revolutionary service:

Jonathan Ferrin inlisted as private in Revolution from Town of Dunbarton year 1776. He was at Bunker Hill Battle, from thence to New York. At this time served 18 mos., returned home and again inlisted May 1777, or first part of summer of said year, served in Col. Cilley's Regt. as she thinks, in the 7 company and 3rd Regt. for the term of 9 mos. having been wounded in the knee and received a furlough for sixty days, which carried his time of service out. In 1776 he enlisted in Col. Alexander Scannel's Regt. or served in it in Capt. Benjamin Stone's Company or in 1777, she does not know which year, but he served in Capt. Stone's Company in one of those years, or both. She is satisfied that her husband served 18 mos. in 1776 and 1777 and 8 or 9 mos. in 1777 or 1778, counting his furlough when wounded. (United States Pension Papers.)

In 1786 he was one of the petitioners, inhabitants of the Town of Londonderry, on a petition to the general court relative to paper

money and also the Masonian Title.

Shortly after the Revolution, Col. Matthew Thornton, who was a resident of Londonderry, went to settle in a place further north which thereafter took his name, Thornton, N. H. We presume many of his townsmen followed him, and in 1790 Jonathan Ferrin appears for the first time on the tax lists of Thornton, N. H. He was not one of the "Original Proprietors."

United States Census of 1790. Thornton, N. H., gives Jonathan Farren: one male over 16, one male under 16, and four females.

On the Thornton Town Records 1791, there is a reference to use of tax for highways. "Mill Brook Road from main road to Mr. Farin's," but we have found no deed until April 11, 1808, when the Matthew Thornton Estate deeds to Jonathan Ferrin Home

<sup>\*</sup> Papers in possession of Dr. Chester M. Ferrin (Micah<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>3</sup>) state that Jonathan served on the Penobscot Expedition.

Lot No. 87 in Thornton. (Grafton County Records.) Oct. 27, 1814 Samuel Holmes quitclaims to Jonathan Ferrin the place "where he now lives, Home Lot No. 87." (Grafton County Records.) He adds to his original farm March 29, 1823, when Tabitha Dustin deeds to him adjoining land containing about 63 acres, Lots No. 88 and No. 89. (Grafton County Records.) May 22, 1824 Samuel Fish deeds to him the south half of Lot No. 56 in Thornton containing 100 acres. (Grafton County Records.) His name appears on the tax lists of Thornton right through to his death. The town records often refer to him. In 1817 he is appointed surveyor of highways.

On the fourth of June, 1818, "Jonathan Ferrin of Thornton" makes application for Pension, and on Sept. 6, 1819 the claim was granted, the Pension to commence June 4, 1818 and the Secretary

of War, J. C. Calhoun, signed the paper.

His will is dated June 9, 1827, and in it he remembers his wife Hannah and all his children. He died June 30, 1827 and is buried

in the town cemetery at Thornton, N. H.

His widow Hannah continued to live in Thornton, N. H., and on Sept. 18, 1838 she made a declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of July 7, 1838. She was 77 at this time and infirm and unable to appear, and declaration was taken at her home. She testified that she was present when her husband Jonathan died and filed papers testifying to her marriage record. Sept. 10, 1839 Jonathan Ferrin, her son, made affidavit. March 17, 1840, affidavit from Secretary of State's Office, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, showing Jonathan Ferrin on the rolls as stated. March 26, 1840, Hannah Ferrin was granted five years pension at the rate of \$40.00 per annum, commencing March 4, 1836. April 14, 1840 additional declaration of Hannah Ferrin, also an affidavit of son Jonathan Ferrin regarding Revolutionary service of his father. He said that he heard his father say that his discharges were burned when his house was burned. On the New Hampshire Pension Roll, 1840, Hannah Ferrin is given as age 79, residing with her son Jonathan. She died March 31, 1843, Thornton, N. H., and is buried with her husband Jonathan, in the town cemetery.

11. MIKE FERRIN (Timothy², Jonathan¹), born 15 June 1758, Goffstown, N. H. Called also Michael and Micah. Micah likely correct as he was probably named after grandfather "Micah" Hoyt, and "Micah" is the spelling carried through the various branches of the family. He probably went into Maine before the Revolution as he is reported from there in the Revolutionary rolls. The following refers to him:

From History of Durham, Maine, by Stackpole:

O'Israel Bagley's Diary 1773-74. March 9, 1774 "Went to split oyrs Michel came. (Hired man who signed himself Mick Farren.)"

From Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution: Feren, Michael, North Yarmouth. List of men raised to serve in the Continental Army from Capt. George Roger's 3d (No. Yarmouth) co., Col. Jonathan Mitchel's (2d Cumberland Co.) regt., dated Dec. 6, 1777; residence No. Yarmouth; engaged for town of No. Yarmouth; joined Capt. Hill's co. Col. Patterson's Regt; term, 3 years.

Farrin, Michael. Receipt given to Lieut. Crispus Graves for wages for

Nov. and Dec. 1775; dated Cambridge, Feb. 20, 1776.

Ferin, Michael, North Yarmouth. Private, Capt. John Worthley's Co. Col. Edmund Phinney's (31st) Regt. Company return (probably Oct.

1775) enlisted May 14, 1775.

Ferren, Michael (Also given Micah) No. Yarmouth. Private, Capt. Jeremiah Hill's Co., Col. Edmund Phinney's Regiment; muster roll dated Garrison at Ft. George, Dec. 8, 1776; enlisted Jan. 1, 1776; reported reenlisted Nov. 23, 1776; Also list of men raised to serve in the Continental Army from Capt. Jonathan Houghton's co. as returned by Capt. Houghton to Col. Whitney at Harvard dated Bolton, Jan. 2, 1778; engaged for Town of Bolton; joined Capt. Hill's co. Col. Vose's regt; term 3 years; reported a stroller; ALSO list of men raised for Continental Service (year not given) residence, No. Yarmouth; engaged for Town of No. Yarmouth; ALSO list of deserters from Col Jos. Vose's (1st Mass.) Regt., dated Camp Highlands, N. Y. July 13, 1780. Age 22 years, stature 5 ft. 8 in; complexion light, hair red, birthplace "Hampshire."

Ferrin, Michael (also given Micah) Private, Capt. John Worthley's co. Col. Edmund Phinney's Regt., billeting allowed from date of enlistment, May 14, 1775 to date of marching to headquarters July 6, 1775; credited with 53 days allowance; Also same co. and regt. order for bounty coat or its equivalent in money dated Fort No. 2 Cambridge, Nov. 2, 1775; Also list of men mustered by Nathaniel Barber, Muster Master for

Suffolk County dated Boston, Feb. 2, 1777, Capt. Jere Hill's Co., Col. John Patterson's Regt.; Also Private, Maj. Cogswell's co. Col. Jos. Voses regt; Continental Army pay accounts for service from Jan. 1, 1777 to June 12, 1779; reported deserted June 12, 1779; Also Capt. Robert Davis' Co. Col Joseph Vose's Regt. muster roll for December, 1777, dated Camp near Valley Forge; enlisted Jan. 1, 1777; Also same co. and regt. muster roll for December 1778, dated Providence; also same co. and regt. pay rolls for Jan. and Feb. 1779; Also late Capt. Dow's co. Col. Vose's regt. muster rolls for March and April, 1779, dated Providence.

From Maine Historical Collections, Vol. 7, Sec. Series:

Col. Edmund Phinney's Regiment of Foot, 1st Regiment raised in County of Cumberland in Revolutionary War. Capt. John Worthley's Company enlisted at No. Yarmouth and but nine of the men were from other towns. Enl. 24 Apr. 1775. Muster Roll of Capt. John Worthley's Company in the 31st Regiment of foot in the Contienetal Army encamped at Cambridge Fort No. Privates—

Michael Ferin, North Yarmouth, Ent. Mar. 14, 1775. (Went to Canada with Arnold.)

Maine Soldiers at Valley Forge.

Michael Ferren, No. Yarmouth - winter of 1777-1778.

12. JOHN FARRIN (Timothy², Jonathan¹), born 1 Aug. 1765, Goffstown, N. H. and baptized 5 Aug. 1766. He married Mary Davis at Methuen, Mass., 31 Jan. 1788. Methuen Records say "John Ferring of Derry and Polly Daverson, intentions Sept. 18, 1787," and "John Finning and Mary Davis married Jan. 31, 1788." He lived in Londonderry, N. H. until 1809, then removed

to Hopkinton, N. H.

On file at Exeter, N. H. are several deeds to and from John Farrin, one dated 1798 showing the purchase of a farm and land in Londonderry, together with grist-mill and saw-mill and all other buildings lying on Beaver Brook, and containing all the upland and meadow that Matthew Thornton bought of Hugh Gregg of New Boston, N. H., also piece of meadow on Beaver Brook. This may have been his home farm. John Farrin removed to Hopkinton, N. H. before 1810, as the United Census of 1810 places him there. On the United States Census 1820, Tinmouth, Vt., there is a John Ferrin, age above 45, one female under 45, and he is probably this same John. No definite record of John's family has been found, so it is possible that the following children may not be correct.

He married at Haverhill, Mass., 1 Feb. 1803 Abigail Noyes, daughter of James and Abigail (Bailey) Noyes, born about 1778 and died 20 Oct. 1873, Warner, N. H. She is buried in Warner, N. H., in the newer cemetery with her son Stephen. James Ferrin died 20 March 1841, Warner, N. H., and is buried in the old cemetery on a stony hillside in Warner, N. H.

He resided at White Mill, Haverhill, Pembroke, Hopkinton,

Bradford and Warner, N. H.

In the United States Census of 1810 James Ferrin of Hopkinton, N. H.: one male under 10, one under 16, two under 26, one over 45, one female under 10, two under 16, three under 26, one under 45.

He settled in Warner before 1821, as the following from History of Salisbury, N. H. would indicate. P. 419, "The Tornado,"

Sept. 9. 1821:

Tornado coming from Lake Champlain took everything in its path. It bore up on the northwest side of Kearsarge Mountain, apparently in two columns. In pitching down over the mountain into the Gore, the two columns merged into one, and came rushing along with renewed force. In this valley between the two spurs of the mountain stood seven dwelling houses. Tornado first struck the barn of Wm. Harwood, and demolished that; passing onward its outer limits came in contact with the houses of M. F. Goodwin, James Ferrin and Abner Watkins. All these houses were damaged. Ferren's barn was destroyed and Watkins unroofed.

The late Stephen N. Ferren (son of James) of Warner said that on a fence were a flock of turkeys more than half grown, about fifteen in number. These were caught up and whirled away, and no trace of any one of

them could ever be found, neither feathers or anything else.

P. 423. Losses in Warner and Salisbury — Names of sufferers from Tornado. James Ferren lost \$194.00. The Shakers sent to the relief of the sufferers.

There are several deeds on file at Concord, N. H. to and from James Farrin, referring to land in Bradford and Warner, N. H.

He died at Warner, N. H. in 1841. His widow Abigail is given in the United States Census of 1850 as of Warner, N. H., and in 1860 she is living at Contoocookville in the family of Leonard Noyes. In the United States Census of 1870 she is back in Warner and she died there 20 Oct. 1873.

MOSES FERREN (Moses<sup>2</sup>, Jonathan<sup>1</sup>), born probably 1749 or 1750 Biddeford, Maine, baptized 3 June 1759 First Congregational Church, Biddeford, Maine and died 15 Jan. 1843, Eaton, N. H. He married (1) 9 Sept. 1777 Mary Dellan of Portsmouth, N. H. at Portsmouth, N. H. He married (2) 8 Sept. 1784 Aseneah Robinson at Newmarket, N. H. He married (3) 25 Feb. 1839 Jane Blazo of Parsonsfield, Maine. They were married by John Buzzell, Pastor of Baptist Society of Parsonsfield. She was born about 1781 and living in 1855 in Parsonsfield, Maine.

He was a resident of Portsmouth, N. H., his name appearing on the tax lists from 1771 until 1804, when he removed to Eaton, N. H. Jan. 9, 1775, Sarah Sloper of Portsmouth, widow, deeds to Moses Ferren of Portsmouth, gunsmith, land 16 rods wide to compleat one half acre of land. (Rockingham County Registry of Deeds.)

March 14, 1776 — Moses Ferren of Portsmouth signed the

Association Test.

He served throughout the Revolution and the following taken from his Pension Papers gives his own statement of service:

\* From Literary Diary of Ezra Stiles, D.D., L.L.D., President of Yale College -"This evening I married Moses Ferren and Mary Dellan." (These were notes collected while he was spending a while in Portsmouth, N. H.)

"Ent. Nov., 1775, N. H. Capt. Caleb Robinson's Company, 2nd N. H. Regiment, to serve 1 year until Nov. 1776 when he again enlisted in said service being then in State New York, in Company commanded by Capt. Samuel Cherry of Regiment aforesaid to serve during the war; that he continued to serve until the 7th day of June 1783, when he was discharged from service in Newburgh, State of New York; that he was in battles of Hubbardston, on the retreat from Ticonderoga and of Stillwater in 1777, of Monmouth in 1778, of Newtown in 1779, and capture of Cornwallis in 1781." (This statement made under date April 29, 1818, age 62, resident Eaton, N. H.)

On another paper he states that he enlisted under Captain Sherman, Colonel Baldwin's Regiment, Massachusetts Line, in 1775 for one year, but before the time expired re-enlisted for the duration of the war and served under Captain Robinson, Captain Cherry, and Captain Rowell in different regiments and was honorably discharged at close of war. He was at the Retreat from Ticonderoga, at the capture of General Burgoyne and with General Sullivan in the Indian Country; he was in the Battle of Monmouth and the capture of Cornwallis.

On Pension Papers of Jonathan Ferrin (Timothy, Jonathan) of Thornton there is an affidavit of Moses Ferren of Eaton saying that he (Moses) was a private 1776 in Captain Sherman's Company, Col. Loammi Baldwin's Regiment with Jonathan Ferrin of Thorn-

ton (dated June 1, 1819).

There is an affidavit on file in the Secretary of State Office, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, dated March 17, 1840, saying that Moses Ferren was on Military Rolls as stated.

The Eaton, N. H. tax lists from 1805 to 1833 give Moses Ferrin, and his name appears often on the town records, in 1815 as tytheing man and in 1816 as field driver and fence viewer.

From "Revolutionary Pensions, New Hampshire Pension Roll, Strafford County" — Moses Ferron, Private, N. H. Cont. Line,

then age 68 (no date given).

29 April 1818, Moses Ferren declared on his Pension Paper that he had never received his Bounty lands and was desirous of knowing how he could obtain them. (United States Pension Papers.)

29 April 1818, he makes statement that he is a laborer and unable to work owing to age and infirmity, and that his family consists of wife age 53 years, out of health, unable to labor; son Norris, age 17 years, daughter, age 15 years, both healthy.

After his marriage in 1839 to Jane Blazo of Parsonsfield, he evidently went there to live. 23 July 1839 he asks for a transfer of his pension money from Portsmouth, N. H. to Portland, Maine. The New Hampshire Pension Roll of 1840 mentions "Moses Ferrin of Eaton, N. H., age 80, residing with Samuel Ferrin."

He died 15 Jan. 1843 at Eaton, N. H., his family at that time

being in Parsonsfield, Maine.

10 August 1853, Jane Ferren petitions for the benefit of the Act of Congress passed 3 Feb. 1853 claiming she was still a widow

and living in Parsonsfield, Maine.

19 Sept. 1855, Jane Ferren, age 79, of Parsonsfield, widow of Moses Ferren, Revolutionary soldier, applies for bounty land under Act of Congress 3 March 1855.

On United States Pension Papers he states that he enlisted last of Dec. 1775 into the Continental Army for a term of twelve months under Captain Bliss in Colonel Patterson's Regiment which was stationed at Cambridge until the British Army evacuated Boston in the month of March 1776, and that he marched from thence with said company and regiment to New York, from thence to Albany, and from thence into Canada, and that on the retreat back from Canada, he was taken prisoner but was in a few days released and again arrived at Albany; from thence he was marched to Newtown in Pennsylvania and was about the middle of Feb. 1777, finally discharged at a place called Morristown, he having served six weeks longer than his first enlistment at the request of the officers; that the said Patterson's Regiment was one of the Massachusetts' and that he received no written discharge, none being at that time given that he heard of.

10 Aug. 1818, Dominicus Smith of Biddeford swears to the truth of Jonathan Ferrin's War Record and testifies that he had served with him and known him as a neighbor since that time.

18 Aug. 1818, Hezekiah Kimbal of Arundel testified to the truth of Jonathan Ferren's statement, saying that he was well acquainted with him and had served with him and had lived by him as a near neighbor most of the time since the War.

Jonathan Ferren left Biddeford, Maine and went to Kennebunk, Maine soon after the Revolution. In 1810 and 1820, according to the United States Census, he was living in Arundel, Maine.

The following from the Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution, probably refers to same man, but it does not agree with his own statements on application for pension.

Baldwin's Regt. pay abstract for June 1776, dated Camp at New York; also Capt. Caleb Robinson's Company Col. Baldwin's (26th) Regt.; muster and pay roll for the year 1776; also SERGEANT Capt. Nathaniel Cousen's Co. (Late) Maj. Littlefield's detachment of York Co. Militia;

18. ENOS FERRIN (Zebulon<sup>2</sup>, Jonathan<sup>1</sup>), born 3 March 1749, probably South Hampton, N. H. He was baptized 16 July 1749 in the Amesbury Second Church now in Merrimac, Mass. He married (1) Mary Currier, probably in Newtown, N. H. He married (2) in Alexandria, N. H., Judith Corliss Cross, widow of David Cross. They were both of Alexandria, N. H., and were married in October 1788 by Mr. Whipple "Pasture of a Church in Alexandria." He died in East Hebron, N. H. 3 March 1811.

In 1768 in the will of his grandfather, Jonathan Farren, he is bequeathed one-half of three-quarters of forty acres of land in Sandown, N. H., but we have found no record of its disposition. He appears on the Newtown, N. H. tax lists in 1770 and through 1774. The birth of his first child is recorded on Newtown Town Records 19 Nov. 1773.

18 May 1774. "Enos Ferren of Newtown, yoeman, buys of Jacob Tuxbury of Weare, N. H., 60 acres of land in said Weare for the sum of forty one pounds eight shillings." This land was in lot No. 41, range No. 1, and on the map of Weare, N. H. can be seen the old cellar hole. It was in the southwest part of the town near the Francestown line.

\* This marriage was Betsey Ferrin of Alton, so probably this Betsey.

† This may have been Mary Currier, daughter of Aaron and Electa Wells Currier, baptized 28 July 1757. In her father's will made 26 Dec. 1787 she is called Mary Ferrin.

Wells Currier was born 6 April 1757.

Weare, N. H. was originally called Halestown. It was incorporated as Weare 21 Sept. 1769, and named after Meshech Weare, one of the town proprietors and afterwards the first Governor of New Hampshire. However, in many legal papers, Halestown was the name used until long after the Revolution. About the middle of the eighteenth century the country about Weare was opening up quite rapidly. From 1765 on several families from Newtown, N. H. came here to settle. Enos Ferrin was one of these and may have been influenced by his Uncle Phineas who settled in Weare about this time. Ferrin Brook and Ferrin Pond in Weare take their name from Enos Ferrin, who settled near them.

The following from History of Weare, N. H. by William Little,

published in 1888:

P. 8. Ferrin Brook. Enos Ferrin, whose house was near it gave it its name. It flows from Ferrin Pond through the southwest part of Weare, turns the wheel of one saw-mill, is four miles long, and empties into Middle

Branch. It has five affluents.

P. 13. Ferrin Pond in the west part of the town, Mt. Misery to the east of it, Boar's Head to the northwest of it, contains about forty acres and its outlet is Ferrin Brook. It has hard rocky shores and evidently a glacier dug pond. An immense boulder stands at its head. Pickerel and hornpout abound in its waters, and woods and rocky pastures are on its banks. Enos Ferrin, who settled near it, bestowed his name upon pond and brook.

In August 1916 Ferrin Pond in South Weare was visited, also the cellar hole of the Enos Ferrin house nearby. The original bricks, probably made by Enos, were still there. Enos Ferrin was the first owner, Moses Eastman next, and Eben Bartlett the owner at time history was written. The pond was a lovely sheet of water with thickly wooded shores.

In the genealogy of Weare families Enos Ferrin is given as living near Ferrin Pond. No record of family excepting two daughters, Olive, who married Samuel Jones, and Polly, who married

Moses Currier.\*

There is a tablet in the Stone Memorial Building in Weare erected to the memory of Weare men who served in the Revolution. The names of Enos Ferren and his uncle Phineas Ferren are inscribed thereon. No official record of his service has been found, but the following is from the Town History of Weare. From footnote, p. 195.

"He was one of twelve men that Weare sent to Cambridge in 1775 for six weeks:

Nathaniel Weed John Mudget Enos Ferren Mark Flood Jeremiah Page Samuel Ayer

Jonathan Hadlock Joseph Hadlock Lieut. Ebenezer Bailey William Quinby Ebenezer Sargent James Brown"

"He was one of eight men that Weare sent to Cambridge for six weeks in 1776:

7 April 1777 a committee voted that "those who had paid out anything for the year should bring in their bills to this Committee who shall find out how much each should be allowed." Enos Ferren was allowed 1:7 for his services in 1775 and allowed —— dollars per month for his services in 1776. The *History of Weare* states that Weare men for the most part only saw camp service at Cambridge.

Enos Ferren of Weare signed the Association Test 1776.

There is no mention of Enos on the Weare Town Records, but he remained here about five years and in Oct. 1779 sold his land to Moses Eastman.

Tradition says Enos removed to Chester, N. H. for a couple of years. This may mean "New Chester" which was the old name for Bristol, as some descendants relate that Enos walked from "Chester to Alexandria" searching for a place to build a house. He found a site on the hill road between Bristol and Alexandria, now known as the Atwood farm, and built a log house for himself and family. It was the only house on this road. Mary, his first wife, died and was buried here, the first person buried in Alexandria. Her remains were afterwards removed to the Blake Fowler Place. Enos next moved to a part log house opposite the Henry Bailey place.

When Enos came first he had in his hand a willow cane cut by himself. He put it in the ground just below the old Aaron Sleeper place on the right side going from Alexandria to Bristol. It grew to be a large tree standing until recent times.

10 July 1781 Enos Ferrin buys of Jonas Minot of Alexandria, N. H. one third part of the lot of land in Alexandria numbered 26 in the first division of lots.

Enos Ferrin and others sign the following petition dated Alexandria, N. H. 10 June 1782 setting forth their conditions and asking that they may be incorporated:

New Hampshire Records, Vol. 11 — P. 14.

(Remonstrance of the Inhabitants of Alexandria against building a Road, and Petition to be Incorporated.)

To the Honorable Council and House of Representatives for The State of New Hampshire in general assembly convened at Concord June ye 1782.

The Petition of the inhabitants of the Township of Alexandria Humbly Sheweth that whereas the Inhabitants of Cockermouth have Petitioned the Honorable Council and House of Representatives for the State of New Hampshire Praying that the town of Alexandria may be compelled to make them a good waggon road through said town which is about seven

miles, with only four settlers on said Road - we the Inhabitants of said Alexandria beg leave to say that it will be a Burthen Insupportable in our Present Infant State of which we beg leave to offer a few things to your Honours consideration which are Real facts, first — That Cockermouth have never requested us to make or mend said Roads — That there is no more than forty inhabitants Freeholders in Alexandria - That we have above forty miles of Roads in said Alexandria - That said Roads are very uneaven rocky and wet - Several Large Streams to Bridge have already built three Bridges over Smiths River more are needed over same - That there must be two over the branches of Fowlers River one of which we suppose will cost at least One Hundred Hard Dollars the stream not being fordable at many Seasons of the year — That our settlers are much scattered it being about Fourteen miles from one Extream to the other — that we are not Incorporated therefore cannot lay out any Roads at present. - That our Settlers in general are in low Circumstances a great part has been obliged to buy great part of their Provisions Hay &c from the Neighboring Towns that has Run them Considerably in Debt so that they have not for four years past been able to pay their taxes otherwise than by Hireing money for which they are now in Debt, and by no means able to pay - We the Petitioners therefore Humbly pray that your Honors will take the matter into Consideration and grant us an Incorporation by the name of Alexandria. Beginning at A Maple in Masons Patent Line about forty rods from Newfound Pond thence over part of said Pond South Twelve Degrees East Five Miles and an half more or less to the place where a Hemlock Tree formerly stood and Marked for the Easterly Corner Bounds of Alexandria, from thence south fifty three degrees west Eight and half miles more or less to A Beach Tree Marked - From Thence North twelve degrees west four and half miles more or less to the Pattent Line aforementioned, from Thence easterly on said Line to the Place first Mentioned, which Transcript is agreeable to Charter — and that as soon as we are Incorporated the Select Men or a Committee from Alexandria may be ordered to Lay out all Necessary Highways, or roads to Cockermouth in order to make the same Passable as soon as may be, and that the cost may be assessed on Residents and Non Residents as State Continental and war Taxes are that your Petitioners be not distressed till such order can be obtained and your Petitioners as in Duty bound shall ever pray &c.

(In answer to the foregoing petition, an act was passed, Nov. 23, 1782, incorporating the town, and authorizing the selectmen to lay out and make the said road, and assess a tax upon all the land in town to pay for the same.)

20 Oct. 1784 Enos Ferrin buys of John McMurphy a certain tract of land lying in Alexandria, being part of lot No. 25 in the

first division of lots of said town, to contain 50 acres,

14 Aug. 1787 Enos Ferrin buys of Jonathan Hoyt, Constable, one common or undivided right in said Cardigan, originally belonging to Silas Bowin by estimation 132 acres. Enos Ferrin was the highest bidder for the same at public vendue duly notified and held the 14th day of August at the dwelling house in said Cardigan of Jonathan Hoyt, Constable, the place appointed for the sale of such non-resident proprietors lands as are delinquent in paying the taxes assessed thereon and cost of sale.

In 1788 Enos Ferrin married Judith Corliss Cross, widow of David Cross, who had five children. The Ferrin and Cross children were about the same ages and were brought up in the same

household.

United States Census 1790 — Enos Ferrin, Alexandria, N. H.,

two males over 16, three under 16, and four females.

The early town records of Alexandria were burned, but from 1792 through 1798 Enos Ferrin's name appears. In 1792 and 1793 he was surveyor of highways. In 1795 fence viewer. In 1798 he was chosen petit juror. In 1798 it was "voted to build a pound near Mr. Enos Farran's."

18 Dec. 1794 License was granted by the Town to Enos Ferrin

to keep a tavern and again in 1796 as follows:

"We the subscribers do approve of and have licensed Mr. Enos Farren of said town to keep a house of entertainment and tavern house with the accommodation suitable for travlers and towns people so that men and beast may be refreshed with their making a reasonable compensation to him for his trouble and we expecting you to be suitably qualified and provided for the exercise for such an employment and firmly attached to the constitution and law of this state requires tavern-keepers to be this license for one year from this date.

24 Dec. 1794 Enos Ferren and others sign the following petition for a division of the town. The division was granted and Danbury was set off and incorporated as a town 18 June 1795.

# PETITION FOR A DIVISION OF THE TOWN State of New Hampshire.

To the Honbl the Senate and House of Representatives for said State

Convened at Concord Dec. 24th 1794, Humbly Shew

The Subscribers Inhabitants of the Town of Alexandria that they labour under many Inconveniences by reason of the disagreeable form or manner in which said Town lies also by reason of a large mountain that crosses said Town about midway on the length thereof — Said Town is nine miles in length and about Six miles in breadth which makes it large enough for two Towns, and the mountain in the middle of said Town renders it almost impossible for the Inhabitants of the South part and those of the North part to assemble on any occasion whatever without travelling a great length of way to get by said Mountain. They therefore pray that your Honours would take their case under your wise consideration and grant them relief by making a division of said Town at or near the middle thereof which your Petitioners conceive would be of public utility as well as greatly contribute to relieve the embarrassments of your Petitioners, and as bound shall pray

He lived in Alexandria, N. H. until 4 July 1798 when he swapped farms with William Crawford in Hebron, N. H. On the Grafton County Registry of Deeds 4 July 1798 Enos Ferrin deeds to William Crawford his 50 acres in lot No. 25 in Alexandria and also his 132 acres in Orange (Cardigan). On the same date William Crawford of Hebron deeds to Enos Ferrin 276 acres in Hebron. William Crawford reserved an orchard on this farm until his death. A Mrs. Kelly living in 1916 at Crawford's Corner, Alexandria, grand-daughter of William Crawford, said she remembered her Uncle James saying that his father had swapped a farm with someone so that he might come to Alexandria. The following from diary of her Uncle James Crawford: "William Crawford who was my father settled in year 1782 in that part of Plymouth which is now

Hebron. He was married in 1786 to Susan Melvin, lived there

until 1798, at that time moved to Alexandria."

The 276 acres in Hebron comprised a great section of land in the vicinity of Newfound Lake at what is now known as McClure's Corner, East Hebron, N. H. When Enos Ferrin moved here, his household goods were transported by raft on Newfound Lake. Life must have been very primitive in this part of the country at that time, and the Indians and bears could not have been very far away. The exchange of farms was not agreeable to the children and it is told that the boy Zebulon (then fourteen years) said most emphatically that it was "mighty poor business to swap a farm without rocks for a farm with rocks." The original Enos Ferrin house was on the right side of road about three or four minutes walk up the hill from the present McClure homestead. The cellar hole with black birch growing out of it can still be seen just above the fork in the road. After a while the family built a new house across the road and moved into it. The old house, a one story building, was then used as a carriage and tool house.

Later the Enos Ferrin farm came into the possession of Ralph Burns. He sold it to Caroline W. Kelly and she rented it to Mr. McClure, father of J. T. McClure, the present owner, and after-

wards sold it to him.

From 1799 until his death the name of Enos Ferrin appears on the *Hebron Town Records*. In May 1799 — "Deacon Enos Ferrin's mark for cattle — two round holes punched through the near ear." He is thereafter referred to as "Deacon Enos."

In Nov. 1795 Hebron voted to form a society and build a meeting house on Eben Bartlett's land, and it is presumed that the present meeting house, well over 100 years old, is the church where

Enos Ferrin held office as deacon.

In May 1799, Hebron Town Meeting was held at school house

No. 1 and Deacon Enos Ferrin was chosen moderator.

The following taken from Hebron Town Records refers to laying out of road:

11 Nov. 1799. Hebron Town Records. Laid out by us the subscribers an open road beginning at a stake and stones on the east side of the road leading from Deacon Ferrin's dwelling place to Bridgewater thence easterly on the line between said Deacon Ferrin and his son Aaron Ferrin about one hundred rods to a stake and stones at the corner of said Aaron Ferrin's land — thence continuing easterly as marked trees direct being marked X on the south side of said road until it comes to land of Ebenezer Ferrin thence still easterly as marks direct through said Ebenezer Ferrin's land to land of Ebenezer Emerson thence continuing eastwardly to land of Moses Emerson, thence nearly an east point through said Moses Emerson's land to Plymouth line, this road to be two rods and half wide.

Also at the same time we laid out an open road beginning at the above said road on the line between said Eben Ferrin and said Ebenezer Emerson at a stake and stones the north side of said road thence northward by each owner bearing equal share of said road as far as the land will allow till it comes to the range line. Thence following said range line as far as the

land will allow and be convenient for a road, thence leaving said range line and crossing this land of Robert Crawford to Blodgett's land thence northerly through said Blodgett's land land of Livermore and any other land to Plymouth line, near Samuel Abbott's this road also to be two rods and half wide. The above two roads were laid out Nov. 11, 1799.

In 1800 Capt. Samuel Hazelton chosen collector of taxes and Nathaniel Ball and Deacon Enos Ferrin were accepted as bondsmen. In 1801 we find "To see if the town will throw up or make void the ancient road from Plymouth Line by Deacon Ferrin's old house to Bridgewater." A month later it was voted that the old road be thrown up and made void. In 1808, "To see if the town will throw up a piece of road from Enos Ferrin's to northeasterly corner of his land and lay out another from the turnpike on the said Ferrin's land to where Isaac Jewett formerly lived." In the same year, "To consider the propriety of throwing up the road through Enos Ferrin's farm to Wm. Ladd's and lay out another road from the turnpike on and near said Ferrin's north line to said Ladd's."

On the Grafton County Register of Deeds we find 28 Oct. 1799, Enos Ferrin deeds to his son Aaron Ferrin, 80 acres of land in

Hebron. Another son Ebenezer was one of witnesses.

28 Aug. 1802. Enos Ferrin deeds to his son Ebenezer Ferrin a

tract of land in Hebron. (No acres given.)

14 March 1805. Enos Ferrin and wife Judith deed to Enos Ferrin, Jr. 120 acres of land in Hebron. These three farms were adjoining.

11 March 1809. Enos Ferrin buys of Daniel Pike two acres of

land in Hebron.

The tax lists of the town of Hebron carry the name of Enos Ferrin from 1799 until 1810 inclusive and then his widow appears until 1816.

We have found no official record of the death of Deacon Enos, but in the settlement of a "Ladd" estate in 1916 a crude paper book was found amongst the old papers in an attic. The first page reads:

"Deacon Enos Ferin Desed March the 3 1811 he lived to see the statly stepings of our Lord and savour Jesus Christ he would often shought and sing hosanna to our hevenly king

He lived sixty and two years."

The late Mr. McClure of East Hebron, N. H. found the grave of Enos Ferrin with a common field stone marking it. It is on his property, but permission was granted to clean up the grave and surrounding plots, and in 1916 the writer erected a bronze tablet

to the memory of Enos Ferrin, his great-grandfather. The tablet reads:

## Here lies buried DEACON ENOS FERRIN 1749-1811

A soldier of the American Revolution

Erected by Frank M. Ferrin, 1916

The grave was probably in a family cemetery on his farm. At the time of his death an old brush road ran past it, but it has been abandoned since then, and now it stands slightly back from

the road on the McClure farm.

Widow Judith Corliss Cross Ferrin evidently stayed on the Hebron farm until 1816 and afterwards lived with her son Jonathan and daughter Sarah. She died in 1839, age 84 years, at the Sylvester Cross place on the River Road, Bridgewater, N. H. and was buried there. Afterwards her remains were taken to the Town Cemetery at Bridgewater, N. H., evidently a Cross family lot. There are three small stones marking lot, Judith Ferrin, Susan Cross, Abigail Cross.

Abijah Cross, her husband (Simeon, Deacon William, William, John of Methuen) was b. 14 March 1790, probably on Cross farm on the River Road in Bridgewater about three miles above the New Hampton bridge. Abijah Cross is buried in the Bridgewater Cemetery, Bridgewater, N. H.

26 Feb. 1778 he signed a petition, as an inhabitant of Goffstown, together with his Uncle Philip and others "for a lottery to build bridges over Piscataquog River, 1778."

16 April 1781 at Goffstown, he professed to be of the Presby-

terian Profession.

18 March 1783 he buys of Robert Foresith one hundred acres of land in township of New Chester. He settled in New Chester, appearing on tax lists from 1785 until his death, then in 1792 "Widow Jane" appears.

3 Sept. 1787, Ebenezer Ferrin was one of inhabitants of New Chester and Alexandria asking for incorporation of Town of Bridgewater. In 1788 the petition was granted and Town of Bridgewater

was incorporated.

On the United States Census of 1790 Ebenezer Ferrin, New Chester, N. H., one male over 16, three males under 16, three females.

In the month of May of 1780 I together with Silas Dewey and Ethan Barker, enlisted at said Suffield under and order issued to said Capt. Nathaniel Pomeroy to furnish three men for the Continental Service, I enlisted for six months in what was then called the 'Short Levy.' We went to Hartford with the said Capt. Pomeroy to the Recruiting office where we passed Muster and joined a Company. From thence we marched through the Towns of Farmington, Danbury, and other Towns and not recollected by this Declarant to Nelson Point in the State of New York nearly opposite West Point. The Company while marching from said Hartford to Nelsons Point was commanded by a Continental officer whose name this Deponent hath forgotten. When the Company arrived at Nelsons Point I joined a Company called Col. Starrs company commanded by Lieutenant Tiffany in the Regiment commanded by Col. Starr, and served in said Company and Regiment six months. During that time we marched to a place called Kings Ferry where we crossed the Hudson River, from thence to Orange Town in New Jersey. From Orange town we marched to a place called 'Soldiers Fortune,' I think in the Highlands, so called of New York where I was Honorably discharged. I was present at the execution of Major Andre. I with 3 or 4 others received a discharge on one peice of paper which I am now unable to find nor do I recollect by what officer it was signed. I was discharged on the month of November of the same year. I served in all the term of 7 months. I hereby relinquish every claim to a pension or annuity and declare that my name is not on the pension Roll of the agency of any State." Sworn to and Subscribed

He was honorably discharged and returned to Suffield, Conn., where he remained a few more years. It is just possible that he came to Connecticut because of his father having settled in East Haven, or he may have come with his father, a boy of six or more years at the time. He went from Suffield, Conn., to Newport, N. H., and married there in 1785. His children were born in Newport, N. H. The United States Census of 1790, Newport, N. H., gives: Zebulon Ferring, one male over 16, two under 16, and one female.

The family moved to Croyden, N. H. about 1800. Tradition says that about 1818 he disappeared from this part of the country.

In his pension papers (6 Feb. 1834), he is given as living in Smithfield, R. I., and had been for several years, according to depositions, and as having lived in Newport, N. H., Suffield, Conn., and Smithfield, R. I., since the Revolution. He died in Rock Island, Ill., in 1835. His widow, Chloe, evidently lived with son Nathan, as United States Census 1850, Goshen, N. H., gives Chloe, 79, born in Rhode Island, living with Nathan C. Ferrin.

William Ferren evidently lived and died in Sandown, N. H. On 14 March 1776 he signed the Association Test from Sandown.

4 June 1776 his was one of the names signed to a petition, dated Sandown, N. H., relative to the election of a representative.

On the Sandown, N. H. Town Records 2 April 1778, William Ferrin was one of the names on Town Clerk's list "to regulate the expense of the war within said parish from Concord fight to present time." And in the same year he was chosen surveyor of highways, and again in 1785.

In 1785 William Ferren was one of the names signed to a petition relative to militia affairs, addressed to the General Assembly, and on June 1, 1786 his name again appears in another petition rela-

tive to paper currency.

On the Sandown Inventories of 1815, 1816, 1817, 1818, 1819, 1820, 1821, 1822, 1823, 1824, 1825, the name of William Ferren appears each year. It does not appear after 1825, so he likely died about this time. In 1830 his widow "Mary" appears on the inventory.

We have not been able to verify this and have found no further record of Aaron Ferren in this section.

We found a grave in Wright Mountain Cemetery, Bradford, Vt., of Aaron Ferren, husband of Ruth, who died June 27, 1805, aged 38. As the name Aaron comes from the Currier family (Anne Currier, wife of Philip Ferren (Jonathan)), could this be the Aaron

of Goffstown? There are some discrepancies in dates handed down by tradition, but in the absence of further data, we will presume that he is the Aaron of Goffstown.

If he is, he married (2) 7 Dec. 1797 Ruthy Rogers, daughter of Lieut. Josiah and Hannah Woodman Rogers of Newbury, at

Towards the last of his life the children would rent the farm by the year to someone who would take care of their father.

Born in Thornton, N. H. he lived half of his life there. He removed to Plymouth about 1848. His name appears on Thornton,

N. H. tax lists when he comes of age.

Jonathan Ferrin was partially disabled by lameness, but by industry he was a successful farmer and always a good citizen. He lived on the Thompson farm, South Plymouth, on the Glover farm and on the William Sawyer farm, which he bought of Horace Perkins.

On a list of "Line Officers of Plymouth Company of 14th Regiment from 1816 to 1851." In 1840, CAPT. JONATHAN FERRIN.

One of the most interesting incidents in his life happened when he was nine years old. His father, Jonathan (1753-1827), lived at Millbrook, Thornton, a carpenter by trade. One Monday morning he started for the nearby town of Campton to work on some buildings, taking his nine-year-old son, Jonathan, with him, so that the boy might take the horse home before going to school. The father thought by heading the horse home there would be no question of the young Jonathan's return. But it just happened that this particular horse had been previously hauling logs through Franconia Notch and over Profile Lake. Instead of taking the boy home, the horse made for the Notch and went right into the present Profile Lake, swimming across. Little Jonathan stayed courageously on his back and was taken in by a family who lived across the lake; they fed him, dried him and kept him overnight. Next morning he was taken home to Thornton, nearby. This was in the spring of the year. After that time this body of water was called "Ferrin's Pond." Historical Relics of the White Mountains, by John H. Spaulding, published by Nathaniel Noyes, Cornhill, Boston, in 1855, gives as one of the attractions, "Ferrin's Pond." It became known as Profile Lake probably about the middle of the century, as in 1859 Starr King calls it "Profile Lake."

Aaron Ferrin's name appears on Hebron tax lists for 1795 and 1796, owning land there at an earlier date than his father. It appears again in 1799. In the meantime he had married (1798) a Maine woman and may have been away from Hebron for a couple of years. In the United States Census of 1850 his son Bradden is given, born in Maine 1 Nov. 1799. On the other hand, at the Concord State Capitol Bradden's birth record says he was born in New Hampshire.

26 Oct. 1799, Enos Ferrin deeds to Aaron Ferrin eighty acres in Hebron. This was probably part of the farm of Enos and likely where Aaron settled after his marriage. He is on Hebron tax lists until 1806 inclusive and is mentioned in the town records

27 March 1840, Joshua L. and Abigail E. Weare deed to Aaron Ferrin land in Bridgewater, seventy acres, on shores of Newfound

8 Feb. 1841, Aaron and Phoebe Ferrin deed to their son Lewis B. Ferrin the Bridgewater farm on Newfound Lake bought in 1840.

The site of above farm was very beautiful, and in 1916 an old house "Bella Vista" marked the spot on the shore of the lake. Since then it has been torn down and a very fine residence marks this site.

Lewis B. Ferrin married in Feb. 1841, so we presume his father Aaron deeded farm to him then, and he and Phoebe his wife spent the remainder of their days in the home of Lewis B. on Newfound Lake. In the United States Census of 1850, Bridgewater, N. H., family of Lewis B., Aaron D. 75, Phoebe 73.†

28 Aug. 1802, Enos Ferrin deeds to Ebenezer Ferrin land in Hebron, near his brother Aaron. This was evidently on the East Hebron shore of Newfound Lake and likely part of his father's farm. But Ebenezer owned land in 1799, as he appears on Hebron tax lists from 1799 through 1809. He is not on in 1810 and 1811, but reappears in 1812 through 1815.

10 April 1809, Sam and May Emerson deed to Ebenezer Ferrin the

David Phelps farm in Orange, N. H.

11 March 1811, Ebenezer Ferrin deeds to Stephen Goodhue this same land.

24 Sept. 1810, Daniel Smith deeds to Ebenezer Ferrin 100 acres in Bridgewater, N. H.

As these last deeds show, Ebenezer Ferrin moved to Orange, N. H. for a couple of years. United States Census 1810, Orange, N. H., gives Ebenezer Ferrin, three males under 10, one under 16, one over 45; three females under 10, one under 26, one under 45.

On the Bridgewater, N. H. tax lists for 1811 and 1812 he is taxed as "non-resident." 18 Feb. 1812, tax collector's notice of sale of land for taxes: "Ebenezer Ferrin, lot 61, 100 acres sold to Robert Craig for \$6.62." Ebenezer Ferrin deeds this same land 23 April 1812 to Jesse Smith.

Ebenezer left Hebron, N. H. about this time. The family tradition says he and his family left in the fall of 1815 and started for Western New York by ox-cart. He first settled in Sardinia, which is near Concord, N. Y.

Enos Ferrin's name appears on Hebron, N. H. tax lists in 1803 through 1816. The remaining tax lists were missing, but it is known that Enos Ferrin, Jr. was a resident of Hebron all his lifetime. On the 1815 tax list he is given as *Lieut*. Enos Ferrin and on

the 1816 tax list as Capt. Enos Ferrin.

The first farm in his possession was 14 March 1805, when Enos Ferrin and wife Judith deed to Enos Ferrin, Jr. land in East Hebron, 130 acres. This was probably set off from his father's farm on the East Hebron shore of Newfound Lake, and bordered the farms of his brothers Aaron and Ebenezer. There are many deeds on record to and from Enos Ferrin, all land in Hebron, N. H.

From Hebron Town Records:

1807, Enos Ferrin, collector of taxes, surveyor of highways. Drawn as petty juror, but he declined to serve and asked to be dismissed. Town granted request.

Enos Ferrin lived on the shores of Newfound Lake in East Hebron for many years, then moved to Hebron Village where he spent the remainder of his life. His home, known to old settlers in 1916 as "Enos Ferrin house," was then owned by Woodbury.

Enos Ferrin was known as Capt. Enos Ferrin and "Capt. Enos Ferrin" is on his gravestone. He was on the Governor's staff for one year. On the Lincoln, N. H. Town Records at a town meeting 10 March 1846, Enos Ferrin received seven votes for counsellor. At a town meeting 9 March 1847, Enos Ferrin received thirteen votes for counsellor.

68, deputy sheriff, wife Lucy, age 67.

Zebulon Ferrin was on Hebron tax lists in 1804 and on through 1816. No further Hebron tax lists were found, but he remained in Hebron until 1831, when he removed to Plymouth, returning to Hebron some years later and spending the remainder of his life there. He was a carpenter and farmer by trade. The farm in East Hebron, N. H. known as the Zebulon Ferrin farm is on top of the hill leading up from McClure's Corner, East Hebron, past the farm of his father Enos. In 1918 the Zebulon Ferrin house was standing.

61. SAMUEL FERRIN (Enos<sup>3</sup>, Zebulon<sup>2</sup>, Jonathan<sup>1</sup>), born<sup>4</sup> 21 April 1785, at Alexandria, N. H., and died 14 May 1867 at Charlestown, Mass. He married 9 July 1809 in Charlestown Lydia Raymond. The intentions were published 11 June 1809 and they were married by Rev. William Collier. She was the daughter of Daniel and Naomi (Leighton) Raymond, born 5 June 1789, and died at Charlestown, Mass. 9 Oct. 1890.

Samuel Ferrin settled in Charlestown when a young man. His name appears on the Middlesex County Registry of Deeds commencing in 1812 and through and including 1856. There are numerous deeds with Samuel Ferrin as grantor and grantee. He was a manufacturer of bricks and in these deeds is referred to as "Samuel

Ferrin, brick-maker."

The following is from Old Charlestown, by Timothy F. Sawyer, published in Boston in 1902, from the chapter, "Fine Old Estates":

"On the lower part of this ridge as it dropped off towards Bunker Hill Street (that part of it which formerly bore the name of Morton Street from the Turnpike to Tufts Street where Bunker Hill Street used to begin) were several dwelling houses, a brewery and a rope walk; and on the other side of the street the brick yard of Samuel Ferrin, a highly respected citizen, whose widow is still residing in the old homestead on the corner of Ferrin and Jackson Streets, nearly one hundred years of age." (As Lydia Ferrin died in 1890, this of course was written before that date.)

Ferrin Street, Charlestown, was named for Samuel Ferrin, and at his death he owned five houses on this street. He was prosperous and genial, and the nieces and nephews always enjoyed visits at his home on Ferrin Street. A niece of Samuel remembers most pleasantly her visits in Charlestown. She mentions a fine tree in their garden called the "Tree of Heaven." She also said that the bands from the Navy Yard would serenade the Ferrins at different times.

Samuel Ferrin was one of the selectmen of Charlestown at the

time of the war with Mexico.

His death record calls him "Samuel Ferrin, chair-painter." He died at 59 Ferrin Street and is buried in the tomb with Edward Adams, No. 12 Phipps Street Burial Ground, Charlestown, Mass. Administration of the estate was granted the second Tuesday of June 1867. Petition for license to sell real estate filed 14 Jan. 1868. Inventory of estate of Samuel Ferrin, gentleman, filed 10 Sept. 1867.

He was survived by his wife Lydia Raymond, who lived to be 101 years of age. "Old Lady Ferrin" was well known and loved in Charlestown. People remembered her working in her garden, and the children passing to school always received of her bounty in the way of flowers and "goodies."

The following is an extract from the Charlestown Enterprise 29 June 1889, giving an account of the celebration of her one-

hundredth birthday.

## MRS. FERRIN'S BIRTHDAY

Old fashioned and not very attractive to the eye is the house numbered 78 Ferrin St., and yet on Monday last it was the most important place of residence in the city of Boston. Within its venerable walls Mrs. Lydia Ferrin, relict of Samuel Ferrin, sat in comfortable state and received warm tributes of congratulations upon her safe arrival at the age of 100

vears.

All day long the estimable lady held informal reception. Neighbors came in to reiterate oft expressed wish that her future might be long and peaceful; brothers and sisters in the church of which she is the oldest member improved the opportunity to extend heartfelt thanks that one who was of the early flock had been spared to witness later triumphs; children and grandchildren came to gaze again on the dear, familiar form, and to bring tokens of that love which is one of the brightest comforts of the old lady's declining years. Bright, alert, and intelligent, Mrs. Ferrin received the homage due to superior age.

Her hearing is impaired, and she cannot move with the activity which characterized her steps in earlier years; but the mental fire has been hardly dimmed, and it was with evident pride that she received the tributes of esteem and the tokens of affection. As stated in these columns a month or more ago, Mrs. Ferrin is a native of Westford, this State, where she was married at the age of 19. The house in which she lives was

\* A grand-nephew of Samuel was asked one time if he were related to the Ferrins of Charlestown. On replying that he was, he was told of a public celebration for a very old lady "Ferrin" which had taken place there on her 100th birthday. She had walked up the steps of the platform unassisted and turned and spoke to the crowd gathered there. She pointed to a man about 75 years old, saying, "That young man's father was once my beau." She told them that all the land which the Navy Yard then covered was part of her father's farm.

built by her husband, and to it she came as a bride over eighty years ago.

Ten children were born to the happy couple, but only four have been permitted to live and congratulate their mother on arriving at an unusual age. Mr. Ferrin, after whom the street is named, died 21 years ago. The four surviving children are Warren Ferrin of this district; Henry F. Ferrin of Providence; Mrs. Harriet Morris of Boston; Mrs. R. W. Reed of Allston. These and their children aided the venerable lady to entertain

her guests.

For the members of the First Baptist Church, the day was one in which they claimed and took a special interest. Mrs. Ferrin became a member of the church in 1817 and in recognition of the anniversary, suitable resolutions were drawn up by a committee of which F. O. Reed was chairman, and adopted by the church. Rev. George E. Horr, Jr., the pastor, was one of the early visitors and made a fervent prayer. He also spoke feelingly of the event. A basket of 100 roses, representing the number of years in Mrs. Ferrin's life, was a touching tribute from the church; and Brother Marcellus Carpenter, who was one of the most youthful visitors, was made a committee of one to buy a nice rattan rocking chair for Mrs. Ferrin. Perhaps the most touching tribute from the church was that Frank A. Hamilton, the youngest member, made, who gave her a portrait of himself and said:

"My dear sister, I present to you this picture as a token of esteem, and I congratulate you upon arriving at your great age. We are brother

and sister in Christ."

Master Hamilton is only nine years of age, and a few weeks ago was admitted to membership in the church of which Mrs. Ferrin has been a

shining light for 72 years.

From early morn until evening guests arrived and departed. Well-known citizens of Charlestown and prominent residents of other places were in the throng. Refreshments were served to the visitors, and in the evening there was instrumental music. Mrs. Ferrin bore the unusual excitement remarkably well.

13 April 1822, Jonathan Ferrin buys of George and Nancy Cross fifty acres of land in Bridgewater. Widow Judith Ferrin, his mother, bought this farm for him and lived with him on it before his marriage, and for many years afterwards, although she died on

the Sylvester Cross place nearby.

20 March 1824, Jonathan Ferrin buys of John Harriman, Jr., thirteen acres adjoining his farm. He brought his wife, Harriet, to this home. When the original farm was purchased there was a house and barn standing on it. It was a small house of two rooms with a chimney between the rooms, and an ell for a kitchen and

storeroom. In the house was a fireplace of fieldstone with an iron kettle eighteen inches across hung on a crane, coals on top of cover. Later the family acquired a tin baker. The first five children were born in this little home, and there was the usual trundle-bed for them.

On the farm was a gristmill and sawmill. After a few years Jonathan Ferrin built a new house across the dam, and in 1911 the cellar hole of this house and the dam could be seen. It was a one-story house built of planks sawed in Jonathan's own mill and dowelled together. Jonathan Ferrin was a good mechanic and built this house himself. Seven children were born in the new house, making twelve of the family who were born in Bridgewater, N. H. The farm was off the main Plymouth and Bristol road and in this same section was the William Fogg farm just below Jonathan's, and here the Ferrin and Fogg children grew up together.

Jonathan Ferrin and Abijah Cross, his brother-in-law, spent a great deal of time working on "perpetual motion" in Jonathan's

workshop.

Bridgewater Town Records:

The Bridgewater, N. H. Town Records have very complete tax lists and from 1822 through 1838 Jonathan Ferrin is taxed in this town. Inventory of the farm is given each year. In August 1833 there is an application for a new highway by George Cross to run from Jonathan Ferrin's sawmill westerly to the dwelling-house of Cross for his particular accommodation.

14 Sept. 1833 William Fogg was called to meet at Jonathan Ferrin's house at ten o'clock in the forenoon and the selectmen

laid out the highway.

2 Sept. 1836, fence-viewers appoint a time to make a division of the fence between the farm on which Jonathan Ferrin of said Bridgewater, yeoman, now resides, and the farm of Julia Gordon,

called the Gordon Place.

In 1837 Jonathan Ferrin went to Mobile, Ala., for one year. Rufus Lewis of New Hampton had large lumber interests down there and Jonathan entered the employ of his company for one year, lumbering up the Tom Bigbee River. He returned home in poor health. In 1839 he decided to leave Bridgewater and moved to the Henry Heath House on the River Road, Bristol, where they remained for one year, and their daughter Abigail Dolloff was born in this house.

Jonathan Ferrin and Jacob Webster, his brother-in-law, while visiting in Alexandria met a Zeke Sanborn, who had a large farm in Alexandria. He asked Jonathan to look his farm over. After inspecting the farm Jonathan leased it for one year, agreeing to give Zeke Sanborn one-half the crops. The next year he bought this farm, comprising 150 acres. It was at the very top of Bear

Hill and one of the most sightly spots imaginable, with a magnificent view of the surrounding country. The last three children were born on Bear Hill. The family now numbered sixteen and all grew to manhood and womanhood and were supported entirely from this farm, although at times it was a severe struggle. Some of the old settlers remember the enormous crops of wheat raised on this farm, and the sheep and cattle there. Colts were raised for sale. One of these old folks remembers the day that the Ferrin family moved on to the hill. She said it was an interesting picture to see all those little boys walking up behind the ox-team of household belongings. She visited them later on very often and said she remembered quite vividly two large settles either side of the fireplace filled with the little ones and not one of them moved from there while she stayed. She says their mother was very sweet and kind with the children. She was a very pretty woman, in fact before her marriage one of the nicest looking women in New Hampton.

She had a remarkably lovable disposition. Harriet was the direct opposite of her husband, who was a strict disciplinarian. The children retained a lovely memory of this mother, who died at the age of 46 years. She is buried in the Town Cemetery, Bristol,

N.H.

Jonathan Ferrin was a small man, straight as a ramrod, and very stern. He was an ardent advocate of temperance and a devout Universalist, travelling any distance to hear Universal preaching. He was at all times interested in religion and politics. He had been known to leave in the midst of haying and go into the house to read the President's Message. An inveterate reader, he borrowed books from anywhere he could. Visiting was his especial delight, and anyone whom he had ever known was sure to have a visit from him.

As was the custom in those days, the boys were obliged to turn in all earnings until they were of age. When the three oldest boys came of age Jonathan bought the cloth for their "freedom suits" at David Hazeltine's store in Hebron, N. H. and employed a tailor named Corson, who lived at Crawford's Corner in Alexandria, to make them.

22 May 1844, Jonathan Ferrin bought a coal-pit in Groton, N. H. and burned charcoal there. In 1913 an old gentleman of Hebron told us he remembered very well seeing Jonathan Ferrin going through Hebron many times on his way to Groton. He was

selectman for Alexandria several years.

Three years after Harriet Webster Ferrin died Jonathan married the second time, and his second wife came to Bear Hill and brought up the younger children. They afterwards left Bear Hill and went to Ellsworth, N. H., to live, and later to Campton, where she died in 1880. He gave up his farm and spent the remaining two years of his life with his children, dying in the home of his daughter Laura, Mrs. Charles Rockwood of Temple, N. H. He is buried with his wife Harriet in Bristol, N. H. Cemetery.

In January 1917 his grandson, Frank M. Ferrin, in memory of his father, Francis Legro Ferrin, erected in the Union Church at Alexandria, N. H., a bronze tablet to commemorate this family.

Joseph Dunham lived in New Haven and kept a private school

there. He was a very strict disciplinarian.

21 Nov. 1845, Wyllys Hemingway, administrator of estate of Jacob Farren, deeds to Joseph D. Ferrin of New Haven, land and dwelling, East Haven, Conn. Records 10 Oct. 1845, Bela Farnham, Town Clerk.

In 1860 or 1861 he and his family left for Lawrence, Kan., to help make Kansas a "Free State." He lived there about fifteen years and then returned east. They were in the famous "Quantrell's Raid" and one of the sons, Edward Payson, has written

the following account of it. Joseph Dunham was a representative from Kansas and in Washington for several years.

New Haven, July 26, 1913.

To J. K. Rankin and Gentlemen and Ladies of Lawrence Massacre Memorial Committee.

Dear Sirs and Mesdames:

Your invitation to be present at the Commemoration Exercises of Quantrell's Raid received, and while there is nothing I can think of that I should enjoy more, my plans are so arranged that it will be impossible for me to attend.

I will send you an account of my experiences that day which, altho a very small boy, were so impressed on my mind that it seems as tho I could see every detail of that awful day before me now, and while some

of the details may be wrong, the main facts are correct.

Our family at the time of the Raid, were living in the Finley House which was on the east side of Massachusetts St., directly back of the old city hall (some called it Durffee House) kept by Mr. Stone, a short dis-

tance from the river bank.

That morning between four and five o'clock my brother and I were awakened by a great shouting and shooting. We sat up in bed and looked out of the window which was at the foot and saw a great crowd of men on horse back all around the hotel and our house. We threw ourselves back onto the pillows just as a bullet came thru the window and struck the wall right over our heads. It would have hit us if we had sat up a moment longer. Just then our mother came to the foot of the stairs and called "Come children; hurry and come down. The Rebels have come." We were not long in getting down stairs I can tell you. After we got down there father made my sister, brother and myself get under the bed on the floor saying that we would not be as likely to be shot there. Mother would not, saying if she was going to be shot she would be shot on the bed.

Mother the first thing that morning had gone all round the house and pulled down all the curtains and for some reason or other the Rebels seemed to be afraid of a house that was shut up, for they rode round and round the house ordering us to come out and daring us to come out, and all the time shooting (the day after we counted between fifty and a hun-

dred bullet holes in the house).

For two or three weeks before the Raid they had been recruiting a Company of Sharp Shooters in Lawrence and they were camped in No. Lawrence by the old Baldwin Mill (since Darling's, I think) and by that time they began to get in their work so that the Rebels had to leave our house. Soon after that father looked out and saw that they were taking their prisoners to the City Hotel. It seems that formerly Quantrell had taught school in Lawrence and boarded with the Stone's and while there had had typhoid fever and they had taken care of him and been very good to him so that morning he had said that they should be safe and all in their house and they took all the prisoners there, father hiding in some very tall weeds back of the house.

There we found a great company of half dressed people, Quantrell and a lot of the Raiders were there and they said to the people of the house, "If you can't stop those fellows shooting over the River they will kill everybody," so some of the women went upstairs and waved sheets out of the north windows for them to stop, while we stayed around there, the people talking of who had been killed, the Rebels coming up with pris-

oners every little while till finally we thought they had left there. I was with my mother and a great many others in the dining room when Lydia Stone, the daughter of the proprietor ran dodging thru the crowd and went upstairs. In a minute or so two of the Rebels were at the door saying, "Where is she?" and when they could not find her they said, "Every d—one of you come out here." They had taken her diamond ring early that morning and she had gone to Quantrell and he had made them give it back. They told her they would get even with her so they had come back for it. After they had got us out they lined us all up on the veranda, men, women, and children, and commenced at one end and said to the man. "Where are you from?" He said, "Ohio." They said, "What part of Ohio?" He said, "The southern part." They shot him. To the next man, "Where are you from?" "The same place, but for God's sake, don't shoot." They shot him. The next man was one armed Brown, the peddler that all the old settlers knew. He held up the stump of his arm to show that he was a cripple. They shot him. They shot the next man, whose blood spurted all over the lady next to mother and me. Just then Mr. Stone came out of the house and walked up close to the men and said, 'Look here; I have been guaranteed protection and safety for myself and all in my house and I want this stopped." They shot him. He turned around, went back into the house and died in a little time.

Then we all made a break, jumped off the veranda and ran down the hill to the Ferry which was at the foot of New Hampshire Street and what a run that was, expecting to be shot every minute, we children running on and then back to mother saying, "Oh mother, mother do run faster, they will kill you," she saying, "Go on, children, save yourselves; don't mind me." The Ferry saw us coming and came across to where there was a great crowd of us. We had just started when father and the men who had been in the weeds came running down the hill. We thought they were going to be left behind and how we children did scream, but the Ferry put back and got them and we all went over to No. Lawrence and into the bushes and stayed until the afternoon and then went back to Lawrence to find how things were. We found a man dead on our door step, six lay dead across the street, and so all over town, — all our friends and neighbors.

It seems as if I could write for a week of the scenes and instances which I saw and knew of that awful morning, making it the worst of my whole life, but I feel that I have written enough so will stop, hoping that this account will be of interest to some, I remain,

From there they went west across northern Illinois and finally reached the farm home of Samuel Preston, ten miles east of Savannah on the Mississippi. Both remained here, and in 1842 Joseph Ferrin married Elizabeth Preston, daughter of Samuel. He became a successful farmer and stockman. She died in 1857 and in 1859 he married again. Augustus Jonathan was originally named Jonathan Augustus, but he had it changed to Augustus J. His father loved to tell him that he was born just in time for him to go on the Hill and vote for the electors for President Jackson. As a boy he worked on various farms around Bristol, N. H., and when of age left for Natick, Mass. to join his brother Francis L., who was then working there at the shoe business. While living in Natick he married and remained there for one year. His first wife lived only one year after marriage, and two years later, in 1858, he decided to go to California and join his brother Morris T., who was there at that time. Crossing the country was quite an affair in those early days. He took passage from Boston for New York, Cuba and Aspinwall, then crossed the Isthmus of Panama and boarded a steamer for San Francisco, twenty-seven days in all. He then went by boat up the Sacramento River to Stockton, and by stage to Coultersville, Calif., where he met his brother Morris T. Here a party was forming for the trip to the Fraser River Gold Mines. There was intense excitement and wonderful, colorful stories afloat, and the two brothers decided to join the party comprising thirty

men and forty mules. They were well armed, as they were to travel through wild, unsettled country, abounding with hostile Indians. They traveled every day for three months, reaching Fort Cantiloupe, B. C., and after two more days reached Fraser River only to find that the mines were not working. The men had to make the best of a bad bargain and found employment wherever they could. They traveled back to Olympia, Wash., and from there to Salem, Ore. Here Augustus J. found agreeable work, made good friends and remained for two years. He always said he preferred Oregon to any other part of the western country. After his return he lived on the Bear Hill home farm at Alexandria off and on for a few years.

In 1864 he married again and brought his wife to Bear Hill, where they stayed for a year and a half. In Dec. 1865 they moved to Natick, and for a while lived there with his brother Francis L. The next year Francis L. bought the property at 37 West Central Street, Natick, Mass., known ever since as the Ferrin homestead, and Augustus J. and wife lived with them. Their eldest son was

born in this house.

Working indoors at the shoe business, however, proved injurious to his health, and he was obliged to settle once again on a farm. He bought the Dolloff farm in Bristol, N. H. and lived on it for twenty years, a sightly place on top of a hill. His later years were spent in the Town of New Hampton, N. H. and on the River Road, Bristol, N. H., where he died in 1917. The old home on the River Road is now no more, having been removed by the Government to make way for the new Bristol Dam built in that section. A more peaceful spot could not be imagined. The old River Road stretching along the Pemigewasset and their simple home bordering upon it, with its beautiful river view, is a memory long to be cherished.

Augustus J. was a Republican and Odd Fellow and served five years as selectman of Bristol, N. H. and three years on its School Board.

His last days were made more difficult by failing eyesight, but even in his last years many a happy hour was spent with him, reviewing the familiar lights of the past. He passed way in his ninety-second year in his home on the River Road. His wife, Sarah, survived him eleven years. She had been educated in the town schools and at the New Hampton Institution, and before her marriage taught school in Bristol and Alexandria. At the time of her death, 17 May 1928, the Bristol paper spoke of her as an "efficient and excellent spirited woman in the community, a good neighbor and friend."

Just before the death of Augustus J. there was quite a memorable gathering of relatives at the old home. Referring to this reunion, the *Bristol Enterprise* had this to say: "A tribute of thankfulness is due the ancestors of these sturdy old families in having brought upon the scene of action men and women who could bear

burden without complaint, walk erect among their cypress trees and cling fast to their roses, though the hidden thorns drew blood. So we who have lived and toiled with these and seen so many of them go down into the mist that ever hangs cold and white over the river, are glad to accord to them their due places of honor in our old yoeman stock."

205. FRANCIS LEGRO FERRIN (Jonathan<sup>4</sup>, Enos<sup>3</sup>, Zebulon<sup>2</sup>, Jonathan<sup>1</sup>), born 11 March 1828, Bridgewater, N. H. He married at Newton Centre, Mass., 31 August 1856, Mary Ann Burley, daughter of Jonathan and Lydia (Copp) Burley, who was born 6 Oct. 1832, East Wakefield, N. H., and died 13 Nov. 1906, Natick, Mass.

His childhood days were spent on the Bridgewater farm, playing about with the neighboring children, and attending the little red brick schoolhouse on the Bridgewater Road. The building still stands, and Francis L. never ceased to thrill on every occasion

when he made his annual visit to these familiar spots.

He was eleven years of age when his father left the Bridgewater farm for Bristol. The family was large and Jonathan, his father, was pleased when his half brother, Zebulon, who lived at McClure's Corner, East Hebron, N. H., offered to give Francis L. a permanent home with him. In after life Francis L. often spoke of this episode which lasted but one week. He ran away, intending to walk home. Uncle Timothy, living on the shore of Newfound Lake, saw him and kept him overnight with them, and the next day he took him home. The loneliness and homesickness of this experience left an indelible mark on his memory. After this, he worked on neighboring farms, and with money that he saved went to Lowell, Mass.,

accompanied by his sister Viana. He worked there for a short while, and his father, Jonathan, was greatly impressed with the accumulated savings that he brought home with him when he returned. The family were then on the Bear Hill farm, Alexandria, N. H., where Francis L. remained until after his mother died. He was extremely fond of his mother, resembled her in many ways, and

inherited the red hair and complexion of her Webster line.

Francis L. knew a family in Hebron, N. H. by the name of Jewell. Some of this family were then in Natick, Mass. working on shoes. They interested him, and he left Alexandria, N. H. before 1850 to join them. He followed the shoe business for many years, and during the Civil War had a business of his own, manufacturing shoes for the army. He spent the remainder of his life in Natick, Mass. He often spoke of his friendship with Mr. Henry Wilson, a former Vice-President under President Ulysses S. Grant, and a

neighbor and co-worker in the shoe industry.

He married in 1856 and lived for a short while in South Natick, afterwards coming to live on Plain Street, Natick. His only son, Frank M., was not born until ten years after their marriage, and shortly before his birth in 1866, Francis L. purchased the property at 37 West Central Street, Natick for a permanent home. It has always been an impressive place, and treasured by Frank M., who kept it as a memorial to his parents until his death in 1939. His special joy was to visit it regularly and find every precious thing just as his mother and father had kept it. The wreaths were in the windows at Christmas; the lilies at Easter. To him it was still their home.

After some years Francis L. and his wife retired for a year to the old farm at Bear Hill, Alexandria, but before the year was up, he was called back to Natick to take a position as superintendent in Mr. Johnson's shoe factory, which position he held for many years. About the age of sixty, he retired from the shoe business and opened an office for real estate, mortgages and insurance, which business he carried on until his death in 1913 at the age of

eighty-five years.

Francis L. Ferrin rounded out about sixty-five years of life in Natick, when he was laid to rest in 1913 in the Dell Park Cemetery, Natick, where his wife, Mary A., had been placed several years before. He had come to Natick in the strength and vigor of young manhood with courage and will to progress, which he surely did, to the benefit of others as well as himself. He helped many over hard places, and always spoke highly of those co-workers who helped him to success. He lived through some interesting years of our nation's history. In one of his diaries was a note in April 1865 "draped the shop to mourn President Lincoln's assassination."

He made many visits to New Hampshire in later years, necessitated by the moving of family graves from rural cemeteries to the Town of Bristol Cemetery where he was assured that they would be permanently cared for. He felt a great sense of responsibility in this matter. In his search for proper data with which to mark the stones being erected over these new graves, he developed a great interest in the past of this pioneer family.

Frank Myer Ferrin spent his boyhood days in Natick, varied by visits in summer to the old homes of his mother and father in New Hampshire. He attended the public schools of his native town, and then finished his education in the English High School, Boston, Mass., where his uncle Hobart Moore, husband of his mother's sister, was the military instructor. He graduated in the class of 1887, and was a constant attendant at the annual class dinner held in after years. He made and held many good friends from these English High days, and helped morally and financially some of his classmates who were not as successful as he was. He had a very keen interest in everything pertaining to the English High School, and was one of their finest graduates.

After leaving school, he followed the electrical business, finally entering the employ of C. S. Knowles, an electrical supply house at 7 Arch Street, Boston. He began here to develop a business of his own, and in 1901 left C. S. Knowles and opened his own business a few doors down at 45 Arch Street, where he remained for many years. Before the completion of the new Warren Institution for Savings Building at 3 Park Street, he reserved the fourth floor, designing it to suit his needs, and it was from his prospective offices here that he was privileged to witness the return parade of the Yankee Division in April 1919. The following August he moved his business to this address, where it is still being carried on. His business was known as "F. M. Ferrin, handling wires and cables, particularly "Ferrin Cables," a product of his own. Under his supervision the first cable to the Isle of Shoals was moved and laid. He often spoke of this cable and the events incident to the laying.

The development of his business through the years coincided with the growth of the great American Telephone and Telegraph Company, and it was his privilege to work with some of their greatest men in the formative years of this great industry. He numbered among his friends men high up in American and Canadian business, which friends he held throughout. His great integrity, strong personality and true interest in humanity were his great assets, and earned for him a place among the successful business men

of the early years of our twentieth century.

His ideas on the successful running of a business were.

much ahead of his time. He always believed that those in his employ who had worked with him were entitled to a fair share of results. This idea he was able to inculcate in some heads of larger companies, and was always proud to feel that he had helped a little towards obtaining more humane conditions for employees. His own feelings were very definitely shown in his will, when many bequests were made to old

and faithful employees.

Mr. Ferrin lived at 35 Hunnewell Avenue, Newton, Mass., where his widow still lives. He was a very quiet, unostentatious man, enjoying his home and his friends in a very quiet way. He was a great lover of antiques, and sought recreation from a strenuous business life in visiting the various antique shops, where he had many friends. After the death of his father, he became interested in family history, and spent a great deal of time and money in pursuit of this hobby. It became his great recreation in later years, and brought him back to early haunts in New Hampshire, which he visited several times a year. In his search for Ferrins, he made many trips to old French Canada, where he made friends of archivists and historians, amongst them Pierre Roy, Archivist of the Province of Quebec, and writer of many historical books. He loved Quebec, its environs, and the Maritime Provinces, and each year made his annual visit to these places.

He was a member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Colonial Wars and The Governor Thomas Dudley Family Association. He was a descendant of Gov. Thomas Dudley through his daughter Mercy. At one time he served on the Board of this organization. He was also a member of the Algonquin Club, Engineers Club, Exchange Club, Braeburn Country Club and, for many years, the Bankers Club of New York. He was also a member of the Duxbury Yacht Club, where

he and Mrs. Ferrin spent their summers.

Frank M. Ferrin was a true New Englander, with a New Englander's love of the land. He owned land so that he might walk on it. Also a lover of horses, he owned several during his lifetime, and spent many vacations at Virginia Hot Springs where he rode over the Virginia countryside. Above all things he loved to ride his favorite horses.

Mr. Ferrin had a very strong will, which he always said was a Ferrin trait. A man of fixed principles, no one could influence him if he thought he was in the right. A man of great feeling, there was no person too humble to commend himself to his interest. He always had time to encourage and bolster anyone in difficulty, and gave generously of his time and money in trying to straighten out the lives of those who came to him for advice. No one who knew Mr. Ferrin could ever forget him, and those who were closely associated with him for long years will ever treasure the privilege of knowing such a man.

Martin of Alexandria, N. H., born 1852 and died 29 Sept. 1881. He died 20 Jan. 1876, New Hampton, N. H., and was buried with

his first wife in Dell Park Cemetery, Natick, Mass.

As a boy he worked on the home farm on Bear Hill, Alexandria, then went to work lumbering for Moore's Mills, River Road, Bristol, N. H. A great desire to go West interrupted this work, and in 1854 or thereabouts, he started for California. He reached Mariposa County and was lumbering somewhere in the vicinity of Coulterville, Calif., where he remained two or three years. While there he joined the Masonic Order, and always afterwards wore the pin of the Coulterville Lodge. About 1858 Augustus J., his brother, joined him in California, and they both left for Frazer River Gold Mines. On their arrival the mines were not working. Morris stayed there mining somewhere in the vicinity for a couple of years, and after accumulating some money, decided to return home and settle in the East.

He married in Billerica and lived there for a few years. He enlisted for the Civil War 31 Aug. 1862 and was a private in Company H, 6th Regiment under Capt. Rodney C. Ferson. His discharge paper, in possession of his daughter, Mrs. Sam Clay, is dated Lowell, Mass. 3 June 1863. After his discharge he joined his brothers in Natick, Mass., and was watchman at Fay's Hat Shop for many years, owning a small home near by. He remained here until after the death of his first wife. After her death he and his daughter left Natick and went to Bristol, N. H. to make their home with his brother Augustus J. on the Dolloff Farm on the hill. In a year or two he married the second time, bought a farm in Campton, N. H., and went there to live. Shortly after this his health began to fail and he was obliged to leave the farm and come to the town of New Hampton, where they had a little house near Dickerman's Pond. He lived only a short time here, passing away at the age of forty-five years. His daughter, only surviving child, Mrs. Sam Clay, formerly of New Hampton, N. H., has a very loving child memory of her father:

"I can truthfully say that my father was my ideal of what a father should be; kind, patient and loving, with a pair of very deep blue eyes, with a twinkle of fun and good nature in them. My mother died when I was five years old, and he had to fill her place as well as his own in my life, and he was everything to me. I worshipped him. After my mother went, we two were always together. I do not think there could be a blacker day in my life than the day he went away and left me a lonely little orphan girl not ten years of age. I cannot even now think of the days that followed without a shudder. I felt so alone and to this day I miss

him."

The Bible of Morris T. Ferrin was in 1913 in the possession of his daughter, Mrs. Sam Clay, then of New Hampton, N. H.

In 1867 he and another young man from Natick left for the West, traveling for days, finally arriving at the home of his Uncle Jacob Webster in Caledonia, County Seat of Houston County, Minn. They remained on the farm of his uncle for a year or so, and then his friend returned East while he decided to stay in the West. At one time he was driving the stage and carrying the mail from Caledonia to Preston, County Seat of Fillmore County, a forty-five-mile trip. He was married in 1871 and afterwards, for a year, was in charge of a store at Spring Valley, Minn., which he left to take over the buying for a big railroad hotel in Lanesboro, Minn.

In 1879 he and his family went to Dakota Territory and took a homestead where in 1880 he was elected county assessor for two years, and in the meantime appointed postmaster, which position he held for six years. He remained in Dakota nine years, but losing three crops of wheat from drought, badly discouraged, he returned to Holdings Ford, Stearns County, Minn., bought forty acres and started all over again. He had various positions here: census enumerator; in charge of a store and lumber yard; and then postmaster, which post he resigned to move to the State of Washington, where his brother-in-law had gone the year before. Letters were coming from him telling of the advantages of Washington, and Ira Ferrin asked him to purchase thirty-eight acres of land for him, and in May 1902 they arrived to take possession of this land.

He and his son Clarence settled down to develop a fruit business, and this proved successful, so Ira Ferrin stayed in Wenatchee, Wash. for the remainder of his life. When he first came to Wenatchee, there were only 400 people. In 1922, there were 10,000, and, of course, more each year. Ira's wife died 22 Sept. 1924 at Wenatchee. After this he went to live with his son Clarence, working with him in the apple industry. At the age of 84 he was making countless boxes by hand for the shipment of the apples. He spent his winters iu Seattle with his granddaughter, Ethel Ward Pfeiffer. He died in a Seattle hospital 5 April 1931 at the age of 86 years, and was buried with his wife at Wenatchee. He married 10 Feb. 1856, at Ogden, Utah, Martha Ann Bronson, born 13 June 1834 at Brownstown, Wayne County, Mich., daughter of Leman Bronson. She was a pioneer of Utah, 19 Sept. 1847.

At the age of twelve she, with her parents, left the Brownstown home to journey westward, making the trip by ox-team When one of her brothers enlisted for service in the Mexican War, one of the wagons was left without a driver, and Martha was given this difficult job, although only thirteen years of age. She arrived in Salt Lake City, Sept. 19, 1847, where she lived for a time at the fort then being erected. She attended school in the winter in a little one-room building. She learned to speak Indian and Spanish from the Indians and Spaniards who came to the fort. After eighteen months, Martha's father moved his family to a tract of land

assigned him near-by. After the death of her father, she went to live with a married brother in North Ogden, Utah, where she became acquainted with Josiah Marsh Ferrin.

She died 14 Jan. 1926, Ogden, Utah, and was buried with her husband in City Cemetery, Ogden. He died 20 June 1904, Ogden,

Utah.

Josiah Marsh Ferrin was a Bishop and High Councilor in the Church of the Latter Day Saints. He was a member of the State Legislature and a farmer and stock raiser. The following biography is from "Biographical Encyclopedia of Latter Day Saints":

Ferrin, Josiah Marsh — Bishop of Eden Ward, Weber Stake of Zion, Utah, was born Jan. 22, 1834, in Chautauqua County, New York, the son of Samuel Ferrin and Sally Powell. He was baptized July 15, 1844, by Samuel Ferrin, was ordained successively a Deacon, a Teacher, a Priest, and Elder, and became a member of the 38th quorum of Seventy. After being ordained a High Priest in 1857, he served as a member of the High Council until 1868; otherwise he has acted as teacher and superintendent of Sunday School, president of Ward Y. M. M. I. A., etc. He acted as Bishop of Eden from 1877 to 1882 and again a second term for eleven years, commencing in 1885; after that he moved to Ogden where he was called to act as an alternate member and later as a regular member of the High Council.

In 1868–1870 he filled a successful mission to Great Britain, laboring in the Manchester and Leeds conferences, presiding for a short time over the latter. In 1856 (Feb. 10th) he married Martha Ann Bronson, who bore him twelve children, nine sons and three daughters. In civil affairs Bishop Ferrin was ever active and served his fellow citizens faithfully in many different capacities, such as school trustee, constable, and member of the legislature. His principal occupations in life were farming, saw milling, railroading, contracting and stock raising. Since his first arrival in Utah (from Pottawattamie County, Iowa) in 1852 he was a hard worker and a

natural leader of men.

In 1862 he settled in Ogden Valley, becoming one of the first settlers of Eden. He also had his share of Indian fighting, while serving as a member of the Utah militia with the rank of captain. He raised a large family of faithful Latterday Saints and finally died, highly respected and beloved, at Ogden, Utah, June 20, 1904.


