

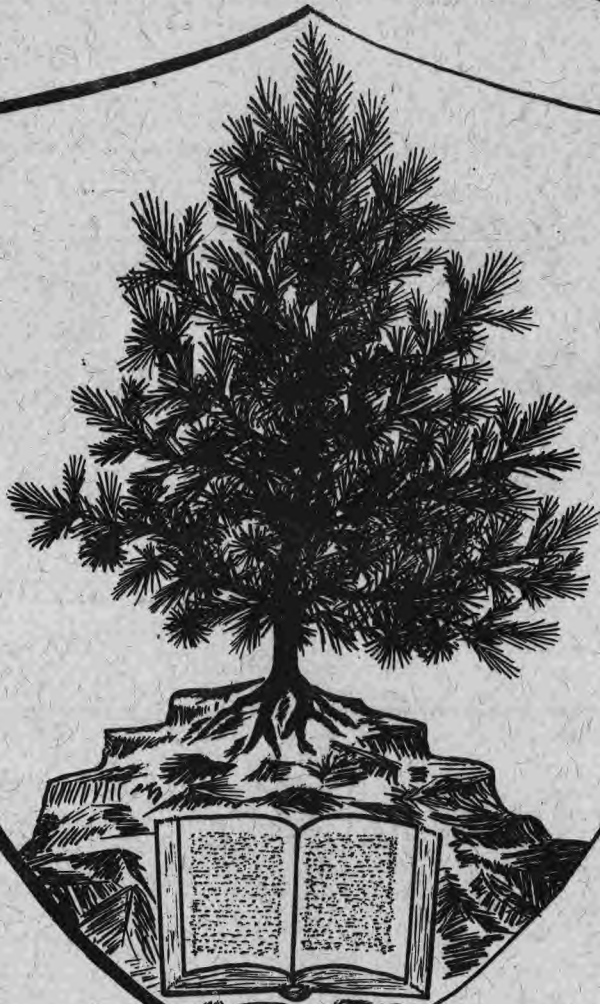

SUCCESSFUL WORKSHOP HELD

The SGS Advanced Genealogical Workshop held April 1 was highly successful. Besides staff, 86 registrants crowded into the third floor auditorium of the Seattle Public Library. Twelve came up from Portland, Oregon. Tacoma, Yakima, Olympia, Bellingham, and Camano Island were also represented.

The workshop grossed \$1,052.57, including \$875.00 in registrations, \$140.47 at the supply table, and \$37.10 at the food table.

There were displays on both sides of two new folding screens, which were made by Mr. Lewsthof. Mrs. A. W. Guyes exhibited the illustrated lineage chart and the Women Descendants of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company coat of arms, both of which were done for her by her son.

Mrs. Grace Lewsthof brought her notebooks showing her lineage with pictures, illustrations, and maps. Displays illustrated the different types of documents mentioned in talks, including wills, guardianship papers, deeds, samples of old handwriting. Don Vincent exhibited the Society coat of arms drawn for him by a TV artist.

A new SGS form made its advent. It is to be used for recording data from Soundex census microfilm. (See pp. 436-37, December, 1965, issue for details on Soundex.) Soundex means that the card index was arranged by the first letter of the surname, the sound of the surname, and not strictly alphabetically.

Geoffrey Gilbert of Victoria, B.C., told how he saw his genealogy, Gilberts of New England, progress from rough notes to a nice hard-cover edition (250 copies). Printing alone cost him \$25 per volume, and he sells them for \$10.

Mrs. Willmetta Bauguess gave a good analysis of systems of abbreviation. She mentioned that in old handwriting the capitals were written above the line so that I and J looked alike; both capital and small V and U were the same; small E and O looked the same in some regions.

Arthur Fiske told of the half-way covenant of the Congregational Church, prevalent in the early 18th century, and the importance of a parent owning the covenant prior to baptism of children.

Each instructor prepared a printed outline of his talk, and those outlines were included in the kit. Portions of this kit and the kits of previous workshops are for sale at the supply table at SGS meetings.

Another elementary workshop is scheduled for October, 1967.

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MAY PROGRAMS VARIED

Mrs. R. E. (Helen) Stevenson of Ephrata talked May 6 on making the family live for young people. Her children have been living with genealogy for the past few years. They know their family history, although sometimes are inclined to be a bit influenced by TV. Before going on a trip, cross-country or a shorter trip, the family studies a book on the history of the area written on the children's level. Nine-year-old Lisa already has made genealogy her hobby. She has asked for and received 2 families of her own to work on. She carries on her own genealogical correspondence.

Allan Hitchings on May 10 talked on the beginnings of industry in America and showed slides of the Saugus (Mass.) Ironworks. It was established in 1648 and has been excavated and reconstructed.

Other cemeteries may be copied this summer, so express your interest. Tacoma Genealogical Society is doing Pierce Co. cemeteries. The Seattle Genealogical Society will do Thurston and Kitsap Counties. Mrs. Wauneta McMaines has copied Seabeck, and the SGS has copied Bethel and Port Gamble, all in Kitsap Co. Mrs. C. F. Hall plans to copy some cemeteries in southwestern Washington. The SGS has copied Tumwater and Grand Mound in Thurston Co.

If you find a cemetery on a trip, please copy it. But first check with Arthur Fiske to make sure it has not already been done. It is especially important to copy small family plots in fields. Hunters especially may find these.

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BULLETIN PUBLISHING IS COMPLICATED

Someone asked if we deliberately set out to make publication of the Bulletin as complicated as possible. No, it just grew!

Mrs. Victor Benson organizes and types the queries and mails or brings them to me. I gather news, write articles, and make stencils

(except where an individual is given credit). The typing of stencils is done when 2½-year-old Danny and 5-month-old Renee are fast asleep. Danny had night-owl-itis this winter, which presented a real problem (now resolved). I make one or two trips with stencils and kids from Capitol Hill to University Presbyterian Church by bus or taxi, depending on the weather. Bernie Bean runs off the stencils on the U. Pres. mimeograph. He also sees that the offset master for the front cover is made and runs it off.

Roy Colbert picks up the back page, takes it to Bothell, and runs it through the addressograph. Mrs. Lester Saffell, membership committee chairman, keeps him apprised of which members have paid dues and of changes of address. Mr. Colbert takes the back page to Miss Marie Freeman on Seattle's First Hill. She and Mrs. G. A. Jensen apply the stamps (postage limits us to 22 pages per issue). They take the back page to the Seattle Public Library; Bernie Bean takes the other pages there. Mrs. Jensen's committee assembles the Bulletin: Mrs. William Grove, Miss Freeman, Mrs. John Zuber, Marguerite Wirt, Mrs. George Weigert, Mrs. George Swanton, Mrs. Gunn, Mrs. Saffell, William A. Mills. If there is no car available to take the boxes of Bulletins to the Post Office, it must be done by taxi; some taxi drivers object to loading it.

Mrs. Saffell takes some of the extra copies for mailing to new members as they join. Mrs. Anthony Guyes, chairman of mailing and selling publications, takes the rest of the extra copies to make up into sets which are available for purchase. Mrs. A. P. Miranda is compiling an index of the Bulletin for recent years.

P R E S I D E N T ' S   P A G E

Army Lieut. Col. Gerald G. Griffeth (ret.), past president and long-time member of the Seattle Genealogical Society, died February 21, 1967, at the age of 84. A faithful participant in nearly all activities of the Society, he will be greatly missed.

But his memory will linger on in the hearts of all who knew and respected him, and generations of genealogists in Seattle will be grateful for his generous contributions of books and microfilms to the Seattle Public Library. It can be said that Col. Griffeth was a patron of genealogy, and in some measure every day his genealogical work will continue to bring pleasure and satisfaction to those who use the collection at the Library.

Among the most valuable sets donated by Col. Griffeth is the published Archives of Ontario (Canada) containing material on United Empire Loyalists and other early settlers of the Province of Ontario. While the Canadian collection was perhaps the most outstanding of his contributions, his interests were also represented by many local histories, family genealogies, microfilms, and other materials relating to genealogical research.

A memorial fund has been established to secure funds with which to purchase books to honor Col. Griffeth. Anyone wishing to contribute to the fund may do so by mailing contributions to our treasurer, Mrs. E. R. Powell, marked "Griffeth Memorial."

FAMILY CARDS for the 1730-1830 file are coming in almost daily, and nearly 1,000 cards are now on file. The cards should be printed or typed on regulation 3" X 5" cards which can be purchased at any drug store or supermarket. Each card should provide sufficient data with which to POSITIVELY identify the person on whom information is sought. Cards may also be submitted for families on which you have complete information but are willing to share with others. We believe this can be one of the most important projects of the Society and one which should be an incentive for genealogists to become a part of the organization. It is planned to restrict the use of the file to members.

For more complete information regarding the FAMILY FILE, see pages 530-31 of the March Bulletin. For ready reference, however, we repeat the sample card printed previously. It contains a MINIMUM amount of data.

### GERMAN RESEARCH HELPS GIVEN

Manfred Vierthaler of the Bavarian Restaurant in Tacoma spoke on research in his native Germany at the April 13 meeting of SGS.

Some towns had no town registrars before mid 1700's. With non-royalty families you are lucky to get back to the 1400's; it depends on where they lived. For the western part of the Rhine before 1820 you have to go to the churches. You may get no response from small town churches. Regarding cases of records destroyed by bombing, the little towns were not affected as much as the large industrial cities. However, there are several different sources for the same record.

Use international postage coupons (obtainable at Post Office). There is no problem in writing in English even to the little towns. Some towns send 4 or 5 pages free; some will send one date and charge \$3. Ship's passenger lists exist; write the German Immigration Service. In Germany when you move you have to leave a forwarding address with the police department.

Sometimes there are 5 different spellings for the name of the same individual. Sometimes people spell their name the same and bear the same coat of arms but are not related.

Mr. Vierthaler brought his copy of a valuable little book written in German, Taschenbuch fur Familien-geschichtsforschung, by Friedrich Wecken and Johannes Krausse (Schellenberg bei Berchtesgaden: Verlag Degener & Co., Inh. Gerhard Gessner, 1951). This book contains many important addresses.

It contains the following: ad-

dress of the general archive for the Lutheran Church in Germany; addresses of states archives; names and addresses of families of people who died in German wars; German genealogical abbreviations; dates when some German genealogical books were published beginning as early as 1574; names and addresses of organizations publishing genealogical periodicals; names of genealogical societies in Germany; list of general books on genealogy; basics of genealogy; list of books of church records; list of books of funeral orations about individuals from mid 1600's to mid 1800's; list of who went to German and Austrian universities beginning as early as 1623, 1392, depending on when university was founded; military information; how to read early German handwritings; different ways of counting time, days of months, etc.; symbols found on old records; heraldry; name rights; hierarchy; types of royalty; diseases; advertisements of genealogists.

### SCANDINAVIAN INTEREST GROUP GROWS

Scandinavian Interest Group of the Seattle Genealogical Society will hold the last monthly meeting for this year on June 8 at 1:00 p.m. in the first floor conference room of the Seattle Public Library. The SIG was initiated October 13, 1966. For at least three years there had been increasing interest in founding such a group, especially after the other interest groups were begun.

There were 11 people present at the October meeting. To date, 38 people have attended one or more times. Still others plan to attend. A number are coming regularly. There has been much interest, which is not surprising because of the number of Scandinavian-Americans residing in Seattle and outlying districts. It is expected that the membership will continue to increase as people are informed through the newspapers and otherwise. It is thought by those who have made a study of it that the Scandinavian Interest Group is the first of its kind in this country.

Several members of the Scandinavian Interest Group are also members of the Norwegian-American Historical Society, located at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota. We have had considerable correspondence with its secretary, Mr. Lloyd Hustvedt. This association is receiving the Bulletin of the Seattle Genealogical Society in exchange for its News Letter. A number of its publications are in the Seattle Public Library, especially in the History Department. Through this organization and with the encouragement of Mr. Arthur D. Fiske, SGS president, and Mrs. C. C. Magoon, SGS book purchase chairman, the Seattle Genealogical Society has been able to procure approximately 150 duplicate older books and pamphlets, in English and Norwegian, for \$28.00 including postage! There is material on family history, place history, church history, etc. These books are being checked and prepared for cataloguing at the library. They should be of great help in the study of genealogy, especially Norwegian and Danish genealogy.

The Scandinavian Interest Group has received good advice from Dr. Walter Johnson, chairman of the Department of Scandinavian Languages and Literature at the University of Washington. Because of this advice, we have been in contact with E. Gustav Johnson, executive secretary and editor, Swedish Pioneer Historical Society, Chicago, who sent us helpful material. We have also heard from Nils William Olsson, who was formerly in the American Embassy in Oslo, Norway, and is the author of Tracing Your Swedish Ancestry. In September of this year he will take over the directorship of the American Swedish Institute in Minneapolis. He stated: "I will then have a much better chance to be of help to you." In response to a letter to Dana College, Blair, Nebraska, Director of Public Relations Phillip A. Pagel said that the college, "founded by the Danes, serves as a depository for many things Danish. We have a large collection of Danish works in English translation as well as many things in the original." He sent a copy of an interesting and useful book, Saga of the Tower by Christensen. He stated they would like to help us. So far we have not received much help regarding Finnish and Icelandic genealogy.

## SCANDINAVIAN INTEREST GROUP GROWS (CON.)

This year the following members of the Scandinavian Interest Group have contributed talks to our programs: Mr. Thomas Overby (Norwegian), Mrs. Kenneth Jacobson (Swedish), Mrs. George Tallman (Finnish), and Mrs. William Chisholm (Danish). These talks have necessarily been limited to 20 minutes because of important announcements, some other shorter contributions, and questions from the group. Some who have had much to give have not yet had an opportunity to share it. We hope to have Iceland represented in the fall. At the June meeting we wish to give all the members present an opportunity to share helps in genealogy and to ask questions, to which we shall try to find answers as soon as possible.

The Scandinavian Interest Group contacted Mr. Svein Gilje, staff member of the Seattle Times, who has written a number of articles on Scandinavians. He met with the SIG at our March meeting. Members cooperated well in preparing written statements, at his request, regarding their genealogical experiences. He is interviewing some members prior to completing his article on the SIG, which he hopes to have in the Times soon.

One member, Mrs. Marie Sherwin, whom we hope to have on the program in the fall, has been present at each SIG meeting. Other members include: Arthur D. Fiske, president of the Seattle Genealogical Society; Mrs. Carol Lind, assistant in the Genealogy Section of the Seattle Public Library; Mrs. Rose E. Rowe, SGS chairman of charts and supplies; Mrs. Ida McCormick, Bulletin editor; and Mrs. G. A. Jensen, chairman of Bulletin mailing.

Mrs. Leo Forsberg of Tacoma, who has attended every meeting since November, suggested that the SIG go to Scandia Gaard at Gig Harbor this summer. We hope the SIG will be well represented at the Nordic Festival August 13-20 in the Plaza Building at the Seattle Center. We have been asked by Mrs. Sirkka Wilson, the chairman, to volunteer as hostesses of booths. Captain and Mrs. Gunnar Olsborg, sponsors of the Nordic Festival, have freely given our Group advice since its beginning.

Miss Marshall of Scandinavian Airlines supplied the SIG with maps of Scandinavia and copies of the booklet, Tracing Your Swedish Ancestry, by Nils William Olsson. The Swedish Consulate furnished us with 10 of Mr. Olsson's booklets. The Norwegian Information Service, Washington, D.C., sent us a number of booklets, How to Trace Your Ancestors in Norway.

Mrs. Jack W. Ehrig of Richland, Washington, hopes to visit our Scandinavian Interest Group in the fall. She is editor for the Tri-City Genealogical Society and author of three genealogies: Descendants of Hans Thomsen, The Ehrig Book, and The Skow Family, which are in the Seattle Public Library.

My co-chairman, Mrs. Kenneth Jacobson of Kirkland, has done much research and has been of great assistance to us in this project. While we have been trying to help others we have also been helped. We thank all who have helped us so graciously.
