FAR FROM HOME AND MATES.

More Than a Hundred Homing Pigeons To Be Released.

More than a hundred homing pigeons were received at the Pennsylvania station from J. A. Allen, of Pittsburg, to be released that they make return to their home 353 miles away.

Homing or carrier pigeons are trained by being taken from their home to stations and released, beginning at a point near by and increasing the distance. Greenfield is one of the stations, the birds being consid-

ered pretty well trained by the time they get this far along. They arrived this morning and will be released at the home of John Martin, on Swope street Sunday morning at 7 o'clock. Watch for them and see if they know the direction to take.
