

Vintage quilt exhibit in Lima

The Lima Historical Society is sponsoring a vintage quilt exhibit, "Needles and Pins," at the Tennie Burton Museum through November and December. Eight vintage quilts will be shown, as well as the Bicentennial Quilt featuring historic buildings of the town. The museum is located at 1850 Rochester Street (Route 15A) in the village of Lima, and will be open from 2 until 4 p.m. each Sunday afternoon from November through March. Both the museum and the special exhibit are free and open to the public, although donations are gratefully accepted.

The big white birch: a parable

I miss the tree in Judy and Ken's yard. The corner is empty now that the big white birch is gone. It was a beautiful thing, tall and stately, yet graceful. In summer there was a pool of cool shade as the branches spread with garlands of leaves glistening like emeralds in the summer breeze.

The tree didn't seem to suffer a lot of damage in the ice storm. Some branches broke, but not many. The tree seemed to recover as limbs, bent under the weight of the ice, returned to their places when the heavy coat of ice melted. But apparently there was damage no one saw.

I think it is that way with people lots of times. When abused or hurt, they seem to bend back in place and go on as if nothing happened. But inside there is damage. A child abused will be a child who doesn't trust easily. The dam-

age our cruel words cause may not be evident, but our neighbor dies a little inside because of our thoughtlessness. Healthy attitudes and sense of well being are damaged because we hurt each other.

People don't visibly wither and die like the white birch tree did. But much of what they could be is denied us because of the damage caused by life's storms.

Judy and Ken say they won't try to replace the big tree. I'm sorry. I really miss it. I feel poorer because of the richness of personality many of the folks I know might have if they hadn't been hurt so badly inside.

We can't prevent ice storms. They just happen. We can do something about the hurts we cause other people by being as careful with them as we try to be with the rest of God's creation.
