

## Introduction.

Ι.

A few months before the death, in March 1930, of my father, Rollin C.Smith, I found a bundle of old faded Payers in the attic. They proved to be some papers which father's cousin, Frank Hendee, had passed on to him not long before. While we were interested in these old papers, some dated before 1800, and were thrilled to find the signatures of greatgreat-grand father Reuben Smith and great-grand-father Samuel Smith, it was not till several months after father's death that I became interested in finding out what there was to know about the family. I have deeply regretted my delay, for my father was interested in his family, and could have given much information not only about the Smith family, but about the Manlay family as well, who were his mother's people.

( Genealogy of Manley Family compiled May 1938.)

Such traditions and information as father had could have recalled are now lost to posterity.

Mrs. Helen Carlton # 105 of Poultney gave me the first assistance with a copy of her D.A.R. paper # 155410, and data on the family of Reuben Jr. # 8. This data for the D.A.R paper was originally furnished by Flora Griswold, whose mother's first husband was John Wiley Smith,# 11. I had information from her but her later illness and death prevent. ed me from obtaining further help from that source.

Susan Dean Rubbell, #128, of Ravenna Ohio, contributed the vital statistics of her family, and her tribute to her pioneer grandmother, Tryphena Smith, #10, had added much to the human as well as the historic interest of this work.

### Introduction.

Mary Harrison Hubbard # 156 of Salisbury, Vt. has given much help with her data and material from letters in her possession, of the Harrison family. For the interest and moral support "iven me by these two cousins I am deeply grateful.

The Holden family of No. Clarendon and Rutland, Vt. have contributed their share of data. Estelle waterstradt § 160, of Dundee, Mich. made & chart of Alendar's \$33 descendants which was not only a fine bit of work but a great addition to my files.

Many other descendants of Reuben Smith have sent whatever information they possessed, bible records, etc. and while it is impossible to mention each one, their efforts and help have made this compilation possible. In only one instance was my appeal for data completely iggored, but suffioient has been obtained so that the names of descendants were secured.

It was fortunate that when I began my research in carnest I was living in Pittsford, and was near enough to the Town Clerk's offices in Brandon, Rutland and Chittenden so that I was able to get first hand what informathese records afforded.

The Pittsford Tywn Hissory by Dr.Caverly, yielded some dates and mapy interesting items about locations of farms and old roads, but most of the material is from Bible and cometery records of various branches of the family.

I have included several allied families in this compilation, as in many cases I believe such information as I have is not on record in libraries. Other information has

has been obtained from various genealogies in the State Library at Madison, Wis, and from the Mewberry Library and The Institute of American Genealogy of Chicago. The Whedon data is from Rev. H Curtis Whedon, of Oxford, N.Y. who is compiling the Whedon Genealogy.

Nost of this data was collected in 1934, and many births, deaths and marriages have undoubtedly occurr ed in several branches of the family since them. And there is no doubt but errors in dates have occurred, not to mention the typegraphical errors.

If the heads of families will make such correc tions and additions to their own copies of this pamphlet, and send such information to me it will be greatly appreciated.

Let us hope that this collection of Smith data will inspire the descendants to keep up the work by putting their own histeries down in black and white for pesterity.

The descendants of Reuben and Lois Smith , ever 450 to the Sth generation according to this record, are scattered from Vermont to Galifernia and Florida, and my contact with these who have helped has been most pleasant.

The completion of this genealogy has been delayed for a moment, that the record of the youngest member of the family could be included, and now on this day, May 27, 1939 we can add the name of John Robert Dickerman, my third grandchild, born to Edd and Doris # 161 Dickerman of Gainceville Florida. ### Early SMITH Settlements.

A Colony of Smiths landed in Virginia in 1607. They were ruled by laws written in blood. For twelve years they languished under the government by Sir. Thomas Smith, Treasurer of the Virginia Company un England, and suffered greatly.

The first colony established by the Pyymouth Company in 1607 on the caost of Maine was a failure.

A permanent settlement in New England began with the arrival of a body of Separatists. in the Mayflower, in 1620, who founded the colony at Plymouth. This was followed in a few years by an exedus of Puritans who planted towns along the coast.

One of the first settlers of New England was Abraham Smith who was resident and land owner in Cambridge in 1646. Christopher Smith, Proprietor of Dedham, was a carpenter, herdsman and weaver.

The surname of Smith is of great antiquity in Scotland. It is sometimes called "Gow", which is the Gaelic for Smith. Traditions account of the origin of the Smith family is that they are all descended from Clan Chaltan. The word smith in Anglo-Saxon is from Smitan - to smith.

There are many Coats-of-Arms belonging to the Smith Families, but they are too numerous to explain here.

## REUBEN SMITH OF PITTSFORD, VERMONT.

The earliest record we have of HLUMEN SMITH is found on a DAR paper, #155410. This gives his birthplace, the name of his wife and list of engagements in the Revolution War.

Reuben Smith born in Hoosick, New York, on the \_\_\_\_\_ day August, 1750 and died in Pittsford, Vt. on the 29th day of August, 1834. He was a soldier in the Revolutionary War. He married at Hoosick Falls, N.Y. Lois Kverest, (No date.)

His children were:

Diadamia Roberts. Huldah Samuel b Cot.19,1778 m Cynthia Mead. Mercy James Dean Lois b 1786 m Samuel Harrison Reuben m Matilda Gooper. Claricy m Charles Wolcott.

### Ancestor's Service.

Capt Benjamin Cox's Company of Rangers, Maj. Ebeneser Allen's Detachment raised for the defence of the State of Vermont, commencing Aug.15, and ending the 15th of November11780, both days included. the name of Reuben Smith appears. 3 months service, Pay 6 pounds, 1 sh. 4 pence. (Private.)

Bennington.

Reuben Smith also appears as private in Capt. Jacob Odel's Company in Col. Ira Allen's Regiment of Militia for service done the State of Vermont on alarm to the Northward, which commenced October, 1781. 40 miles travel, 6 days. Pay 1 pound 1 sh 4 pence.

Capt. Parmelee Allen's Company of Rangers, Maj.Ebenezer A Allen's Detachment raised for the defence of the State of Vermont, commencing Feb.1st,1780 and ending the 1st of December 1780 both days included. Appears the name of Reuben Swith. Commencement of pay May 1st. 7 months24 days service. Discharged December 2st 1780, pay 14 pounds, 12 sh.

Reuben Smith's name also appears is the Pay Roll of Capt. Abner Seeley's Con any in the service of the st ate of Vermost in 1781. Service ending the 30th of June. Sum gaid 2 pounds 9 sh. 4 pence. (Sunderland).

as the first and third engagements were held at the Game time it would be impossible for one man to have served in both. so it is evident that more than one man by the name of Reuber Smith were enlisted in the companies that were raised in the Southern part of Vermont.

The Revolutionary Rolls of Vermont give also the following records of engagements in which appear the name of Reuben Smith.

Capt. Timothy Rush's Company of Hilitia, Scouting at Stafford. Alars Newberry. Col. Peter Gloutt, Cct. 19, 1780,6 da. (Windsor)

Capt. Jacob Odell's Company, Col. Irs Allen's Regiment of Militia. Oct. 1781. 6 days. 13 miles. (Rennington).

Capt. Abner Seeley's Co. in Col. Benj. Wait's Rattalion, July 1,1781 to Nov. 30,1752. (Bennington).

During the ten-year period before Vermont joined the Union in 1791 it was not uncommon for the men living in that part of New York State east of the Hudson River to join forces with Vermont for protection, and as Reuben Smith was known to be living in Little Hodsic (see Indenture) in 1798, and in Argyle (see 1790 Census) in 1790 we can assume that he was living in New York during the Revolution.

By a careful checking of the dates it appears that one person could have taken part in the three engagements in Bennington and the one in Sauderland, and as these places were only a few miles from Little Hoosic it is safe to assume that our Reuben saw service at those places.

In the MSS Division of the State Library at Albany, N.Y. is an Indenture, dated Farch 5,1788 and signed by Stephen Van Rensselear and Reuben Smith; as follows: "Reuben Smith of Little Hoosick, N.Y. in the County of Albany, Farmer, in the Famor of Rensselearwyck, on the east side of the Hudson River, at a place called Lit le Hoosick, beginning at the southeast corner, a Birt tree"-----Bie. "gentaining one hundred aighty acres, and no more." The rest was 15 bushels a year for sixty years. The signature of Reuben Smith he we verified with that on a deed proves he lived in Little He 1788. It would set to know why he broke this contract and moved to the set at living there in 1790.

Having supplied the names which are not in the early census reports we have the family of Leuben as it was known to be in 1790 and 1800.

In the Old Baptist Cemetery, Pittsford, Vt, beside the graves of John Wiley Smith and his son, Orlin G. is a stone with the following inscription: "Willy Smith. Born 1796. Die 1816". Could she have been one of the Tamily? If so, she couldn't have been included in the 1800 Census.

It would appear that Diadamia and Huldah did not accompany their parents to Pittsford, and our knowledge of them and their sisters, Mary and Mercy, is very scant.

One of Clarissa's granddaughters recalls hearing her grandmother say that she had thirteen brothers and sisters, and while she never saw her oldest sister she saw her next oldest but once.

That is all we know about Huldah. We have a little information about Diadamia from a letter which she wrote to her sister Lois Smith Harrison of Chittenden, Vt. The name of the state is omitted but I am inclined to think she lived in Michigan as she spoke of friends moving to "Illenoys".

This letter is owned by Lois' great granddaughter, Mary Harrison Hubbard of Salisbury, Vt. and is as follows: Letter written by Diadamia Boon to her sister Lois Harrison. Grafton Dec 30th 1838

Bear Sister

I received yours dated July 9th and am sorry to have the meloncholy news of your sons deth but I feel to simpathise with you for I have been called to drink the biter cup of afflicion in losing my husband and children. But the Savior says our greater afflicions shall not be able than we are able to bare. Therefore if we are faithful we shall one day meet them in Neaven.

S.Rowland Davison moved to Illenoys this fall which was quite a bitter cup for me for I never expect to see him again in this world for old age begins to creep on and I must according to the comon corse of Mature bid farewell to earth. By helth however is very good except the infirmeties of age and my family were all well the last I heard from them. I should like to see you face to face then I could tell you all about my trouble.

I often reflect on past times when we youst to surround our \_\_\_\_? Fathers fireside then we new nothing about trouble.

many soles have been called I trust from Nature darkness to his marvelous sigh which makes me rejoiced.

I was called to morn not long sens the loss of a neighbor Frother Daniel Rhodes Wife but I believe she has gone to a better world for she was a very plus Christian I want you to write when you can for it wont by long before Deth will close the sene with me

Poor Diadamia, Conesone for her family, sad with the loss of her husband and children but still full of hope for the better thiggs to come! How I wish we could know more about her.

In the City Clerk's Office, Rutland Vt. Pock of Deeds 13, page 97 is the record of a Juit Claim Deed which interests me. Omitting all formal wordings it is as follows:

Reuben Smith of Pittsford to the Heirs of John Smith - for the consideration of one dollar to the full satisfaction of the heirs of John Smith - - - - release to the heirs, etc. land bounded on the bast by Francis Gleason, South by W. Meacham, West by Rutland west line and North by lot - - - third Division by Proprietors of the Fown of Rutland it being the three Rights granted by the Governor of New Mampshire to Thomas Flanchard and Oliver Colburn - - - 60 acres. Dated Sept.10,1832. Signed his

Reuben X Smith mark.

S. S. & Delivered in presence of

Orlin Smith Mercy Smith Reuben Smith Pefore Reuven Smith Justice of Peace.

Reuben Sr. had been able to write his name but possibly at his advanced age of 82 he was able only to make his mark. <u>Mercy and Reuben would be his sons and Orlin his grandcon.</u> I could find no record of Reuben Br. being Justice of Peace. Who could have been the John Smith, and was he related to our family? There is record in this same office of the death of one John Smith in 1817, whose father's name was also John.

I find this deed most interesting as it is the only place that we find the name of Mercy.

The D.A.R. record states that "ary mirried James Dean. I believe James Dean to be the borther of Nathan Dean who married Eary's niece Tryphena. A brother, Luke, lived in Fire Hill near the Smiths, and James is said to have gone to St. Lawrence Co. N.Y with his trother Mathan to find a location. Ferhaps more intensive search would find their record.

We have a full record of the other four children of Leuben which will be taken up later.

No trace of the antecedents of Reuben Smith or his wife Lois Lverest can be found.

Estelle Waterstradt recalls that her old Aunt said the family were from England. We know that there were many families of Smiths in New England but the most careful search has given us no clue as to which one Keuben could claim.

There is record of the birth of keuben Smith, son of Samuel and Mary, July 24,1750 in Arfield, Ct. but our record gives the place of his birth as Little Hossic. (Conn. State Library) At one tire there was a migration of families from Connectionit to Datchess Co. N.Y. The Burtons settled in Amenia She Wands from Martford west to Mine Partners, and I rather thick some with families and along too. (Lizra Wead Warried Tryphenia Purton in Wartford, Their damgater Cynthia married a rog of Heuben Smith about 1891 in 7t.) (See Mine Partlies.) The Weads removed to Mutland Co. Vt in 1789 but it was 16 years later that Heuben Smith bought land in Pitteford.

There is record of a "ill of Beuben Smith of Dutchess Go. N.Y. dated May 25,1758 which leaves the property to the wife Mary and the children, (a) maxes). Frother Mathan Smith and brother-in-law John Lockwood are the Executors; witnesses are antel wight, Jacob Surton and Joseph Parcee. Jacob Surton was Cynthis Mead Smith's grandfather. Was this Houben the father of bur Meuben, and who will be able to do sufficient research to find out?

(This will is not on file in Dutchess Co)

### The vere & 28mily.

There were two immigrant families by the name of Everest. Wenjamin once from Lagland and settled in Caybrook. Isaac was a Finnter of Duilford in 1680.

Tenjasin had five sons. Indock and Benja in were among them and they signated to Feaser Co, ".Y. and Addison Co. Wt, and both were coldiers in the Rev. ar. If there were a record of any daughters along with that of the sons I feel sure that the mane of Lois would appear. Indock had a daughter named Lois and and could have been asked for his sister.

Zadock had nine other children. Loraine married a Hurray and was grandmother of the Murray family of Clarendon Springs. There are families of verests living in that town at the present time.

On his first died to property in Pittsford Reuben's name. Address is given as Clarendon. Bid his family come up from Argyle and decide to settle in Fittsford? to be near the Everest relatives?

Some authorities claim that the names Everest and Everit were the same but even so there were families by both names. However the following entry is of interest: "Lois Everitt born Cct. 26,1752, Woodbury Ct. Descendant of Richard Everitt." Postibly further research along this line might disclose important data.

Following is a copy of the deed to the first land bought by Reuben Smith in Pittsford. It is copiedd in its entirety and is immensely interesting. The land is situated in that part of the town salled Fire Hill, and is high on the mountain side not far from the road "over the mountain to Hubbardton". The races are not at all good though the sail makes a trip over them daily.

A little spring bubbles out from under a hummock at the foot of a hill near where the old cider mill stood and the spot has been a favorite picnic place of this branch of the Smith whenever occasion allowed. This spring is the beginning of the little mountain stream that flows soun the mountain side, through the flat near the Jermont Company's mills at Florence, and joins the Otter Creek not far from the railroad bridge south of the station at Florence.

TO ALL FROPLE TO GHORE THE DEPENDENTS SHALL COME Know Ye that Charles Frederick Webster of Juffield, Sec. sy of Hartford and State of Conacticut & for the considerative of one hundred and sixty dollars and thirty three cents lawful ailver m money to me In hand Faid before the Delivery Hereof by Leuben Smith of Clarendon in Rutland County in the State of Vermont received to my full satisfaction of Reuben Smith to give, grant bargain, sell and confirm unto the ed Heuben Smith his heirs and assigns forever all my right and title Interest in property & demand of In or therto a certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in the West part of the Fownship of Pittsford in the State of Vermont butted and bounded as follows:

Beginning at a great white birch tree markd 9th on the West line of Benj. Stevens home lott, then running south 4' west 80 rods to a stake and stones then west 4' north one hundred and ten rods to a stake and stones then North 4' sust eightey rods to a maple tree marked, then east 4' south to the first mentioned bounds, being the first division of the original right to George Hobins with a proper allowance for highways.

To have and to hold the above granted and barglined premises with the appustenances thereof, unto him the said Reuben Smith, his heirs & assigns forever to his and their own proper use benefit and behoof.

And also the sd Charles Frederick Webster do hereby and engage and defend the sd granted premises against all claims and demands whatsoever and so for myself as my heirs executors and Administrators covenant with ad Reuben Smith his heris and assigns throughout and until the enscaling these presents I am well seized of these pramises as a good indefeasible state in fee simple and have good right to bargain & sell in the same manor and form as above written, and that the same is free from all incumbrances whatsoever.

And furthermore 1. the sd Charles Frederick Sebster, do bu the presents bind syself and my heirs forever to warrant and defend the above granted and bargained premises to the sd Reuben Swith and to his Heirs & Assigns against all claims and demands whatsoever.

In witness what rof I have hereunto set my hand & seal the first day of September A.D. 1797. Signed Sealed and Delivered in presence of Charles F. Webster X. Joseph Foreward James Foreward.

Hartford Go. Granbey, September 1th 1797. Parsonally appeared Charles P.Webster, signor and scaler of the above Instrument and acknowledged the same to be his free act and deed. Before me, Joseph Foreward, Justice of Peace. Recorded Dac.4th 1798 in Bock of Deeds No 3, pp31-33.

his land Neuben sold to his son Samuel on the 25th day of Sept. 1801, for 3300,000 and on the 12th day of Oct. of the same year Neuben and Samuel bought of Sphriam Ancker of Bolton, folland Co. Conn. a parcel of land for 3270.00 decoribed as follows: Beginning at a Maple tree being the NW corner sa Smiths home lott, thence on ad Smiths west line south east 157 rods to a saake and stones being the SW corner of ad Smiths home lott, thence on the north 14 se of land I sold Col. Kellogg West 1' South 157 rods to a sease and stones, thence North 21' East 113 rods to a stake and stones near a birch tree thence North 1' West 49 rods thence East 1' North a straight line to the place began at containing one hundred and eighteen Acres. This transaction took place about the time of Samuel to

marriage.

On Mar.25th,1808 Reuben sold to Samuel for \$100.00 13 Adres of land which from its description sounds as if it were the north end of the "Home Farm". Description as follows:

Beginning at a maple tree at the NE Corner of my home farm, thence westerly 55 rods to the NW corner of sd farm, thence south 3' east 37 rods and 20 links fo a stake and stones, thence Lasterly parallel with the north line 55 Rods to a stake and stones thence North 4' hast 37 rods and 20 links to the first bound. Book 7.pp 389/90. Pittsford.

On Oot.12,1761, Benning Wentworth, Governor of ew Hampshire granted twanty five thousand acres to 64 men for the town of Pittsford. These 64 grantees were for the most part from Connectiout and many of them never lived on their grunts. (See Pittsford Fown History by Dr.Caverly.)

The first purchase of Reuben Smith was the first division of the original right of George Robins who had sold it to Webster; and Lhyriam fucker had no doubt come into possession of the . he sold Reuben and Samuel through the same source.

While I have several old deeds in my possession and have copied others from the records in Pittsford there is not a sufficient amount of data to make a satisfactory record of all the various land transactions that took place in the family.

However It is evident from Samuel's will (1823) that all the property had been turned over to him by his father; and the part known as the home farm Samuel willed to his son Orlin, who' lived there till 1837. Cephas Brown owns the place now.

"farm south of the home farm Orlin sold to his brother-in-law, Bradley Burditt who lived there till 1862 when he bought the Buck place in Pittsford Village.

REWELN SMITH lived to be 84 years old and his wife, 78. Noth outlived their son Samuel and his wife Cynthia, and all four are buried in the Old Congregational Cemetery in Pittsford village. At the time of his death Reuben had 19 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren, according to the records which we have. There records have now enabled us to the following descendants of our Pibneer Ancestor

SAMUEL SHITH was 19 years of age when he came to Pittsford with his father, and settled on Fire Hill, where he spent the remainder of his life.

There is a tradition in the family about his death which is hard to explain; His son Orlin was often heard to relate how he drove to Albany in the dead of winter to bring home the body died of his father who had while visiting in Michigan. As Bamuel died in August this trip is hard to explain, unless the body had not been shipped until the cold weather had come. The funeral expenses of \$25.50 would not include transportation from Michigan even in those days of small costs. The Inventory of his estate was taken in Oct. 1829. We would like the solution of this rip.

And who could Samuel have been visiting in Michigan in 1028? Was it his sister Diadamia who wrote in 1332 that she had not seen her family in so long?.

There is only one thing we know about the character of Samuel and that is not greatly to his credit. There must have been a rough, primitive streak there is omewhere as Rollin #51 was often known to say that he never heard his father, Crlin # 13, speak of his father, Samuel, with a kind word.

And Reuben, jr. is reported having a family of sons that he frequently beat. Cynthia must have inherited this bad disposition, as the expression "ugly as Aunt Cynt" has been used in our family since my sarliest remembrance! She was a stout, flees person as was her brother Orlin, and half brother Samuel Franklin.

Her sisters Gryphena and Sarah wer tiny small boned women who probably favored their mother, Cynthia Mead. Orlin had the same genial disposition as his sisters and a kinder old gentleman I have never known.

Deguerrectypes or photographs of nearly all of Samuel's children are in the possession of the writer and it is to be regretted that the expense of reproducing them prohibits in cluding them in this compilation. There is also a photograph of Clarissa Smith Wolcott-#9

Samuel Smith's first wife was Cynthia Kead of Rutland, who died in 1824. In a few months he was again married to Sarah Bresee of Pittsford. She was born in West Stockbridge, Mass. An Jan.15,1795. the daughter of Christopher and Hannah (Minman) Bresee.

CHRISTOPHER BRESSE settled in Pittsford in 1797, and bought 166 Acres of land - part of the 3d division of the origin al "ight of Charles Whittlesey. "I land was later owned by his and son Wallace and was situated on the read to Bresse's Mills. Eney had 14 children and Sarah was the 10th.

In 1833, five years after the death of her husband, Sarah quit-chaimed her share of her husband's estate to his son Orlin for 3800.00. And on Jan.30,1842 in Whiting she was married to Harry Holden, son of David and Hannah Holden of Shrewsbury, who was the father of 6 daughters and two sons.

grand Thus the only Smith grandparents Samuel's/children had ( except, of course, his youngest son) were "Grandpa and Grandma Holden", who were no relation at all, except as she was a Stepgrandmother and he was her second husband.

That they were greatly beloved by Orlin's family is shown in letters written in the 1860's and by the fact that Orlin's son and wife named their only son Harry Holden Smith.

Sarah Breses Smith Holden lived to be 72 years old. She died in Shrewsbury, Vt. Oct.10,1867; and is buried in the Old Congregational Cemetery in Pittsford by the side of her sister K ate and not far from the grave of her first husband, Samuel Smith. See Holder Genealogy by Eben Putnam, for Holden data

At the time Samuel married Sarah Bresse his family consisted of his father Reuben and mother Lois, his sons John and Orlin, and five daughters ranging in ages from fourteen to four. Tryphena and Ezra were married and lived in Depuyster, N.Y. It must have taken a woman of strang courage to step into a family of such proportions.

It is interesting to note that Cynthia named her first daughter for her mother,; her first son for her step-father, John

Wiley, and her second son for her father, Ezra Mead, od whom she must have had scant recollection.

In June 1830, nearly two years after Samuel's death, his sous John and Urlin made an agreement to become "partners in agreculture and farming", and Orlin quit-claimed his share of his father's estate to John for 1000.00

About six months after both were married this partnership was dissolved (April 1832); and Orlin discharged John from his obligation to Cynthis and Sarah as specified in their father's will.

Hendee, and Orlin stayed on at the home farm which he sold in 1835 to his brother-im-law, Bradley Burditt.

Orlin bought the Amherst Lee farm located on the "Creek Hoad" (to Brandon); after owned by David Holden, and at the present writing owned by a son of John Landon. This farm Orlin sold to his brother John, whose father-in-law, Solomon Hendee lived in the adjoining farm which had been improved by the erection of a large stone house. John lived here until his death in 184.7.

Orlin bought the Willis ferm in 1837 but sold it in 1846 (?) and moved back to Fire Hill. Just where he Lived is not known; possibly with the Burditts who had bought the home farm.

The house on this farm had burned at one time and to its foundations was moved a house from the adjoining farm. This house now stands overlooking the Otter Creek valley and the Nickwaukett Mountain beyond, on whose slope the Manley family lived, and where Orlin went for his wife Mary.

On Oct.2,1847 Orlin purchased the Oven farm on Otter Greak from Ashael Wolcott, and here he spent the remainder of his life. Thus farm is now owned by the Vermont Marble Co. at Florence.

Samuel Smith was selectman in 1813,1821 and 1823-4. His name appears in a list of wolf hunters in 1809. In 1827 he was selected Sustodian of the Key to the Cider mill and in 1826 he was appointed Justice of the Peace.

To all Hom These Presense Shal Come: We the subscribers doe mutuly agre to Mind ourselves, our heirs, Executors or administrators to g in and put up a fraim thirty six by twenty-six feet and complext the outside of it ina a workman like manner for the purpose of a cidermill.

3d house to be wald on two sides and one end sufficiently high to leigh the plates and Beams upon. sd mill to be not on willum Peals or Samuil Smith land as near the brook Where it runs across the road betwixt Samuil Swith and Wm Beals or will nost conduce to the best good of all the company.

Then it to be understood that Luke Dean Samuil Smith Wm Heals & Pster Thomas is to compleat the mill in a workman like manner in season to make up the next fall cider.

And the expens of Dooing the inside work is to be perportioned amongst these men according to the prefit that they are to receive from ad mill.

After sd mill is compleated in the manner above pescribed it is understood that all those who Subscribed to this agreemnt are to keep sd mill in good repare which expens ad Company are to pay in pepertion to the profits they recev theirfrom.....

Dated at Pittsford this 29 day of March ..... 1717.

- 1-1y. After ed mill is compleated there is to be some Suitable person Belonging to ad Company to be apointer as trustee for ad Company and to take charge of the mill.
- 2-ly. it is to be understood that this Company is to have qui rights and preveleges to make their own cider in sd mill.....
- 3-ly. if it should so Happen that two or more of sd Company should want to use ad mill at one time and they cannot make to get ther and they cannot agre amongst them selve who shul have the first use of ad mill the parties in contention shall wast Lotts for the first use of sd mill.

- 4-ly. it is to be understood that when the first one begins to make his cider or at least what he calculates at that time, he shall dispense with it as soon as and slear the mill for the next, and so go on to "the others throug the Company so that no one of sd Company is use needlessly Detained....
- 5-ly. it is to be understood that if any one of sd Company should conclude not to make all his cider at one time that he is to wait til the rest of the Company has had their turns unless the mill shud stand empty a sufient time for him to make the remainder of his cider.
- 6-ly no one who does not belong to ad Company shull be admited to make cider in ad mill unless it is by the direction of the trustee of ad Company, and not then when any one of ad Company are wishing to use the mill, and if any one/of the company should use the mill it shul be the duty of ad trustee to receve the pay and keep it in bak (?) fr the express purpose of repairing ad mill....
- 7-ly. no one of sd Company is to use the mill for anything except it be for the purpose of storing aples and making cider. Sd mill is to be secured by a good lock and kee and the kee is to be lodged with the trustee of sd Company.....
- 8-ly this atticle of agreement is to be lodged with the Trustee of sd Company who is to be acountuble for the safe keeping of the same....

I,Samuel Smith of Pittsford in the County of Rutland and State of Vermont, being weak in body but of sound and perfect mind and memory do make and publish this, my last will and Testament in manner and form following;

That is to say in the first place I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Sarah all the household furniture that she passessed when I married her, also one fourth part of the doverletts, blankets, sheets and pillow onces and disper which she made for me since she became my wife.

Also can hundred and fift dellars in each to be paid her by my executor hereinafter named within five years after my decease. Also the use while she remains my widow, of the southwest corner of my new welling house, and chamber above said room and onefourth part of the kitchen of said house and onepfourth part of the sink-room, and one-fourth part of the cellar under ad nouse.

I further give her one three-foot table, also six diging chairs, one three pail kettle, the pet, one dish Kettle, two iron besons, one Shovel and tongs, one pair firs-dogs, one tes-kettle, nine common Table plates, eight small disto, byc blue quart bowls, two small bowls, one two quart pitcher, one set of knives and forks, and so much of the crockery as to make out a set with the above described.

And six Table spoons and four tin milk pans, four earthon pans, and two tin plates. Also two cows, also one of the looking glasses, the one she may choose, one pair of brass candlesticks, also a small churn.

In the next place I bequeath to my son Orlin my home form and thirty-five acres, called the Thomas Parm, with all the building and appurtanances to the above desprised real estate, subject to the above bequest to my wife.

Also the remainder of my personal property on the condition that he at all times furnish my widow with a suitable horas Carriage and harness, Bridle, etc. and twenty pounds good sheeps wohl ennually, ten pounds of good wheat, Tweaty bushels of indian corm, two hundred pounds of good park and what shuce she may need, all to be furnished annually.

And shall also keep number and whiter in good manner the aforesaid two some for to wife and in case of death by sickness of either or both of them to replace the same so that at all times she may while she remains my sidew have two cows.

And shall also pay all my jus. deste and funeral o charges. I also give to my son Orlin the said property the use of which I have bequauthed to my wife when it ceases to be here.

I next give to my son John ".Smith the Lean farm socalled, situated in Pittsford, upon the condition that he pay my daughter Cynthis two hundred dollars in good salable neat outtle when she arrives at full age, and also pay to my daughter Sarah two hundred dollars as last aforesaid when she arives of full age. And also find my father and mother ten cords of good fire wood annually during their life time.

The said Orlin is also to maintain and school Cynthia and Sarah in the same manner as he is to the other children.

I also give to my sons Orlin and Sohn W. Smith in equal shares all my property in the clutr mill standing on the Beal Farm so-called.

Lastly I hereby appoint my son Orlin and Isaac Bresse executors of this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all former wills made by me.

That a wonderful peek into the household of more than 100 years ago this Inventory gives us; and how interesting each group of furnishings is in itself.

The Inventory itself is a much faded and badly creased paper, and though the ink is somewhat faded the writing is clear except for the poorly shaped letters. In some places it was impossible to decipher some of the words, especially not is use at the present time. And the figures were hard to determine. The total at the end was the total given on the Inventory, and not of the figures as they have been deciphered!

Articles of Agreement had, made, concluded and agreed upon this 4th day of June, A.D. 1830, between Orlin Smith and John W. Smith both of Pittsford in the County of Rutland, agraculturists and Farmers.

And also that the said co-partners shall at all times hereinafter, during ad co-partnership, pay, care & discharg equally between themselves all the expenses of keepint & main taining our Grandfather Reuben Smith and his wife, our grand mother, and also to pay equally all the logacies agreeable to the provisions expressed and contained in the last will and od our deceased father to our brothers and sisters.

& to pay to our mother-in-law, Sarah Smith, the amont & at the time, as is provided for in & by the Will of our Father, deceased.

And all the porffite of she said business of co-partnership shall be equally divided between us, as we shall hereinafter agree, or at the dissolution thereof.

## Tryphens Smith Dean.

I have been asked to write a biography and a tribute to the character and personality of my pioneer grandomther, Tryphena Smith Lean. Would that I had the ability of a Bess Streeter Aldrich to bring her to life, as we see that other pioneer, Abby Deal in "Alantern in her Hand."

To tell the story of her life is easy, but to describe her experiences, and to delineate the fine courage and happy enthusiasm with which she met the trials of frontier life are more difficult.

Tryphena was the eldest of the ten children of Samuel and Cynthia Mead Smith, and was born near Pittsford,

## Third Generation.

Vermont, December 17,1802. Till the end of her life she loved Vermont and New England; and even now her "Vermont stories" are being repeated to her great-great-grandchilren.

How she laughed as she told one on herself as a child of four or five years. It seems that she and her two little brothers, John and Ezra, were walking together and were accosted by a stranger. Observing that the children were about of a size ( Tryphena was always tiny) the man said to the sister and spokesman." Are these your brothers?" How much difference is there in your ages?" Tryphene answered solemnly, " 5 think about six weeks."

Tryphena was married at the age of twenty-ons

to a Fitteford boy, Mathan Dean. A year before their marriage, Nathan in company with a brother or two had taken up land in St.Lawrence County, New York. After keeping ah anty alone one summer in the thick woods, he started for Vermont to marry his sweetheart. to marry his sweetheart. He traveled on foot and alone, two Bundred miles, with his pack containing his clothing, on his back.

After the wedding, the couple returned to New York and began life in the shanty. They proceeded to clear land and to establish a comfortable home. They sived there twelve years during which time four of their live children were born.

Then the pioneer spirit again took possession, and again Nathan started toward the west. He went on foot and alone. He traversed Western New York, Ohie and finally found his "Utopia " in Jackson County, Machigan. Territory. He bought 640 acres of land from the government, and returned to his home in St. Lawrence Co.

The following year, 1835, Nathan Dean brought his family and possessions to the new home in Michigan, Travelling by mater a s far as Detroit, they proceeded from there with horses and wagon, the latter loaded with their goods. Tryphens rode on top of the load balling her fourtees muthold baby, George. Mathan and the older children were on foot driving the four cows.

At the time they came to Michigan, the country was an almost unbroken wilderneds, and wolves and bears and Indians prowled about. The first shanty in which the family lived several months was fourteen feet by eighteen fact, and they had was set out of deers at night in order to make room for beds on the floor. The cooking mag done out of doors, a pile of logs supplying the first bread was baked in an iron kettle with a tight fitting cover, buried in the hot askes. Blankets were hung at night for doors and windows, and drinking water was brought from a spring four miles away.

The family often entertained new settlers who were passing through looking for land, and the Indians made frequent calls for something to cat.

goon a comfortable log house was built, and in this home their last chill was born. He was Orlin Smith Dean, my father, and he was born in 1838.

After long years of hard work and hardships, the land was eleared, fortile fields yielded rich harvests, and fine country houses and barns were built. Nathan and Tryphena found themselves prosperous, and they found great happiness in seeing their children and grandohildren enjoy-

ing the opportunities their labor and thrift had made posel ble. My father has told that during those hard years, whild the land was being cleared of timber, and afterwards, when the large farm was under cultivation, and immense orops of wheat were being planted and harvested, Tryphena, weighonly nimety pounds, with the help of one fed and cared for the small army of men required to do the work. There was little or no machinery in those days; the work was done by man power, and it goes without saying that there were no movenimnes in the kitchen.

But through it all it was the courage, "he ambition, the enthusiaam of the wife and mother that furnished the incentive to such the family about. Tryphers never complained or knew discouragement. She presented a rem arkable mind, and what she said was worth bearing. Her sume of humor was unique, and there was always a twinkle in her eye. Young people leved her because she was never old.

Tryphens Dean lived to see her minety-second year, but " > never lost any of her vivacity, and was active in mind and Ody until her last illness. Her dector could find no disease; her heart stopped besting, that was all.

Nathan and Tryphens Dean loved their shurch, an d with four others formed the first Methodist class in the community. In the early years the was an itémerant preacher and meetings were held in the 1 am log-house. Later the Deans were instrumental in building substantial church buildings.

The family also believed in education, and echools and colleges bear witness to their fidelity.

Nathan Dean died in 1885, at the age of dighty-four,

and Tryphena was permitted to stay with us for eleven mare years.

The children and grandchildren and great-grandchildren of this couple have been men and women who have been respected for their integrity and who have measured up in a splendid way to the high standards which were set by these pioneers, Mathan and Tryphens Dean.
