Foreword 1162786

At the Fiftieth Annual Reunion of the Skilton Family, held at the Town Hall, Watertown, Connecticut, August 25, 1915, the suggestion was made that a Family Genealogy be published in 1918, to mark the bicentennial of the birth of Dr. Henry Skilton, who emigrated from England to Connecticut in early manhood.

In accordance with this suggestion, the following Publication Committee was elected, with instructions to collate and publish such genealogical information regarding Dr. Skilton

and his descendants as might be available:

Subsequently Pearl Julius Skilton, Everett Webster Skilton, Edna Abigail Skilton and Anna Elizabeth Avery were

made members of the Committee.

At the request of the Publication Committee there was appointed, at the Fifty-Second Reunion, an Executive Committee, consisting of:

John Davis Skilton, Chairman; Pearl Julius Skilton, Secretary; Charles Herbert Skilton, Treasurer; Artison Skilton

Clark, Ira Cliffton Matteson.

The Publication Committee is responsible for the present

volume, but it may not assume undue credit therefor.

The collection and preservation of data regarding the Family of Dr. Henry Skilton has ever been a work of loving care to his descendants and it may be said that this book embodies the results of the labors and investigations of many

individuals during a period of almost a century.

In the nature of things, it is impossible to render nicely proportioned credit to those who have given continually and unselfishly of their time and their means in the gathering and preserving of facts regarding the Skiltons, of whom it has been a characteristic that they have manifested at all times a singular interest, together with a certain commendable pride, in their family history.

A vast amount of what may be termed preliminary, pioneer work was done by Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton, whose activities were continued and expanded by his two sons, James Avery⁶ Skilton and George Steele⁶ Skilton. Their researches were extended for a long time and in many directions by correspondence, by examination of records and by personal investigations. All the results attained by these men have been placed most generously at the disposal of the Committee, which acknowledges gratefully the obligation for help and counsel without which this book could not have been prepared.

So far as it has been able to do so, the Publication Committee has appropriated the results attained by those who labored in the past, supplementing, augmenting and correct-

ing the material procurable.

An earnest endeavor has been made to avoid and to eliminate all inaccuracies and to set forth the essential facts of the family history. The Committee is aware that the record is not complete, that omissions and errors will probably be detected, in spite of the most careful and strenuous efforts to gather material and to give all data fully and precisely.

The book would never be published, were absolute completeness, or accuracy, a prerequisite. The Committee has tried to utilize to the full all the reliable information that has been attainable. In some instances it has felt constrained to exclude data which were in doubt. In no case has anything been published without the fullest opportunity being offered for corrections and emendations.

Reference to the Bibliography will show that information has been sought from the usual sources, viz: Public Records, Cemetery Records, Tomb Stones, Deeds, Wills, Family Bibles, Letters, Diaries, Memorabilia, and other documents and

publications.

It has been deemed wise to quote fully the available matter published regarding the members of the earlier generations. All quotations have been made with care. Where discrepancies occur as between these quotations and the text of the book the Committee believes that its own version is correct.

The delay in publishing the book has been occasioned by the activity of various members of the Committee in work

incident to the World War.

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Copy of letter found among papers of George Steele Skilton, deceased:

> Coventry, England May 27, 1850.

Sir:

I lose no time in forwarding the copies required but in respect to the Bapm of the John whose marriage I have sent we have no trace whatever, our Baptism register commences with the year 1698. They were accidentally destroyed by fire about that time so that we have nothing before that date. I have searched the first few years of our registr for the Bapm of John but have not succeeded in finding it, or any other of the name.

Explanatory Note

This Genealogy is arranged on what is known as "The Register Plan", approved by a number of Genealogical Societies.

The family records are printed in numerical order, beginning with

1 John Skilton, of Coventry, England.

A Grand Number is assigned to 1 John 1 Skilton and to every recorded descendant of 1 John¹ Skilton and Mary (Bennitt) Skilton. The highest number indicates the total descendants enumerated, including 1 John¹ Skilton. This Grand Number, in Arabic figures, precedes the name.

The superimposed numeral following a Christian name indicates the number of the Generation as counted from 1 John Skilton, or from the earliest known ancestor of any given line. At the beginning of each record the names printed in parentheses show the ancestral lineage

back to 1 John 1 Skilton.

James Skilton (Avery3, Henry2, John1) signifies that James Skilton was of the Fourth Generation, the son of Avery3 Skilton, grandson of

Henry2 Skilton, great-grandson of John1 Skilton.

When the surname of a descendant is other than Skilton, because of the marriage of a woman ancestor, the latter's maiden name is given,

together with her generation numeral.

John LaPorte⁶ Gibbs (Rebecca⁵ Atwood, Reuben⁴, Mary³ Skilton, Henry², John¹) signifies that John LaPorte⁶ Gibbs was the s. of Rebecca⁵ Atwood, grandson of Reuben⁴ Atwood, great-grandson of Mary³ Skilton, great-grandson of Henry² Skilton, and greatgreat-great-grandson of John Skilton.

Each name in the birth list is accompanied by certain symbols, their

significance being thus explained: 102 i Elijah Steele5 Skilton.

The Arabic number 102 denotes the Grand Number of Elijah Steele5, s. of James Skilton and Chloe (Steele) Skilton. The marriage record may be found by turning to the Grand Number 102. The Roman numeral i signifies that he was the first child of his parents. The superimposed 5, following his Christian name, indicates that he was of the Fifth Generation.


When known, the maiden name of a wife is inserted in parentheses, e. g., Mary3 (Skilton) Atwood indicates that Mary3 Skilton m. an

Atwood.

The fact that a woman married twice is indicated by brackets and Millicent⁵ ([Gaylord] Southmayd) Judd indicates that Millicent⁵ Gaylord m. a Southmayd and that, after his death, she m. a Judd.

Early History

Compiled originally by Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton about 1850; revised by his son, George Steele⁶ Skilton, Genealogical and Family History of Connecticut. Lewis Historical Publishing Co., N. Y., 1911. Vol. II, p. 740.

The ancient home of the Skilton (formerly Skelton) family is in Cumberlandshire, England, in the parish of Skelton, from which the family took its name. The name was written de Skelton as long as the family owned the Skelton estate, or parish, and resided there. The prefix was dropped by emigrating portions of the family, and finally entirely omitted after the middle of the fifteenth century. Some derive the name of the parish directly from the British language-Skell, water, and tone, town. Others believe that the town was not named until the later half of the Anglo-Saxon period, or possibly as late as 1090, when its cultivation began. Thus, they derive the name from the Anglo-Saxon language-Skaling, a hut. Huts were built in numbers in the forests of Inglewood to shelter the herdsmen who tended the vast herds which fed in the ancient forest, forming in time a village; and, when cultivation began, the place was called Skaling-ton, tone, tune, etc., having been previously adopted from the British into the Saxon language, and used as now in English in Skelton.

The earliest de Skelton mentioned represented Cumberland in Parliament, in the time of Edward I, about 1300. John de Skelton was knight of the shire in 1316, reign of Edward II. Adam de Skelton was member of Parliament, 1318; John de Skelton was member of Parliament, 1324-9; Richard de Skelton was member of Parliament in 1331, reign of Edward III.

Thomas de Skelton was knight of the shire in 1337, reign of Edward III, Sir Clement de Skelton, about 1350, married the heiress of Orton of Cumberland, and in default of heirs, a part of the property passed out of the family. He was four times knight of the shire between 1375 and 1396, in the reign of Richard II, Between the reigns of Edward II and Henry VIII several individuals of the family distinguished themselves in the Scotch and French wars. As a token of superior strength and valor was preserved in Westminster Abbey a large sword equal to that of Edward III, which, it was said, was worn by some of them in attendance upon the king of France. Hence came the family coat of arms, viz: Azure, a fez between three fleurs de lis, or. It appears that such was the marked character of their prowess that several differences were granted in their arms, each indicating the individual personal success as a commander against the French. Sir Thomas de Skelton was steward of the Duchy of Lancaster. He died in 1416, and was buried in Hinxton, Cambridgeshire. He was probably father of Johannes de Skelton, who was member of Parliament in 1401, 1406 and 1422. Both he and his son John were noted among the gentry at the visitation of 1433. The latter was sheriff of Cumberland in the tenth, nineteenth, twenty-fourth and twenty-ninth years of Henry VI and was in Parliament in 1450.

For his prowess as a warrior he received a grant from the crown of one hundred acres at Armathwaite. His brother Richard was sheriff of Cumberland in 1427, and was with Henry V in France at the battle of Agincourt, in 1415. He married the heiress of Branthwaite, and established the family of Skeltons of Branthwaite, receiving a grant of arms for Robert Skelton, Esquire, was M. P. for Carlisle in his valor. John Skelton, Esquire, was sheriff of Cumberland in George Skelton, Knight, was sheriff of Cumberland in 1511. 1520. Sir John Skelton, of Norfolk, married Anne Boleyn, aunt of Queen Anne Boleyn. Reverend John Skelton, of Norfolk, was poet laureate of Henry VIII. John Skelton, Armiger, was sheriff of Cumberland in 1633. Sir John Skelton, one of the generals of Charles I and Charles II, was lieutenant governor of the city and fortress of Plymouth, 1692. At that time his son, Sir Bevil Skelton, was captain of the Guards, and soon after he was minister successively to the courts of Germany, Holland, and France. Charles Skelton, brother to Bevil, not known to fame, lost his life in battle in the wars of this period. Charles Skelton, lieutenant general in the French Service, Grand Croix, Commander of the Order of Saint Louis, married the daughter of Lord Dacre. She died in 1741.

Henry Skelton of Branthwaite Hall, general in the army, and governor of Portsmouth, was engaged in Flanders and in Scotland in 1745. Dying without issue, he bequeathed his estate to his friend, Jones, who had saved his life in battle,

the Jones family taking the name of Skelton.

Reverend D. Phillip Skelton, of Ireland, from the Armathwaite family, was a noted Episcopalian divine and commentator.

The name Skilton now being very rare in England, it is probable that the change from Skelton took place about the beginning of the eighteenth century. One of the first of the name may have been John¹ Skilton.

First Generation

1. John¹ Skilton was born at Coventry, England, about 1688. He was married to Mary Bennitt, of Coventry, January 23, 1717-18, in Saint Michael's Church, Coventry. See cut insert for Record of Marriage, contained in Book of Registers, No. 1. The earlier records of Saint Michael's Parish having been destroyed by fire, as tradition says, the first absolutely definite information we have as to the Skiltons begins with the marriage of John¹ Skilton and Mary Bennitt.

The dates of birth and death of Mary Bennitt are not known, but it is believed that she died between 1728 and 1733.



Second Generation

Cothren, with the aid and counsel of Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton, published in the History of Ancient Woodbury, Connecticut, the following account of the life of Dr. Henry² Skilton. (History of Ancient Woodbury, Connecticut, From the

(History of Ancient Woodbury, Connecticut, From the First Indian Deed in 1659 to 1854. By William Cothren, Waterbury, Connecticut. Published by Bronson Brothers, 1854.)

Pages 396-397:

"Doctor Henry Skilton was born in the parish of St. Michael's, Coventry, England, November 19th, 1718, and baptized in the established church, December 3, 1718. He removed with his parents to Rumsey, Hampshire County, when eight years of age, with a younger brother and sister. At Rumsey another sister was born, and his mother died. His father having obtained a place in the British navy soon after, Henry left home March 31, 1734, and England, April 1, 1735, in a gunship. He left the ship the same year at Boston, remained a while in Roxbury, and is next heard of in Preston, Connecticut, where he married Tabitha Avery, July 9th, 1741.

"He removed to Southington about the year 1749 or 1750, where he bought lands. Having procured some medical books, he commenced the study of medicine as early as 1748, and having fitted himself for the duties of the profession, he commenced practice as the first physician in Southington. He sold lands to Samuel Smith, in Southington, but did not sell all he owned till several years after his removal to Woodbury, which took place about 1760, as his name first appears in the tax list of this town the next year. In Woodbury, he practiced medicine many years. While here he took the place of his son, Avery, who had been drafted into the service about the period of the battle of Bunker Hill. The detachment which he joined, and in which he was a commissioned officer, was stationed at Roxbury Neck, Massachusetts. chases of land in Woodbury extend from 1761 to 1773. age he made his last change of residence by removing to Watertown, in 1788. He died at the latter place, June 7th, 1802, aged eighty-four. His residence in Woodbury was near Rock House Hill, which is a round hill a little west of Harmon Judson's dwelling house.

"Dr. Skilton's preferences in religion were for the Congregational or Calvinistic doctrine, but he did not approve some of the disciplinary customs of his brethren, nor did he accept the form of church government in use among them. Hence he became a 'Separate', and held meetings at various places,

teaching his followers in the 'things of religion'. In Prospect, Connecticut, the remnant of a church of his organizing existed as late as 1831, in the person of an aged lady who still revered her former pastor's name."

Pages 711-712-713:

"Henry Skilton2, son of John Skilton1, and Mary (Bennet) was b. in the parish of St. Michael's, Coventry, England, November 19, 1718. He removed with his parents to Rumsey, Hampshire County, when eight years of age, with a younger brother and sister, where another sister was born. mother died, and his father left for a place in the British navy. Henry left home March 31, 1734, sailed April 1, 1735, in a gunship, and landed at Boston, Massachusetts, the same year, boarded for some time in Roxbury, and is next heard of in He m. July 9, 1741, Tabitha, eldest Preston, Connecticut. child* of Joseph Avery and Tabitha (Gardner), of Norwich, Conn., the latter being originally from South Kingston, R. I. He removed to Southington, about 1749, became a physician and practiced his profession in that town. From thence he went to Woodbury, about 1760, continued in the practice of his profession, and in old age removed to Watertown, Connecticut, where he died June 7, 1802, aged 84."

**"He was the second resident physician of the town, and was a man of more than common ability in almost every particular. Not only did he successfully practice his profession, but conducted various business enterprises. At one time he had a

store, hotel, mill, and two or three farms on hand.

"He was born in the parish of St. Michael's, Coventry, England, November 19, 1718, and entered the British navy at seventeen years of age, and his ship landing at Boston he left the service and remained in this country. In 1741 we find him married to Tabitha Avery, of Preston, and in 1748 he removed to Southington, and bought the farm that belonged to the late Avery Clark, Esq., at Clark Farms. He owned a large tract of land in the vicinity of the Merriman Burying Ground, and also the property now the site of the Atwater Manufacturing Company.

"The time he began to practice medicine is unknown, but it is supposed that being intelligent and apt, he began in the small way of extracting teeth and blood letting; and by reading of some text-books in Surgery and Practice, he was able to treat ordinary cases. He gave himself, however, more to business than to the practice of his profession. It was prob-

ably his superior judgment that secured his professional success. In 1760 he removed to Woodbury, where he practiced medicine, and became a landholder. A son of his having been drafted to serve in the Continental Army, he took his place. He died at Watertown in 1802, aged eighty-four.

"He is said to have organized the Separate or Strict Congregational Church in Chesher, now Prospect. While in Southington he took an active part in the religious controversies of the time and is said to have been a warm personal friend of Mr. Merriman, the first Baptist minister. His descendants still live in the vicinity of Watertown."

Carrie May6 (Skilton) Skilton in her application for Membership to the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution submitted the following statement regarding the services of Dr. Henry² Skilton. Her application was

granted.

ANCESTOR'S SERVICES

"My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

"Dr. Henry Skilton served for a time in the Revolutionary Army. He took the place of his son Avery, who was drafted into the service about the period of the battle of Bunker Hill.

"The detachment which he joined and in which he was a commissioned officer was stationed at Roxbury Neck, Mass.

"Dr. Henry Skilton was born in England and entered the British Navy at seventeen years of age, and, his ship landing

at Boston, he left the service and remained in America.

"While living in Preston in 1748, he procured some medical books, and commenced the study of medicine. He afterwards began his practice, as the second resident physician of Southington, Conn. He was a man of more than common ability, in almost every particular. Not only did he successfully practice his profession, but conducted various business enterprises, having at one time a store, hotel, mill, and two or three farms on hand.

"In 1760 he removed to Woodbury where he practiced medicine, a number of years, and became a landowner, removing to Watertown in 1788, where he died June 7, 1802, aged eighty-

four.

From James George⁶ Skilton, Watertown, Conn. On back of photograph of Groton Avery House, written by James Avery⁶ Skilton:

"This 'Avery House' is located on the edge of Poquonnock Plain, or Plains, in the town of Groton, Connecticut, and was built and occupied by James Avery, the son of Christopher Avery, born in Salsbury, England, in 1620, and the great-grandfather of Tabitha Avery, the middle portion in 1656, the highest part about 1684, from the frame, etc., of the first church built in New London, with a Watchtower for watching Indians. He, James Avery, the first, bought it to remove, when the Society proposed to build a new church. He continued to use the first floor, in one large room, as a church, as long as he lived, himself preaching therein.

"He lived on a farm where Gloucester, Mass., now stands, married Joanna Greenslade at Boston in 1643, and with her and three children came to New London with the Cape Ann party in 1650. Had the 5th land allotment among them but

soon sold out and moved to this place.

"A swamp close at the back protected it on that side from Indians. Many of the wounded from Fort Griswold were removed and cared for here. Living in Preston, I have no doubt, Henry Skilton visited this house, though his name does not appear in the town records, which are now kept in this house by James D. Avery, Town Clerk. I visited this house September 3, 1888, and searched records. Father and I must have passed within one-fourth mile of the house in 1841.

*"There is a little story relating to Tabitha Avery and Dr. Henry Skilton, that may be of some interest. John Skilton was a silk or ribbon weaver in Coventry, England, somewhere about 1715. He had a family of children, all of them young, of which Henry was the oldest. The tradition handed down in the family is, that John Skilton went out one Saturday evening to purchase supplies for his family; was seized by the press-gang on the streets of Coventry; was hurried away without being allowed to communicate with his family; on shipboard he was horribly brutalized, beaten and abused, and never returned to his family. His son Henry later, at about the age of eighteen, resolved that England was no place for him to marry and raise a family in. Although without money, he made up his mind to emigrate to America. Starting with

a little pack, slung to a stick over his shoulder, he walked to Bristol: there obtained a position of clerk on an English war vessel bound for Boston; deserted the ship when he reached Boston, as he originally intended and had a right to do; drifted down into Rhode Island; studied medicine; became interested in the radical religious ideas of the Rhode Island of that day, and finally settled down to the practice of medicine in the town of Preston, Conn. After he had achieved the purchase of a horse for use in his practice, he was in the habit of riding his horse to church regularly, a pillion being one of the trappings. Joseph Avery (20) was also the father of a family of He owned an outlying farm, where he had cattle and hay. As fall came on, he offered his oldest son the title to this outlying farm, provided he would go and occupy the small house upon it during the coming winter, and feed, water and care for the cattle until spring. This offer the oldest son declined to accept; whereupon a younger sister, Tabitha Avery, proposed to accept the offer if she were given the opportunity, and it was arranged that she should spend the winter at the farm, for the purpose above indicated. so engaged she was in the habit of attending church on foot the same church attended by the young doctor, who, taking advantage of his opportunity, offered her the use of his pillion and his escort to and from the church and her residence: the eventual result being an engagement and marriage."

The following quotation is from "The Averys of Groton," page 9:

"Christopher Avery, a weaver, was born in England about 1590. There are several traditions with regard to his immigration to the new world. One is that he come from Salisbury, Wilts County, England, in the 'Arbella' with John Winthrop, and landed at Salem, Mass., June 12, 1630. Another tradition is that he came over with the younger Winthrop, in 1631, and that, on the voyage, the subsequent Governor of Connecticut formed a strong and life long attachment for Christopher Avery's young son, James.

"The shipping list of the 'Arbella' is not known to be in

existence."

Joseph⁴ Avery (James³, James², Christopher¹) was bap. (Page 130) April 17, 1692, at New London; m. Tabitha Gardi-The Rev. David Avery says that Joseph Avery, son of James, married Tabitha Gardiner of South Kingston. Sweet says that they were married in South Kingston and that her father's name was William. William Gardiner of Kingston, R. I., had a daughter Tabitha. He died in 1711; his will mentioned his wife, Elizabeth, and a daughter, Tabitha, then apparently unmarried. This Tabitha was probably born in Kingston, R. I., between 1685 and 1690. On the records of the Second Congregational Church of Griswold, Conn., is found the marriage of Henry Skilton of South Kingston to Tabitha Avery of North Kingston. As this Tabitha was the daughter of Joseph Avery, the marriage record strengthens the theory that her mother, the wife of Joseph Avery, came from Kingston. A story has been handed down in the Skilton family to the effect that Joseph Avery owned an outlying farm, where he had cattle and hay. This farm he offered to his eldest son if he would occupy the small house upon it during the coming winter and feed and care for the When the son declined the offer, the sister, Tabitha, accepted it. It was during this winter on the farm that she met Henry Skilton whom she soon married. Possibly this farm was in North Kingston and came to Joseph Avery through his wife. If this is so, old deeds may reveal the parentage of the wife of Joseph Avery.

Norwich, Jan. 10, 1717, James Avery through love deeded to his son Joseph land that he bought of Isaac Harrington. This land was east of the River Quinabauge at a place called Pabaquamsque; 60 acres bounded by the common, River Quinabauge and Pachogue Brook. March 16, 1717, he deeded him two tracts of land, through "love he bears his dutiful son Joseph". September 1, 1729, Ebenezer Avery deeded to his brother Joseph Avery, through love, "land in Norwich, on which the said Joseph now dwells" (Norwich Deeds, 1:65, & 6:467).

June 27, 1753, at Norwich, "Old Joseph Avery was drowned" is an entry in Jabez Fitch's diary (Mayflower Descendants, 1:38). His estate was inventoried at Norwich, November 6, 1753, but was not wholly divided until May 5, 1755. The heirs were the widow, Tabitha Avery; sons, Joseph and Benjamin; dau. Tabitha (Avery) Skilton; and the heirs of dau., Lucy deceased, wife of Jonathan Tracy (Norwich Wills, 1:454).

He emigrated to America and settled in Rhode Island, where Later, he moved to Preston, Conn., he studied medicine. where he was a practicing physician. Joseph⁴ Avery deeded land to Henry Skilton and wife, Tabitha, "my beloved daughter", March 20, 1745. In a deed of land, February 8, 1754, Henry Skilton called himself of Farmington, Conn. He lived in Southington, Woodbury and Watertown. He was a man of enterprise, owning a store, hotel, mill, and two or three farms at the same time. He was one of the organizers of the "strict" Congregational Church of Chester. He d. in Watertown, Conn., June 7, 1802; his wife d. at the same place, October 25, 1797. I have your letter of August 15th relating to Mr. Sweet's record of Benjamin Avery who married for his second wife a Mary Skilton. Mr. Sweet made a sorry muddle of these Benjamins and Thankfuls Avery and we had no end of trouble in straightening the matter out. If I remember correctly, there were two Benjamins and two Thankfuls and the family of one was given by Mr. Sweet to another of the same name. I think that you will find that the record as printed on page 185 of The Groton Avery Clan is correct.

I find on my files two letters bearing on the Skilton family. I send them to you enclosed herewith hoping that they may be of some assistance to you, perhaps putting you into communication with some one who can give you help, and with a

request that you return said letters to me.

Of course, I do not believe that this Benjamin Avery, who was a brother of Tabitha Avery who married Henry Skilton, married either Thankful Avery or Mary Skilton as recorded by Sweet. Deeds and wills are much more authoritative than family traditions and the record shows that Benjamin⁵ Avery, who died between May and July, 1776, was survived by his widow, Elizabeth, and that she was living as late as February 11, 1783.

If you get any new light on this subject I should be glad to have you send it to me.

Avery Skilton was a comparatively quiet sort of man, and did not have the energy or apparent ability of his Sarah, however, who married Richards (and the family record says has had two children, as to whom I have information only about one, the daughter Eliza), was a very remarkable woman and had a remarkable career. a sort of prime minister to Jemima Wilkinson, the 'Universal Friend'; was her business manager and very capable. held the titles to the real estate of the fraternity, which, after her death, was in litigation for 30 years, out of which her name and character came with the endorsements of the Courts and of the later historians of Yates County. Her husband died early, and she with a daughter joined Jemima Wilkinson in her efforts to improve society and purify religion. ternity was first started in Pennsylvania, but finally moved into Yates County, New York State, where Sarah died Nov. 30, 1793. 

The surname Judd is one of the oldest English surnames, and is identical with Jude, an old and now almost obsolete Judson and Judkins are formed from the personal name. same name. Henry Judde, of County Kent, and John Judde, of Oxfordshire, were mentioned in the Hundred Rolls of 1275, and the family has been in Kent down to the present time. Sir Andrew Judd, a dealer in skins and furs, of London, son of John Judd, of Tunbridge, Kent, was mayor of London in 1550, a man of wealth and influence. He endowed a grammar school in Tunbridge. His only child was a daughter Alice. The coat-of-arms of this family is: Gules, a fesse reguled between three boars' heads couped argent. It is likely that all the Judds are descended from this Kent family. The only

other coat-of-arms of the Judd family is plainly of the same origin, and indicates relationship. The Judds of Middlesex bear: Gules, a fesse reguled between three boars' heads erased argent. Crest: on a ducal coronet or, a cockatrice, wings displayed proper. The family was also prominent in County Essex, England.

*"Thomas Judd came from England, in 1633 or 1634, and settled at Cambridge, Massachusetts. His home lot of four acres was granted in August, 1634. It was in that part of Cambridge called the 'West-End', on the northeast side of the highway to Watertown. He built a house upon this lot. His name is among those who were to receive their proportion of meadow ground, August 20, 1635; and also in the list of those who had a house or houses in Cambridge in February, 1636. He was admitted freeman of the colony May 25, 1636. He removed to Hartford in 1636, and it is not improbable that he was one of that company of about a hundred men, women, and children, who departed from Cambridge on the last day of May, 1636, and traveled through the wilderness to Connec-His houselot at Hartford is thus described in ticut River. 'One parcel of land on which his dwelling now the records: standeth, with other out houses, yards and gardens thereon being, containing by estimation two acres, more or less. Abutting on the highway leading from William Gibbens's to the ox-pasture on the east, on James Cole's land on the south, on the highway leading from John Moody's towards Wethersfield on the west, and on Mr. Willys's land on the north.' Thomas Judd's houselot was on the south side of the Willys homelot, which is distinguished by the charter-oak, and both lots extended westward to the highway leading to Wethersfield.

"Thomas Judd was one of the first proprietors and settlers of Farmington. The year in which he removed from Hartford is not known, but it was apparently about 1644. His homelot was the third lot from the north end of the main street, on both sides of the street, and extended westward to Farmington River. He was a substantial farmer and an influential man. Farmington first sent deputies, viz., Stephen Hart and Thomas Judd, to the General Court in May, 1647. Thomas Judd was subsequently a deputy at the May session, 1648; May, 1649; September, 1650; September, 1651; February, 1657; October, 1658; October, 1659; May and October, 1661, 1662 and 1663; May, 1666; October, 1668; October, 1670; May and October, 1677; May, 1678, and October, 1679.

"The wife of Thomas Judd died in Farmington, perhaps about 1678; her death is not recorded. Thomas Mason, of Northampton, died in 1678, leaving a widow, Clemence, with a good estate and no children. On the 2d of December, 1679, Thomas Judd married widow Clemence Mason, and he resided with her in Northampton most of the time during the remainder of his life. Her homestead was on the east side of Pleasant Street and the front extended from two or three rods below the great elm down to Hawley Street; and she owned about forty acres of meadow land. Thomas Judd was one of the selectmen of Northampton in 1682. His youngest son, Samuel, came to Northampton and lived with his father, and after his decease, took care of his widow Clemence, and she gave to him her estate.

"Thomas Judd was a member of the church under the care of Rev. Thomas Hooker and Rev. Samuel Stone, both at Cambridge and Hartford, and his connection with the Hartford church continued until a church was gathered at Farmington, Oct. 13, 1652. Some of his children were carried from Farmington to Hartford to be baptized. He was one of the seven pillars of the church of Farmington at its organization and

his wife united in November, 1652.

"The first pastor was Rev. Roger Newton, 1652, and the second, Rev. Samuel Hooker, 1661. Stephen Hart was the first deacon and Thomas Judd the second. In what year the latter was chosen deacon is uncertain. He is styled deacon in the Connecticut Colony records in 1668 and after, and he bore the same title in Northampton. Deac. Thomas Judd died November 12, 1688. His death is not in the Northampton record, but it was registered by the County Clerk at Springfield. His age must have been about 80, perhaps above 80. His second wife, Clemence, died Nov. 22, 1696. He was probably married before he came from England. Neither the family name nor christian name of his first wife has been found. He settled his estate by deeds and not by will. Several of his deeds to his children are dated in 1683, '84 and '85.

"Deac. Thomas Judd was one of the 84 proprietors of Farmington, among whom lands of that extensive township, now embracing five or six townships, were to be divided, according to an agreement made Jan. 8, 1673. Many divisions were made after his decease, and administrators on his estate were appointed once or twice after 1708. Large tracts of his lands were distributed to his children and grandchildren at several times between 1708 and 1730. Five of his sons were also among the 84 proprietors. Samuel was not of age in 1673 and not a proprietor. In March, 1662, the General Court

granted to Thomas Judd, probably for some public services, 200 acres of land, which were located, and called Judd's Farm, but some years after, the land was found to be within the bounds of Wallingford, and was given up, and an equivalent taken elsewhere.

"Children of Thomas Judd, of the Second Generation,

"He had nine children, viz., six sons and three daughters. No record of their births can be found, but from records at Hartford and Farmington, the order of the births is ascertained, excepting the two oldest, and some knowledge is obtained in regard to the years in which they were born, though not so exact as is desirable. When Thomas Judd died, he had a large number of grand children, each of his sons and daughters having had children.

THOMAS JUDD'S DAUGHTERS

"Elizabeth Judd married Samuel Loomis of Farmington, Dec. 27, 1653. They removed to Windsor in 1660, and to Westfield about 1674. Their children born in Farmington were Samuel, Elizabeth; in Windsor, Ruth, 1660; Sarah, 1662; Joanna, 1665; Benjamin, 1667; Nehemiah, 1670; William, 1672; in Westfield, Philip, 1675; Mary, 1678. Ten in all. Samuel Loomis died in 1689. His widow, Elizabeth, was living in Westfield, 1716.

"Mary Judd married Thomas Loomis of Windsor, January 1, 1663. She was his second wife. Their children were Elizabeth, born 1664; Ruth, 1665; Sarah, 1668; Jeremiah, 1670, died 1672; Mabel, 1672; Mindwell, 1676; Benjamin, 1679. Mary,

the mother, died Aug. 8, 1684.

"Ruth Judd married the third John Steele of Farmington. Children were Mary, Elizabeth, baptized 1680; Sarah, 1683;

John, 1686; Rachel, 1689; Ruth, Ebenezer.

"Waterbury, called by the Indians Mattatuck, began to be settled by families from Farmington about 1677. Among the early settlers were Thomas Judd and Philip Judd, sons of Deac. Thomas Judd; and a few years later, Thomas Judd, son of William Judd.

"Four of the sons of Thomas Judd, contemplating a removal to Mattatuck, and being members of the church, desired the advice of their brethren in the church. The following counsel was given, and is recorded in the church record of Farmington:

"'The church, having considered the desire of their brethren, William, Thomas, John and Benjamin Judd; as also John Stanley, Jr., touching their removal from us to Mattatuck,

agreed as follows:

"1. In general—that considering the divers difficulties and inconveniences that attend the place towards which they are looking, and how hazardable it may be, (for aught that appeareth,) that the house and ordinances of Christ may not (for a large time at least) be settled among them—the church doth advise the brethren to be wary of engaging far, until some comfortable hopes appear of being suited for the inward man in the great things fore-mentioned.

"'2. Particularly—to our brother, William Judd, that it having pleased God to deal so bountifully with him, that not many of the brethren with us have so large accommodations as himself, yet see not his call to remove on the account of straightness for outward subsistence, and therefore counsel him, if it may be with satisfaction to his spirit, to continue his

abode with us, hoping God will bless him in so doing.

"'3. To the rest—though we know not how much they will be bettered as to land, all things considered by their removal, especially John and Benjamin Judd, and therefore cannot much encourage; yet if the bent of their spirits be strong for going, and the advice aforegiven, touching the worship of God be taken, we shall not trouble, but say,—the will of the Lord be done.'

"The record is without date. The advice was probably sought and given between 1677 and 1680. William, John and Benjamin did not remove, but lived and died in Farmington. Philip did not ask counsel with the others, for he was not a

member of the church till 1681.

"William Judd was admitted freeman May, 1656; Thomas, Jr. and John, May, 1664; Benjamin before 1669, and Philip, May, 1677. Samuel was made freeman in Massachusetts, May, 1684.

DESCENDANTS OF WILLIAM JUDD ELDEST SON OF DEACON THOMAS JUDD THIRD GENERATION

"2. William Judd, eldest son of Deac. Thomas Judd, married Mary Steele, daughter of John Steele, of Farmington, March 30, 1658. He died at Farmington, in the latter part of the year 1690. The inventory of his estate was presented to the Court, Nov. 5, 1690. He had in lands and buildings £495 and in personal estate £198, making £693. This was an ample estate for those days, and it appears by the church record, that 'not many of the brethren with us have

so large accommodations as himself.' His age at the time of his decease, was between 54 and 57. He was usually called Sergeant William Judd. His widow, Marv, died Oct. 27, 1718,

aged about 80.

"Children. The births are not recorded, and only four baptisms, viz., Mary and Elizabeth, July 22, 1660; Thomas, Oct. 13, 1662; William, January 8, 1665. Elizabeth and William died young. The names and ages of the children, as returned in the inventory, Nov. 1690, were: Mary, aged 32; Thomas, 27; John, 23; Rachel, 20; Samuel, 17; Daniel, 15, and Elizabeth, 12. According to this probate record, the years of their birth were nearly as follows:


"11. Thomas Judd, son of William, settled in Waterbury. He married Feb. 9, 1688, Sarah Freeman, daughter of Stephen Freeman, one of the first settlers of Milford, and afterwards of Newark, N. J. Thomas and Sarah Judd sold land in Milford, that fell to her from the estate of her father. Stephen Freeman, for £60, Dec. 27, 1688. This Thomas Judd was a Blacksmith, a Farmer, Town Clerk some years, a Deacon of the church, a Captain of the Militia, a Justice of the Peace, and a Deputy to the General Court, at one or both sessions, more than twenty years between 1696 and 1733. His will, dated April 26, 1738, is recorded in the Probate office at Wood bury. (He gave his 'silver headed cane' to his son William. This has come down to the compiler of this work. He calls himself Thomas Judd, Blacksmith, in his will.) He had then one son and five daughters. His grave-stone, which is near the northwest corner of the old burying yard, has the following inscription, some of which is almost illegible:

> 'Here (lies) the body of Thomas Judd, Esq., Justice the Deacon & first Captain in Waterbury. who died Jan'y ye 4th A. D. 1747 aged 79.

On the foot-stone is 'T. J. Esq. 1747'. Near by is a monument with this inscription: 'Sarah Judd, wife of Deac. Thomas Judd, dyed Sept. 8, 1738, in the 69th year of her age.'

The researches of Prof. H. Bronson show that Deac. Thomas Judd was the second Justice in Waterbury and not the first. His uncle, Thomas

Judd, was the first.

"This age of Thomas Judd, Esq., does not correspond with his age returned to the Probate Court in 1690; and that does not quite agree with the baptismal record. I cannot explain these discrepancies. The figures on the stone designating the age, are indistinct. He must have been 84 or 85 at the time of his decease. The date of his death is correct. He had a large landed estate.

This proved an unhappy marriage and they separated. 4th, Mary Foote, widow of Samuel Foote, June 6, 1780. She died October, 1782. 5th, a widow Clauson of Stamford. othy Judd was appointed a Justice of the Peace every year from May, 1765, to May, 1783, and held other offices. He represented Waterbury in the General Court 21 sessions, from 1746 to 1773, but resided in Westbury parish. He died with his son, Allyn S. Judd, in Northfield parish, in the bounds of Litchfield, Jan. 23, 1796, aged 82. Children:

Timothy Judd was the first Town Clerk of the town of Watertown, Conn., and for over forty years kept a careful record of deaths in the Parish of Westbury-formerly a part of the town of Waterbury and which later became the town of Watertown-written by his own hand, every name being numbered with great care.

Carrie May⁶ (Skilton) Skilton in her application for membership to the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution submitted the following statement regarding the services of Timothy Judd. Her application was granted.

ANCESTOR'S SERVICES

"My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

"After the meeting of the General Congress in 1774, a town

meeting was held at Waterbury, on Nov. 17, 1774, to take action on the '11 Article of the Association of the General Congress'. This Article recommended that every town should appoint a committee, 'whose business it shall be' to 'attentively observe the conduct of all persons touching this Association'. Timothy Judd of Westbury Parish was one of fourteen men, who were at once appointed to serve on this important 'Com-

mittee of Inspection'.

"Nov. 22nd, 1774, he was appointed one of a committee to receive donations contributed toward the relief of the sufferers from the 'Boston Port Bill'. Again in 1777 after the surrender of Burgoyne, on the 'Request of the Governor and Council of Safety', requesting sundry articles of clothing for the Continental soldiers, he was chosen moderator at a town meeting which responded by appointing a committee of fifteen to carry the request into execution.

"Timothy Judd graduated at Yale College in 1737. He was appointed Justice of the Peace every year from May, 1765,

to May, 1783, and held other offices.

"He represented Waterbury in the General Court twentyone sessions from 1746 to 1773, but resided in Westbury Parish.







(A) Page 41. The First Connecticut Regiment was commanded by Gen. Wooster. The Fifth Company of this Regiment was commanded by Captain Caleb Trowbridge from 1 May, 1775, to 10 December, 1775. The Company served at the siege of Boston. Elijah Steel enlisted in this Company,

6 May, 1775, was discharged 20 December, 1775.

(B) Pages 322 and 324. The Second Regiment "Connecticut Line", Formation of 1781-1783, was commanded by Colonel Heman Swift. Elijah Steele was a private soldier in Captain Thomas Converse's Company and was paid from 28 June, 1781. to 31 December, 1781.

(C) Elijah Steel served a total of seventeen months, fourteen days in the War of the Revolution, as shown by the fol-

James⁴ Skilton, was a woman with marked force of character which exhibited itself in all the details of the home life, as well as in all the activities with which she was connected. The mother of ten children, her sphere was largely in the home where economy and executive ability were ever apparent. Her children, with the exception of Elijah, the oldest, were born at the Skilton Homestead in the French Mountain district, North Watertown, in a house built for the young couple in 1801 and still

standing at this date (1918).

She was a woman commanding the love of all who knew her, kindly, sympathetic, attending all the needs of her numerous family with time to spare for aid and sympathy extended to sick and needy ones outside. Truly many there will be who "will rise up and call her blessed". It was my privilege to know her intimately the last few years of her life, as they were spent in my own home in Middlebury. As I look back to those years, I am impressed with her marked personality. She was possessed of a never failing fund of humor which presented itself when relating incidents which occurred during her entire life. She was a Christian of the sincerest type and her children reflected in their lives the influence which her precept and example had upon them. She was uncomplaining while bearing the severe infirmities of age, ever resting in the belief that everything was for the best. She was exceedingly fond of receiving visits from the various members of the family and could entertain them in a remarkably easy and courteous manner. The first Family Reunion was held at her home in Middlebury and no one of the numerous relatives and friends present enjoyed the occasion more than she. She was a true type of the sturdy New England Puritan stock and made a place for herself in the Skilton Family which has left its stamp.

Parthenia⁴ Skilton was educated at Morris Academy and was, before her marriage, a teacher. Although she lived but seven years after her marriage to Cyrus Avery, she seems to have made a deep impression upon the minds of her neighbors of those early days. They described her as a tall, dark woman of great strength of mind and business ability, a very daring horsewoman, and possessed of much of her grandfather's medical skill. It is related that in cases of illness it was customary to send at once for young Mrs. Avery, who would come upon her horse, often carrying one of her young children on the saddle before her, and that during a fever which prevailed at that time she was accustomed to ride about daily, caring for the sick and administering medicines.

Her own death resulted from this fever, which she contracted while nursing a member of her family. She drew the plans and personally superintended the building of the family home, which still stands at Lyons, and the greater part of

which is a copy of her home in Watertown.







Copy of Letter of Ordination of the Reverend John Wilson: "KNOW all Men by these Presents, That I, Francis Asbury, Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in America, under the Protection of ALMIGHTY GOD, and with a single Eye to his Glory, by the Imposition of my Hands, and prayer, have this Day set apart John Wilson for the Office of a Deacon in the said Methodist Episcopal Church; a Man whom I judge well qualified for that Work: And do hereby recommend him to all whom it may concern, as a proper Person to administer the Ordinance of Baptism, Marriage, and the Burial of the Dead, in the Absence of an Elder, and to feed the flock of Christ, so long as his Spirit and Practice are such as become the Gospel of Christ, and he continueth to hold fast the Form of sound Words, according to the established Doctrines of the gospel.

Elijah Šteele⁵ Skilton, a pioneer of Portage County, Ohio, and one of the early settlers in the Connecticut Western Reserve, went to Ravenna in 1832. He settled on a large farm in the northeastern part of Ravenna Township, where he lived until his death in 1873. In addition to his work on the farm,

he taught school and was a Methodist Minister.

Residents of the community who lived there during his time, as well as older members of the family, frequently mention his ability as a seer. One of the incidents which is often spoken of in this connection was a case in which some horses were stolen. The owner of the horses, knowing that Elijah Skilton had traced stolen property simply by this mysterious ability, went to him and stated the situation. The man was told where he should go to recover his stolen property and did so with success.



*"Doctor Avery Judd Skilton, son of James (who married Chloe Steel), son of Avery (who married Parthenia Judd), son of Dr. Henry (who married Tabitha Avery), was born in Watertown, Litchfield Co., Ct., Feb. 1, 1802. Commenced practice in Troy, N. Y., in the year 1826, and died there Mar. 20, 1858. He married Mary Augusta Candee, of New Haven, at Oxford, Ct., Mar. 2, 1828. She was born Jan. 30, 1804, and died in Troy, May 14, 1865. They had nine children, six of whom are still living: James Avery, Mary T., Julius Augustus, Charles Candee, Julia Augusta, Juliette, Steel, Ella Frances, Kitty Josephine.

"His professional life was so successful and laborious that he seemed to have crowded the work of sixty into those thirty odd years. He is known, in addition to other regular work, to have assisted at the birth of 30 children in a single month, without having a night's sleep in that time. In addition to keeping up with the progress of the science of medicine, he did the same in the sciences of botany, mineralogy, geology, conchology, paleontology, and all branches of biology.

"He likewise devoted himself to the study of genealogies of many New England families, particularly the Avery, Judd, Steel, Skilton, Candee and related families, conducting a large domestic and foreign correspondence during many years, making extended personal researches of public and private records. He devoted much time for many years to the work of obtain-

ing Avery genealogical records, making extended journeys for that purpose, most of which have been lost since his death. He did not publish, and his papers, letters and family pictures, etc., were destroyed by the great fire of 1862 in Troy, but he was one of the pioneers, had a remarkable faculty for this study, as for many others, and some of the results of his researches and contributions are to be found in the Judd and Steel genealogies, in Cothren's Ancient Woodbury and in Timlow.

"He was a man of thorough New England type, as his ancestry would indicate, of high character, intelligence and professional standards. He had great skill and deep insight, and was in almost everything in advance of his time. Among his virtues were modesty, fidelity to duty and careful consideration for and attention to the poor and suffering. These received a large share of his time, attention and skill, without regard for reward of any kind, and were never neglected by him. Among his ancestors were the Steels, Judds, and many others among the pioneer settlers of Westfield, Windsor and Hartford, Waterbury and Watertown, Conn."

*"Some ten years since, the writer began, for his own amusement chiefly, to collect genealogical information respecting the Steele family of the United States. To this family he is allied, through both paternal and maternal branches.


"While making investigations to this end, he learned that another—A. J. Skilton, M. D., of Troy, N. Y., and also of the same connection—was zealously engaged in a similar pursuit.

"On finding that our views and aims were identical, we henceforth united in the prosecution of our inquiries as opportunities presented.

"It was not anticipated at first, that the result of these investigations would be such as to warrant publication. But in the course of research, the amount of matter became so full, and the success so complete, that in the autumn of 1857 it was resolved that the manuscripts should be revised, and a copy from them prepared for publication. Of this the charge was committed to Dr. Skilton. In the spring of 1858, Dr. Skilton was removed from his earthly labors, and the task was left to others."**

"So much of the present volume as relates to the earlier descendants of those two pioneers, in the first settlement of the Colony of Connecticut, John and George Steele, is mainly due to the researches of Dr. Skilton. Gathered with unexampled perseverance and care from the Colonial, Town, Probate, and other Records in Connecticut, and from Cemetery Inscriptions and Family Registers, they present a true specimen of his accuracy and industry."

Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton was born in Watertown, Conn. He graduated from Yale Medical School in 1827 and began the practice of medicine in Troy, N. Y., in the same year, where he built up a large private practice, from which he was suddenly removed by tuberculosis while in his prime. Buried with his wife and children in the Skilton plot, Oakwood Cemetery, Troy, N. Y. The family monument there gives genea-

logical data for two generations.

An obituary of Doctor Skilton was published in the Troy

Daily Times of March 22, 1858.

The family physician in those days was still the friend on whom his clients felt dependent and to whom they felt they could always turn, confident of help in sickness and suffering. His death after so short a sickness was a great shock to these families, who came to the funeral in the State Street M. E. Church, in numbers sufficient to fill the building, and also the whole street from curb to curb. Ministers of three denominations took part in this service.

He was a conscientious and sympathetic physician, ever ready to sacrifice his own comfort and strength to respond to the call of the sick, regardless of whether the bill would ever be paid. Consequently, as the immigration from Ireland to Troy beginning in the '30s brought in many poor people, he always had an enormous Irish practice, never refusing to go to the sick, night and day.


During the cholera of 1832 and 1849, which was before the method of its communication was fully known, he was fearless and untiring

and untiring.


In obstetrics he had over three thousand five hundred cases. He had in his possession the mortar and pestle used by his great grandfather, Dr. Henry² Skilton.

According to the method of teaching medicine then in vogue, for years there were students in his office, as many as half a dozen at a time.

He was President of the Rensselaer County Medical Society; was a member of the American Association for the Advance-

ment of Science and Corresponding Member of the State Historical Societies of Connecticut, Vermont and Wisconsin.

As he had a remarkable memory, he developed a great aptitude for languages. Taking up Latin, Greek, and German in his youth, he continued after with Polish, Saxon, Armenian, French, and Spanish. In the enjoyment of this fad he filled his libraries with books of many different languages, including many that are still unknown, even by name, to most people. In 1834 he befriended a Polish student who had taken part in a revolution for Polish independence, and who escaped from his guards on the way to Siberia and reached America without funds. He was Rudolph Gutowski and said to be the son of a Polish nobleman. Dr. Skilton took him into his home and maintained him until he was able to provide for himself. He is supposed to have eventually returned to Poland.

Two canes with silver bands with mottoes in foreign languages are still preserved. They were probably presented to him by fellow students of the languages of the inscriptions. He was the pioneer in the genealogy of the Skiltons and the Steeles, to which he gave years of work. He was also a student of Natural History, to which he devoted such leisure hours as he could take from his practice. He made a large collection of Natural History specimens and was an occasional contributor to the publications on these subjects, particularly geology, a subject then only partially developed for

this part of the world.

Upon his removal to Troy he at once took a prominent part in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and was a class leader for twenty-five years or more. His knowledge of the Bible was remarkable.

"He was a kind, benevolent man," says our authority, "a citizen in whom were united the most desirable attainments and the most brilliant and admirable traits of mental and moral character."

George Steele Skilton.

Mary Augusta Candee, wife of Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton, was thrown upon her own resources by the early death of her father when she was three, and her mother when she was six. She taught school and also nursed the sick. She came to the assistance of Mrs. Captain James⁴ Skilton upon the birth of the latter's youngest daughter (who was named Mary Augusta Skilton for her). It is supposed that two strains, Candee and Sperry, of French ancestry, may account for her physical characteristics, particularly delicate features and beautiful color in youth, features which have been extended to some of her descendants for two generations.

While her fiancé went to Troy, N. Y., to establish himself, she occupied herself in spinning linen for her outfit. Some of her sheets were in the possession of her daughters. Henry Bennett⁵ Skilton related that after the marriage he took an ox team and hauled the household effects of the young couple from Watertown, Conn., to Troy, N. Y., to start the home there. She was a devout Christian, as shown in some early letters to relatives in Connecticut, still preserved, and at once became active in the State Street M. E. Church.

Some women were still living as late as 1910 who had been guided and encouraged in their youth by her sisterly help and judgment, for which she was gratefully remembered. Most of her children were born at 105 Fourth Street, in Troy, which was the home for nineteen years and until the removal to the northeast corner of Fifth Avenue and Broadway, about 1855.


Her children have all lived to old age, except three, who died in early childhood from scarlet fever, which must have been brought to the home by the father.

She was a most capable woman in the management of her home and the practice of New England thrift, through which her boys were enabled to go to college.


One of the early pianos manufactured by Burns, a pioneer American piano maker in Albany, N. Y., came into the home before 1840 and the daughter, Mary Tabitha⁶, was practicing on it when she was nine years old. Music became the family recreation, particularly on the Sabbath, and it was found that only one in the family lacked the musical ear. All learned to read vocal music and began the acquisition of a musical appreciation and taste, which was a source of pleasure through life.

All of her children, except Ella Frances⁶, having left Troy, in the summer of 1861 she gave up the home there and these two went to Middlebury, Conn., and boarded with her sister-in-law, Hannah Maria⁵ (Skilton) Clark, whose mother, Chloe (Steele) Skilton, was also living there. She remained there until the fall of 1863 and Ella Frances⁶ remained until October, 1862. Her son, George Steele⁶, also visited her there in the summer of 1861. It was then that Mary Augusta proposed in the presence of the grandmother, Chloe, that there should be a gathering of her descendants in her honor, annually, as long as she lived. This was approved and the other four families were invited to Middlebury for a day, September 13, 1861. Thus were inaugurated the Gatherings (called also Reunions) of the Skiltons, which have been continued annually, after an interval, to the present time.

In the fall of 1863 she went to Albany, N. Y., to make a home

for her son, James Avery6, while he was studying law at the

Albany Law School.

She was visiting her daughter, Mary Tabitha6 (Skilton) Palmer, in Washington, D. C., just at the close of the Civil War (in 1865) when she had a stroke of apoplexy. Having no hope of recovery, it was her one desire to go back to Troy. This return was accomplished with difficulty and after several weeks.

James Avery⁶, Mary Tabitha⁶, and George Steele⁶ were her

children who were with her at her death.

Height, five feet, four inches; weight, about one hundred forty pounds; hair, chestnut brown, abundant and wavy; eyes, dark gray; complexion, clear, bright and light, with delicate color.

Henry Bennett³ Skilton passed his boyhood days upon the farm and he was educated in the public schools of the town. He spent several winters teaching district school, and while teaching in Prospect, he became acquainted with Julia,⁸ dau. of Merit⁷ and Keturah (Smith) Clark, and was married to her November 19, 1832.

She died June 14, 1836, and two years later, November 19, 1838, he married her younger sister, Emily⁸, with whom he lived for more than half a century. To them were born ten

children.

He followed farming the most of his life, settling on the Steele farm in the Guernseytown District, where for years he cared for his Grandmother Steele and her brother Jonathan. In 1857, he sold the farm and purchased one adjoining, where he lived till the time of his death.

He was closely identified with the Episcopal Church, having been confirmed October 1, 1839, and was for many years a Vestryman of Christ Church Parish, Watertown, Conn.

He was respected and honored in the town in which he lived, filling important offices, including those of Selectman, for

several years, and Justice of the Peace.

He was considered a man of excellent judgment, a man of strong convictions and with moral courage to carry out the same, strong for the right and quick to rebuke the wrong, and many came to him for advice of various kinds or for help in the settling of disputes. He died March 13, 1894, at Watertown, Conn.; bur. Evergreen Cemetery, Watertown, Conn.

Emily⁸ Clark (Merit⁷, Isaac⁶, Isaac⁵, Thomas⁴, Samuel³, Thomas², George¹), the youngest child of Merit and Keturah (Smith) Clark, was born at the Clark homestead in Prospect, Conn., where she lived till the time of her marriage to Henry

Bennett⁵ Skilton.

She was but little over sixteen, but assumed the care of the two children left by the death of her sister Julia, his first wife.

She was of a quiet, home-keeping nature, a devoted wife and mother, a kind, conscientious Christian woman, who won the love and respect of all who knew her. She was one who looked well to the ways of her household and ate not the bread of idleness.

She was the mother of ten children and several, by reason of age or infirmities were, by circumstances, placed under her care, yet, through it all, she maintained such an even disposi-

tion that a son remarked he never knew her to scold or speak a cross word.

Isaac⁵ Clark (Thomas⁴, Samuel³, Thomas², George¹), who was b. 1726; d. July 12, 1787, aged 61; m. Elizabeth Andrew, granddaughter of Governor Treat, of Connecticut. He was known as Captain Isaac Clark.

Isaac⁶ Clark (Isaac⁵, Thomas⁴, Samuel³, Thomas², George¹), who was b. October, 1756; d. April 25, 1849; m. Hannah Nettleton, who d. December, 1800. She was the dau. of Thaddeus Nettleton. Isaac⁶ Clark m. 2d Keturah (or Susannah) (Smith) Smith, widow of Jesse Gould Smith. She d. March, 1842, aged 74.

Merit⁷ Clark (Isaac⁶, Isaac⁵, Thomas⁴, Samuel³, Thomas², George¹), who was the son of Isaac⁶ Clark and Hannah (Nettleton) Clark, was b. February 4, 1789, at Orange, Conn.; d. October 6, 1867, at Prospect, Conn. He m. Keturah Smith, who was b. August 18, 1789; d. February 13, 1870, aged 80 years, 6 months, at Prospect, Conn.; dau. of Jesse Gould Smith and Keturah (Smith) Smith.

"West Haven, Conn., February 3, 1905.

"Miss Edith M. Skilton, Watertown, Conn.

"Dear Cousin:

"Yours of the 1st received and noted. I will write what

facts I have about our ancestors, the Smiths.

"When I came to West Haven ten years ago, I did not know who my father's grandparents were. During the time I have lived here I have ascertained the following facts which I take pleasure in sending you.

"First Generation.

"George Smith was one of the original settlers of New Haven. His name appears on one of the first maps of that

place, as the owner of a lot in the suburbs. It was on the hill about one-eighth mile southwest of the large spreading oak tree under which Mr. Davenport preached his first sermon in the wilderness from Matthew vi, 1. I presume he was there listening to it. He also had a grant of land at City Point, a portion of which is still in the possession of his descendants, the oyster growers, J. H. and Geo. Smith & Sons, of City Point. He was married in 1642. Moved to West Haven in 1655, built a house near the harbor on what is now the east end of Center Street, four blocks from where I live. He had ten children, six sons, Samuel, Ebenezer, Joseph, Nathan, Thomas, John, and four daughters, Sarah, Hannah, Mercy, Elizabeth. I do not know the date of his death, nor his age.

"Second Generation.

"Nathan, son of George, was born December 27, 1656. Had two wives, Esther ——, and Hannah ——. His children were Amy, b. in 1683; Mehitable, b. in 1698, and Andrew, b. November 15, 1701. He lived in the house built by his father, and died there in 1726, aged 70.

"Third Generation.

"Andrew, son of Nathan, m. Mercy Painter (do not know the date). Their children were Eunice, Nathan, Hannah, Mabel, Andrew, and Rebecca. He lived in the same house that his father and grandfather lived in and died there in 1789, aged 87.

"Fourth Generation.

"Nathan, son of Andrew, was b. in 1733. Married Sarah, oldest daughter of Samuel Sherman. He bought a farm on the hill about one mile west of the center of West Haven, and built a house in 1760, which is still standing. He was a deacon in the West Haven Church for several years, and was always called Deacon Nathan Smith. He was the father of six children, viz., Thomas, Gould, Nathan, Jr., Sarah, Percis, and Lucy. He d. 1807, aged 74.

"Fifth Generation.

"Gould (sometimes spelled Gold), son of Dea. Nathan, was b. in 1764, m. Susanna Smith in 1784. This Susanna Smith was a daughter of Oliver Smith, who descended from Ebenezer, son of the original George. His father gave him a farm adjoining his own, of which I have the deed, dated in 1793. They had six children, three sons and three daughters, named, Oliver, Lyman, Jesse G. (called Gould), Katura, Susan, Louvisa. Capt. Gould (or Gold) Smith was a captain in the State Militia. I have the commission given him in 1795, signed by Samuel Huntington, the then Governor of the State

and commander of its military forces. He died in 1800, only 36 years of age, leaving a widow and six children, my father being the youngest and only six years old. I may be mistaken here. I know that he was the youngest of the boys, but am not certain about the ages of the girls. Perhaps your grandmother or some of the Clarks of Prospect may have a record of their ages. After the death of Capt. Gould Smith the farm was sold and the family scattered. The widow, Susanna, married Isaac Clark of Orange, who was the father of your grandfather, Merrit Clark. I presume your grandmother has told you about the three kinds of children that constituted the family of this Isaac Clark. He was a widower with 7 children when my grandmother married him. She had 6 children, making 13; after that they had three more, making 16 in all.

"I do not think the Smith children spent much time in the Clark family. Oliver went to live in New Haven. Married Jane Mix and was overseer of the Almshouse there for several

"Lyman married and settled in Prospect. (Can you give me the address of one of his descendants so that I can cor-

respond about the dates and names of his family?)

"Gould, my father, lived with a farmer in West Haven until he was 16 years old, then 6 years in New Haven, in a bookbinder's shop; then superintendent of a farm in Woodbridge until his sister Susan's husband died and left her with eight children and a large farm, which he looked after until he married Susan Fowler, my mother, and had a farm of his own.

"Susan married Samuel Prudden, a neighbor of Isaac Clark.
"Katura married Merrit Clark, one of the Clark boys, and

settled in Prospect.

"Louvisa married Harvey Morse, and settled in Litchfield,

afterwards moving to New York State.

"I have given in this hastily written, rambling style a very crude historical sketch of our ancestors as I have ascertained the facts. To make it more simple I will give you the line of descent from George Smith, who came from England, on the next page.

74. His wife d. in 1893, aged 91.

"William G. Smith, their son, was b. in 1835; d. in 1892, un-

married.

"Charles F. Smith, their son, was b. in 1836. Married Mary G. Tomlinson of Milford in 1866.

"Susie F. Smith, daughter of Charles F., was b. in 1867.

Married Clifford E. Treat of Orange in 1891.

"Minnie H. Smith, daughter of Charles F., was b. in 1873, unmarried. Now teaching school in Cedar Street School, New

Haven. Young Harry Skilton is one of her scholars.

"Charles F. Treat, son of Clifford and Susie Treat, was b. in 1895. Elbee J., another son, was b. in 1899. Charles F., Susie F., Minnie H., Charles F. and Elbee J. are the only descendants of Jesse Gould Smith living. Only one, my brother William, has died.

"I think I have written everything I know about the Smith

family that you are interested about.

"I hope you will call on me at my place in West Haven in the near future, when I will show you where your ancestors lived, and where they are sleeping their last sleep in the windowless house of the dead.

John Chester⁵ Skilton entered the service of Terry and Thomas, clockmakers, in the town of Plymouth, Conn., when nineteen years of age. When this firm dissolved in 1836, or 1837, he was employed by the retiring partner, Seth Thomas, who established a clock-making plant at Thomaston, Conn. In that position he remained until his death, December 29, 1851, at Plymouth, Conn. His remains lie in the Skilton Lot, Spring Grove Cemetery, Hartford, Conn.

Anna Heaton lived in Plymouth Hollow and Waterbury until the Civil War. Dr. Egbert Guernsey prepared her for hospital work, and Dorothy Dix sent her to be matron of a hospital in Alexandria, Va., and later to have charge of five hospitals at Beaufort, S. C., in care of soldiers in Sherman's After the Civil War she was badly crushed on the railroad and was a helpless invalid till she died, July 14, 1891,

at Hartford, Conn.; bur, there.

Levi Heaton, who was b. January 14, 1774, d. August 12, 1844, m. Anna Guernsey. He was descended from Abram Heaton, first Civil Governor of Connecticut. The names of the first Civil and Religious Governors of Connecticut, Heaton and Davenport, are in large letters on the front of the "Church on the Green", in New Haven.

Anna Guernsey was descended from John Guernsey, who emigrated from the Island of Guernsey, in 1638. He was one of the one hundred eighty Pilgrims who came to New Haven and established that colony. He was one of those who carried food to the Regicide Judges, Goffe and Whalley, who were concaled in "Judges' Cave".

Chloe Cornelia⁶ Skilton attended public and private school at Thomaston, the High School of Waterbury, and Normal School at New Britain, till sixteen. From that age she was a teacher at Harwinton, Waterbury, and in New York State. After the Civil War she returned with her mother to Beaufort. S. C., and taught among the colored people on the Islands, and later the colored children of Augusta, Ga., and at Silver Springs, Maryland. In Washington she taught in a public school, but was called home to Hartford by the serious accident to her mother. From that time she taught in the schools of Hartford for over thirty years. Teacher: 733 Asylum Avenue, Hartford, Conn. (1918.)

107. Hannah Maria Skilton (James . Avery . Henry .. John¹), who was b. February 4, 1812, at Watertown, Conn., m. March 22, 1840, at Watertown, Conn. (Watertown Records), Gould Smith Clark, who was b. March 12, 1814, at Prospect, Conn.; s. of Merit Clark and Keturah (Smith) Clark; grandson of Isaac Clark.

Hannah Maria Skilton spent her early life at the old Skilton homestead at North Watertown, Conn., but after reaching young womanhood she lived two years or more in the home of her older brother, Avery, who was a leading physician in the city of Troy, New York. While there she attended Miss Willard's School for several terms, thus preparing for a successful career as instructor in the common schools of her home state.

While she was possessed of a naturally pleasant disposition, often exhibiting its humorous side, she still maintained a serious attitude toward the responsibilities of life. in the religious atmosphere of the Methodist Church, her early connection with that body was not surprising. twelve she came into full communion, and continued a devoted member, till later in life, when she transferred her membership to the Congregational Church in Middlebury, Conn., of which her husband was Junior Deacon.

In 1840 she m. Gould Smiths Clark, a native of Prospect, Conn., and two years later they began homemaking on the newly purchased farm in Middlebury, Conn., (see cut of home, page 26) where the remainder of her life was passed. She d. January 18, 1897, at Middlebury, Conn.; bur. there.

Gould Smith8 Clark (Merit7, Isaac6, Isaac6, Thomas4, Samuel³, Thomas², George¹) lived during boyhood in his home town, Prospect, Conn., where he attended the best schools

that the rural government provided. A man of even, quiet temperament, he was held in great esteem by his acquaintances, and filled at different periods of his life prominent official positions in the gift of his townsmen.

He represented his town in the State Legislature in the years 1857, 1871 and 1872, and was appointed by Governor Andrews as one of the appraisers of the State Prison property in Wethersfield, Conn. He early became a member of the Congregational Church and was appointed Deacon in 1864, and remained continually in that office till his death.

He was of sturdy New England stock, and in his personal character exemplified the noblest and best traits of Puritan ancestry.


Mary White was the dau. of Joel White, b. April 8, 1803, at Oxford, Conn., and Emma (French) White, of Bethany, Conn., dau. of David and Anna French, who were m. December 2, 1825.

Samuel William Southmayd⁵ Skilton attended school in the French Mountain District and finished at Morris Academy. He taught school several years in various towns; worked for Oliver Smith, of Westville, now New Haven, Conn., and "turnpiked" the streets of the city with plow and scraper about 1843. After his marriage, he bought a farm at the foot of Carrington Hills, Woodbridge, Conn., where one of the New Haven water reservoirs was subsequently located. After living on this farm about six and one-half years, he sold it and purchased Prospect Farm, Litchfield, now Morris, Conn., where he resided from April, 1853, until he d. there, April 23, 1894. He was bur. in East Morris Cemetery.

He held various offices, such as Selectman, School Visitor,

and member of the Board of Relief.

Mary White received her early education in the public schools of Oxford and subsequently attended a private

Of her union to Samuel William Southmayd5 Skilton five children were born, of whom the first two, William Steele and Joel White I, died in infancy. After the death of these two boys, the family moved to South Farms, a part of Litchfield, Conn., which was afterward set off as the town of Morris, where the remaining three children were born. In early life she gave herself to her Saviour, uniting with the church in Woodbridge in the spring of 1848. Upon removal to Morris, she united with the Methodist Church in Bethlehem, later taking a letter to the Morris Congregational Church, remaining there a member until her death, February Her many amiable and generous qualities were 11, 1904. recognized and appreciated wherever she was known. was a loving daughter, a true friend, a kind sister, a devoted wife, and an excellent mother. She was one of those rare people, of whom it was said that she never spoke ill of anyone. The funeral took place at the Congregational Church in Morris, on February 15, 1904, the Reverend Francis Wavland Fletcher officiating. Interment was in the East Morris Cemetery.

Melicent Parthenia⁵ Skilton at the age of sixteen years became a Christian, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which she was a devoted member for over seventy years. She was educated in the Emma Willard Seminary at Troy, N. Y., after which she taught successfully for several

She was united in marriage to the Reverend Ebenezer Osborne Beers, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Middlebury, Conn. In less than five years her husband died, leaving her with two small sons, James and George. She was m. the second time on February 4, 1850, to William Minor Bowker, of Pike, Pennsylvania, a fine Christian man who acceptably filled various offices in the church to which they belonged. He was a kind father to her children as well as to his own. In the spring of 1851 they removed to Herrick, Penna., where she spent the remaining years of her life.

George Frederick⁵ Skilton was b. in the house near the Morris line at North Watertown, which was erected by James⁴ Skilton in 1801.

He was m. first to Wealthy Maria Munn, at the old Methodist Episcopal Church, at North Watertown, of which it is

said that his father built one corner of it.

His second marriage, to Abigail Wilcox, took place at the home of the bride's uncle, Joshua Richards, of Winsted, Conn.

In order that he might stay at home and take care of his father and mother, he gave up an offer from his older brother,

a physician, to study medicine with him.

In his home life he was a happy, cheerful husband and a kind, impartial parent. In his work on the farm and in business he was distinguished for his industry and perseverance. In business relations he was respected as a man whose word could be depended upon on all occasions. On July 24, 1837, he united with the Methodist Church, of which he was a member up to his death. His first church associations were with the Methodists in the north part of Watertown, where he held various offices of trust. After the church services were discontinued at the North End, he, with his family, attended the Methodist Church in Bethlehem. Soon after the church was organized in Watertown he began attending there, and, although he never transferred his membership from the old parent church, he was appointed to several responsible positions, which he held for a number of years. He was a firm believer in the Christian religion as based on the Word of God. He was at one time nominated for Representative, but declined the nomination. Still, he accepted many responsible town offices and filled them with credit.

He was a quiet, unassuming man, but his religious life was such that it exerted a marked influence in the community

where he spent his days.

He was gored by a cow June 8, 1895, and d. at his home in Watertown, Conn., July 18, 1895.

His last request was that the open Bible be placed upon his

casket instead of flowers.

At his funeral, which took place from the Methodist Church, in Watertown, the Rev. Mr. Tolles officiated. The little church was packed to its utmost. His pallbearers, all nephews, were: Julius James Skilton, George Steele Skilton, Joel White Skilton, Artison Skilton Clark, Halsey Steele Clark and William DeWitt Watkins. Interment was at Evergreen Cemetery, Watertown, Conn.

Abigail Wilcox, when eighteen months old, was taken by her father with his family from Connecticut to Ohio, part of the

way by "prairie schooner" and the rest by canal. He was of the "Connecticut Western Reserve" and an original settler of the town of Litchfield, removing later to Penfield, Ohio.

Her early life in the wilderness was attended by many hardships. She often told of an experience before her father had finished the log cabin where they lived, the door of which was a blanket, how wolves came dangerously close to the house while she, a babe, lay in her cradle. On another occasion, her father killed five deer, before breakfast, in the clear-

ing surrounding the cabin.

In June, 1849, Abigail came to Winsted, Conn., to visit friends and while there met George Frederick⁵ Skilton. They were m. at her uncle's home in Winsted and went to live at the Skilton Homestead in North Watertown, where she resided until November, 1895, after her husband's death, when she removed to Waterbury, and made her home with her youngest dau, until January, 1910. At this time she went to live with her son, James George⁶, at Watertown, Conn., where she d. May 18, 1910. She is bur. in Evergreen Cemetery, Watertown, Conn.

The success of the Skilton Family Reunions was largely due to "Aunt Abigail" and her contemporaries, for her husband's relatives were hers, and her kind hospitality and cordial greeting will never be forgotten by those who came under her influence. Her church membership extended over a period of

seventy-one years of active Christian life.

Born in the old Capt. James Skilton place in the French Mountain District, Watertown, Conn., Mary Augusta⁵ Skilton was the tenth and last child of Capt. James and Chloe (Steele) Her early years were passed under the home roof, attending school in the District, learning spinning and knitting and all housewifely duties. Later she spent six years in Troy, N. Y., in the home of her brother, Dr. Avery Skilton. four of these years, she attended the Emma Willard School for girls, graduated from that institution. The last two years of the six, she taught school in Troy. Gifts showered upon her by her pupils prove her a favorite teacher.

The old Clark homestead in Prospect, built in 1799, with ample fireplaces, its twenty-four paned windows, its tall clock fastened against a beam of the living room, was the first and only married home of this youngest daughter of Capt. Skilton.

Fair of face and full of faith in her husband, Mary began married life here December 29, 1847. If the grandfather clock did not strike twenty-four as Merit Clark entered at the door with his blushing Mary, it was at least present to do so, and ticked more than its ninety years without slumbering in its place against the wall.

Judging from the silk wedding gown, bridal wreath, dainty kid and prunella shoes, linen and silver dower, and other belongings, she made, for those times, a well dressed, well provided for bride. Mary was the kind of wife and mother who put home first and foremost in her attention. An active church member, teacher in the Sunday School, President of the Ladies' Aid Society, yet her best efforts were expended for her home and home friends. She was especially well known for her quaint humor and her constantly sunny nature.

After bearing, with great patience, years of semi-invalidism, she passed away, August 26, 1901, at Prospect, Conn.; bur. there.

Merit⁸ Clark (Merit⁷, Isaac⁶, Isaac⁵, Thomas⁴, Samuel³, Thomas², George²), the second son of Merit⁷ and Keturah (Smith) Clark, was b. at the Clark homestead in Prospect, Conn. His childhood was spent on the home farm, learning the many industries in one—farming. He attended the District School and later was a student at Wilbraham Academy.

Of a saving and industrious nature, Merit enjoyed the life of his family and the town, being an active member of the Congregational Church, which he joined with his wife, July 4, 1858. He also conducted himself with esteem and approval in school, road and other town affairs. In 1861, and again in 1871, Merit represented his town in the State Legislature. He was present when word was brought that Fort Sumter had been fired upon.

Merit's love of affairs patriotic and especially for Abraham Lincoln was shown when he and his brother Gould were at work in the field one day. Word was passed through the town that Lincoln had been shot. This news was so stunning that Merit collapsed.

After two years of trying inactivity, Merit Clark died February 1, 1894, at Prospect, Conn.; bur. there.







A beautiful volume was published containing the Proceedings of the Senate, State of Minnesota, in Memoriam of the Life and Services of the late Lieutenant Governor John L. Gibbs, February 4, 1909. From this booklet we reprint an Extract from the Official Journal of the Senate:

"Memorial Services, John L. Gibbs.

"The hour having arrived for the memorial service in memory of the late John L. Gibbs, addresses were made by Messrs, Cashman, Thorpe, Hall, Anderson and Schaller.

"Mr. Cashman offered the following preamble and resolu-

tion:

"'Ex-Lieutenant Governor John LaPorte Gibbs died at his home in Owatonna, Minnesota, November 28, 1908. He was born in Pennsylvania, in the year 1838. After receiving a collegiate education in his native state, he entered Ann Arbor University and graduated from the Law Department in 1861, and, after many hardships, arrived in Albert Lea, Minnesota, where he commenced the practice of his chosen profession. In the fall of 1862 he was elected County Attorney of Freeborn County, and the following year was elected a member of the House of Representatives from the district comprising Steele, Freeborn and Waseca Counties.

"'Mr. Gibbs represented his district in the Legislature at five different sessions thereof, and was one of the most hardworking, prominent and conscientious members of that body. In 1877 he was elected Speaker of the House of Representatives, which honor was conferred upon him again in 1885. In 1887 he was appointed a member of the Railroad Commission, and reappointed in 1889. He was elected Lieutenant Governor in 1896 and presided over the Senate at the legislative session of 1897. As presiding officer of the Senate, Mr. Gibbs displayed those qualities of mind and heart which carried him so successfully through many campaigns, and which compelled the respect of all who came in contact with him.

"'As a public officer he made the interests of the State his own. Though a man of strong convictions, he was open-minded, fair and tolerant of the views and opinions of others. His courtesy towards his opponents and those who differed with him was the result of the promptings of his kind heart and of his broad and tolerant disposition.

"'It is but right and proper that the body over which Mr. Gibbs presided and which he honored by his presence should, as a token of the high esteem in which he was held, place upon its Journal a permanent record thereof.

"'Therefore, we respectfully submit the foregoing brief statement as an expression of the honor due to the memory of one who wrought so well in laying the foundations of this State, and we ask that the same may be entered upon the Journal of this Senate, and that a copy thereof, duly authenticated by the President and Secretary of the Senate, be forwarded to the bereaved widow and family of the deceased.

by a rising vote of the Senate.





The following is found in the Pennsylvania Archives, Sixth Series, Volume Two, page 797:

"Camp Security, Oct. 7, 1781.

"These are to certify that John Sowers hath Served his tower of Two Months in the Fifth Class of York County Militia under the command of Major Edie.

Thos. Orbison, Captain."

This is all the information I find on file in this office regarding John Sowers.

After the close of the war he m. Mary Ann Kramer, and settled near Gwinn's Mills, some eighteen miles from Baltimore, Maryland. At this home a family of four sons and one daughter were born and grew to manhood, or womanhood. About 1814 John³ Sowers, with his four sons and John Sowers⁵ Davis, only child of his deceased daughter, Mary Ann⁴ (Sowers) Davis, moved to Fairfield, Lancaster County, Ohio, where they resided a year, pending the settlement of disturbances among the Indians of the lake region. In 1815 he settled, with his family, at Monroeville, Huron County, Ohio, where he purchased seven hundred acres of land, paying therefor twenty-one hundred silver dollars brought from the old home in Maryland.

Drake, who states that he is a member of the Sons of Veterans; that in his capacity as such, it was his duty to take charge of the decoration of soldiers' graves in Ridgefield Township on Memorial Day; that he was the Custodian of the Roll of Honor of Ridgefield Township, which contained the names of all soldiers, so far as known, who served in the Armies of the United States, or United Colonies, of America, and are buried in said township; that said Roll of Honor bears the name of John Sowers, as a Revolotionary Soldier; that said John Sowers is buried in Riverside Cemetery, Monroeville, Ohio, his grave being marked with a stone bearing an inscription stating that he died July 23, 1820, aged sixty-three years; that said grave has for a number of years been marked as that of a Revolutionary Soldier; that said grave has been regularly decorated on Memorial Day for a long term of years.

John Sowers⁵ Davis (Mary Ann⁴ Sowers, John³, John², John¹), who was b. March 28, 1806, in Baltimore County, Maryland, was the s. of Jesse Davis and Mary Ann⁴ (Sowers) Davis. He m. May 17, 1843, at Galion, Ohio, Catharine Pasco³ Nave; d. July 1, 1888, at Monroeville, Ohio; interred in Davis-Skilton Vault, Riverside Cemetery, Monroeville, Ohio.

*John Sowers Davis of Monroeville died July 1st, 1888, aged 82 years, 3 months and 3 days.

The deceased was born March 28, 1806, in Baltimore County, Maryland. His parents were Jesse and Mary Ann Davis, his mother being the only daughter of John and Mary Ann Sowers. She died when he was but a few weeks old, and his maternal grandparents then adopted him.

After his mother's death his father removed to Pennsylvania and was subsequently twice married; first, to Miss Hunt, who bore him two children, Mary and Jackson, and last to Miss Sewell, who bore him one child, Anne Eliza. He died in the

village of Shrewsbury, York County, Penna., in the year 1833. In the year 1814 John S. Davis came with his maternal grand-parents to Fairfield, Lancaster County, Ohio, and in 1815 he removed with his grandparents to Ridgefield township, they being the third family which had taken up their permanent settlement in the township. Their log cabin was erected on the land now known as the Cone farm, being land known as Lot four, Section four, of Ridgefield township, a portion of which land is now a part of the village of Monroeville.

Here his grandfather, John Sowers, Sr., died July 23, 1820, aged sixty-three years; and his grandmother Sowers died May 21, 1848, aged ninety-three years. His grandparents left four sons, Moses, John, Daniel, and James, with the oldest of whom, Moses, who with his grandmother continued to live on the home farm, Mr. Davis made his home until he became of age.

In 1815 Ridgefield township comprised the territory now included in the townships of Ridgefield, Sherman, Lyme, and the south half of Oxford township. As a boy Mr. Davis witnessed the first township election ever held in Ridgefield township, which authentic tradition says (the records being lost) was held in the spring of 1816, the township having been organized under the laws of the state the first Monday of December, 1815. At the spring election of 1816, witnessed by Mr. Davis and his few pioneer playmates, the following persons comprised the voting population of this wide range of territory: Joseph F. Reed, Daniel Sherman, Sanders Littlefield, George Pierce, Seth Brown, Daniel Page, John Sowers, Sr., John Sowers, Jr., Moses Sowers (the last two Mr. Davis's uncles), David Underhill, John Hahn, Thos. Webb, Adam and George Wires, Thos. Dickey, Richard Henry, George Burt, John Burt, Salmon Drake, and a Mr. Strong.

In 1817 he was present when his grandfather and Seth Brown, his pioneer neighbor on the north, set off a portion of their adjoining lands into a village plat, laying it off into business and residence lots, naming the first hamlet in this section, Monroe Village, the name being selected by Seth Brown, who had, while serving in the army of 1813, married Mrs. Sarah Tuttle, at Monroe, Michigan. When a few years afterwards a postoffice was established, the name was changed to Monroeville to avoid mistakes and confusion in transmitting mail.

About this time, 1817, the first log school house in the township was erected on what authentic tradition says is the pres-



ent location of Mr. John Hosford's residence. The first school was taught by George H. Burt, and the names of John S. Davis and his youngest uncle, James Sowers, appear among the little group of pioneer scholars. The full list of scholars, many of whom traveled miles from their log cabin homes to attend, is as follows: John S. Davis, James Sowers, Augustus H. Hubbell, Benjamin, Isaac and Rachael Spicer, Nelson and Orrin Brown, William and Rachael Fletcher, Diantha and Minerva Littlefield, Celia and Louisa Hubbell, Hosea and Almon Hunt. In this same historic school house, with John S. Davis and his little group of classmates as interested spectators, in 1818 the first church organization in Ridgefield township was formed, being the founding of the Baptist church, although missionary preaching by other denominations was held in the same log school house from the earliest settlement. Thus under the same roof was the rugged and substantial intellectual and moral training of John S. Davis and his associates prosecuted and impressed.

Reliable tradition tells us that William Frink, a hunter, was the first white man who attempted to establish a home in Ridgefield township. This was in 1811, when he erected a log cabin on the spot where the Samuel Clock residence now The Indians drove him away and in the spring of 1812 he sold out to Seth Brown who, prior to this date, had been in New Orleans, but in 1811 was driven by the ravages of yellow fever to seek safety in a more northern clime, and with only his trusty rifle as his companion, protector and support, killing game for his daily meal, he walked all the distance from that plague stricken city to Ridgefield township, where, as above stated, he became in 1812 the purchaser of the Frink land and cabin, thus becoming the first settler of Ridgefield township, and planted a patch of corn; but the same year the Indians again took the war path under the influence of British gold, and he was forced for safety to enter the United States army at Monroe, Mich. Here, as before stated, he married, and in 1813 returned to his cabin home in Ridgefield township, and established the first home in this section.

The second home builder in the township was Sanders Littlefield, who came originally from Crown Point, New York. He arrived here, it is claimed, in 1814, and the grandparents of John S. Davis, as before stated, in the spring of 1815 became the third family of home builders in the township. After which, the war with England and the Indians having ended,

immigration became more rapid because more safe. The first successful efforts to establish civilization in this section of country were thus witnessed and participated in by the deceased, and the courage, the energy, the industry and privation required from the pioneer sons as well as fathers and mothers, developed strong and sturdy characteristics and made them successful and essential instruments in laying deep and solid the foundation of our free institutions and opening up the magic development of the great Northwest Territory.

At his majority the deceased became the owner of forty acres of land on the western part of his grandfather's farm, and here by his industry and economy in a few years he was enabled to accumulate sufficient means to engage in mercantile business, and in 1835 at about the age of thirty years, he removed to Lexington, Richland County, where in 1836 he entered into partnership with Mr. J. Bloomer in the dry goods In February, 1838, Mr. Davis and his partner removed their business to Galion, Crawford County, and engaged in merchandizing, and subsequently in 1850, in the same place, engaged in banking, becoming members of the firm of "Atwood, Davis & Bloomer", doing business as the Exchange Bank of Galion, and afterwards became interested in the First National Bank of the same place and in the Farmers National Bank of Mansfield. Mr. Davis remained in Galion until 1866, when he returned to Monroeville.

While living at Galion, on the 17th of May, 1843, he married Catharine Nave. They have had four children, of whom two daughters are still living, (John and Kittie died in infancy). The oldest daughter, Amanda J., married Capt. Alvah Stone Skilton in Galion on December 20th, 1865; the youngest daughter is Mary Elizabeth.

In 1866 Mr. Davis returned to Monroeville, purchasing the brick residence of Mr. S. V. Harkness, on Main Street, which has since continued to be the family homestead. The same year he went into partnership with Mr. C. S. Crim and Mr. H. P. Stentz, forming the banking firm of Davis, Crim & Stentz, known as the Exchange Bank of Monroeville. To illustrate the confidence the public had manifested in the integrity and sound financial ability of this firm it is only necessary to state that during the panic and financial crash of 1872 and 1873, when many of the oldest banking institutions of the country had to close their doors, this firm had an average liability to depositors of \$150,000, not an hour passed during those dark days but that the Exchange Bank was ready to pay every demand on call. In 1879 the firm Davis, Crim &

Stentz merged the Exchange Bank into the "First National Bank of Monroeville", which opened business with the following Board of Directors: J. S. Davis, C. S. Crim, H. P. Stentz, O. W. Head and S. D. Fish. The two latter each served as President until their death; Mr. Davis being its President at the time of his death; Mr. H. P. Stentz having continued as Cashier of both the Exchange Bank and the present institution from 1866 to the present time.

The foregoing facts sufficiently indicate the success of the deceased as a business man. He had a naturally religious nature; his charities were many but always unostentatious. As a true friend, none could be more faithful, and those who had known him the longest and most intimately, were the ones who most deeply feel the loss of his taking off.

His manly, chivalric confidence in a faithful friend, was most touchingly exemplified, when upon opening his last will and testament, for probate last Saturday, it was found that after making a just distribution of the fortune so honorably earned, the deceased had appointed his faithful business associate, Henry P. Stentz, as executor of the will, and requested that no bonds be required of him.

A FEW CORRECTIONS IN OUR ACCOUNT OF THE EARLY LIFE OF JOHN S. DAVIS

Editor of the Spectator:

In your issue of the 12 inst, is a biography of Mr. John S. Davis, so lately deceased, in which occur some historical The writer says, "About this time, 1817, the first log school house in the township was erected on what authentic tradition says is the present location of Mr. John Hosford's residence." The first school house was of logs and stood on the east side of Main Street, about where the residence lately occupied by Mr. W. H. VanHorn now stands, but a little nearer the top of the bank east. In a few years a frame building was built where Mr. Hosford's house now stands. This house was called the "old schoolhouse", and many of the village people remember it as "the first school house", while but few remember the old log house. Mr. Davis and the writer of this looked over the ground and located this log house not many years ago. We write this as an historical correction of where the first school house stood.

Further on the writer says, "Reliable tradition tells us that Wm. Frink, a hunter, was the first white man who attempted to establish a home in Ridgefield township." This is another historical error; the first white man who made his home in

this corporation was Reuben Pixley, who built a pole cabin near a spring, a little west of the present home of Mrs. W. R. Jackson. There he lived when Mr. Frink came to this country, and as early as 1810, Pixley's son Reuben, with his Uncle Seymour, were surprised and the uncle killed by the Indians, about the first year of the war of 1812, the Pixley boy being taken prisoner and carried to Detroit.

With these historical corrections, so far as I know, the account is substantially correct.

While on the subject of Mr. Davis's biography it may not be out of place for me to add my idea of what he was in our community. "He was the friend of age, the guide of youth, and if he had failings (and who has not?) they leaned to virtue's side." His social relation was of that kind that made all men cheerful in his presence. While he had no ostentatious or false pride, yet he was a proud man—proud that he had lived, and that in his humble way he had added something to the work and to the good of mankind. He was a cheerful man and loved his friends and all who had any relations with him. In truth it may be said of him that he was an honest man and it has been said that kind of a man "was the noblest work of God" and of him it may be truly said that:

"If there is another world he lives in bliss, If there is none he made the best of this."



May 17, 1843, she was married to John S. Davis, of Galion, and to them were born four children, two of whom, the only son and a daughter, died in infancy. Two daughters, Mrs. Amanda J. Skilton and Mrs. Thos. W. Latham, née Miss Mame Davis, and four grandchildren, reside in Monroeville.

In May, 1866, Mr. and Mrs. Davis moved from Galion to Monroeville, the former home of Mr. Davis, where in ease and

comfort were spent the remainder of their days.

Mrs. Davis united with the Presbyterian Church of Galion, in 1864, and July 8, 1866, she joined by letter the Presbyterian Church of Monroeville, continuing a faithful member of that organization till the time of her decease.

For five years prior to her death Mrs. Davis was an invalid and though during this period all that medical skill and tender nursing could do was done for her, she yet endured such suf-

ferings as perhaps few in this world have undergone.

She died peacefully at her home, surrounded by relatives and friends, Thursday, February 6, 1890, aged sixty-seven years, seven months, and twenty-six days.

Alvah Stone⁶ Skilton was b. in what was then the wilderness of the Connecticut Western Reserve, in Northern Ohio. While he was a babe his mother died, leaving her husband with five small children. The father, in primitive surroundings, was compelled to make such provision as he could for these children and sent the older ones to be cared for by his parents in Connecticut. In his arms he carried the infant son, Alvah Stone, and placed him in the charge of good neighbors, Jonathan Thompson and his wife, Caroline, with whom the boy lived until youth, toward whom he ever cherished a devoted affection and for whom he made tender, generous provision in their declining years.

Elijah Steeles Skilton made entry in his diary and account

book: "J. C. Thompson Cr

1838 March 8, this day bound my child to said J. C. Thompson and balanced all back deal for said child by giving in one half of a note given to me by him for twenty dolls bearing date May 30, 1837, he giving me his note for remaining half and half of back interest. E. S. Skilton."

The lad had but meager opportunity for attending school. This fact made him the more keen during after life in his steady purpose to seek education for himself and his children.

He had scarcely emerged from boyhood when he entered the service of the Bellefontaine and Indianapolis Rail Road, now a part of the Big Four Road of the Vanderbilt System, and at the age of eighteen years he had become a locomotive engineer with a high reputation for skill, reliability and speed.

November 1, 1861, he enlisted in the Union Army. On February 10, 1862, he was commissioned Captain of Company I, 57th Regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantry, subsequently Ohio Veteran Volunteer Infantry, to which he was attached until the close of the war. This Regiment was a part of the Army of the Tennessee and participated in all the important battles and campaigns of that Army.


Captain Skilton was four times wounded-once at the Battle of Shiloh, April 6, 1862, when a bullet shattered both bones of his right fore arm, shortening it two inches, and causing intense suffering as long as he lived; once at Kenesaw Mountain, where he was struck in the leg by a bullet; once in the hip by a fragment of a shell fired at night by a Confederate gunner whose attention was attracted by the blaze of a match a soldier struck to light his pipe; and a fourth time at the Battle of Atlanta, July 22, 1864, when he was hit on the head by a missile and was believed to have been killed. He was captured at this battle and spent the remaining period of the war either in Confederate prisons, or in vain endeavor to make his way back to the Union lines. His diary, kept during this time, shows that he was prisoner at the following places: Camp Oglethorpe, Macon, Charleston (where he was confined in a negro work house, under fire of the Union guns for six weeks), Salisbury, Columbia, Asheville (where he was placed in an iron prison cage), Castle Thunder, Libby. last named prison he was liberated April 2, 1865, and on the thirteenth of the same month he was honorably discharged from the service of the United States.

When the war ended, he returned to railroading for a short time, but soon after his marriage he became a grain, seed, coal and lumber merchant and farmer at Monroeville, Ohio, maintaining these activities up to the time of his death.

He always evinced a strong interest in the affairs of his old soldier comrades, especially those which concerned their widows and orphans. He was appointed the first Chairman of the Huron County Soldiers Relief Commission, a position he held until he died. He was one of the organizers and the first Commander of Asa R. Hillyer Post, No. 532, Grand Army of the Republic, at Monroeville, Ohio.

While the morning sun of strong manhood beamed upon him and while life's shadows were yet lying toward the west, his eyes beheld the things which are eternal and he fell on sleep.

May he rest in peace and may light everlasting enfold him! He d. July 27, 1887, at Monroeville, Ohio; interred in Davis-

James Avery⁶ Skilton, subject of this memorial, was the son of Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton, a leading physician in Troy, N. Y., who was in advance of his time in many of his theories and practice, and whose brilliant and original treatments and surgical operations are still remembered and quoted with deference among many of the physicians of the present day His early education was in the common schools in Troy. After a course at a private school in Williamstown, Mass., he took the scientific course at the Renssalaer Polytechnic Institute, at Troy, N. Y., completing his education at Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn. In 1847, he was called, by reason of the severe illness of his father, to take charge of his business, showing superior ability and tact in management of same. In 1851, owing to imperfect health, he visited England, taking passage in a sailing vessel. his stay of nine or ten months, he made many clear-sighted observations, and wrote home most interesting letters. While in England he secured valuable data regarding the genealogy of the Skilton family. Among these were records found in St. Michael's Church, in Coventry.

On his return he visited Savannah, Ga., where he was interested in business projects until the breaking out of the Civil War.

In the spring of 1861, as he was planning to leave the South,

he had an opportunity to join a party of southern officials, who with Gen. Beauregard, who was in command of the Southern forces, were on a tour of inspection of the batteries which were soon to make an attack on Fort Sumter. night he wrote to his brother Charles, who was then in Savannah, that no one could see what he had seen and hear what he had heard that day and not believe that South Carolina was in On account of the war his business in the South had to be abandoned and he took up the study of law, graduating

at the Albany Law School, later making a specialty of patent

law, becoming a brilliant and successful practitioner.

During his years of professional work he continued the sociological and philosophical studies to which he had always been devoted. He became a member and Corresponding Secretary of the Brooklyn Ethical Association, which has among its correspondents the noted scientists, Herbert Spencer, Thomas Huxley, and other prominent leaders of thought. At the time of the World's Congresses at the World's Fair at Chicago, in 1893, it was Mr. Skilton who inaugurated and presided over the Evolution Congress which was participated in by many brilliant and prominent men of the time. He was an ardent member and supporter of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, during the pastorates of Henry Ward Beecher, Dr. Lyman Abbott and Dr. Hillis, the last of whom conducted his funeral services, paying a feeling tribute to his worth and substantial Christian character.

His mind was an unusual one, grasping generalities and possibilities rather than details, and he was looked upon as

one of the advanced thinkers of the age.

After an illness of three weeks he passed away at his home in Brooklyn, N. Y., on February 19, 1904. Mr. Skilton had always been active in sustaining the interest of the family reunions, and will be greatly missed at their subsequent meetings.

Both wives of James Avery⁶ Skilton were brilliant and interesting women. They were close friends. They taught Sunday School in the Rochester Avenue Mission School and

belonged to the same Shakespeare Club.

Sarah Agnes Sheppard was beloved by a wide circle, and was said to have an unusual "talent for friendship". She was a successful teacher of the piano before marriage and played the organ in the church.

She was Secretary of the Zenana Band of the above Mission. She was a rare story teller, possessed of a great fund upon which she could draw off hand, having elocutionary ability and a keen sense of humor, all contributing to her

unusual social powers.

Julia Serena ([Davis] Bishopric) Skilton began to teach when sixteen and until her marriage was a teacher of Latin at the Packer Collegiate Institute, Brooklyn, N. Y. Her father was an accomplished scholar, and professor of languages at Columbia College. She was President of the Zenana Board of the Rochester Avenue Mission.

Witty and quick at repartee, she had a wide circle of friends. A remarkable memory for history, poetry and general literature, which rendered her a most interesting conversationalist. An extensive reader, keeping up with the times, she gave of her efforts weekly for a considerable period in reading to the blind in an institution. Her daughter, Celinda Davis (Bishopric) Abbot, by her first marriage, is a teacher of languages at the Medill High School, Chicago.

*Mary T. Skilton, daughter of Dr. Avery J. and Mary Augusta (Candee) Skilton, was born in Troy, N. Y.

She numbers among her honorable ancestry some early Governors of Connecticut, and the Hon. John Allyn, "The Secretary" of the Colony so instrumental in preserving the rights of the people about the period of the Charter Oak episode and subsequently, and was a direct descendant from the brother of the man who was supposed to have concealed the charter in the famous tree, and from most of the prominent persons of the so-called "Dorchester Colony".

The father of Mary T. Skilton was born in Watertown, Conn., and was an eminent physician in Troy, N. Y. Her mother was a native of New Haven, Conn.

The early education of Miss Skilton was pursued in the select schools of Troy, notably that of Miss Eliza Anthony. She studied French with private teachers and with her father. Her delicate health precluded a continuous course of study, and during her attendance upon Troy Seminary, in 1845, her recitations were confined to the morning sessions.

In 1848 or 1849 she was a pupil in a New Jersey boarding-school, but returned to Troy Seminary for the year 1851. Owing to her frail health and sensitive eyes, her lessons could only be prepared by daylight, and her parents deemed it unwise to subject her to the more rigorous duties incident to graduation; in place of which she occupied her last year with music and painting. After leaving the Seminary she spent two years as governess in a family in Georgia.

She married Henry L. Palmer, and has lived successively in Troy, New York City, Washington, D. C., Savannah, Ga., and

in recent years in Brooklyn, N. Y.

She has been interested in various philanthropies: a prominent officer of the "Brooklyn Nursery and Infants' Hospital", for some years a member of the Brooklyn "Young Women's Christian Association", the "Brooklyn Woman's Club", and the Barnard Club, the "Woman's Health Protective Association" of Brooklyn, "Fort Greene Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution," Brooklyn, N. Y., National Number 17082; by descent from Dr. Henry² Skilton. She was Vice-President of the "Emma Willard Association." She prepared the "Partial Catalogue" of the former pupils of the Troy Seminary, the compilation of which involved no little perplexing labor. She served as the efficient Secretary of the "Biographical Committee" of the "Emma Willard Association." She was a member of Plymouth Church of Brooklyn, under the pastorates of Henry Ward Beecher and his successor, Dr. Lyman Abbott.

Henry Lyman Palmer was a descendant of Walter Palmer, and Zacheus Candee, all Connecticut stock. This branch of the Palmers lived several generations in Stonington, Conn., and then branched off to Stillwater, Saratoga County, N. Y., where they also lived for three generations. Stillwater was formerly called "Palmer's Falls". The Candees were of New Haven and Oxford, Conn. Henry Palmer was quite a young man when he went to Troy to make a start for himself, and was there soon interested in modest enterprises of his own initiation, among which was a printing and bookbinding con-

cern, "Burns & Palmer".

At the close of the Civil War he became the representative of the Troy concern of Fuller, Warren & Co., Stoves, etc., in the Southern States, having control of that large territory for

the introduction of their goods.

Then for some years he was in charge of the New York City branch of the Fuller-Warren Company on Water Street, which he gave up to start in New York the making of sheet metal goods with his brother-in-law, Charles Candee Skilton, the

firm being Palmer & Skilton.

He subsequently established a stock company for the extensive manufacture of sheet metal goods, of iron, steel, copper, brass, with embossing, plating, etc., called the "Palmer Manufacturing Co.", with factory in Brooklyn, and offices in Pearl Street, New York.

He lived mostly in Brooklyn, where in 1894 and for four years he was Deputy Park Commissioner of Prospect Park.

Henry Palmer had no children. He was a genial man, a good friend and of generous impulses. The great number of

men who worked for him, at one time or another, though they may have gone into other service, always remembered

him with something akin to affection.

He was buried in the Skilton Lot, No. 6, Section G, Oakwood Cemetery, Troy, N. Y., beside his wife. You may stand and meditate at their graves upon the hills which look down upon the valley of the Hudson. A mile to the Westward you see the broad surface of the river as it flows Southward and you may recall that this view has not changed since we buried in this spot Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton and later his wife Mary Augusta, and before that his brother Julius Gardner⁵ Skilton. Three generations are already represented here. A fourth and perhaps some of the fifth will join them and come to rest in this beautiful spot.

Julius Augustus⁶ Skilton, B. N. S., A. B., A. M., M. D., carefully and liberally educated, was graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute of Troy in 1849; from Wesleyan University of Middletown, Conn., in 1853, and concluded with a professional course at the Albany Medical College in 1855, receiving from each high and honorable degrees.

An associate partner with his father, Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton, an old and leading physician, in 1853 he entered upon the practice of his profession in his native city, receiving from it several positions of trust, of which were the appointment of

City Physician and member of the Board of Education.

Among the first to enlist at the beginning of our civil struggle in '61, he was made Assistant Surgeon of the 30th New York Regiment, one of the earliest organizations volunteering

for our country's defense.

With the opening of the campaign of '62, he was promoted to full surgeoncy of the 87th N. Y. Regiment of Volunteers, and with it saw active and severe service during the entire Peninsula Campaign, including those seven days of fearful carnage before Richmond, in which, as operating surgeon, he scarcely saw time to eat or sleep. Volunteering to remain in charge of our wounded at Charles City Cross Roads, Dr. Skilton was made prisoner, and, contrary to the rules of war governing non-combatants, was taken to Libby Prison.

We quote from Rev. J. J. Marks, in his volume of "The Peninsula Campaign in Virginia", published in 1864: had no definite report of the two last battles, and knew nothing certain in regard to the fate of our army, until Dr. Skilton of the 87th New York came in from Gatewood House, on the He had been detailed to remain with our Nelson Farm. wounded at this house, within the enemy's lines, and being destitute of medicine and food, had ridden across country, under guard, to Savage Station, for sanitary and medical stores. Dr. Skilton was one of the most self-denving of our His labors constant and humane, surgeons. from field to field, from cabin to cabin, looking after those who had been wounded, and left without attendant and help. And in the hospital at the Gatewood House, he was unwearied and sleepless, in his efforts to alleviate pain, and meet the wants of the hour. The severity of his exertions were well nigh fatal, for he was brought up to Richmond, very ill with typhoid fever, and thrust into Libby Prison, where for some time his life hung by a single thread. I was glad to meet him later, returned to his post of duty, with recruited health and strength."

With the fearful carnage of those days of strife, the 87th became so dismembered in ranks, that the few remaining were incorporated in other commands, and Dr. Skilton, with other officers, was mustered out. He was, however, subsequently commissioned to the surgeoncy of the 14th New York Cavalry, then being recruited and organized in New York City, also as examining surgeon. Here, too, during the perilous negro riots of 1863, he was on constant duty, day and night, until

they were suppressed.

December of the same year found him with his regiment transferred to New Orleans, where at once he was promoted to be Medical Director of Cavalry of the Department of the Gulf, on Gen. Banks's staff, taking part as such in the Red River Campaign, where he was wounded in the foot, at Cane River Crossing, by a fall from his horse. Still as Medical Director of Cavalry of the Department of the Gulf, and with Gen. Grierson's forces, operating in Florida and Alabama, he was present at the taking of Fort Blakely, and subsequent engagements of that campaign, and was mustered out among the last of our country's heroes.

All through the war, Dr. Skilton was in active and perilous service, marked by unusual skill and faithfulness that brought testimonials of gratitude, not alone from the ranks of our own brave boys, but from many wearing the gray, whose lives were saved by his impartial desire to alleviate suffering, whether amid friends or foes.

At the close of the war, he was offered a commission of Lieutenant in the Regular Army in recognition of his faithful and distinguished services, but did not accept same.

When the French intervention was staggering to its fall, in 1866, he went to Vera Cruz as special correspondent for the New York Herald to watch the operations and learn the intention of the French, besieged by the Mexican Army at that port. By his indomitable energy and determination, he succeeded in sending out to the world by cable, the first reliable information obtained. For this he narrowly escaped being shot as a spy. Only a timely warning enabled him to reach, in disguise, the friendly protection of a foreign vessel, lying in the harbor of Vera Cruz, on which he escaped to New Orleans.

With the close of the intervention and death of Maximilian, he returned to Mexico as Medical Officer of the escort of President Jaurez's family, who in New Orleans had been awaiting the issue of events, and with them reached the capital in July, 1867, not long after the triple execution at Queretero.

Dr. Skilton was deputed by the Mexican Government to examine and identify the remains of Maximilian while "en transit" to Vera Cruz, where Admiral Tegetthof, of the Austrian Navy, on the Frigate "Elizabeth", was waiting to receive and transport them to Austria, and thus he was the last person to view the body of the unfortunate prince before its removal from Mexican soil.

Later he was successful in procuring the release of the imperial prisoners, among whom was the Prince Salm Salm and Father Fischer, the latter private secretary and confessor of Maximilian, and in gratitude for this service, was presented with valuable souvenirs of the dead Emperor.

In the capacity of special Commissioner of the New York Herald he chronicled many of the important historical events pertaining to the French Intervention and its downfall, giving valuable information not only to the files of the New York Herald and public at large, but reaching to the Government itself and its various departments.

By reason of his close relations with the Government of Mexico, Dr. Skilton was enabled through his published articles, to contribute largely to the history of this unsuccessful effort against republican institutions on this Continent, and to make known the resources and great possibilities of this newly re-established Republic, in fact, was almost pioneer in the firm belief that the day of prosperity had already dawned on revolutionary Mexico.

Dr. Skilton, one of President Grant's first appointees, was made Consul in 1869, and created the first Consul General near the Government of Mexico, in 1872, occupying his position with distinction until the close of Gen. Grant's administration in 1877. During these eight years of consular service, he contributed full and reliable reports on the commercial relations existing between the sister republics, which were considered of great statistical value, and well received, especially in Mexico.

All his life a student, devoted to literature and fine arts, he was made honorary member of the Geographical, Historical, Statistical and Art Societies in Mexico, and was unwearied in obtaining collections of various art and archaeological treasures.

We close with a concluding paragraph from a memorial service pronounced before Lafayette Post, No. 140, of New York City, December 17, 1897, of which he was an honored veteran:

"In Yale University, there is a large archaeological collection of discoveries made by Dr. Skilton at the time of his residence in Mexico. He was Consul General by appointment of President Grant, and during his services acted in special matters for France and Austria.

"Few men have been endowed with the courage and ability shown at various times by our comrade, now at rest from his honorable and faithful career. He was a man whom none

knew but to respect.


"It is not only on the file of American History that our comrade's record is, but, both his work and knowledge have placed him on the files in the world's structure of deeds accomplished."

Harriet Euphrasia Ingersoll was the dau. of Captain Samuel Clark and Laura (Case) Ingersoll and granddaughter of Isaac and Irene (Sweetland) Ingersoll, the latter couple settling in Cazenovia, N. Y., as early as 1805, coming from New England, where Isaac's branch of the Ingersoll family played an important part during the Revolutionary struggle. The ancestry of the family dates back to Richard Ingersoll of Bedfordshire, England, and Salem, Mass., 1629.

Mrs. Skilton was b. at Cazenovia, N. Y., September 3, 1838, where she received her primary education from private teachers. She attended the Cazenovia Seminary three years and finished her education at the Willard Seminary in Troy. She was married June 10, 1856, to Dr. Julius Augustus⁶ Skilton, the second son of Dr. Avery Judd⁵ Skilton and Mary (Candee) Skilton, of Troy, the Reverend Dr. Robert Booth, of

Troy, performing the ceremony.

During the war service of her husband, she spent a winter in camp at Upton Hill, Virginia, where she volunteered as nurse during an epidemic of smallpox, and with other ladies, the wives of officers, attended several functions, including a reception at the White House where she met and conversed with Abraham Lincoln.

During the latter months of the war she went to New Orleans, where Doctor Skilton had received the appointment of Surgeon in Chief of Cavalry of the Department of the Gulf.

In 1868 she joined her husband in Mexico, which was at that time recovering from the French intervention. For some years Mrs. Skilton was special correspondent for the New York Herald and on its payroll. From her pen many interesting news letters appeared during the government reconstruction days and the founding of the liberal republic.

In the year 1872 she with her husband and a party of English and American tourists made a successful ascent of the volcano Popocatapetl. In this party was Arthur Kitchener, a brother

of the late Earl Kitchener, of England.

Upon her return to the United States with her husband a home was established in Brooklyn where she resided until the death of her husband, November 20, 1897. Mrs. Skilton removed to Auburn, N. Y., in 1911, where she resided until she died at the home of her son, Frank Avery Skilton, February 26, 1918. She was a woman of rare culture and singular refinement and although a sufferer from a spinal displacement most of her maturer life, she bore the cross with Christian fortitude and sympathetic tenderness.

*AT REST IN OAKWOOD

Two interments to take place in Oakwood cemetery this afternoon recall old days in Troy and esteemed families connected with them. The remains of Dr. Julius Augustus Skilton, who died in Brooklyn on November 20, 1897, arrived here yesterday afternoon and were taken charge of by Undertaker Rufus G. Millard, who will also take charge, this afternoon, of the remains of Dr. Skilton's widow, Harriet (Ingersoll) Skilton, who died February 26, last, at Auburn, from which city her remains have been brought here, for interment in the family plot in Oakwood.

Mrs. Skilton, who was eighty years of age at the time of her death was a grauate of the Willard Seminary, and was married to Dr. Skilton in 1856. The latter was a son of Dr. Avery Judd Skilton, who was a practicing physician in this city in 1828. Dr. Skilton, whose remains are to be placed beside those of his venerable wife, in beautiful Oakwood this afternoon, was a surgeon of note and served with distinction in the Union army during the Civil War. Mrs. Skilton spent a winter in camp with him at Upton Hill, Va., and, while there acted as a volunteer nurse during an outbreak of smallpox among the soldiers.

During the closing months of the war Dr. and Mrs. Skilton were prominent in Washington military society and frequent guests at President Lincoln's receptions. In 1868 they went to Mexico and from there Mrs. Skilton, who was a correspondent of the New York Herald, sent graphic descriptions of conditions in the border Republic upon the overthrow of the attempt to establish an Empire there. Later she and her husband traveled extensively, one of their traveling companions about the Capital

being Arthur Kitchener, brother of Earl Kitchener.

Upon her husband's death in Brooklyn Mrs. Skilton went to live with her son, Frank A. Skilton, in Auburn, who is here to-day to attend the interment of his venerable parents in the same place

Charles Candee Skilton was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn., of the class of 1855, in which College his two older brothers preceded him.

While preferring business to a professional career, he would have been successful in any intellectual sphere. He was endowed with a remarkably retentive memory, a valued inheritance, which contributed to his conversational qualities and served him as a public speaker at times, on subjects of general

welfare, of local interest as well as politics.

After graduating, and giving two years or so to bookkeeping for James Cusick in Troy, he went to Savannah, Georgia, where his father owned real estate, and was employed there in a commercial house. He was about to be taken into the firm when the Civil War began. He held on there for nearly a year, hopeful that the war would end, and then managed to escape to the North through Kentucky and Tennessee, when threatened with being forced into the Confederate Army.

For a time after the war he represented Albany and Troy Stove Manufacturers, and then joined the firm of Palmer and Skilton, Manufacturers, which was established in New York

and Brooklyn about 1870.

He spent the latter part of his life in the Third Ward, Brooklyn, where as a staunch Republican he did his duty as a patriotic citizen. He was a member of the Union League of Brooklyn for some time. He joined actively in the movement to prevent the absorption of Brooklyn into Greater New York and addressed many public meetings against this consolidation.

His wife was b. Fannie Markel in Adams County, Penna., of German ancestry. She was the youngest but one of a family

of eleven children and inherited a strong constitution.

In early womanhood she went to Baltimore, Md., to live and there married John Snowden Hopkins, who died in the early 60's.

Mrs. Fannie ([Markel] Hopkins) Skilton was a woman of the strongest social instincts. She was unselfish and always a friend to anyone who needed encouragement and sympathy. George Steele Skilton.

George Steele Skilton graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, at Troy, N. Y., with the degree of Civil Engineer in 1868, for which he had prepared in the Troy public schools, and the Amenia Seminary in Dutchess County. Went to Mexico in 1869 to prepare himself for railroad building in that country where his brother Dr. Julius Augustus⁶ Skilton had interested himself in Railway concessions from the Mexican government. The acquisition of the language of the country being of first importance, he took up the compilation of news and prepared many of the correspondent's letters for the New York Herald, after his brother became United States Consul General. Was given his Exequatur as Vice Consul General of the United States by the Government of Mexico, which title he retained for some ten years during two administrations of President Grant and part of Hayes's, taking over the duties of the office from time to time, in the absence of the Consul General, on vacations or otherwise. Was in charge of the United States Consulate at the time that Hon. William H. Seward, ex-United States Secretary of State, visited Mexico as the guest of that nation, and so took part in all the entertainments and formal functions inaugurated in Mr. Seward's honor.

Prepared great number of claims for presentation to the "Mixed Commission" of the two countries under the Seward-Romero Treaty of 1868, with their memorials in two languages. Made trips to New York and Washington in connection with these claims, holding the powers of Attorney of the Claimants, and received and apportioned payments on most of these that were awarded, for ten or a dozen years, until all payments were com-

pleted.

On his first trip to Mexico in 1869 by steamer from New York to Vera Cruz, stopped at Havana, Cuba, where there was great excitement due to the critical condition of the revolution against

Spain, then at its height. Hon. Thomas H. Nelson, his Secretary of Legation and his family came on board there, arriving from New Orleans en route for Mexico, having been appointed by President Grant, Minister Plenipotentiary to Mexico, to relieve General Rosecrans, the appointee of the previous administration. George Steele Skilton was invited by Mr. Nelson to join his party as an attaché of Legation and travel with them from the Port of Vera Cruz to the City of Mexico, in great part by stage, as the railway from the coast was unfinished. They were treated with much ceremony in the various cities along the route. He was also of Mr. Nelson's suite when formally received in the "Salon de los Embajadores" in the "National Palace" by PresidentBenito Juarez, and then at the United States Legation, when he took it over from General Rosecrans. He was frequently on duty at the United States Legation as an attaché during the term of Hon. Thomas H. Nelson and subsequently during the term of office of Hon. John W. Foster (also Minister to Mexico) and both he and his wife, Adah G., contributed to the entertainment of the guests of various nationalities in the many social functions given by Mrs. Foster at the Legation during several years, by reason of linguistic facilities, music, etc.

In engineering work he was first an Assistant Engineer of the construction of the Vera Cruz Railway, and was situated in the famous "Cumbres-de-Maltrata" on the four percent grade, until

the completion of that interesting engineering feat.

He put down an artesian well in the American Cemetery at the City of Mexico and some other constructions there. Subsequently in 1873 and 1874 was in charge of the surveys of the location of the Mexican Central Railroad from the Capital as far north as the City of Leon. This led to his being recalled to Mexico in 1880. from Kansas City, Mo., where he was also on Railroad work, to take charge of construction of the Southern part of the Mexican Central. For this purpose he took on and organized a labor force of about fifteen thousand Mexicans, conducting all business and correspondence in Spanish, and using only Metric System for the work and old Spanish measurements for land areas. He successively had his residence and office in the City of Mexico, Tula, San Juan del Rio, Silao, Guanajuato and Leon. President Porfirio Diaz, who was intensely interested in the construction of the railroads by the American and other companies, was occasionally entertained on the work, and the home maintained in the above towns and cities by the engineer and wife was sufficiently ample for the entertainment from time to time of the Mexican and American Directors and officials in large parties on their trips of inspection, and on Sunday, open house for the young American assistant engineers, of whom there were more than forty on the work. His final title on this work was Chief Engineer until its completion.

After some silver mining work in the Pachuca mining district, and surveys of some local railroads, he went over the mountains from Durango to the Pacific Coast in January, 1884, guided mostly by a compass on his watch chain, to take the management of the Sinaloa and Durango Railroad and to make a reconnaissance through the mountain back-bone of the country for the future extension of the road, at the same time.

This road was then somewhat demoralized by reason of yellow fever which had appeared for the first time on that coast. His wife joined him there from the City of Mexico, via the Mexican Central Railroad to El Paso (then just opened), Sonora to Guaymas, and steamer to Altata, in the state of Sinaloa where she was met by her husband in the Captain of the Port's small boat in the open roadstead some miles to sea. They lived there both in Altata the port, and Culiacan, the Capital of the State of Sinaloa. Both had yellow fever and they lost a valued man house-servant with the disease.

Returning to the United States late in 1885 and after attending to the repairs of his Company's steamer for that year in San Francisco, he sent in his resignation to London, as his wife had acquired malaria and needed a change of climate. Lived in Brooklyn, N. Y., until 1896, while General Manager for some nine years

of the Palmer Manufacturing Company.

In 1894 appointed Assistant Engineer in the Water Department of the City of Brooklyn. Held this position through consolidation and then took over the duties on the New York City Water Shed. Was Chief of the Division of Real Estate of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, covering some twenty-eight thousand acres in the water sheds, and completed a system of many hundreds of maps, clearing up the City's titles, dependent on defective surveys and poor maps of an early period, and settling many disputed property lines due to errors and misunderstandings and had removed some three hundred eighty-five parcels of land from the tax rolls in various counties, for which the City was being incorrectly taxed, the same land being found in some cases, assessed and taxed as many as three times. Removed in 1896 to Rockville Centre, Long Island, on the water shed, bought the home and present residence there in 1901.

This connection with the Water Department of New York City

terminated December 13, 1914.

Became interested in genealogy in 1891, especially that of the Skiltons, Steeles, and Sperrys, with a view to extend the work initiated by his father and continued during several summers as a recreation by his brother, James Avery^a Skilton. Worked on his mother's Sperry ancestry and compiled during twenty-five years of work the descendants of Richard Sperry of New Haven, Conn., 1640, and such other Sperrys as have come to America since, and brought their records down to a recent date, consisting of many

thousand families. This required the inspection of public records in many towns mostly in Connecticut, but also in other New England States, New York, some Western States and several Southern States, which became an annual summer recreation for years, and also the writing of many thousand letters to the living.

Also compiled his wife's ancestry, requiring systematic search of Massachusetts early records, and extensive correspondence during over thirty years, resulting in the elaborate ancestral chart published herewith, in which many lines running back to various first settlers of many surnames, have been for the first time discovered and brought to light.

George Steele⁶ Skilton was Secretary of the Rockville Centre Board of Education and also opened all the District Public Meetings from about 1902 to 1912. For two years following was

President of the Board of Education.

The foregoing account of his life was written by George Steele⁶ Skilton a short time before his death, which occurred January 9, 1921, at his home in Rockville Center, Long Island, New York. He was bur. in the Skilton Lot No. 6, Sec. G, Oakwood Cemetery, Troy, N. Y.

Mention has been made in the Foreword of the vast amount of work done by George Steele⁶ Skilton in gathering information regarding the Skiltons. He labored assiduously for a long period, compiling data included in this volume, as well as

material of great value to other families.



While recording its deep appreciation of his labors as one of its members, the Committee desires to express its regret at the passing of George Steele⁶ Skilton ere he had witnessed the publication of "Dr. Henry Skilton and His Descendants."

Adah Sawyer Gould, wife of George Steele⁶ Skilton, is a descendant, exclusively, of first and early settlers of Massachusetts and New Hampshire. She has the right to membership in the D. A. R. by the military and naval services of three ancestors, and a grandfather also served in the war of 1812.




MATERNAL ANCESTRAL CHART

She met her future husband while on a visit to the City of Mexico, 1872-1874. She was one of a party of Americans which he organized and led to the summit of the volcano Popocatapetl and down into its crater in September, 1874. Thus the longings of her childhood during several years of living at the foot of Popocatapetl and Iztaccihuatl, these grand snow-capped sentinels of the Continent, materialized in an ascent, up to that time supposed to be impossible for a woman to accomplish. (An account of this ascent with names of all those of the party was published in the New York Herald in the late fall of 1874, or a following winter month.)

She took up teaching for several years. Was the teacher of music and modern languages in Mrs. Kutz's Boarding School for Young Ladies, No. 1221 Walnut Street, Philadelphia, Penna., for the last two years previous to her marriage.

She joined her husband in Mexico in July, 1881, and lived with him on his construction work, building the Mexican Central Railroad, Northward. Afterwards they lived two years in Culiacan, State of Sinaloa, where he had the management of the "Sinaloa and Durango Railroad". During these first years of her married life she had her own saddle horse and went with him on many trips and expeditions lasting several days, some for business, others taking in pre-historic monuments and ruins, and natural wonders, such as the pyramid of San Juan Teotihuacan, pyramid of Cholula, ruins at Xochimilco, cave of Cacahuamilpa, Cuernavaca, the great silver mines and silver reduction works of Pachuca and Guanajuato, etc.

Returned to the United States in the fall of 1885, before the birth of her children. The family home has been as follows: at 81 Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, 1886-7; 68 Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, 1887-91; 142 Park Place, 1890-1; 372 Decatur Street, 1891-6; 81 Lincoln Avenue, Rockville Centre, Nassau, Co., from and after 1896. In these homes she devoted herself principally to the physical and mental development of They entered the Froebel Academy (then at her children. Tompkins Avenue Park) which led to her becoming one of the early members of the Froebel Society, a unique Mother's Club connected with the Academy. Upon removal to Rockville Centre she became the first president of the Fortnightly Club, a flourishing woman's organization which, after twenty years, now numbers over one hundred. Her children attended the public schools there and graduated from the High School in 1903 and 1904, Avery Wadsworth having attended Pratt Institute High School, 1900-1902.

Mainly through her foresight and teaching the four members of this family each play some musical instrument.

Catacomb for her burial has been built in the Skilton Lot, No. 6, Sec. G, Oakwood Cemetery, Troy, N. Y.



Ella Frances⁶ Skilton began attendance at the public schools of Troy, Miss Doolittle being the teacher, in the autumn of At this time she was able to read books for young children and was put at once into the First Reader Class. In October, 1851, she was seized with scarlet fever, which left her, after an illness of five months, in an invalid condition with a cough threatening consumption. Her health grew worse until she went, in December, 1854, to Waynesville, Georgia, where she spent the winter in the pine woods. She returned to Troy in May, 1855, her cough gone, and gradually recovered a considerable degree of health. During a few ensuing years she was taught at home by her older sister, Mary Tabitha6 Skilton. In September, 1858, she was considered physically fit to be sent to school and entered Grammar School, from which she passed into the High School in February, 1860. the fall of 1862 she went to Amenia Seminary, Dutchess County, N. Y., and there graduated in July, 1865.

After her marriage to Alexander Bower Plough she went with him to Iowa, where the next seventeen years were spent under pioneer conditions. In October, 1888, Mr. and Mrs. Plough took up their home in St. Paul, Minn., where they

resided until the death of the former, in 1900.

Merritt Clark⁶ Skilton always had a strong interest in the Skilton Family Organization, serving as President for a long term of years, stimulating the enthusiasm of young and old, inculcating a just pride in the family name. He took a prominent part in the affairs of the neighborhood in which he lived. He was a teacher and visitor in the public schools and was noted for the strong emphasis he placed on spelling and reading, his proficiency in the latter bringing great pleasure to others in the home, or neighborhood, gatherings. He represented Watertown in the Connecticut Legislature in 1881 and was frequently elected to other public offices in his home town. He was Junior Warden of Christ Church, Watertown, for twelve years, of which he was a member for thirty-eight years, and was Sunday School Superintendent for seventeen He owned and operated the Skilton Mill in North vears. Watertown.

Sarah Ann Nichols, while a pupil in the district school, met her future husband, who was then her teacher.

Her married life, in her devotion to her home, in the care of her four children, revealed an unusually earnest character.

The last few years of her life she was in poor health, grad-

ually failing, until she quietly passed away.

He was a member of the Church of the Ascension, in New Haven, and for twenty years served as one of its Vestrymen.





DeWitt Clinton⁶ Skilton, b. January 11, 1839, in Thomaston, then known as Plymouth Hollow, was the s. of John Chester⁵ Skilton and Anna (Heaton) Skilton. He was a worthy representative of families on both the paternal and maternal sides, who have been conspicuous in the history of New England. One of his ancestors, Henry² Skilton, came from Coventry, England, in the Spring of 1735, settling first at Preston, Conn., and later at Southington, Conn., with the building up of which town he was closely identified. Among other ancestors was the Hon. John Steele, who went to Hartford from Boston with the Hooker party that settled the town and established the church there. Another ancestor was the Hon. John Wadsworth, half brother of Captain Wadsworth, who is said to have hidden the Connecticut Charter in the Charter Oak. He was also descended from Sir William Southmayd, the Hon. Matthew Allyn, one of the original parties to the Connecticut Charter from the King, called in history "The Great Secretary", William Pynchon, Gov. Thomas Welles, Captain William Judd, Timothy Judd, representing Waterbury in the Colonial government forty years, Captain James Avery, of Groton, a leading man in the church and local government and a noted

Indian fighter, and Sir Thomas Gardner.

He entered upon a mercantile career from April, 1855, till October, 1861, when he became clerk in the Hartford Fire Insurance Co. A man who made the most of his opportunities and who did his work thoroughly, he was steadily advanced till he was chosen Secretary of the Phoenix Insurance Co., December 1, 1867, and Vice-President August 1, 1888, and President, February, 1891. With all his fondness for his chosen walk in life, he could not turn a deaf ear to his country's call. Going to the front in the Civil War with the Twenty-Second Regiment, Connecticut Volunteers, he was Second and later First Lieutenant of Company B of that command. After the War, he was Captain in the State Militia, and an officer of the West Middle School District. For many years, Mr. Skilton was a Director of the Hartford National Bank and Trustee and Corporator of the State Savings Bank of Hartford. 

Active in any movement for the good of his native town, he organized the Morris Fish and Game Protective Association, of which he was the first president and was elected president of the "Old Home Day" celebration committee in Morris. He is survived by his widow, Alice Carrie (Kilborn) Skilton, who was a faithful and efficient help meet and co-worker in all of her husband's many activities.

One of his sons, Elton Robert⁷, now has charge of the store





Here, accurate work and diligence won for her the enviable reputation of "a worker", and her pleasant, amiable way, the friendship of all with whom she came in contact. Later, upon reorganization of Coupon-Exchange Section, Miss Skilton, because of her aptitude and ability, was placed in charge of recording all shipments made by the Section. The Section referred to received coupon bonds of respective Liberty Loans from Federal Reserve Banks, and banks and individuals of the country at large, issuing in return registered bonds in the names of the subscribers,

This position Miss Skilton held with much credit, until taken with the sickness which resulted in the untimely death.

During her service in the Treasury Department Miss Skilton endeared herself to all who associated with her, leaving by her demise, a gap which was exceedingly difficult to fill.





Y., paper. "Auburn, March 24, 1911.

"Florence Emeline Hadger, wife of Frank A. Skilton, died recently at her home, 84 Hamilton Ave. She had been ill for nearly a year but it was only recently that her condition became alarming and a trip that she had planned to take in the

south had to be abandoned.

"In the death of Mrs. Skilton, the city loses one of its active leaders in musical and philanthropic circles, her entire lifetime having been devoted to the encouragement of the higher forms of vocal and instrumental music and the education of her sex. She was best known to Auburnians as a soprano of unusual ability. At one time she was the leading soprano in Auburn and up to her illness last year had been active in musicales, concerts and church choir work. She was engaged in philanthrophic work for many years, having been a member of the Y. M. C. A. Ladies' Auxiliary and a teacher in the Women's Educational and Industrial Union.

"As a musician she first became prominent twenty-five years ago, when she sang in the choir of St. Peter's Church. From that time her services were eagerly sought and she sang in nearly all of the Protestant church choirs of Auburn, her last choir connection being St. John's Episcopal Church. She was an unusually good reader and her leading was always looked forward to by singers in choral work, who obtained the best harmony under her direction. She was Directress of the Monday Musical Club, and had taken active parts in the Beethoven Choral and similar organizations. Her solo work was always demanded in concerts in Ithaca and Syracuse. She was one of the Three Little Maids in one of Auburn's first noteworthy amateur productions-The Mikado. She graduated from Auburn High School in the class of 1884, of which William H. Seward, Jr., was president. She leaves, beside her husband, one sister, Mrs. J. W. McMaster, of Geneva.

"The funeral was held from her late home Friday afternoon at two o'clock and was attended by a large gathering of friends and associates of the deceased during her activities in Auburn. Dr. A. M. Dulles, pastor of the Second Presbyterian

Church, officiated and paid tribute to her life of unselfishness and usefulness. The bearers were George F. Wills, John Hizer, D. E. French, J. O. Lee, Porter Beardsley and Irving Bacon. A male quartet composed of Charles G. Adams, A. L. Hemmingway, H. D. Benham and A. S. Baker, sang two of her favorite songs, 'Nearer, My God, to Thee,' and 'Jesus, Lover of My Soul.' Burial was at Fort Hill Cemetery."

Frank Avery[†] Skilton received his early education at home and in the primary schools of Mexico City where he acquired a youthful and practical knowledge of the Spanish Language. Thereafter he spent two years in the Yonkers Military Institute, Yonkers, N. Y., and at the age of fourteen years went to Cazenovia Seminary, Cazenovia, N. Y., where in 1878, he graduated with the degree of B. S.

In 1878-9 he spent one college year in the Law Department of Michigan University, pursuing a course in Common Law

and International Law and Comity.

In the fall of 1881, he entered the Albany Law School, Senior Year, and in May, 1882, at the age of twenty-two years, he graduated with the degree of B. L. In the same month upon state examination, he was duly admitted to practice at the Bar of New York State. During these days, eye trouble developed which eventually resulted in the loss of sight in one eye, and upon advice of specialists, a quiet simple life was adopted, with Auburn, N. Y., as his home.

Clara Maria (Gilbert) Skilton was the dau. of the Reverend Nathaniel and Mary (Perkins) Gilbert; granddaughter of Simeon and Margaret (Ingersoll) Gilbert; great granddaughter of Simeon and Sarah (Nye) Gilbert, who, coming from Oakham, Mass., located in Pittsford, Vermont, in the year 1800, and were among the earliest settlers of Rutland County, Vermont. The Gilbert family played an important part in the early settlement of the State of Massachusetts.

Mrs. Skilton's grandmother, Margaret (Ingersoll) Gilbert, was the dau, of the Revolutionary soldier, and Bunker Hill patriot, Ebenezer Ingersoll, a sister of the Reverend John Ingersoll, who was an energetic contemporary and friend of the Reverend Charles G. Finney, and father of the late Colonel Robert G. Ingersoll.

Mrs. Skilton's mother was Mary Perkins, dau. of Dr. Joseph Perkins, of Castleton, Vermont, who was for some time Pres. ident of Castleton Medical College. The Perkins family were

also early pioneers in the Green Mountain State.

Mrs. Škilton's father, the Reverend Nathaniel P. Gilbert, was for eleven years a pioneer missionary in Chili, located most of the time in the city of Santiago, where Mrs. Skilton was born in the last year of his mission work, 1871. On July first, 1876, while pastor of the Congregational Church in Hubbardton, Vermont, Mr. Gilbert died. His wife, Mary (Perkins) Gilbert, died March 4, 1883. After the death of her mother, Mrs. Skilton made her home with relatives in Illinois and Nebraska. In 1892 she was graduated from the Omaha High School in Omaha, Nebraska.

After a year at the State Normal School in Peru, Nebraska, and two years of teaching in Omaha, she removed to Pittsford, Vermont, where she taught in the High School for eight years, being preceptress part of the time. In 1903 she went to Teachers College, Columbia University, New York City, obtaining the degree of B. S. in 1905. Subsequently she taught in the High School at Rye, N. Y., the last two years serving as vice principal. She resigned in 1911, to accept an appointment as assistant teacher of English in the Bushwick High School, Brooklyn, N. Y. This position Mrs. Skilton held until after her marriage, in Auburn, N. Y., May 12, 1917, to Frank A. Skilton, of that city.

Mrs. Skilton can boast of a distinguished ancestry from as far back as colonial times in this country, and she springs from a highly educated and religious branch of the family of Gilberts. An uncle, the Reverend Frank Gilbert, was graduated from the Auburn Theological Seminary, and for a time occupied a pulpit. In his later years he turned to editorial writing and at the time of his death was one of the editors of the Chicago Inter Ocean. Another uncle, Hon. John I. Gilbert, of Malone, N. Y., was for a time a member of the State Legislature and up to the time of his death in 1904, he was a prominent factor in New York State educational development. Two other uncles, George L. and E. Dwight Gilbert, were lawyers, the former in Omaha, Nebraska, and the latter in Brooklyn, N. Y. The eldest of the family, the Reverend James B. Gilbert, was well beloved as a home missionary in the Middle West. The two sisters of Mrs. Skilton's father were no less gifted than their brothers, being both literary and artistic. The Reverend Simeon Gilbert, D.D., of Chicago, who died in 1917 at the age of eighty-three, was the last of his generation. He was a prominent member of the Congregational clergy of Chicago, and for many years was editor of the Chicago Advance.

Chloe Mariella[†] Skilton lived with her parents in Brooklyn until 1896, when the family removed to the suburb Rockville Centre, L. I., where she graduated from the High School at the age of fifteen. She at once took up teacher's courses in the State Normal School, then in Jamaica, L. I. She passed in the classical course and also the kindergarten course at eighteen, and passed the New York City examination for Kindergartener, opening the way for a teacher's career.

On the day of her last city examination she took a train to meet her aunt, Julia S. (Davis) Skilton, at Montreal, for a summer trip through Scotland, England and to Paris, and then

returned to take up her teaching in Brooklyn.

She was soon appointed as Kindergartner to the new Public School No. 42, at Classon and St. Mark's Avenues. For this position she was further fitted because of her studies in vocal and piano music, carried from childhood outside of the state educational course, and her teaching of these for some years. She and her associate started the first kindergarten in this neighborhood. At the same time she entered Adelphi College and took a teacher's course for degree of A. B. At the end of three years she thus had passed up the first two years of this course. She had acquired by her services a permanent license as teacher in Greater New York. She was then granted a leave of absence of two years, in which she passed the final two years of her college course for A.B. and then returned to her school, No. 42, where she continued to teach until the fall of 1919.

She kept up an interest in music by taking advanced courses in vocal and teacher's courses (for teaching music) at the Virgil Piano School, New York, and for some years taught this method to a group of young people in her home town of Rock-

ville Center and also in Brooklyn.

She has always been interested in athletics. She made a record in winning tennis contests and prizes, and is quite expert in rowing, sailing, canoeing, swimming, skating, horse

back riding and basket ball.

She conducted a club for girls at the Jacob Riis Settlement House on the East Side, New York, and for two summers took the place of the head counsellor of the Riis House Camp for girls, and is now (1920) a Director of the Riis Settlement Board.

She was m, on the seventy-sixth anniversary of the birth of her father, 356 George Steele Skilton.

Bradley Harold Myers was the s. of the Reverend John and Annie Harvey (Wilde) Myers, and grandson of the Reverend Mathias Thackray and Elizabeth (Ogden) Myers, on the pateral side, and Bradley and Emma (Coppock) Wilde, on the maternal side.

Bradley Wilde b. February 20, 1839, in Oldham, Lancashire, England, d. 1881, in Manchester, aged 42, and there bur. in the Eccles Cemetery. His parents, John and Sarah (Baron) Wilde, lived in Oldham.

He has continued with this firm to date. He represents them as commercial traveler throughout the N. E. section of the United States and Eastern Canada. He has occupied positions of trust in the Patrons of Husbandry; O. U. A. M.; and the Modern Woodmen of America. In 1897 he succeeded his father as Treasurer of the Skilton Family Organization and has since served continuously in that

capacity.

Frank Wilcox Pinneo was the oldest son of Samuel Lyman Pinneo and Mary Juliette (Wilcox) Pinneo. Ancestrally he is the seventh in direct paternal line from Jacques Pinneau, one of two Huguenot brothers, refugees from France at the time of the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes, in 1685. With vast numbers of the skilled artisans and industrial workers from France who fled from persecution, the boys came to America.

Other ancestral lines were largely Puritan.

He attended the Newark Academy from early age to graduation in 1884, with the first honors in classics, and entered Princeton University; but turned to business, expecting to return to College in a year or two. 

LESTER WHITING ATWOOD (Bennette, Chester, Elisha, Mary3 Skilton, Henry2, John3) enlisted as a Private in the Field Artillery at Fort Slocum, New York, July 6, 1917. He remained here for about three months, being placed in the 21st Recruit Co. About October 1st he was transferred to Fort Myer, Virginia, where he was assigned to the 3rd Battery, 6th Field Artillery Reserve Battalion. Here he was promoted to Private, First Class, in October and to Corporal in November. He sailed from New York for England December 12, 1917, on the S. S. "Adriatic." ship reached Halifax shortly after the terrible explosion. other ships joined them at Halifax, and they proceeded to Liverpool, arriving with no mishaps December 25, 1917. They went immediately to Southampton, and from there to LeHavre, on the 27th. In February, 1918, he was promoted to Sergeant and transferred to the 1st Light Tank Corps. In April he was promoted to Sergeant, 1st Class. He remained in the training area during the Spring and Summer of 1918, being stationed at La Courtine (La Creuse), Montrichard (Loire et Cher), Bourg (Haute Marne) and Brennes (Haute Marne) respectively. In June he was promoted to First Sergeant and transferred to Co. A, 327th (later 345th) Battalion, Tank Corps, U.S.A. On September 7, 1918 his command left Brennes for the front with their tanks, reaching St. Mihiel Sector on the 9th. They took part in the St. Mihiel drive, September 12 to 15, at Essey, Pannes, Beney, St. Benoit, They left the Saint Mihiel Sector about September 20, arriving at the Argonne (Clermont) about the 22nd. He took part in the Argonne-Meuse offensive beginning September 26, and remained in that offensive until October 14th. He helped in the attacks against Varennes Montblainville, Apremont, Chatel Chehery, Exermont, Fleville and Sommerance. He was commissioned Second Lieutenant in a dugout at Montblainville, October 5, 1918. the 14th he was wounded slightly in the left hand and forearm by splinters from a machine gun bullet which hit the tank and entered by means of small cracks in the armor. He was removed to Evacuation Hospital No. 163 and then to Evacuation Hospital No. 9, where he stayed about a week, afterwards being sent to Paris on a hospital train, remaining a week at No. 3 Rue de Chevrence and about ten days at Rue Boileau. After returning from the hospital to Bourg (Haute Marne) he was assigned to Co. A, 344th U. S. Tank Corps, and remained with this Company until his discharge. He returned to America from Marseilles March 17, 1919, on the S. S. "Patria." He was discharged as a Second Lieutenant at Camp Meade, Md., May 16, 1919.

Albee, then, in October, to Boston (Harvard University and Children's and Massachusetts General Hospitals) and, in November to the Army Medical School, Washington, for three months course of combined surgical and military instruction. Here he received promotion to Captain, on January 15, 1918, and was sent over-seas for service at the front January 22, 1918, sailing on the S. S. "Baltic," leaving at Newark his wife and two babies, Joy, age two years, and Lily, eleven months. The trip of fourteen days was characterized by the realization of the dangers of war at sea when, the evening before landing at Liverpool, the "Tuscania," close to the stern of the "Baltic," one of the twenty ships and warships which made up the convoy, was torpedoed in the North Channel and sunk, with the only serious loss of life any American troopship suffered during the war. He was stationed at the First Scottish General Hospital, Aberdeen, where he remained thirteen months in very active work of a three thousand bed base hospital of the British Army under the Division of Orthopedic and Reconstruction Surgery of the American Army and under the direction of General Sir Robert Jones, visiting also, on orders, the chief military hospitals of England and Scotland. The work included care of fresh wounds, few days after battle in France, and continued treatment of them, through convalescence and resulting deformity, to restoration to service or discharge from the army. Four months after the armistice he returned on the S. S. "Aquitania," by way of France, to America and, on arrival March 30, 1919, was assigned to Camp Bowie Base Hospital, Fort Worth, Texas, as Chief of the Orthopedic Division, to hasten the treatment and discharge of the disabled. Completing this, he was ordered to the Fort McPherson General Hospital, Atlanta, Georgia, in the same

capacity, and was here honorably discharged from the Army on July 28, 1919, having served two years. He was discharged a Major, having been promoted a second time on September 12, 1918.

 EARL WHITE SKILTON (Cyrus⁶, Henry⁵, James⁴, Avery³ Henry², John¹) was called into service in the U. S. Army on February 26, 1918, reporting at Camp Devens, Ayer, Mass., where he was assigned to the 76th Division Depot Brigade, as a Private. In about two weeks he was transferred to Camp Upton, where he was placed first in Company E, and then later in the Headquarters Co., of the 308th Infantry, 77th Division. On April 6th he started across the Atlantic on the S. S. "Lapland," arriving at Liverpool, England, on the 19th of April, 1918. On April 21st he was transferred to Calais, France. Here he went into training back of the English lines, at Leulingham, France. He was a gunner on a onepounder, or 37 mm., gun designed by the French in 1916. On June 28, 1918, he was under fire for the first time, and from that date he was under fire almost continuously until he was wounded. He was on varying fronts, being at Badonvillers, in the Lorraine Sector, at the Vesle River near Sherry, and last at the famous Argonne His Division was the only one that went through the middle of these woods. On the 26th of September, 1918, the drive was started, with 20,000 men in the Division; when the woods were passed, there remained 10,000 men in the Division. Just after leaving the Argonne Forest, near Corny, he was wounded in the right knee by a high explosive shell. This happened about eight-thirty in the evening of October 29, 1918. With the help of a companion, he managed to walk back about a quarter of a mile, then was carried by an ambulance to the Field Hospital, where his wound was dressed. For about a week he was at Evacuation Hospital No. 9, at Rubescourt. From there he was sent to the Base Hospital No. 68, near Nevers. While he was at Nevers the armistice was signed. He was here about two months when he was sent back to his Company, meeting them at Azainville just before New Year's Day, 1919. The Company was here a large part of the winter, then removed to Brulon, where it remained until the departure for America. He sailed from Brest on the 19th of April, 1919, on the S. S. "America," landing at New York on the 28th of April. The command was sent directly to Camp Mills, in order that it might parade in New York with the 77th Division. After being transferred to Camp Upton, he was honorably discharged as a First Class Private, on May 9th, 1919.

Wesley Frost Ayer, who m. 778 Faith Emily Margaret Clark, (Artison, Hannah Skilton, James, Avery, Henry, John), graduated from Beloit College, Beloit, Wis., A.B., 1909. Taking the degree of M. A. at the University of Wisconsin in 1910, he entered on newspaper work as a reporter on the Milwaukee Senti-

nel and later as city editor of the Beloit, Wis., Free Press. While so engaged he passed successfully a competitive examination for commission in the Regular Army and was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant of Infantry on October 6, 1911. He reported for his first Army duty at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and was shortly afterwards assigned to the 23rd Infantry, which he joined at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indiana, in June, 1912. In the following February he went with that Regiment to the Mexican border, where he served at Texas City and Galveston until January, 1915, when he was transferred to the 15th Infantry, at Tientsin, China, While on this foreign service he was stationed for many months in command of the small garrison at Leichuang, China, a point on the railroad from Peking to the sea, which is guarded by international troops. At this point the American and Japanese sections of the railroad come together. In November, 1916, he was sent on detached service to Manchuria, for a study of the battlefields of the Russo-Japanese War. During this foreign tour he traveled also in the Philippines, Formosa and Japan. He was promoted to the rank of 1st Lieutenant July 1, 1916. The declaration of war by this country found him still in China and it was not until August, 1917, that he was ordered to return to the United States, at the same time being promoted to the rank of Captain. He landed in San cisco Sepember 26, 1917, after passing through a terrific typhoon in the China Sea, in which the transport "Thomas" nearly foundered. Immediately after landing, he was put on duty with the 13th Infantry at the Presidio of San Francisco and marched overland with that Regiment in October, 1917, to Camp Fremont, California, where the Regiment became a part of the 8th Regular Army Division then being organized. Captain Aver was appointed Supply Officer of the 13th Infantry and was engaged during the succeeding months in equipping the Regiment for overseas duty. When this task was almost completed he was promoted to Major of Infantry, June 7, 1918, and the promotion brought with it a transfer to Camp Lewis, Wash. Here Major Aver was on duty until the signing of the armistice, first in command of the second Group of Battalions of the 166th Depot Brigade, and later as Senior Instructor of the 166th Depot Brigade. In January, 1919. he was ordered to Honolulu, Hawaiian Islands, to assist in demobilizing the native Hawaiian troops that had been raised during After these troops were mustered out in the Spring of 1919, he was appointed Quartermaster of Schofield Barracks, the large Army post in the Hawaiian Islands. While on this duty his transfer to the mainland was ordered at the request of Pomona College, Claremont, California, where he went in October, 1919, as a professor of military science and tactics. His orders were again changed before he had been long at Pomona

College and he was sent to El Paso, Texas, as military instructor in the High School there.

784. George Warner Skilton (Joels, Samuels, Jamess, Averys, Henry2, John1) enlisted in the United States Naval Reserve Force as a Seaman, 2nd Class, on May 1, 1917, at New Haven, Conn., leaving college at that time. Not receiving his call to active duty immediately, he returned to college in June and received his degree, graduating with honors. He was ordered into active service July 1, 1917, reporting to the Commander of Section One. Third Naval District, New Haven, Conn. There he received the regular course of training lasting about eight weeks, at the end of which time he was nominated for foreign service. This and two subsequent assignments falling through, on January 1, 1918, he went into the Executive Office at that Station. On March 1, 1918, he was promoted to the rating of Yeoman 3rd Class. During the ensuing spring and summer he had entire charge of all enrollments in the Navy throughout the Section. It was due to his energy and ambition that the number of enrollments increased from an average of ten per week to an average of one hundred per week during June and July. On June 1, 1918, he was promoted to the rating of Yeoman 2d Class. On November 1, 1918, he was promoted to the rating of Yeoman 1st Class. About the first of November he was placed in charge of the Executive Office at that Station. From then until the time of his release from active duty, he was acting Chief Yeoman in charge of the Executive Office. He was recommended for promotion to the rating of Chief Yeoman, but was released before he had served the necessary time in his lower rating. He was released from active duty on December 31, 1918, having served exactly eighteen months.

HARRY JAMEST BEERS (James⁶, Melicent⁵ Skilton, James4, Avery3, Henry2, John1) was called into service in the Army, reporting at Camp Upton, N. Y., May 23, 1918. On June 23, 1918, he was transferred to Camp Joseph E. Johnston, Jacksonville, Fla., and was placed in Motor Transport Co. No. 450. The Company moved to Newport News, Va., August 12, 1918, sailing for France August 22nd. After several exciting experiences with submarines they landed in France, September 5, 1918. They were stationed at Marseilles for some time, doing troop hauling and general trucking. After the signing of the armistice they were sent into Germany, and April 5, 1919, they were driving at Trier for the Advance General Hearquarters with their touring cars. He was promoted from private to Corporal on May 1, 1919. After several weeks at Trier they were sent to Coblenz on the Rhine, where they were stationed until July 22, 1919. They sailed from Brest August 3, 1919, landing at Hoboken, N. J., August 10th. He was then transferred from the Motor Transport

Company No. 450, to Casual Company No. 1035, and was sent to Camp Upton. He was honorably discharged August 15, 1919.

805. Ernest Bowker, Wood (Melicent Bowker, Melicent 5 Skilton, James4, Avery3, Henry2, John1) enlisted in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps at Ithaca, New York, reporting at Madison Barracks, New York, May 13, 1917. He was assigned to the 12th Training Company. About June 16, 1917, he was transferred to Fort Monroe, Va., and assigned to the 5th Officers' Training Company. He was commissioned Captain of Coast Artillery. August 15, 1917, and assigned to duty at Fort H. G. Wright, Fisher's Island, New York. He was on duty at Fort Wright from August 19, 1917, to August 8, 1918, except for a short time when he was sent to Fort Monroe, about July 6, 1918, for a special course. Here he was engaged largely in organization of new units and training of men. He left Fort Wright August 8, 1918, for overseas duty, in command of Battery F, 68th Artillery, C. A. C., arriving in England August 25, 1918, and in France August 29th. He was in training with the organization at Libourne, France, until the signing of the armistice. The regiment had finished the artillery training course and was ready to go to the front. He set sail for America from Bordeaux February 3, 1919, arriving here February 16th. He was discharged at Fort Wadsworth, N. Y., March 4, 1919, as a Captain of Coast Artillery. On April 21, 1919, he accepted a commission as Captain, Coast Artillery Reserve Corps.

840. Robert Sanford Cornish (Ida⁶ Skilton, Otis⁵, Henry⁴, Avery³, Henry², John¹) of Montclair, New Jersey, enlisted in the United States Naval Reserve Force on June 9, 1917, at the Newport Section, Second Naval District, Newport, R. I., as a Seaman

2d class. He was called to active duty on July 9, 1917.

On August 28, 1917, he was transferred to the Wood's Hole Patrol Station, Second Naval District, Wood's Hole, Mass. In April, 1918, he was commissioned Ensign in the United States Naval Reserve Force, standing fifth among four hundred men who took the examination for commission as Ensign. On June 11, 1918, he was transferred to the United States Naval Academy, Anrapolis, Md., for an intensive course in Navigation and Seamanship. He graduated from Annapolis September 13, 1918, and was assigned to duty on the U. S. S. "North Dakota."

848. GIRALD CYRUS⁷ BISHOP (Charles⁶, Mary Skilton⁵ Avery, Parthenia⁴ Skilton, Avery³, Henry², John¹) enlisted in the Signal Officers Reserve Corps, United States Army, in June, 1917; First Lieutenant, Aviation Service, A. E. F., France, 1918.

951. INA WOODBRIDGE⁸ ATWOOD (Charles⁷, Henry⁸, Joel⁵, Henry4, Mary3 Skilton, Henry2, John1) enrolled as a Reconstruction Aide in the U. S. Medical Corps October 7, 1918, and was mobilized at once at Hotel Albert, New York City. She stayed here for five weeks and on Armistice Day, November 11, 1918, set sail for England on the S. S. "Cedric." On the vessel were about two hundred medical officers, three thousand enlisted men from the southern states, and twenty-five women. They were in a convoy of eight vessels and two destroyers, which zig-zagged their way across, with no excitement. They landed at Liverpool and proceeded to Southampton, where they remained three days. They crossed the Channel to LeHavre, spending one day in Paris before proceeding to Savenay, where they were to be stationed. At Savenay their hospital post consisted of about ten different base hospitals located around a few brick buildings which had once been a French Normal School. The post would accommodate about forty thousand patients and from there men were sent to Saint Nazaire for immediate embarkation. She sailed from Brest February 1, 1919, on the Swedish boat "Stockholm." On reaching America she was assigned to Lakewood, N. J., where a hotel was used for a hospital. With a group of twenty-five girls she was sent to Fox Hills, Long Island, where there is one of the largest general hospitals in the east and the largest physio-therapy clinic in the world.

1011. IRA WOODRUFF⁸ BLACK (Hattie⁷ Woodruff, Ellen⁶ Atwood, Hinman⁵, Henry⁴, Mary³ Skilton, Henry², John¹) enlisted in the United States Army, August, 1917, at Los Angeles, Calif.; stationed at Camp Lewis, Washington; Instructor at Officers' Training School, Maine University, Orono, Maine (1918)

ORVILLE REAUGH FISHER, who m. 1012 Ida Mary⁸ Black (Hattie⁷ Woodruff. Ellen⁶ Atwood, Hinman⁵, Henry⁴, Mary³ Skilton, Henry², John¹), enrolled in the United States Naval Reserve Force, March 29, 1918, as a Musician, First Class, and reported for active duty at the Naval Training Station, Balboa Park, San Diego, California. He was released from active duty February 12, 1919, with the rating of Musician, First Class, from the Naval Training Station, San Diego, California.

Herbert Dudley⁸ Woodward (Antoinette⁷ Atwood, William⁶, John⁵, Wheeler⁴, Mary³ Skilton, Henry², John¹) was called to service in the United States Army, September 19, 1917, reporting at Camp Devens, Ayer, Mass. Here he was placed in Company L, 304th Infantry. July 16, 1918, he was sent to Boston to leave for overseas. Stopping at Halifax Harbor two days, this command arrived at Avon Mouth, England, July 31, 1918. After parading at Bristol, August 1, they went to Camp Winchester, staying there two days, when they left for Southampton for France. They landed at LeHavre and were sent to Camp Aigain and then to the firing line.

He served in the Supply Co., 304th Infantry, 76th Division; Company M, 161st Infantry, and was then transferred to Company M, 59th Infantry, 4th Division Regulars. He held the ratings of Wagoner, Private and First Class Private. He took part in the St. Mihiel Offensive September 12-14, 1918, helping to capture the towns of Fresnes-en-Woevre and Manneulles. From September 26 to October 19 he took part in the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, twenty-four days of continuous fighting. WILLIAM EDGAR⁸ SMITH (Abbie⁷ Barnes, Sarah⁶ Atwood, John⁵, Wheeler⁴, Mary³ Skilton, Henry², John¹) joined the United States Army September 7, 1917, at Ayer, Mass., better known as Camp Devens, in the Artillery branch. He stayed at Camp Devens until September 18, 1917, and was placed in Battery E, 102d Regiment, Field Artillery, 51st Brigade, 26th Division, remaining in this command until his service ended. He left for France September 20, 1917, having been in the Army less than two weeks. He sailed within a few days for Brest, France, on the boat "Finland," which was sunk on her next voyage. The trip was uneventful, except for the fact that the ship had to turn back a day on account of an attack on a vessel ahead of it by a submarine. He remained in the training area near Neuchateau,

France, for about four months. The first of February, 1918, the Division entered the front in the sector known as the Chemin Des Dames. They next held the Toul Sector, where the following battles were fought: Apremont, April 10, 12, 13; Seicheprey, April 20-21; Humbert Plantation, May 27; Richecourt, May 30; Xivray Marvoisin, June 16. The next sector held was Pas Fini Sector, then their attacks freed the towns of Torcy and Belleau Woods. Rupt Sector was the next, with the St. Mihiel offensive, and next was North of Verdun until the armistice.

He was neither wounded nor gassed. He was made a Corporal June 6, 1918. He returned to America on the "Mongolia," landing April 10, 1919, at Boston, Mass. He was discharged April 29, 1919, at Camp Devens, Mass., with the rating of Corporal.

- 1121. John Russell⁸ Ferguson (Henrietta⁷ French, Lucy⁶ Skilton, Elijah⁵, James⁴, Avery⁸, Henry², John⁴) was called into service as a mason in the U. S. Army April 30, 1918, at Camp Custer, Mich. He was assigned to the Headquarters Det. Engineers. On July 12, 1918, he was transferred to Camp Mills, Long Island. He was promoted to Corporal and to Sergeant. On July 22, 1918, he set sail for France on the British Transport "Grampian." From August 9 to September 9 his Company was becoming acclimated in southern France. He took part in the St. Mihiel drive September 12 to 16, and was in the Meuse-Argonne offensive September 26 to November 11. He was with the Army of Occupation in Germany from November 24, 1918, to May 24, 1919. He returned to America June 27, receiving his discharge as a Sergeant at Camp Custer, July 3, 1919.
- 1124. Louis Wamboldt⁸ Skilton (James⁷, John⁶, Elijah⁵, Tames4. Avery3. Henry2. John1) volunteered for service in the U. S. Army on April 18, 1918. He was assigned to the Headquarters Company, 51st Infantry, 6th Division of the Regular Army at Fort Oglethorpe. Here he underwent a course of training until his departure for foreign service. He sailed for France on July 4. 1918. During the ensuing seven months he saw service in France and England. Being overcome by the strenuous campaigning and marching, he was returned to America with a ship load of casuals, arriving at Newport News, Va., February 11, 1919. Here he was placed in the Debarkation Hospital, at Hampton, Va., formerly the National Soldiers' Home. On April 12, 1919, he was discharged at Chattanooga, Tenn., as a Private. Owing to the fact that he had not fully recovered from the effects of the hardships experienced in France, he suffered a relapse, and returned to the Army to remain under government care.
- 1155. Russell Ingersoll⁸ Geyer (Mary⁷ Skilton, Julius⁶, Avery⁵, James⁴, Avery³, Henry², John¹) volunteered for border service in 1916, serving several months. He was honorably dis-

charged because of a wound to his knee received while in service. After several attempts to enlist he was finally accepted for qualified service, in the U.S. Marine Corps, on the 27th of March, 1918. at Asheville, N. C. He was stationed at Paris Island, S. C., until second week in May when he was transferred to the Philadelphia Navy Yard. He was rated as a Special Duty man on detached duty. He was transferred to H. M. S. "Berwick" the last week in May, serving on this ship during his fifteen day trip across to Glasgow, Scotland. Upon his arrival in Scotland, he was transferred to the London Naval Headquarters where he did guard duty; courier duty between London and France, going to all partsof France and England, being in Paris during two air raids and long range gun bombardment. He was one of President Wilson's guards during his stay in London. At one time he was sent to Dunkirk to the Northern Bombing Squadron, on courier duty. He returned to America March 8, 1919, on the U. S. S. "Plattsburgh." He was discharged May 26, 1919, at Quantico, Va. Salesman, Dunham's Music House, Asheville, N. C. (1919).

James Morris Ripley, who m. 1156 Avis Engs⁸ Geyer (Mary⁷ Skilton, Julius⁶, Avery⁵, James⁴, Avery³, Henry², John¹), won an appointment to West Point, but decided to enlist in the Navy. He underwent training at the U. S. Naval Training Station, at Pelham Bay, N. Y., and was commissioned as Ensign. He was assigned to the "Kittery," but was later transferred to the "Covington," which was torpedoed off the English coast. In January, 1919, he was promoted to Lieutenant and assigned to the "Point Lobos." He received the "French Cross" for saving the life of a French General. He is attached to the U. S. Merchant Marine as a Lieutenant. (1919)

ROBERT HENRY WATKINS (William, Anna Skilton, John⁵, James⁴, Avery³, Henry², John¹) enlisted in the Ambulance Corps of the Medical Department of the United States Army, at Waterbury, Conn., June 24, 1917. He was transferred to the Medical Department August 4, 1917, and was called into active duty August 5, reporting at Fort Ethan Allen, Vermont. From here he was sent to Camp Merritt, N. J., in November, 1917, where he was assigned to Base Hospital No. 66. This was the first regular army hospital to reach France. He left Hoboken December 14, 1917, landing at Glasgow, Scotland, New Year's Eve. After spending a week at Winchester, the unit was sent to France, arriving at LeHavre January 14, 1918. His next stop was the final one, at Neufchatel, where the unit erected their hospital. He remained here for twelve and a half months, leaving France January 31, 1919, and landing at Newport News, Va., February 7, 1919. He was discharged at Camp Devens, Mass., February 28, 1919, with the rating of Private, First Class, rated Surgical Assistant.

THE HIVE OF THE AVERYS

We have printed on page 22 a picture of the Hive of the Averys, quoting description written by James Avery⁶ Skilton on back of photograph from which our cut was made. Groton Avery Clan, Vol. 1, page 46, refers at length to the old house, giving historical information of importace which it is of interest to incorporate in this volume.

"In the New London book of grants is a record of various parcels given to lames Avery * * *.

"1650, December 15. There was given to him and to James Morgan, Andrew Lester, Will Meader, Will Hough, Robert Allen and Robert Deball, part of a swamp at 'ye Westward of weaver Smith's lot in ve said swamp out of which weaver Smith has his land out.' In 1661, he received twenty acres of upland. In 1652, he sold his land in the first division to Mr. Blinman. About this time he was granted a farm in South Groton. He, however, continued to live with his family on the west side of the great river. Early in 1653, he secured another farm, one of the Pocketannock grants, further up the river and in what is now the town of Ledyard. About 1656, he built and occupied the 'Hive of the Averys,' at the head of Poquonock Plain, in the present town of Groton, a mile and a half from the River Thames.

"In June, 1684, the old Blinman edifice at New London, 'the unadorned church and watch-tower of the wilderness, was sold to Captain James Avery for six pounds, with the condition that he should remove it in one month's time.' According to tradition, it was taken down and its materials were carried by river and sound and added to the house he had already built at the head of Poquonock Cove. In spite of this analytic and synthetic process, the house seems to have retained something of its sacred character. A century later, 'the same timbers, the same boards, joyfully resounded once more to the ancient but well remembered voices of exhortation and praise.'

"With its charming situation, the old time combination constituted one of the most interesting and picturesque residences in the country. This historic home never passd into alien hands, being continuously occupied by James Avery or some of his descendants until it was destroyed by fire on the night of the twentieth of July, 1894.

"Soon after the destruction of the 'Old Hive,' the Avery Memorial Association was incorporated. It received the old homestead site by deed of gift from the owner, James Denison Avery, and there erected a granite memorial in what is now known as the Avery Memorial Park. The shaft is surmounted by a bronze bust, representing the builder of the 'Old Hive.' The bust is of heroic size and represents the founder as a typical Puritan, magistrate and Indian fighter. It was designed by the noted sculptor, Bela Lyon Pratt, an Avery descendant. The shaft rises from the middle of the outline of the old house, which outline has been carefully preserved; the old fireplaces have been rebuilt; the old hearthstones are in their places; the old thresholds are marked by the stone steps which the feet of the founder of the race first trod.

"This monument was dedicated July 20, 1900. Six hundred members of the clan gathered to do honor to the founder of the tribe, who had been dead two hundred years. Dr. Elroy M. Avery, the president of the association, presided; Helen Morgan Avery unveiled the bust; Frank Montgomery Avery delivered the oration, opening with these impressive words:

'We have assembled here today to join in the dedication of a memorial; not of a monument erected to the memory of any one man; not of a shaft or tablet to commemorate the happening of a great historical event or the accomplishment of some illustrious personal achievement; but of a memorial designed to designate the spot where the roots of a family tree struck deep and strong enough to take permanent hold in the soil of New England, and whence its branches have spread out far and wide and lusty with the strength of the parent stock. It is to honor the place of our forefathers' refuge and abode, of their struggles and triumphs, their birthplace and their death place through the early generations, that this shaft has been erected on the site of the first of their homesteads, and that we are here today,'

"The oration was given in full in the report of the dedicatory exercises printed in Avery Notes and Oueries, No. 11 (August, 1900)."

CONCLUSION

As the work of the Publication Committee reaches completion,

a closing word may be in order.

The Committee has tried faithfully to interpret aright and to carry out fully the original instructions given when it was elected. These instructions were embodied in a Resolution adopted at the Fiftieth Annual Reunion, as noted in the Foreword (page 5):

"Resolved: That it be the sense of this Gathering that we celebrate the two hundredth anniversary of the birth of our ancestor, Doctor Henry Skilton, which occurs on November 19, 1918, by the publication of the genealogical records of his descendants."

The Committee has done its best and now presents to the family "Dr. Henry Skilton and His Descendants."

The reason for delay in publishing the book has been given in the Foreword.

The Committee has been actuated throughout by the desire to set forth accurately and succinctly the salient facts of the family story. Much material was gathered and edited which it was not thought best to embody in this volume, owing to the fact that there might be some question of the authenticity of the information secured.

The Committee has included in the book rather full data concerning the Atwood, Avery, Clark, Judd, Steele, and other families whose members have intermarried and have married with the Skiltons.

All facts given are not, of course, equally pertinent, but the purpose has been, where possible, to trace ancestry back to the Old World and to indicate the close relations which subsisted between our own and certain other families in the early days of American history. Fulsome praise has been studiously avoided. The task has been to tell in simple fashion the story of honest, upright, God-fearing people, proud of their descent from a man of high character and notable attainment, who came as a youth to America that he might live his own life and rear his children beneath the aegis of liberty, civil and religious.

The provision of suitable likenesses of members of the Family, particularly those of the earlier generations, has been a matter of much concern to the Committee, which has put forth a great deal of labor with results, in some instances, far from satisfactory. In a number of cases the Committee was confronted with the alternative of leaving out pictures altogether, or inserting such cuts as could be made from old, imperfect, faded daguerreotypes, or photographs. The latter course was chosen, with the thought that thus some remembrance might remain among men of the lineaments of our forebears, although the pictures might be lacking in technical or artistic excellence.

It is hoped that the book will be found a useful compendium of information for present needs and that it may serve as a nucleus, also as a stimulus, for further work in the years to come.

Those who detect inaccuracies will be doing a service by bringing to the attention of the Committee any corrections that should be made.

Blank pages have been included at the back of the book for recording births, marriages, deaths, and other items of interest regarding the family history.

As already indicated, the Committee has been punctilious in its endeavor to carry out the directions of the Family as given by Resolutions adopted at the Reunions. Therefore, at the risk of seeming to indulge in its own praise, the Committee is impelled to insert a self-explanatory Resolution unanimously adopted at the Preliminary Gathering (an annual event since 1880) at Water-

town, Conn., June 25, 1921.

"Resolved: That suitable mention be made in the Skilton Book commending the labors of the Executive Committee and the other members of the Publication Committee for the patient, unselfish and efficient manner in which they have served the Family in prosecuting the work of publishing 'Dr. Henry Skilton and his Descendants.'"

Conversely, the Committee expresses its appreciation of the help given by those who have contributed, financially and other-

wise, to the preparation and publication of this volume.

We have spent many years looking backward to the story of our ancestors and we pray that our posterity may be worthy of their lineage.
